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SUMMARY

The Cal Palmer Memorial Building, located at 502 Main Street, Windermere, is a one-story, frame vernacular building with drop siding, on a foundation of concrete piers. The building is rectangular, twenty feet wide by twenty-six feet deep, with a low pitch gable roof covered with composition shingles. Constructed in 1911, it is the oldest building in the community. The 1941 enclosure of the front porch and removal of the original front wall are the only alterations to the building.

SETTING

The Cal Palmer Memorial Building is in the center of a three block commercial district in the Town of Windermere (Photo 1). With the exception of the Town Hall (c.1922) and a portion of the old school (c.1916), all other buildings in the commercial area date since 1949. A public sidewalk runs in front of the building along Main Street. The building is surrounded by mature shrubs and oak, pine and cedar trees (Photo 2). Windermere is located on a thin strip of land between two large lakes; Lake Down on the north and east, and Lake Butler on the south and west. Main Street, running north and south, is the primary access road between the The town is on the periphery of metropolitan lakes. Orlando's current expansion, and golfer Arnold Palmer recently built his exclusive Islesworth development and Bay Hill Club immediately to the south. Disney World development is less than 4 miles to the south. As a result, Windermere is under intense development pressure.

PHYSICAL DESCRIPTION

Exterior

The main facade (east elevation) has a gable and a centrally located, single light, paneled wood door with original hardware (Photo 3). Two 1/1 wood windows with shutters flank the door. A flower box, with scalloped edge,

is attached beneath each window. Tongue and groove wood siding within the gable is set vertically. There are two decorative stepped brackets at either corner under the eaves.

The north and south elevations are identical. They have double casement windows in the front portion of the building, and a triple casement window in the rear portion. The roof rafter ends are exposed (Photos 4 & 5).

The rear (west) elevation has a centrally located, exterior brick chimney which pierces the peak of the gabled roof (Photo 6). As on the front, the wood brackets under the corners of the eaves are visible. To the south of the chimney, is a single light door accessed by two wooden steps.

The extended overhanging gables, braced with decorative brackets with stepped ends, and battered corner boards of the main facade, are Craftsman stylistic elements. The siding that encloses the original screened front porch is set back so that the original battered columns remain exposed.

Interior

The building originally had two spaces, a screened front porch and a single interior room. In 1941, the porch was enclosed and the original front wall was removed, making the interior one large room. A non-historic dry wall partition in the northwest corner of the room provides a small office space.

A brick fireplace is centrally located on the rear wall. The floors are tongue and groove pine. The framing for the walls and roof rafters are exposed in the front portion of the room (Photo 7). Horizontal siding in an exposed interior gable further defines the division between the original porch and interior room (Photo 8). The flat ceiling in the rear portion is of beaded tongue and groove boards.

SUMMARY

The Cal Palmer Memorial Building, built in 1911 by Palmer, is significant under Criterion A in the areas of Community Planning and Development, Commerce, Exploration/Settlement, and Politics/Government. It is also significant under Criterion B because of its association with Palmer who is credited with developing the present Town of Windermere. The building served as the business office for Palmer's various commercial ventures which included the Windermere Improvement Company, which platted the present town, sold lots and promoted the community's development. The building also served as the town hall and post office during the 1910s, and was used for community meetings.

HISTORIC CONTEXT

After the Civil War, London based development companies bought large tracts of Florida from the state and railroad companies. They in turn sold it to individuals who were usually seeking affordable living in a congenial climate. Central Florida's numerous lakes were popular areas for purchase and citrus development. An Englishman, Dr. Stanley Scott, bought a large estate on the west side of Lake Butler and encouraged others to move to the area. By the 1880s, there was a settlement of English and American growers between Lakes Butler and Down. The Florida Midland Railroad, connecting Longwood and Kissimmee, was built through the community in 1887 by Englishman, John Dawe. Dawe lived in the community and is credited with giving it the name of Windermere. A post office for the community was established in 1888. Dawe filed the first Windermere plat in 1889. The community's growth halted however, when the severe freeze of 1894-1895 destroyed the local agriculture and the town was largely abandoned. Between 1907-1910, S.S. Griffin, who later served as a state legislator, bought up all the land between the lakes, mostly from his father, an early settler.

HISTORIC SIGNIFICANCE

In the fall of 1910, John Calvin (Cal) Palmer and Dr. J. Howard Johnson from Wauseon, Ohio, discovered what remained of Windermere -- one house and a roofless log cabin. The house faced Lake Butler and belonged to Griffin and his Palmer, who had been a building contractor, roofed wife. the log cabin and used it as a residence until he could build a house. Palmer and Johnson, serving as developers, bought all the property between Lakes Butler and Down from Griffin in January 1911, and formed the Windermere Improvement Company. Johnson moved a saw mill from Ohio, but immediately returned to Wauseon, and was a silent partner in the enterprise for the first several years. The Company replatted the town in 1920. The population went from 2 in 1910, to 150 in 1913, to 200 in 1925, when the town incorporated.

The Cal Palmer Memorial Building was constructed by Palmer in 1911 (Photo 9). Palmer's 1911 building served as the office for his several enterprises, and early local government meetings were held there until a town hall was built in 1922. Community meetings held there, included the Shuffle Board Club, which was associated with the local parks and recreation programs. Shuffle board and basketball courts are still located immediately behind the building.

JOHN CALVIN (CAL) PALMER

Palmer was born in Wauseon, Ohio, September 11, 1869, and served as the town's Mayor in 1889. He was a talented carpenter, cabinetmaker, and partner in his father's construction business, Palmer and Palmer, which built 25% of the town. He retired in 1909 before coming to Florida. In Windermere, Palmer and his wife, Kate, were active in organizing early community groups, such as the Woman's Club, Chamber of Commerce, Board of Trade, and Society of Agriculture and Home Economics. Palmer donated land for the Woman's Club, Windermere Union Church, and public parks. Palmer was postmaster from 1911-1914. He held several local government positions. He was the first president of the Town Council, and served as president for 11 years, and as a

member of the Council for 17 years. He was the Mayor for 2 years, and presiding officer at the town's incorporation. In private industry, he was president of the Windermere Improvement Company and Vice President of the Windermere Club Company, an engineering and contracting company. He was also the director of the Winter Garden Citrus Growers Association and the Florida Citrus Exchange in Tampa. Palmer liquidated the successful Windermere Improvement Company in 1937. He died in Windermere on September 1, 1966.

Cal Palmer was known as a builder and developer, not as a real estate speculator. He had a courteous, no pressure approach to selling property. His reputation was one of having absolute integrity and an unwavering desire to develop a quality community. As a result, people trusted and liked him, and he had no difficulty selling lots. He is given primary credit for the development of the present Town of Windermere.
