Chattanooga's Soldiers and Sailors Memorial Auditorium is a tribute to Chattanooga's foresight in attempting to build a large auditorium which would meet the needs of a growing city. As Chattanooga's only municipal auditorium, the building is historically significant as a component of the city's attempts to "modernize" in the 1920s.

Hunt designed two of these large entertainment facilities for Chattanooga - the Tivoli and Memorial Auditorium. Yet, each is designed for different purposes and reflects a different execution of similiar architectural influences. The Auditorium exhibits numerous features based on the Neo-Classical style, such as the symmetrical arrangement, elaborately decorated arched entrance areas, and a dentiled cornice with decorative brick work below. While it is typical for Hunt to use the Neo-Classical style, the arrangement is unique to this building.

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
