




Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Beach School is an example of the small country schoolhouse so common to the dusty gravel roads of rural Iowa. Its functional simplicity and use of natural materials place it in harmony with the secluded setting. The wooded site has a stream running nearby and a farmhouse dating from the period.

Built in the early 1890s, the $l_2^{\frac{1}{2}}$ story former school is wood frame covered with clapboard. The entablature is unadorned as are the windows placed at regular intervals to light earnest students' desks. A transom, now filled with a stained glass panel: "BEACH" marks the narrow front door. The school may have once had a small bell tower, for a sketch shows such a bell in place. Also, in 1901 a box sociable and an ice cream social were held to raise money for the purchase of a bell.

The school has been modified in a sympathetic manner for use as rental housing. The small lean-to addition to the rear is evidence of the care the owners lavished on the adaptation. The clapboard matches that of the original and the addition is of proper scale and proportion. Inside, a dropped ceiling was removed in favor of a half-loft and "cathedral" ceiling for the living room. Three small octagonal windows have been added to light the loft. Original wainscoting from the building's school days has been reused in the main living areas.

8. Significance

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Beach School calls attention to the circumstances under which settlers selcet a school site and construct and name a school. It also illustrates the importance of the country school to socializing on the often isolated life of rural Iowa settlers.

A change in school district boundaries prompted construction of Beach School in the early 1890s. Before its existence, students were forced to travel to the very end of the newly drawn district, a hardship on uncertain roads and in inclement weather. Between 1889 and 1891 the school district set aside funds for building in district 3. Benjamin Beach, who had arrived from Ohio in 1868, provided the land, a common occurrance for farmers who saw the benefits of having the school near their homes. The site was already congested by country standards, for Beach operated a saw mill east of the school at creekside and a grist mill across the road. The Beach farmhouse, also built during this period, still stands near the school.

Thus the site was of commercial importance and, with provison of the school, of educational and social use. An example of the socializing associated with Beach School is the box sociable and ice cream sociable held to raise money for purchase of a school bell in the summer of 1901. Beach School continued to bring the rudiments of education to farm children until 1945-46.
