<u>Confederate/Union Veterans' Monument</u> Butler County, Kentucky

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**Description** The Union and Confederate veterans' Monument on the lawn of the Butler County Courthouse is an 18 foot tall zinc monument. It was constructed in 1907 "... by the citizens of Morgantown and vicinity." The monument consists of a Union soldiers approximately six feet tall standing atop a pedestal. The soldier is wearing a kepi cap and a winter great coat. He is resting on his rifle. The pedestal rises approximately 12 feet up from the ground. Just below the soldier on the pedestal on the face of the monument is an inscribed plaque that reads: "This monument erected by the citizens of Morgantown and vicinity -- May, 1907." On the other three sides of the monument are raised faces of Abraham Lincoln, U. S. Grant and Joseph Wheeler. Lower on the base are inscribed numerous names of both Union and Confederate veterans from Butler County.

Statement of Significance The Confederate/Union Veterans Monument meets National Register criterion A and is significant within the context of "Civil War Monuments in Kentucky, 1861-1935." This is one of only two monuments in Kentucky that was created to honor soldiers on both sides. Separate inscriptions on the monument read: "This monument erected by the citizens of Morgantown and vicinity -- May 1907," and "One country, One Flag." These inscriptions demonstrate that the monument was a local creation, but at the same time honored new national patriotism. The monument was erected in the post Spanish-American War days of sectional reconciliation and nationalism. It is one of a handful of zinc monuments in the state, it illustrates local pride and community, by honoring both sides. It is significant because it is a Civil War monument in Kentucky that was built before 1935 has not been severely altered and has not been moved. See registration requirements, pp. F-2 and pp. F-3 of the Multiple Property Documentation Form.

**Verbal Boundary Description** -The Confederate/Union Veteran's Monument whose boundary forms a circle with a radius of ten feet located on the courthouse lawn in Morgantown, Kentucky.

Verbal Boundary Justification - The area associated with the monument is restricted to the ground on which the monument sits and a small buffer around it. The setting outside such a restricted area is not seen as critically important to maintaining an integrity of association. Because the focus of the multiple property submissions is the significance of the monuments, their proposed area of listing will reflect that they have been considered by-and-large, in isolation from their surrounds.
