


18. Description 226-228 No. 15th Street is a five story, red brick commercial structure occupying a corner lot. The first story, now painted white, has a central, recessed entry with a door surround of smooth, coursed ashlar. Plaques on either side of the entry bear the words: "Peaslee - Gaulbert Corporation. General Offices." This entry in its present state dates from 1935. Another entry is situated at the far right. First story windows are (over)		29. 19. History This commercial structure, built in 1880, first housed the Wrampelmeier Furniture Company factory. The firm had been located in the area since just after the Civil War. In 1895, Stratton and Terstegge, stove manufacturers, located here. The Peaslee-Gaulbert Corp., which added the stone entry, established its offices here in 1935.		30. 18. multi-paned, sash-type, all with brick relieving arches except the last five on the right. Fenestration in the upper four stories is identical. Multi-paned, sash windows resting on stone sills are capped by segmental relieving arches and similarly arched, corbeled brick hoods. The windows are separated by brick pilasters which rise from a brick course above the first story and extend through the fifth story. Where the pilasters join the main wall, arched brickwork rounds the angle. A solid parapet with corbeling crowns the facade.
