NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION

The Church of the Nazarene is located on a corner lot with a northeast-southwest orientation; the building has the same orientation as the property. Low-density streets face the property to the north front and the west side. This building was built as a religious facility in the Mission Revival style. Of concrete block on a concrete foundation, its significant features are an arched window over the entry doorway, wood doors, stepping parapets, pilasters that suggest buttresses framing the entry, arched recesses with windows, white stucco, a stylized curvilinear gable, and the building massing that creates different planes that project and recess in space on the façade. The current condition of the property is good as it is well maintained and still in use as a church. The building has historic integrity in terms of location, setting, materials, and workmanship. In terms of design, it is Mission Revival style as interpreted almost sixty years after the introduction of the style. The building has the stylized detail and modern massing of a building of its own era. It has the strong feeling and association with the historical allusions made manifest in the use of its architectural vocabulary as well as with its own time and place.

This building is located on a corner lot located in mixed-use area on east edge of downtown. The lot is one of the directionally skewed blocks that comprise the original town site of Casa Grande from 1879, and the building has the same directionally skewed orientation as the site. The overall shape of this building is rectangular with a small projecting wing to the rear west side. One story in height, there are three bays that are articulated on the front of the building in the massing and fenestration. The division of the side facades into five bays is articulated through the use of pilasters that recall buttresses and through fenestration. The building is constructed of concrete block with a stucco finish, and asphalt shingle roofing. The main part of the building is front gabled with a parapet; a projecting entry vestibule to the front echoes this gabled roof with a parapet at a lower height. Built on a concrete foundation, the load-bearing concrete block walls carry the roof.

Specific features of this building are its front entry porch, windows, and doors. The front entry porch is not covered, but is a raised concrete platform with steps defined by low, stucco sidewalls. There is one large arched and segmented fixed transom window over the entry doors on the front façade. This arched entry is made more dramatic by the contrast of very plain, small rectangular windows also on the front façade; these small windows frame the entry to each side. Small glass block windows located high on the pilasters that frame the entry also are used to this effect. The segmented arched transom is echoed on the sides of the building with steel casement windows that have smaller segmented divided-light arched transoms; these windows are spaced at regular intervals centered between the pilasters that divide the side facades into bays. There are also basement steel divided-light casement windows located just above grade on the side facades. There are two dark-stained double wood entry doors with raised molded panels centered on the front façade.

Important decorative elements on the building are the pilasters on the sides and front façade, the stepped parapet on the front, the arched windows, and the glass block windows on the pilasters that frame the entry. There are no outbuildings associated with the building, but other manmade elements on the property do exist. There is a low wall that mimics the intervals of the pilasters encompassing the property, as well as white, painted slump block and wood signage on the corner that is bounded by the two streets. No additions to this building are apparent.

This religious facility is the one contributing element to this nomination; there are no non-contributing elements.

NARRATIVE STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

SUMMARY

Church of the Nazarene is significant under Criterion C as a Late 19th and 20th Century Revival Style under the context of Architecture in Casa Grande, 1900-1950. The significant date for this property is the date of initial construction in 1949. It is a good example of the Mission / Spanish Colonial Revival Style. Indicative of the Mission style is the simplicity of form, the front façade that continues past the roof plane as a stepped parapet, the arched windows and main entry doorway that punctuate the facade, and the minimal use of surface ornamentation. This property also has good integrity, as the only alteration appears to be replacement of glazing with a solid material at the arched window lights on the side façade. This property is a member of the Community Religious Facilities property type, of which there are only seven in the area considered by the Historic Resource Survey- Casa Grande, Arizona (Pry 1998). The building sits on a corner lot bounded by two streets adjacent to a residential area, as is common to properties of its type. It also has the exaggerated scale and architectural elements suggesting vertical height that are typical of properties of its type. It has a simple rectangular plan that forms a gabled nave, a front facade that is visually divided into three bays, as well as a division of the side facades into repetitive bays through fenestration. This building is also significant for its construction material under the context of Architecture in Casa Grande, 1900-1950. It is one of five public buildings of concrete block of the eighty-eight concrete block buildings within the area considered by the Historic Resource Survey- Casa Grande, Arizona (Pry 1998). This property is owned by a religious institution for religious purposes. However, it nonetheless meets qualifying criteria considerations, as it is a religious property that derives it primary significance from its architectural distinction within the community of Casa Grande. The property has very good integrity in regard to its architectural style and is therefore is a good candidate for listing as a member of its property type.

HISTORICAL OVERVIEW

The local Nazarene congregation built this church at a date estimated as 1949. Plans for the building were first announced in 1945, but it does not appear that any building took place until at least four years later (the only documentation available is a newspaper article from 1949 announcing plans to build the church). How long it remained as Church of the Nazarene is not known. The gable-front house next door (no longer included as part of the property) was built as the church parsonage.
