Description

The Ocoee Street Historic District in Cleveland, Bradley County, Tennessee is a collection of late nineteenth and early twentieth century houses in architectural styles that were popular at the time. The district is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under criterion C for significance in architecture. The district is unusual for Cleveland as a dense collection of historic houses with much architectural detailing, and without modern intrusions.

The district lines both sides of North Ocoee Street, a busy road leading out of the Cleveland business district. The houses in the district maintain an almost uniform setback from the street. There are side driveways onto the property, and outbuildings are located behind the houses near the rear property lines.

The district contains houses in the Colonial Revival, Queen Anne and Tudor Revival styles.

The Queen Anne houses are the earliest in the district, they were constructed circa 1890. There are three Queen Anne houses in the district, they are 2 or 2.5 stories tall. All have weatherboard siding and elaborately detailed wraparound porches. Roof types vary; there are one each of the hip, gable and pyramid type. One house retains its original pressed metal shingle roof, the other two have been replaced with asphalt shingles.

The Colonial Revival style is the dominant style in the district. There are twenty Colonial Revival style houses of twenty six total houses. The Colonial Revival houses were built between circa 1900 and circa 1930, with one circa 1870 house remodeled into a Colonial Revival in the 1920s. There are nine 1 story, one 1.5, and ten 2 story houses in this style. Brick siding is the most common, on nine houses, with weatherboard (7 houses), rusticated concrete block (1 house), and replacement siding (3 houses) also in the district. Most Colonial Revival houses have hip or gable roofs (9 each), there are two pyramid roofs. Asphalt shingles are the most common roofing material on 14 of the houses, two houses have slate roofs, and four have pressed metal roofs.

Some of the houses in the district are a mix of Colonial Revival and Queen Anne styles (examples are sites 6, 8, 18, and 26). These

houses have features of Queen Anne style such as irregular plans, wraparound porches, and leaded windows. However, the houses also have Colonial Revival features such as classical columns and pilasters, returns in gables, and dentil moldings in porch and roof cornices. This phenomenon was not uncommon in the early twentieth century as stylistic preferences changed from Queen Anne to the Colonial Revival.

The Tudor Revival style houses were constructed between circa 1920 and circa 1930. There are on each of 1, 1.5 and 2 stories. One Tudor Revival has brick siding, with stucco in the gables, the other two are stuccoed completely. All three have half timbering in the gables. Two of the Tudor Revivals have gable roofs, the other has a hip roof. All have forward facing gables or dormers on the main facade. All the Tudor Revival style houses have asphalt shingled roofs.

The outbuildings in the district are generally lacking architectural detailing. Two garages associated with Tudor Revival style houses have stuccoed gables with half timbering. One garage associated with a Colonial Revival house reflects the detailing of the house. Siding on outbuildings is the same as the associated house. Most outbuildings have asphalt shingled gable roofs, but there is one pressed metal shingle roof, and one standing seam metal roof.

The district contains 26 contributing (c) primary houses, 13 contributing outbuildings, and 2 contributing walls. Although three of these buildings have replacement siding they still contribute to the district because the width of the siding is in keeping with the character of the house and architectural details have been retained.

There is one noncontributing (nc) outbuilding in the district. It is a modern brick garage located near the rear property line. Because it is not easily visible from the street it is not an intrusion into the district.

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Statement of Significance

The Ocoee Street Historic District in Cleveland, Bradley County, Tennessee is eligible for the National Register under criterion "C" for significance in architecture in Cleveland. The district contains houses with much architectural ornamentation which makes it unusual for the community.

The area began developing as a residential area as a result of the opening of the Centenary College (now Lee College) in 1884-85. Before the development of the College, the lands were unused. Shortly after the development of Centenary College, residential development began to occur along Ocoee Street and Centenary Avenue. At the same time the industrial base of Cleveland was growing and neighborhoods of industrial housing were developed. Those neighborhoods contained unornamented one story houses, and many have been altered significantly since construction.

None of the neighborhoods surrounding the industrial plants exhibit the architectural ornamental features of Ocoee Street. They tend to be very simple with streets of practically identical buildings constructed to minimize costs of individual buildings.

The Ocoee Street Historic District was developed by the industrial and business leaders of Cleveland. They chose to build their houses in the Colonial Revival style, which makes up 70% of the district. This style was popular nationally from the turn of the century until the 1930s when the Ocoee Street district stopped growing.

Ocoee Street developed as an area where the leaders of Cleveland settled because it was removed from the industrial plants of south Cleveland. By building north of the business district these houses were separated from the industrial plants by more then a mile, and odors and noise from the plants did not effect these property owners.

Some of the leaders who chose to build in this area included Frank T. Hardwick, superintendent of the Hardwick Woolen Mills, who built his house at 1733 N. Ocoee Street. The Hardwick Woolen Mills were one of the largest employers in Cleveland at the turn of the century. Another leader was Theodore Stivers, who owned the Theodore Stivers Milling Company which manufactured mens clothing.

He built his house at 1590 N. Ocoee Street. Another industrial leader who built here was John Milne, at 1790 N. Ocoee Street, manager of the Cleveland Chair Factory.

Business leaders who settled in the area included several grocers such as Arthur Rymer (1981 N. Ocoee Street) and Sam Eldredge (1455 N. Ocoee Street). Richard Kibler, a local physician built at 1533 N. Ocoee Street, and Arthur Traynor, an attorney built at 1665 N. Ocoee Street.

Common architectural features of the Colonial Revival style houses in the district include central doors with classical door surrounds or porticos, symmetrical facade patterns and wings, classical columns for porches and pilasters, window surrounds, and returns in gables. The houses in the district which are not Colonial Revival are good examples of Queen Anne and Tudor Revival styles with the use of many of the ornamental features of the style.

The Ocoee Street Historic District is similar to the Centenary Avenue Historic District (NR 4/1/93) in that both districts were developed around the same time by the wealthy families of Cleveland.

The districts are different in that Centenary Avenue was settled primarily by people associated with Centenary Academy (now Lee College), and Ocoee Street was developed by business and industrial leaders.

Also Centenary Avenue has more diverse architectural styles with Queen Anne, Colonial Revival, Bungalow, Tudor Revival and Prairie style houses present, with no one style dominating the area. Ocoee Street has Colonial Revival, Queen Anne, and Tudor Revival houses, but the Colonial Revival style dominated the district.

The houses along Ocoee Street also tend to have more stylistic detailing then those along Centenary Avenue. The Queen Anne houses have elaborately turned or cut balustrades on the porches and scrollwork in the gables. The Colonial Revival styles has classical columns, dentil moldings, and gable returns; many have symmetrical facades. The brick versions have brick or stone lintels over doors and windows, and brick or stone sills under windows.

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The Ocoee Street Historic District is significant in the architectural history of Cleveland because it contains houses with many architectural features, unlike most Cleveland neighborhoods which contain simple houses.

The Ocoee Street Historic District contains the houses fronting on Ocoee Street between Fifteenth Street and Twentieth Street, street addresses between 1455 and 1981 Ocoee Street. The district is bounded on the east and west by the rear property lines of the properties fronting on Ocoee Street, it is bounded on the north by Twentieth Street, and bounded on the south by Fifteenth Street.

The boundary was selected to include a concentration of large houses with much architectural detailing. To the north of the district is a commercial area which is incompatible with the residential historic district. To the south of the district is the Centenary Avenue Historic District which has been listed on the National Register, and Lee College, which is a major change in land use. To the east and west of the district is residential development of a different character than along Ocoee Street. The surrounding housing is one story with little architectural detailing.
