"Reverie Cove" of Bar Harbor, Maine, designed by Fred L. Savage for Dr. John Davies Jones in 1895, is a striking example of an opulent summer home in the modified Colonial Revival style.

The house, of frame construction, contains  $2\frac{1}{2}$ -stories ( $3\frac{1}{2}$  facing the water) with three internal brick chimneys, hipped roof, bracketed cornice, shingle siding, and dressed granite foundation.

The 5-bay-wide facade, which faces west, features an entrance protico to the right, balanced by a porch to the left. These are stylistically identical, being supported by simple but massive paired posts. Above these projections are recessed balconies with balustrades. The central facade bay in the second story is a large three-part arched window with diamond panes (flanked by lunettes), echoed by a rectangular three-part window with equivalent lights below. The bays at each end of the facade in both stories are paired 6/6 windows with external louvered shutters. The half-story contains an extended dormer of low profile containing four windows.

The secondary facade, which faces the water to the east, is six symmetrical bays wide and  $3\frac{1}{2}$  stories tall. The two central bays consist of arched and balustraded recessed balconies in the third floor and semi-circular balconies with projecting balustrades in the second floor; these are flanked by loggias. The first floor (basement) level features fully fenestrated walls of rectangular lights divided into four sections by massive brick posts.

The north and south ends of the house are irregular, containing a wide variety of fenestration including single-arched, 12/12, 6/6, and Palladian.

## Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

"Reverie Cove", one of Bar Harbor's earliest Colonial Revival "cottages", is referred to in Amory's <u>Last Resorts</u> as one of the "most prominent" homes in the town. Built for an internationally known agriculturist, this "cottage" is significant architecturally and socially.

The extravagantly proportioned "cottage" was completed in 1895 from plans by Fred L. Savage ("Highseas"--N.R., 1978). Savage probably used the Taylor House in Newport, R. I. as a model for "Reverie Cove", but incorporated his own ideas into the design.

Dr. John Davies Jones of Washington, a wealthy and respected agriculturist was the original owner of the "cottage". As was so typical of the period, Dr. Jones's daughter, Martina, entered into an international marriage to become the Marchesa Giuseppe Lanza d'Ajeta.

After Dr. Jones's death in 1903, "Reverie Cove" was purchased by Mayor Abram Hewitt and Sarah Hewitt of New York, then by DeForest Grant in 1933. Now privately owned by a Maryland attorney, the "cottage"has been restored and carefully looked after for the last twenty years.
