DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This house is located northwest of the Leitersburg Pike, Maryland Route 64, just southeast of Long Meadow Road in Washington County, Maryland. It is situated near the road and faces south.

The structure is a two-story, five bay stone dwelling with a twostory, four-bay el extending to the rear or north. The entire building is constructed of roughly coursed local fieldstone with particular care reflected in the masonry at the front elevation of the house. No vertical seam is evident in the masonry between the front and rear sections. There is no decorative stone work associated with the window or door openings.

The windows appear to be spaced symmetrically at the front elevation of the house. Moderately wide frames are joined with wooden pegs and are trimmed with ogee molding. Nine-over-six light, double-hung sash are present at the first story of the front section while all other major windows have nine-over-six light sash. Pairs of fourover-two pane sash illuminate the attic. Several pairs of louvered shutters are present.

The main entrance is located in the center bay of the south or front elevation. The opening is framed similarly to the windows with an unusual transom, two panes in height and four in width. The fourpanel door does not appear to be original. A second-story door is located directly over the main entrance. Three entrances are located in the rear elevation of the front or main section, while four are to be found in the east elevation of the wing. Several of the rear entrance doors have six raised panels as do the interior doors.

A double porch framed under the main roof span extends along the entire front elevation. It is supported by square posts trimmed with Victorian period carved brackets. A second double porch extends along the east elevation of the wing. It is supported by chamfered posts without trim. The roof structure is covered with sheet metal and extends beyond the end walls. The eaves are finished with boxing trimmed with simple moldings. Brick chimneys, moderate in size, rise from inside each gable end.

The interior of this house retains much of its original woodwork. The front section is bisected by an entrance and stair hall. The stair case which has decorative applied trim at the ends of its risers is open to the attic. The rear el is divided into two rooms at each story. Interior doors throughout the house have six raised panels. Original exterior doors are hung on long strap hinges. Fireplaces are present in each room, with a large service or kitchen fireplace located in the north end wall of the el.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This house is primarily significant for its architecture. It derives secondary importance from its use, according to tradition, as the residence and office of an early Washington County doctor.

Architecturally, the house is an example of a five-bay, center-hall plan dwelling with an extension to the rear. Vaguely Georgian in form, it is representative of a major architectural group in the Cumberland Valley with examples dating from the late eighteenth through the first half of the nineteenth century. Much of the interior woodwork appears original and suggests, along with the exterior appearance of the structure, a circa 1800 or early nineteenth century building date. An unusual feature of this house is the double porch extending across the front elevation. Such porches at the front elevation are not common among Georgian-inspired houses in Washington County. Another unusual feature of this house is the use of large transoms over entrances in the front elevation.

In 1819 the property on which this house stands, containing 294 1/2 acres, was purchased by Frederick Dorsey from George Beltzhoover for \$23,760. Frederick Dorsey, a noted physician in Washington County, was born in Anne Arundel County in 1776. He settled in Washington County in 1795, studying medicine with Doctor Richard Pindell and residing in Hagerstown where he died in 1858. At the time of his death, Doctor Dorsey was engaged in the practice of medicine with his son, John Claggett Dorsey (born 1805), and his grandson, Frederick Dorsey, Jr. Although the senior Doctor Dorsey is said to have resided in Hagerstown, his son or grandson may have lived in this house and possibly maintained an office here. The presence of a door in the east bay of the north elevation of the main section could suggest that an office with a separate entrance was located in a portion of the house. The property on which the house stands was owned by Frederick Dorsey, Sr. when it was sold to Emanuel Synder in 1866.

A color and extensive biography of Doctor Dorsey is published in Thomas Scharf's <u>History of Western Maryland</u>, as well as in Thomas Williams' History of Washington County.
