DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The present condition is essentially the same as when the original building was constructed in 1898. It is made of native granite blocks about 18" square. It consists of one large, high-ceilinged room, which contains counters around the edges, and a square counter enclosed area in the center for the proprietor and the cash register. There is a post office area partitioned off and fronted by a barred window and the post office boxes. There is also a second floor which is no longer usable. It is a square building with a flat roof. The floors are the original wooden floors.

The building measures 40 feet by 60 feet and has a half-basement used for storage. It was constructed with a foot thick fire-wall around the roof, which is flat.

The ceilings are 14 feet high with pressed tin. Most of the store's equipment is original and practically no remodeling has been done since it was built.

The store front is characterized by rounded arch door entry and windows on the first floor with radiating voussoirs. The second floor windows are flat with plain lintels and sills. The name of the store and the data appear above the door. The entry door is a plain doubleleaf affair with windows at a 45 degree angle in the embrasure and a mullion above. The chimney for the traditional pot-bellied stove is situated to the left rear.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Green Mercantile's main historical significance evolves from the fact that it is one of the few general stores still operating under circumstances very similar to those existing at its inception. It exists as the only general merchandising store serving its small mountain community. It provides essentially the same categories of items—food, dry goods, hardware and home items, some farm items. It provides the same basic services to the cummunity—a community gathering place and center for notices, and a post office. It is operated by the grandson of the original owner. Other general stores exist as museums and tourist attractions. Green Mercantile operates for residents of the community, much as it has always functioned.

John W. Green Sr. went to the small mountain community of Buffalo Creek in the 1880s. The small town had evolved as a result of the ranching, lumbering and mining activities in the area. The narrow gauge railroad reached Buffalo Creek about 1878, when Governor Evan's Denver, South Park and Pacific Railroad was being constructed to corner the market on the mineral resources between South Park and Denver. After that it also served as a fisherman-tourist area, and as a terminus for supplies for construction of Cheesman Dam.

John W. Green, Sr., a native of Virginia, arrived in Buffalo in 1879. He eventually acquired the first hotel in Buffalo from its proprietor, James Miller, and continued to operate it as a hotel and as a general merchandise store until it burned down in a large general fire that burned many of the wooden buildings of the town in 1897. He worked in Saw Mill until he had enough to purchase a hotel. Green rebuilt only the store in 1898. He contracted with Seerie Investment Company to replace the wooden structure with a fire-proof building of native granite building blocks. The hugh blocks were hoisted into place by a construction outfit consisting of six men, a team of mules, and a jim pole.

(Number all entries) 8. SIGNIFICANCE

Mr. Green was also active in politics, bought up quantities of real estate, and was appointed postmaster by Cleveland in 1886. The position passed to his son John Green, Jr. in 1914 and remains in the family to this day. The post office is also an integral part of the store. At one time, the second floor of the store served as a community meeting place, and a recreational center where dances were held.

It exists today in essentially the same condition, except that the second floor is no longer safe and usable. Many of the fixtures, such as the "ice box," well eroded butcher block, cheese container, display cases presented to the proprietor by various salesmen, post office area including the original window and post office boxes, are still in use. There is even an ornate telephone booth installed in the store for the first telephone in the area, which the telephone company never retrieved. The original cash register is still in use—causing some problems for the proprietor with today's prices, since it does not register sales of more than \$1.00. The well—worn wooden floors have not seen wax in many years if ever. The ceiling is pressed tin. Electricity has been installed, but the whole store is still heated by a wood burning stove, with the assistance of a space heater.
