DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

One of Morgan City's more prominent buildings is the Downtown Post Office located at the corner of First and Everett Streets. The two-story building is the only one of its type in Morgan City and has always been a significant element in the downtown area.

The structure was built in 1932 under the supervision of Construction Superintendent, W. G. Ireland, at an estimated construction cost of \$75,000. Local businessmen sold the land for \$6,000. Appropriations were instituted as early as 1919. Algernon Blair, general contractor from Montgomery, Alabama, was the low bidder and awarded the contract. Other men devoted to this project were A. W. Mellon, Secretary of the Treasury and James A. Wetmore, Acting Supervising Architect.

The building has an odd combination. It is rectangular with no wings. The exterior is masonry. The major influence is French. The building is faced with a grand beaux-art style arcade with free standing ionic columns and surmounted by a Mansard roof. On the contrary, the center entrance has several items which do not relate.

- 1. The doorway is more English Georgian out of place.
- 2. An overblown entrance. The wings are not the typical style. These have a renaissance flavor, not English Georgian.

Basically, the building is a French beaux-art, English Georgian combination which is adequate and not jarring.

Inside, above the service counters are classical style ornaments. They are in a bronze or metal entablature form with fluted frieze, quite handsomely detailed.

The lobby floor is terrazzo, made of a mixture of 5% red and 5% yellow chipped marble mixed with cement.

The second floor is used exclusively by the Treasury Department's Customs House. Their entry is by a staircase in the main lobby. All this space was remodeled in 1978 as was the roof.

For a small town, the post office overshadows other buildings due to its grand limestone arcade. Usually the local post office has a quiet feeling but attractive. This one is strident in its feature.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

From its inception to the present, the Morgan City Downtown Post Office has been significant because of its association with important people, governmental functions and its unusual architectural style. A combination of French beaux-art and English Georgian produced an attractive look.

M. E. Norman, Mayor of Morgan City, was in Washington in 1928 meeting with President Coolidge for the purpose of securing a federal building for the city. It was noted in <u>The Morgan City Review</u>, Mr. Norman's message was hopeful due to his Republican background and a Republican president in office. Representative W. P. Martin was the main speaker at a hearing in Morgan City. He listed the steady population gain, lucrative business in fish and oysters and various other businesses finding their way to Morgan City. He later presented his case to Congress.

Covering the corner of First and Everett Streets, the Morgan City Post Office has had a significant impact on the Morgan City community. It is strategically located in the central business district and until some years ago, before the appearance of the shopping centers, most activity centered around the post office area. With the Courthouse, erected in 1905, and the bank adjacent to each other, this area was widely used.

Spanning an era of six decades, the Morgan City Post Office has certainly attained its niche in the community. During its construction, Morgan City's citizens were avidly concerned about the building materials, various stages of construction and wished to attend open house. In fact, each construction stage was provided the public through the news media. All labor was performed by local people.

The building is in fair condition overall. All second floor space was recently remodeled and a new roof installed. The exterior and lobby remain untouched.

Morgan City, Louisiana

Lots One (1) and Two (2) in block No. One (1) in Morgan City, Saint Mary Parish, State of Louisiana; and also an unsurveyed triangular tract of land adjoining said lot, the whole forming a homogeneous body of land having a measurement of one hundred and twenty-five (125) feet on the west side of First Street, and having a measurement of one hunred (100) feet on the south side of Everett Street. Which said land is more accurately described as follows; according to the plan of survey made by John M. Rochel, Civil Engineer, hereto annexed and made part hereof, to-wit.

Having a measurement of one hundred and thirty (130) feet on the west side of First Street; of one hundred (100) on the south side of Everett Street; of one hundred and seventeen and five tenths (117.5) feet on the side line parallel to First Street by one hundred and one (101) feet along the rear line thereof; this portion of ground forms the southwest corner of First and Everett Streets, in square originally designated as block 1 of Barnes survey.
