DESCRIPTION	The Trinity Episcopal Church is a Victorian Gothic style ecclesiastical building of rough cut limestone which features a large bell tower and tall spire on its right front corner. -Its roof is steep and the gables of the facade and rear are broad. Pointed arched doors and windows and stepped buttresses, typical of the Victorian Gothic style, are used on all elevations. There is extensive use of stained glass windows, four of which are Tiffany. Interior cherry and walnut woodwork finishing by Barksdale, Clarke & Company remains unchanged, as does the entire building.

The Parish Office, originally the church rectory, is a two and a half story, brick building constructed with an irregular plan on a stone foundation. It appears to be L-shaped when - viewing the facade, which is three bays wide. Below the gable of the facade are window groups of two on each story. Stone horizontal bands extend across the facade at the levels of window sills and lintels on both stories. A concrete porch has been added since 1970 which wraps around the front of the building from the main entrance at the right bay to the side entrance on the left or west side. It has a hipped and gabled roof. In the rear a classroom addition of the 20th century follows the width and height of the original building and extends to the rear of the lot on which it sits.

The building now serving as the parish office of the Trinity Episcopal Church was built in 1889 as the church rectory and was used as such until 1940. It is an integral part of the Trinity Episcopal Church because of its original and current functions and because it illustrates the type of residential architecture popular in the late nineteenth century chosen by a church congregation for the building of its rectory.
