DESCRIPTION	The Trinity Episcopal Church is a Victorian Gothic style ecclesiastical building of rough cut limestone which features a large bell tower and tall spire on its right front corner. Its roof is steep and the gables of the facade and rear are broad. Pointed arched doors and windows and stepped buttresses, typical of the Victorian Gothic style, are used on all elevations. There is extensive use of stained glass windows, four of which are Tiffany. Interior cherry and walnut woodwork finishing by Barksdale, Clarke & Company remains unchanged, as does the entire building.				
NCE	The Trinity Episcopal Church of Clarksville is an excellent example of Victorian Gothic ecclesiastical architecture in rough masonry. It is the only nineteenth century church in the city built of native limestone rather than brick. It remains unaltered with fine interior woodwork and stained glass windows, four of which are Tiffany.


