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The District of Columbia Court of Appeals is a free-standing building at the southeast corner of 5th and E Streets, N. W. It is built of regular limestone ashlar, measures approximately 102' (five-bay front) by 128' (nine-bay flank), is three stories high, and has a copper-sheathed low hip roof. central bays of the front and rear and the five central bays of the sides project slightly to form pavilion motifs. The principal feature of the exterior is the tetrastyle Greek Ionic pedimented portico above a segmentalarched podium that shelters the three center bays of the front. elevation is rather similarly composed, except that there is no portico, only a pilaster order. The fenestration of the ground floor is segmentalarched, and that floor is treated as a basement or podium for the tall main floor above it. The central pavilion windows of the main floor are roundarched, those of the end bays, with one exception, being rectangular. exception is the large round-arched window at the north end of the east wall. That window lights the main staircase and does not correspond with the two rectangular windows at the south end of the same wall. Thus, the east wall is not identical with the similar west wall, nor is it strictly symmetrical. The third floor is fenestrated only in the central bays of the east and west Rectangular panels and deep entablatures mask the third floor on the front and rear elevations and the end bays of the sides. The exterior is unaltered and was designed in a transitional late-Federal - Early Greek Revival style to accord in its details with Hadfield's Washington City Hall (now United States District Courthouse) of 1820 and following, that stands on the same Judiciary Square block. In 1939, a similar but not quite identical building by Nathan C. Wyeth to house the Superior Court of the District of Columbia was built as a pendant at the corner of 4th and D Streets. all three buildings are similar in architectural treatment. The Greek Revival details of the Court of Appeals include not only the order and attic panels, etc, but also the palmette design of the wrought iron railing of the front portico.

The interior detailing is consistent with the exterior. The first floor contains a large entrance hall with main stairway at the left. A single run rises to a broad landing spanning the east wall. Two runs rise from the land ing to the second floor. An annular corridor encloses a central core of interior rooms divided by a cross corridor providing a passage between the centered side entrances. A short passage between two offices leads to the rear entrance, and the two long side corridors from front hall to rear lead to two minor rear staircases. The floor is white and grey marble. Three offices on the first floor have fireplaces with mantels of late Federal character. are mahogany. The central core on the second floor contains the court room, which measures about 41' by 66' and rises to the roof. It is skylit. front lobby at the second level is formally treated with Greek Ionic pilasters and a distyle in antics access to the main staircase. The ceiling is flat and has Greek revival plaster details. Two large bronze chandeliers and a diagonally set black and white marble floor enhance the dignity of the hall. courtroom walls are articulated by paired Greek Corinthian pilasters supporting a modillion cornice. A cove effects the transition from wall plane to the large rectangular skylight. The paired mohogany doors are headed by triangular pediments, the seating is furnished by mohogany pews, and the mahogany

bench is backed by a draped gilded reredos. At the rear, behind the courtroom is a conference room between the two minor staircases. The conference room has a groined ceiling. There is a fireplace at each end. Judges' chambers have fireplaces and full bathrooms with the original marble fittings.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The District of Columbia Court of Appeals (now United States Court of Military Appeals) is a particularly fine and remarkably early example of revived (20th century) Greek Revival architecture. Elliott Woods (1865-1923), who was Architect of the Capitol from 1902 until his death, designed the Court of Appeals with great sensitivity to respect the adjacent former Washington City Hall of 1820, which now serves as the District of Columbia Courthouse. In addition to being sympathetic to the Hadfield-Mills Old City Hall (Mills is credited with the south side plan and George Hadfield with the north side plan), the design of the Court of Appeals was greatly influenced by it.

The Court of Appeals building is exceptionally well executed. The materials are fine without being lavish, and the refined restraint displayed throughout the structure exemplifies the best architectural thought of the conservative school during the first decade of this century. This singularly harmonious building is extravagant by modern standards in its use of space, fully a third of which is devoted to stairs, passages, and stately lobbies. The dignity of the law and the esteem in which it should properly be held are well expressed by the setting provided by this building. There is in Woods' building no false note of pomposity or meretricious display. A judicious restraint and fine sense of balance mark this judicial structure, one of the handsomest of its period among Government buildings.

The district of Columbia Court of Appeals was established in 1893. The building under discussion was authorized by an Act of May 30, 1908 and was completed on October 1, 1910. It housed the D. C. Appellant Court until 1952, when, on November 1, it was turned over to the United States Court of Military Appeals.
