Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Washington-Willow Historic District is part of a Fayetteville residential area which spreads from U.S. Highway 71 (a north-south commercial thorough-fare through the town) up the slopes of East Mountain. East Mountain is the most conspicuous of the Ozark hills that surround and contribute to the picturesque character of the Northwest Arkansas community. Most of the district lies within the Masonic Addition, the first addition to the original town. Platted in 1870, the southwest corner of the Masonic Addition is within two blocks of the county courthouse and the square, the traditional center of Fayetteville. The University of Arkansas, established not long after the Masonic Addition, is one mile to the west.

The Washington-Willow district consists of 105 primary structures sited along two north-south streets and five traversing east-west streets. The total size of the district is about 37 acres. Nineteen of the buildings possess special significance. (Wa-1,2,5,9,10,13,14,16,29,36,38, Wi-3, 18,22,23, Di-1, L-6, 8, Da-1). Twenty-five do not contribute to the primary character of the district. Almost all of the non-contributing structures are of such scale, style and building materials that they are unobtrusive. Aside from a church, the buildings are residential. Forty-six of the structures were built between 1890 and 1910, 19 before 1890 and 39 after 1910. The date of construction of one building is not known. The oldest house was built in 1853, the latest in the 1960s. There are 56 one-story structures, 41 two-story and eight one-and-one half story.

Architectural styles popular from the mid-19th century to the present are represented in the district. The styles range from Greek Revival to ranch style. Various Victorian themes (especially Eastlake, Queen Anne and Italianate), Classical Revial, bungalow, modern workers' cottages and 20th century period houses are included. The district is comprised of both brick and wood frame buildings, with frequent use of stone for foundations and piers. Some houses have been faced with stucco, asbestos and aluminum siding. Many of the houses have large porches, dormers, and hip and gable roofs. Homes enriched with bargeboards, brackets, stained glass, bay windows, transoms and sidelights appear throughout the district.

The Washington-Willow Historic District has always been an attractive, prestigious residential area populated by a high proportion of local business people, university administrators and professors, and other professional people. The area has never really experienced hard times. Therefore the buildings have been well maintained and the district has been subject to growth and change. There have been recent restoration efforts in the district, including returning some homes to their original paint schemes. The district's cohesiveness derives from visible boundaries, residential character, well-kept homes carefully sited on lawns, large trees lining the streets, stone retaining walls, sidewalks, and a high concentration of buildings possessing architectural merit. The boundaries of the district are visibly marked by public and commercial strips to the west and south and open spaces and nonconforming homes to the north and east.

Buildings contributing to the character of the district:

- Wa-1 305 North Washington (c. 1888): 2 story weatherboard, hip roof with cross gables, 1 story wrap-around screened porch with decorative brackets and trim, transoms, decorative panels, bargeboard, brackets. <u>SIGNIFICANT</u> STRUCTURE.
- Wa-2 306 North Washington (1870s): 2 story weatherboard, hip roof, 2 story gable-roofed central portico, gable returns, pediment decorated with ornamental wood lyre, transom in doorway. SIGNIFICANT STRUCTURE.
- Wa-3 308 North Washington (1904): $1\frac{1}{2}$ story weatherboard cottage, hip roof with cross gables, full-length shed-roofed front porch with Doric columns, imbricated shingles in gables, transom in doorway.
- Wa-5 310 North Washington (1890): 2 story weatherboard, gable and hip roof, 2 story triangular pedimented portico supported by fluted Ionic columns, modillions in portico cornice, multifoil window in pediment, transom and sidelights in doorway. <u>SIGNIFICANT STRUCTURE</u>.
- Wa-6 315 North Washington (1904-1908): 2 story weatherboard, gable roof with cross gable, 1 story full-length front porch on Doric columns with pediment above entrance, decorative shingles, transom in doorway.
- Wa-7 322 North Washington (1895): $1\frac{1}{2}$ story weatherboard, gable roof with 3 front gabled dormers, front porch supported by decorative wrought iron posts.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

SUMMARY

The Washington-Willow Historic District is significant for its historic associations as well as for its architectural quality and character. The district is important in the economic history of Fayetteville for it reflects the economic evolution of the community and was the area chosen by several bankers and businessmen for their homes. In addition, it reflects the evolution of the city in general in terms of community planning for the Washington-Willow Historic District is an important part of the Masonic Addition, the first platted addition incorporated into the original city. It is significant in the field of education because many students, administrators and faculty of the University of Arkansas made their homes in the district. It is significant in terms of law because of the important lawyers who made their homes in the district. It is architecturally significant because of the visual continuity and cohesiveness that developed as a result of a sensitive balance of scale, materials and use of the land in the streetscape among buildings representing a variety of architectural styles spanning more than 100 years.

ELABORATION

The Washington-Willow Historic District consists largely of two streets and is visibly distinct with a commercial highway on the west; public buildings on the south; and undeveloped areas and newer homes on the north and east. The boundaries of the district were established after a survey of the larger residential area indicated on the district map. A careful rating of all structures within the survey area was conducted. The district boundaries were set based upon the concentration of significant buildings and relative lack of intrusions.

The earliest written history of the district focuses on two families, the McGarrah's and the Davidson's. George McGarrah was among the first settlers of Fayetteville (organized in 1828) and laid claim to a large tract of land on the west side of East Mountain. McGarrah's property included the southern part of the Washington-Willow Historic District, north to Maple Street. The McGarrah family sold and gave away small portions of its farm before the Civil War. Headquarters House (Di-1) was built on one piece of that land and the Lotspeich House (L-6) on another. The Fayetteville Masons acquired the McGarrah property after the Civil War. In 1869 the farm was subdivided and the lots sold. The following year the Masonic Addition became the first area annexed to the original city of Fayetteville. In the 1870s several houses were built on the large lots of the subdivision (averaging about 130 feet by 200 feet), including the Wood (Wa-2), Wade-Heerwagen (Wa-11) and the Stone-Hilton (L-8) houses. Elias Davidson settled outside Fayetteville in 1859, acquiring a large tract of land north of McGarrah's farm. Davidson's second home on the property (Da-1) was constructed c. 1869. Portions of the Davidson lands were subdivided and built on in the 1880s and thereafter. Yet the Davidson House is still surrounded by one of the largest estates in the city.

The initial filling-in of the Washington-Willow Historic District in the 1870s paralleled the community's recovery from a particularly disastrous Civil War experience. In 1871, Fayetteville was chosen as the site of Arkansas' land-grant university and in 1882 a north-south railroad was completed through the town. In the 1890s Fayetteville became a banking and distribution center and the hub of prosperous tourist, lumber and fruit-processing industries. During that period of growth, the Washington-Willow Historic District became, as it remains, the center of the most prestigious residential area in the city (one street of this area--now U. S. Highway 71--was given over to commercial development in the 1950s). Bankers, lumber merchants, a furniture manufacturer, a university president, lawyers, railroad men, wholesale grocers and a cigar manufacturer built two-story family homes in the fashionable architectural styles of the period. The homes were large enough that, at the turn of the century, many households had live-in servants and let rooms to tourists and university students. Beginning in the 1890s, many of the large lots were subdivided and the process of infill with smaller homes began. With few exceptions (especially the Davidson House, Da-1, and four homes on North Willow, Wi-22, 25, 28, 31; Photo 6) cottages and bungalows were built between the older buildings and on any other available land. The district thus lost its early upper class character and took on the diverse orientation that it retains. In the 20th century, some of the homes were altered to reflect the development of new architectural styles (For examples, see Wa-5, 7, 14, 29, Wi-17, 27) and eight of the old homes were either burned or torn down and replaced by newer buildings.

The Washington-Willow Historic District contains the highest concentration of significant structures worthy of preservation in Fayetteville. The archeological potential of the district has not been fully explored but there have been productive excavations (salvage archeology) behind Headquarters House (Di-1). There is evidence that a nearby spring attracted Indians as well as the earliest white settlers. It is suspected, therefore, that significant archeological remains exist in the area.

Among the significant people who had homes in the district were Albert M. Byrnes, Benjamin R. Davidson, Arthur M. Harding, John R. Harris and Dr. Harvey D. Wood. Byrnes moved to Fayetteville in 1866 and in the next 60 years established lumber and contracting businesses. He built an estimated 300 structures in the community including at least 10 homes in the district (Wa-1, 9, 12, 13, 29, 30, Wi-15, 17, 22, 23). Byrnes' own home, constructed in the district in 1875, was replaced c. 1960 (Wi-14). Davidson (Da-1) came to Fayetteville with his parents in 1859. He became a lawyer, bank president, railroad president and member of the Arkansas legislature. Harding (Wa-16), in the 20th century, was president of the University of Arkansas and co-author of four mathematics textbooks. Harris (Wa-1) was president of two Fayetteville banks early in the 20th century. And Wood (Wa-2) practiced medicine in the county for over 60 years and was instrumental in the establishment of a hospital in Fayetteville in 1906.

My husband and I have been involved from its inception withh the formation of the Washington-Willow Historic District, indeed even earlier. We grew up in the area, live just outside it, own property in it, and have led opposition to proposed city zoning regulations which we felt endangered the residential character of the district.

We feel very strongly that the area should be added to the National Register of Historic Places. The architecture incompasses styles representing several periods of growth of the town (pre-Civil War, late 1800's, early 1900's, and 1920's.) The residential setting is uniform-large trees and other plantings, sidewalks, parkways, many rock walls. The area is in remarkable good condition, with most buildings owner-occupied and/or single family dwellings that have always been maintained well.

Since the area is so close to a major arterial, Highway 71 B (College Avenue), threats by commercial rezoning are periodically attempted. Listing on the National Register would not only provide recognition for this unique area, representative of the town's development and architectural heritage, but it would also provide some security against future threats to its existence.
