DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Situated on the main road from Bowling Green to Franklin, in rural Simpson County, is Octagon Hall. The structure faces west and can be viewed from the highway.

This two-story octagon house has Flemish bond brickwork on the three front (west) facades, and common bond on the remaining ones. Each side contains three openings, with the exception of the extreme east and west sides, which have only two. The house has a very high basement, which is brick above ground, and stone below. Victorian gratework adorns the basement windows (see photos 1-2).

The main entrance element is simple with a cornice mold and pilasters. The front door is slightly recessed. Cut stone steps and an iron rail lead up to the door. The rear porch is wooden, with a bannistered rail and standing seam roof (see photos 3-4).

The interior plan is simple with a rear, central stair hall which radiates into each room. All interior woodwork is intact. Panelled pilasters with panelled aprons and cornice molding above make up the door trim (see photos 5-6). All the mantles are similar, and each has a simple panelled frieze and sides (see photos 7-8). Eight inch baseboards with a deep profile complete the interior treatment.

The nominated area encompasses the main house, a small 20th century garage, a 19th century frame tenant house which complete the visual integrity of the site.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Octagon Hall, an eight-sided house built circa 1860, exhibits a rare and unusual house form not only in the state of Kentucky but is also uncommon throughout the United States. It is significant as being one of less than ten octagonal houses remaining in Kentucky.

During the 1850s, the concept of the octagon in domestic architecture incited the imagination of the country. This movement was given impetus by Orson S. Fowler in his book The Octagon House A Home For All, first published in 1848. Fowler espoused the octagon as the perfect shape for architecture. He introduced to his readers "not merely a new concept of building but a fresh attitude toward housing."¹ Fowler's book was unlike the other "cottage manuals" of the day because he advocated revolutionary ideas concerning the dwellings of all classes of society. "Why continue to build in the same square form of all past ages? Nature's forms are mostly spherical,"² instructed Fowler.

By 1857 at least 1,000 octagon houses had been built across the country, as well as a number of octagonal churches, schoolhouses, barns and pig sties. It was during this period between 1842 and 1860 that Andrew Jackson Caldwell (1818-1866) built Octagon Hall. It has been reported that Caldwell, an ardent Southern sympathizer, hid rebel soldiers in the house after the Battle of Bowling Green.

One of the features of note of Octagon Hall is the fine brickwork which is consistent throughout the structure. The Flemish bond on the three front sides is perfectly laid, evidenced by the symmetry of the corner headers and window closers.

The interior woodwork, although simple, is finely crafted. All sills, door frames and aprons have a deep but faultless profile.

VBD Description: Beginning at a point on the east side of Hwy. 31W 150' from the NW corner of the main house, the boundary extends south along the east side of Hwy. 31W 350'; turning eastward, the line extends 300'; turning northward, extending 350'; then westward 300' to the point of beginning.

Justification: The house sits on a large tree-shaded lot. The boundary is drawn to incorporate the setting and the two outbuildings which lie approximately 200' to the south of the main house.
