SUMMARY

The Sample-McDougald House, located at 450 N.E. 10th Street in Pompano Beach, is a unique example of the Colonial Revival architectural style from the pioneer era of northern Broward County, Florida. The two-story house, built in 1916, was originally located at 3161 North Dixie Highway. It now sits on an open 2.6-acre site to which it was moved in 2001 in order to protect the building from damage and destruction. As originally located on the Old Dixie Highway, it sat in the midst of hundreds of acres of farmland and pine woods. The house is a large and imposing landmark that has seen little alteration or structural damage since it was constructed eighty-six years ago. The house was listed in the National Register of Historic Places in 1984, but that listing was lost when the house was moved in 2001. This re-nomination is based on the continuing architectural significance of the house.

SETTING

Over the years, as South Florida's population multiplied, the surrounding farmland gave way to commercial and residential development. the two-lane Old Dixie Highway was widened, cutting into the broad front lawn. By the final years of the twentieth century, the neighborhood was out of character with the landmark structure, and it was feared that one of three fates might befall it: commercial alteration out if its historical integrity, demolition, or destruction by accident or vandalism.

Fortunately a fourth option was taken, and it was decided to move the house to a new location that would be more appropriate to the historical identity of the building. In May 2001, the house was moved to a 2.6 acre site leased from the City of Pompano Beach. The new site is devoid of any other building or structure and therefore can be landscaped in a manner harmonious with the character of the house. In keeping with the nature of its original location, the house was sited on the property so as to approximate the relationship between the house and the main road and to maximize the open areas on either side of the structure. The State's Bureau of Historic Preservation was consulted prior to placing the house on the new site. The lack of surrounding structures provides a landscape that approximates, as close as can be reasonably expected, the Sample-McDougald House's historical context.

DESCRIPTION

Exterior (Photos 1-12)

The two-story house is irregular in plan. The front (north) façade is dominated by a one-story colonnaded porch that extends to the east of the main block of the house to create an open porte cochere. The porch wraps around the northwest corner of the house. The porch is executed in the Tuscan order and includes a full entablature with a wide projecting cornice. The entablature is plain and has no decorative treatment in the frieze. The porch columns are unfluted and sit on unadorned bases. The porch roof is flat and it topped by a plain wood balustrade and posts.

The main block of the house is covered by a hip roof with intersecting gables at the east and west facades. Both gables terminate in a projecting two-story bay crowned by a pedimented gable (Photo 6). A double brick chimney is located on the west slope on the main roof. Originally wood shingled, the roof surface was replaced in the 1990s by a composition shingle. The exterior of the house is sheathed with clapboard siding. Decorative details include a simple wrap-around cornice and corner posts.

A projecting portico with paired columns marks the main entrance to the house (Photo 9). The house front entry consists of a single glazed door flanked by a pair of large, single-pane sidelights. A glazed elliptical fanlight covers the whole expanse of door and sidelights. The windows are generally double hung wood sash, one over one with plain wood surrounds. Redwood slatted awnings were added to the house in the late 1940s.

Interior (Photos 13-41)

The interior of the Sample-McDougald House is organized around large central hallways on both floors (Photo 13). The first floor includes a foyer/stair hall, living room, dining room (Photo 17), kitchen (Photo 20), butler's pantry and hall the main central hall, master bedroom (Photo 14) and bath, and a rear office. The second floor, accessed by the main stair and a secondary rear stair, has a nursery, three large bedrooms, a bath, and a secondary bedroom/storeroom. There is no access to the porch roof from the second floor. Other than the kitchen, rooms are generally large, with eleven-foot ceilings.

Interior features are elaborate for the time and place of construction, and include plaster on wood lath on ceilings and floors, hardwood floors, five-panel wood doors, and trim in the main floor living spaces of egg and dart molding and a double cyma recta cornice, all milled from Dade County pine. Also of note are eight-foot

tall French doors located on the first floor. Two yellow brick fireplaces are located on the first floor (Photos 13 & 22).

Alterations

The house has undergone a minimum of alterations. These include the enclosure of a small rear porch (Photo 5), and the installation of window storm screens and screen doors. Some of these additions date back well over fifty years. The building is in excellent condition throughout, and remains one of the most recognized structures in the general area.

SUMMARY

The Sample-McDougald House is locally significant under **Criterion C** as the best example of Colonial Revival domestic architecture in Broward County, Florida. The house, built in 1916, has been an important landmark in Broward County and South Florida since the early part of the twentieth century. The house is distinguished by its architectural detail, size, and virtually unaltered condition.

HISTORIC CONTEXT

Albert Neal Sample built the house only two decades after Henry Flagler's Florida East Coast (FEC) Railway had been extended south of Palm Beach toward Miami. In 1916, much of northern Broward County was little removed form the frontier lifestyle of earlier times;; the town of Pompano and Deerfield were but small farming communities.¹

Sample (commonly known by his middle name, Neal) followed his brother John to South Florida, arriving from South Carolina in 1911.² John had acquired a significant amount of farmland, mostly from the FEC Railway. Neal took over the agricultural enterprise in 1915 when John decided to move out of South Florida. Neal set about building a new family home on his property, fronting the FEC Railway tracks an the Dixie Highway.

Apparently Neal had some architectural training, and was known as a person who paid attention to details. Whereas much of Broward County's buildings at that time were constructed in a vernacular style, Sample's new house was noteworthy for its Colonial Revival architectural style. It was also significant for its size, over 4500 square feet of interior space. Few, if any, residential structures in the area were as large.

Neal Sample built a residence that would befit his status as a major landowner and farmer, a civic leader and an elected official. To gain access to his farmland, he had constructed an east-west road that is known today as Sample Road. Sample died in 1941, and his daughter, Lois Barksdale, briefly owned the house.³

In 1943, William and Sarah McDougald of Deerfield Beach purchased the house and occupied it the following year. William was a farmer as well as Chief of Police for Deeerfield Beach and a Broward County Deputy Sheriff. He held several elected offices and was active in civic affairs. His wife was songwriter and active in the local community. They had seven children.⁴

Following Mrs. McDougald's death in 1979, the house was owned jointly by the McDougald siblings. In 1984 the house was placed in the National Register of Historic Places. Even at that time, however, commercial and residential development was encroaching on the house. Widening of Dixie Highway further damaged the local landmark's historical context. Anxious to see the house preserved for future generations, the McDougalds supported several attempts to preserve it, but logistical and financial complexities could not be overcome.⁵

In 1999 several community volunteers created the Sample McDougald House Preservation Society and sought community support to move and restore the historic structure. The McDougald heirs donated the house to the new organization, and the City of Pompano Beach agreed to a long-term lease on a multi-acre site that would provide a more natural surrounding for the house. On May 30, 2001 the house was moved form its original site and relocated a little over two miles to its new location. The house was sited on the property with guidance form the Florida Bureau of Historic Preservation. The house survived the move with no damage, and it remains an exceptional architectural artifact of South Florida's heritage, worthy of regaining its status as a National Register property.

ARCHITECTURAL CONTEXT - Colonial Revival

With the Centennial Exhibition of 1876 in Philadelphia, America began a romance with its architectural roots that continues to this day. People were seeking a purely "American" architecture to nourish their patriotic pride. It was natural that they should look back to the house types constructed during the colonial era and the first years of the republic. There are two basic types of Colonial Revival buildings, those that are historically accurate reproductions and those—which became more common—that were free interpretations of colonial houses combined with characteristics of the Queen Anne house (absent its florid decoration), with a few grafted on Georgian details, such as classical columns and Palladian windows.

Colonial Revival houses are formal and balanced in design and plan, commonly having central stair halls and formal floor plans. Many had gable ends of brick, stone, or wood. They are often characterized by a central entrance flanked by paired double hung sash windows with multiple lights. Construction materials range from wood frame clapboard to hollow clay tile and stucco. Exterior finishes sometimes also include stucco with occasional examples of brick veneer.

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE

Colonial Revival is a common architectural style in many parts of the United States, but is quite rare in Broward County. Virtually of all of the historic structures in Broward County that were built prior to the 1920s are

vernacular in style; the 1912 Nyberg-Swanson House (NR 1999) in Dania Beach in south Broward County is another good, though much smaller, example. That house is also unusual for its use of concrete block. The Sample McDougald House is, therefore, both a rare and good example of Colonial Revival architecture, exhibiting many of the classically derived elements associated with the style.

A one-story, colonnaded porch extends along the front façade, east of the main block of the house to create an open porte cochere (Photos 1, 7, & 8). On the opposite side of the porch it wraps around to the west façade (Photo 2). The porch has a full entablature with a wide projecting cornice. Characteristic of this style, the porch columns are not fluted and sit on unadorned bases. The entablature is plain and has no decorative treatment in the frieze. The porch roof is flat and is topped by a plain wood balustrade and posts.

The house has a hip roof with intersecting gables on the east and west facades (Photos 3, 5, & 7). Both gables terminate in a projecting two-story bay crowned by a pedimented gable. A double brick chimney is located on the west slope of the main roof (Photo 2). The current roof of composition shingle was installed in the early 1990s; the original roof was wood shingle. The exterior of the house is sheathed with cypress clapboard siding. Decorative details include a simple wrap-around cornice and corner posts.

At a time when most houses in northern Broward County were modest in size and lacked significant ornamentation, Sample included features such as ceilings and walls of plaster on wood lath, hardwood floors, two fireplaces, five panel wood doors, and trim in the main floor living spaces of egg and dart molding and double cyma recta cornice, all milled from Dade County pine.

VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION

A portion of the Northeast Quarter (NE ¼) of Section 35, Township 48, Range 42 East, lying in the City of Pompano Beach, Broward County, Florida. See Site Plan.

BOUNDARY JUSTIFICATION

The approximately 2.6 acres on which the house sits is land leased from the City of Pompano Beach for the relocation of the Sample-McDougald House. It is bounded on the east by NE 5th Avenue, on the north by NE 10th Street, on the south by private residential property and on the west by municipal property (the City of Pompano Beach tree nursery). This property will be developed to enhance the historical character of the Sample-McDougald House, recreating to some degree the agricultural setting in which the house historically stood.






