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Kosciusko Historic District
Kosciusko, Attala County, Mississippi

The Kosciusko Historic District is located in the center of the city of Kosciusko in central Attala County, Mississippi. This section of the state is known as the hill country because of its rolling terrain. While Kosciusko is not situated on a river, there are a number of them within the county, namely the Big Black River to the west, the Yockanookany River to the east and Shakey Creek to the north. The district boundaries are: the Illinois Central Railroad on the north, North and South Wells and South Natchez (S. Wells runs into S. Natchez) on the west with a jut out to take in Galloway Street which is "the Oaks" subdivision, Bobo Street on the south to South Huntington Street then north to Jefferson Street, east along Jefferson Street to its intersection with Highland Drive, and back west to N. East Street, which is the east boundary.

The district can be accessed by a number of major roads. Just north of the railroad is Highway 12, which runs east-west through the northern section of the city and connects on the east with Veterans Memorial Drive, a major arterial that runs north-south through the eastern section of Kosciusko. South Natchez Street becomes Highway 43, south of the district, and runs into Wells Street in the middle of the district. Wells Street then runs north to Highway 12.

The center of the district is the Attala County Court House, built in 1897. The north, east and south sides of the square are filled with commercial buildings with common walls with a sidewalk running directly in front of the buildings and parking in front. The Jackson Street side (east) has narrow one-story brick traditional commercial buildings dating between 1880 and 1920. The Washington Street side (north) has wider one and two story traditional commercial buildings dating to between the 1890s and the 1950s. The North Madison Street side (west) has fewer buildings with a large lot between two of the buildings at the south end, these are one and two story traditional commercial as well. The West Jefferson side (south) has one and two story brick traditional commercial buildings which are wider than the Jackson Street buildings. Traditional commercial buildings also located in the block outside of the square: south along Madison (only on the north side), north along Madison (only on the north side), east along East Washington Street (on both sides), and east along E. Jefferson along both sides.

As Jefferson continues east, there are a few free standing brick commercial buildings from the 1930s and 1940s. Into the next block and then east down East Jefferson until it runs into the bypass, are houses situated on large lots, most with driveways, but no sidewalks. The first block (300) is filled with earlier residences- Queen Anne (#206) and Craftsman (#203), and as one moves east there are residences dating from 1900 to 1955. Many of the Craftsman, Minimal Traditional, and Colonial Revival residences have porte cocheres or garages (attached or detached).

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The northern section of the district is a grid pattern with medium-sized lots connected by sidewalks. These residences date, for the most part, between 1890 and the 1950s and are Queen Anne, Craftsman, Minimal Traditional and Ranch. Located in the area to the west of the square are the water and light plant, water tower, a fire station, and commercial garages. North Wells Street, which forms the boundary on the west, has high style examples of Queen Anne (#533, #531), as well as, some modern infill commercial buildings. The historic residences retain their integrity and are shielded from modern intrusions by their large tree-filled lots.

South Wells Street and South Natchez Street (South Wells becomes South Natchez) runs south and eventually (outside of the district) to the Natchez Trace. There are average-sized lots with sidewalks and medium to small houses from the 1880s to the 1950s on South Wells. On Natchez Street there are medium to large residences on average-sized lots with some sidewalks. On both streets many styles are found, including Queen Anne, Craftsman, Minimal Traditional, and Colonial Revival.

The Kosciusko Historic District includes 562 buildings and two structures. The district centers around the county courthouse and radiates from this commercial area to the residential areas that encircle the downtown. The terrain is gently rolling and is comprised of residential, commercial and public buildings, as well as, two structures (a water tower and a train caboos). The majority of the buildings in the district were constructed between 1930 and 1958, with the second largest construction period being between 1890 and 1930. Of the 562 buildings in this district, 455 were built within the period of significance.

There are 416 residential buildings within the district which are built in a wide range of architectural styles including Greek Revival (#133), Queen Anne (high style (#531), Free Classic (#164), L-plan cottage(#332), and vernacular (#172)), Tudor Revival (#139), Colonial Revival (#123), Neoclassical, Craftsman (#32), American Foursquare (#421), Minimal Traditional (#349), and Ranch (#336). There are also three and four bay galleried cottages (#492) and a couple of shotgun houses. The vast majority of the residential buildings in the district are in good condition, retain their architectural integrity, and have had some level of rehabilitation. The larger Queen Anne residences have all been rehabilitated over the past few years and are in excellent condition. The most frequent alterations which have been made to residential buildings within the district are the addition of synthetic siding and window replacement. There are only a

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couple of residential buildings which have been adaptively reused for apartments or offices, but this is not a widespread occurrence.

The district also contains "The Oaks," the earliest (1938) "modern" subdivision in the city. The tree-dotted boulevard of Galloway Street is lined with houses dating from the 1930s to the 1970s (#93-#109) designed in the Colonial Revival, Minimal Traditional, and styles of each decade.

There are 118 commercial buildings in the district which are broken down into sixty-seven traditional commercial in design (#271, #157), forty-nine other commercial buildings and two buildings associated with industrial uses. The traditional commercial buildings are one or two story brick buildings, with common walls or free-standing, and sitting at the edge of the sidewalk. They have flat roofs or low gable roofs behind parapets (either flat or stepped), with storefronts consisting of traditional display plate glass windows set over brick or wood bulkheads with wood or aluminum full-light single-leaf or double-leaf doors. These buildings often have awnings- canvas, metal or wood- across the façade. The non-traditional commercial buildings are all other designs of buildings built for commercial purposes. They are mostly brick and one story (although there are also two-story examples) with varying fenestration, roof lines and distance from the sidewalk.

Commercial buildings within the district are in good condition and for the most part retain their architectural integrity. Alterations to commercial buildings are generally storefront changes such as changing the recess of the windows and doors, adding new siding or blocking down windows, however, there are also a number of buildings with slip covers. The Urban Renewal program of the 1970s provided funds to "update the look of the downtown" and add awnings in an attempt to draw customers. A number of buildings along the square were "renovated" to a modern look at this time and have not been restored to their historic appearance. However, there are several buildings which have been returned to their original design and the majority of the renovated buildings have not been so changed as to not be readily restored.

The Urban Renewal program was adopted in the hope of revitalizing the downtown area, specifically within the boundaries of South Natchez on the south, Wells on the west, Adams on the north and Huntington on the east. The main purposes of the project were to improve traffic control; to provide more parking; to buy and clear sub-standard properties in the downtown area and resell those properties for redevelopment; to move light industry out of the downtown; and to refurbish the square by means of canopies, new sidewalks, benches and landscaping. Through

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this program, historic buildings (the Oleander Hotel (1920s), East End Grocery, Smythe Building, Luvel factory and entire side of that block on East Jefferson, the old Baptist Church on North Jackson, Kosciusko Ice and Coal Company and the Ray house next to it, McCool House on N. Huntington, and the old three-story high school building on S. Huntington) were demolished. In their place, new buildings and parking lots were constructed. On the site of the ice company, which is also the site of the Redbud Springs, the city built a bicentennial park in 1976.

In addition to the residential and commercial resources, there are ten church buildings, 4 buildings constructed for apartments, a theater (1926, #364), a park building, the Attala County Court House (1897, #264), two public utilities buildings (1920, #275; 1945, #276), a water tower, a caboose, two fire stations (1945, #279; 2005, #183), a gas station (1930, #136), a school complex (#211), a car wash, a library, a jail, the police station, and a post office (1930, #511) which has been adapted for use as the Kosciusko City Hall. The churches date to between 1899 (#512) to 2006.

Of the 564 resources within the district, 383 are contributing and 170 are non-contributing, with only 61 of the non-contributing being buildings constructed within the period of significance. Additionally, eleven buildings within the district are previously listed in the National Register of Historic Places. These are the Storer House (118) (NR-2003), Judge Henry C. Niles House (121) (NR-1993), Niles House (127) (NR-1998), John Copeland Lucas House (133) (NR-1993), Col. Chap Anderson House (172) (NR-1987), Attala County Court House (264) (NR-1997), D. L. Brown Home (508) (NR-1977), First Presbyterian Church (512) (NR-1992), Jackson Niles House (531) (NR-1984), Jackson-Browne House (538) (NR-1987), and Johnson-Sullivant House (543) (NR-1986).

The inventory is arranged alphabetically by street name in ascending numerical order. Buildings are classified as contributing (C) or noncontributing (NC) to the historic character of the district.

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Properties that have already been listed in the National Register of Historic Places are designated as previously listed (PL).

1. NC 206 East Adams Street c. 1970s
A garage and residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable to the front. There are two bays: a garage opening and a 6/6 double-hung wood window.
2. NC 312 East Adams Street c. 1910
A one-story masonite-over-clapboard and brick (wainscoting) residence, facing south, with an asphalt hip roof. The full facade front porch is covered with a hip roof supported with new decorative wrought columns. The porch floor has been lowered to ground level and concreted. There are 5 bays: a center single leaf panel door with sidelights flanked by 2 9/9 aluminum windows. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.
3. C 313 East Adams Street c. 1930
A one-story narrow clapboard bungalow residence, facing north, with an asphalt front gable roof with a rectangular vent in the gable end. There is a gable to the front with paired rectangular vents in the gable end. There is a corner porch recessed under this roof which is supported with square wood posts connected with a decorative wood balustrade. There are decorative cut work brackets. There are 7 bays: a center single leaf glazed (3-light, 3 panel) door flanked by 3 4/1 double-hung wood windows. There are exposed rafter ends. Widely overhanging eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.
4. C 314 East Adams Street c. 1930
A one-story narrow clapboard bungalow residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with a square vent in the gable end. There is a gabled porch on the left of the facade supported by decorative wrought iron columns resting on brick piers. There are exposed rafter ends. Widely overhanging eaves. There are 3 bays: a single leaf glazed (4-light, 3 panel) (left end facade) door and a pair of 4/1 double-hung wood windows under the porch and a pair of 4/1 double-hung wood windows in the projecting section. There is a brick end chimney that has been shortened. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation. Widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends.

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5. C 315 East Adams Street c. 1930

A one-story clapboard residential, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof and a cross gable over a projecting room. There is a brick ridge chimney. There is a 3-sided bay window with a hip roof and 3 4/4 double-hung wood windows, and above it in the gable end is a 6/6 double-hung wood window. There is a gabled addition on the right side of the main block, a carport with a 4/4 double-hung window in the back wall. There is a porch across the main block with a hip roof supported with turned posts and connected with spindled frieze. There are 3 bays under the porch: a single leaf glazed door with sidelights and transom and 2 4/4 double-hung wood window. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

6. C 316 East Adams Street c. 1945

A one-story brick residence, facing south, with an asphalt side gable roof with a cross gable to the front, there is a smaller gable over the entrance supported with brick columns. There is a shed covered addition (clapboard) on the right filled with a series of 5 louvered windows. There are 3 bays: a 3-part fixed window (4/1/4), a single leaf glazed (1/2) door and a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows. The rectangular vent in the gable end is covered. There is an end brick chimney. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation. Narrow boxed eaves.

7. C 318 East Adams Street c. 1930

A one-story drop sided bungalow residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with a gable roof to the front over a projecting room and a corner porch supported with a square wood boxed column and a square wood post, connected with a plain wood balustrade. The eaves are widely overhanging and there are exposed rafter ends and large plain brackets. There is a 3-sided bay in the projecting section with a hip roof which has a 4 1/1 double-hung wood, 2 4/1 double-hung wood and a 4/1 double-hung wood window. There are 2 bays under the porch: a 4/1 double-hung wood, a single leaf glazed (1/2) door with storm. There is a single leaf glazed (1/2) door into the side off the porch. All bays set in plain openings. There is an end brick chimney. Brick pier foundation.

8. C 319 East Adams Street c. 1930

A one-story clapboard bungalow residence, facing north, with a new brick wainscoting. The roof is an asphalt front gable and the corner porch is recessed under the main roof and is

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supported with a metal pole. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf glazed (3 stepped lights) flanked by a pair of 1/1 double-hung aluminum windows. There is a recessed wood vent in the gable end. All bays set in plain openings. Plain overhanging eaves. Brick pier foundation.

9. C 320 East Adams Street c. 1930

A one-story narrow clapboard bungalow residence, facing south; with an asphalt gable roof with exposed rafter ends and a rectangular wood vent in the gable end. There is a gable over a porch set on the left of the facade, supported with tapered square wood columns set on brick piers. There are 3 bays: 2 4/1 double-hung wood windows under the porch and a pair of 4/1 double-hung wood windows. The entrance is a single leaf glazed (4-light, 3 panel) and is into the side off the porch. All bays are set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

10. C 321 East Adams Street c. 1955

A one-story brick and asbestos sided residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof. There is a cross gable over a carport on the right front supported with brick columns and metal poles. There are 4 bays: 3 louvered aluminum windows and a single leaf glazed door (small rectangular light). Overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

11. C 324 East Adams Street c. 1955

A one-story asbestos sided residence, facing south, with a side asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a center porch supported with 3 round wood columns. There is an addition on the left set back from the facade. It has 2 bays that are shuttered. There are 4 bays in the main block: a single leaf paneled door with 6-lights in the top 1/3 and a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood window under the porch. These bays are flanked by a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows. All bays set in plain openings. Narrow boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation.

12. C 328 East Adams Street c. 1955

A one-story asbestos sided residence, facing south, with an asphalt front gable roof with a cross gable to the left. There are 2 bays: a pair of 3/1 double-hung windows and a 3-part window a multi-light fixed window flanked by 3/1 double-hung wood. The right corner is cut out and is supported by a round wood column to form an entrance into the side which is single leaf glazed (3-light, 3 panel). The eaves are narrow and boxed. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

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13. NC 330 East Adams Street c. 1930
A one-story brick-over-clapboard residence, facing south, with an asphalt hip roof. There is a large cross gable over a porch supported with round wood columns. There are 4 bays: a pair of 4/1 double-hung wood windows, a single leaf glazed door (4-light, 3 panel), a pair of 4/1 double-hung wood windows and a 4/1 double-hung wood window (projecting section). The gable end is filled with vertical siding and a pair of 3-light (vertical) fixed sash windows. There is an interior brick chimney. The building has been resided with brick. The eaves are wide and boxed. All bays have plain openings. Brick pier foundation.
14. C 341 East Adams Street c. 1955
A one-story brick residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with two cross gables to the front. A multi-light fixed sash projects slightly under a gable roof placed in front of the other gable. There is a small corner porch under a flat roof supported with a square wood post. The door is a single-leaf paneled door with sidelights and there is also a three-part window with multi-light fixed, single-light fixed, multi-light fixed. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings. There is an open clapboard gabled garage on the right in the rear of the property.
15. C 333 East Adams Street c. 1930
A one-story clapboard bungalow residence, facing north, with an asphalt front gable roof with widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. There is an exterior brick chimney that has been shortened to under the roof line. The full-width front porch is recessed under the main roof and is supported with square wood tapered columns resting on brick piers and connected with a plain wood balustrade. There are 2 bays: a 1/1 double-hung wood window, and a single leaf glazed (1/3) door with a 2-light transom. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.
16. C 335 East Adams Street c. 1940
A one-story brick residence, facing north, with an asphalt hip on gable roof. There is a room on the right side rear with a hip on gable roof. The main roof projects slightly over the facade over the first 3 bays. There are 4 bays: a pair of louvered windows; a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows, a center single leaf glazed door with 3 stepped lights, a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

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17. NC 400 East Adams Street c. 1980
A one-story brick commercial building, facing south, with an asphalt side gable roof with a cross gable. There is a shed over an addition on the right side. There are 4 bays: a large multi-light fixed sash window, a single leaf glazed (6-light, 3 panel) recessed door, a 6/6 double-hung vinyl window and a pair of 6/6 double-hung aluminum windows in the addition. All bays set in plain openings. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. Concrete slab foundation.
18. C 401 East Adams Street c. 1945
A one-story drop siding residence, facing north, with an asphalt side gable roof with a cross gable over a porch on the right facade supported by square wood posts with cut brackets. There are 4 bays: 2 pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows and a single leaf panel door and a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows under the porch. The bays are set in plain openings. There is a brick end chimney. There is a gable over a carport on the left side supported with brick columns. There are exposed rafter ends. Widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. Brick pier foundation.
19. NC 403 East Adams Street c. 1970s
A two-story brick residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with a one-story section on the right which extends forward and is pierced with a central ridge chimney. The roof on the one-story wraps around to cover a one-story porch in front of the two story section. It is supported with decorative wrought iron columns. There are four bays: an 8/8 double-hung window and a single-leaf paneled door under the porch and two 8/8 double-hung windows in the one-story section. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Concrete slab foundation.
20. NC 406 East Adams Street c. 1980s
A two-story brick commercial building, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with extended shed off the gable end on each side. The full-width front porch is recessed under the main roof and is supported with two-story Doric columns. There is a one-story carport under a flat roof on the right side. There are 5 bays: a center single leaf panel door and 4 8/8 double-hung wood windows with shutters and pedimented heads. There are corbelled brick quoins on the corners. Concrete slab foundation. Widely overhanging boxed eaves.
21. C 410 East Adams Street c. 1930
A one-story brick over clapboard bungalow residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with an exterior brick chimney. There is a gable over a porch set to the left of the facade. It

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is supported with wood Doric columns. Both gable ends are covered in masonite. There are 3 bays: 2 4/1 double-hung wood windows and 3 part windows filled with 3 4/1 double-hung wood sash. The single leaf glazed (4- light, 3 panel) door is into the side off the porch. The bays are set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation. Widely overhanging boxed eaves.

22. C 413 East Adams Street c. 1950

A one-story concrete block commercial building, facing south, with an asphalt side gable roof. There are 8 bays: a single leaf panel door, a 4-light fixed window; a single leaf panel door; 2 1/1 sliding windows, a pair of single-light fixed sash; and 2 1/1 sliding windows. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings. No eaves.

23. C 414 East Adams Street c. 1955

A one-story brick duplex residence, facing south, with an asphalt hip roof with hipped projections on the left and right of the façade. There is a porch recessed under the main roof between the two projections supported with decorative wrought columns. There are 4 bays: 4 8/8 double-hung vinyl windows. The entrances are single leaf panel into the sides of the porch. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

24. C 415 East Adams Street 1937-38

Attala County Office Building. A two-story brick public building, facing north, with a metal gable roof with cross gables on either end of the façade. There are corbelled brick quoins on every corner on the facade. There is a flat roof over a two-story porch at the entrance with two-story square columns. There are 11 bays on the first floor: a vent, 2 6/6 double-hung wood windows, a single leaf panel door with a fanlight, and 7 6/6 double-hung wood windows. There are 14 bays on the second floor: a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows, a single leaf glazed door with sidelights, a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood window, 3 6/6 double-hung wood window, a 4-part multi-light fold-out door, a boarded window, 3 6/6 double-hung wood window and 3 pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

25. C 418 East Adams Street c. 1930

A one-story clapboard bungalow residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof. There is a gable roof over a full-width front porch supported with square wood columns. There are widely overhanging eaves with plain large wood brackets. There is a shed roof over an addition on the right side with a gable porch supported with square wood columns. There are 6

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bays in the main block: 3 4/1 double-hung wood windows, single leaf panel door, and 2 4/1 double-hung wood windows. There are 3 bays in the addition: a single leaf panel door flanked by 6/6 double-hung wood windows. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

26. NC 112 West Adams Street c. 1970s
A one-story modern brick public building, facing south, with an asphalt hip roof. There is a flat roof over a carport on the right and a gable over a building to the right of that. There are four bays: 2 2/2 aluminum double-hung windows, an aluminum bay window, and a pair of louvered windows. All bays set in plain openings. Concrete slab foundation. Close boxed eaves.
27. NC 209 West Adams Street c. 1970s
A one-story brick commercial building, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with a large cross gable to the front. The full façade porch is recessed under the main roof and is supported with wood Doric columns. There is a small undersized cupola in the middle of the roof ridge. There are 8 multi-light fixed sash windows and two single-leaf glazed doors. Close boxed eaves. Concrete slab foundation. All bays set in plain openings.
28. C 210 West Adams Street c. 1890
A two-story clapboard Queen Anne residence, facing south, with an asphalt hip roof with a cross gable on the right side. There is a center one-story porch with a hip roof supported with turned posts enhanced with turned brackets, and connected by a turned balustrade. A smaller porch on the second floor sits atop the first floor porch roof and is covered with a gable roof supported with turned posts. It is enhanced with a turned balustrade and a jigsawed frieze. There are fishscale shingles and a pointed vent in the gable end. There are five bays: a center single leaf glazed (1/2) door with sidelights and transom and 4 9/9 double-hung wood windows. The second floor has a center single leaf glazed (1/2) door with transom and 4 9/9 double-hung wood windows. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.
29. NC 211 West Adams Street c. 1960s
A one-story brick residence, facing south, with an asphalt hip roof with a cross gable to the front with an arched vent in the gable end. There is a carport recessed under the roof on the right side supported with metal poles. There are two bays: a large three-light fixed sash and a single leaf panel door. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

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30. NC 300 West Adams Street c. 1980

A modern vertical siding commercial building, facing south, with an asphalt shed roof connected to a mirror image on the back connected by a flat roof. There is a large 4-light fixed dormer with a shed roof. There are four plate glass windows. The entrance is into the side in the porch which is recessed on the right sided. Overhanging boxed eaves. Concrete slab foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

31. C 301 West Adams Street c. 1930

A one-story brick residence, facing north, with an asphalt clipped gable roof with a brick end chimney. A carport is recessed under the main roof on the left corner and is supported with wood 4x4 posts on brick piers. The back wall of the carport is drop siding pieced by a single-leaf glazed (3 light, 3 panel) door. There are three bays on the main façade: a center single-leaf glazed (3 light, 3 panel) door flanked by a pair of 3/1 double-hung wood windows. The entry is set in a projecting gable and has an arch of soldier brick set above the door in the brick. The eaves are narrow, boxed. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings, except the door.

32. C 304 West Adams Street c. 1935

A one-story brick bungalow residence, facing south, with an asphalt hip-on-gable roof with widely overhanging eaves supported with large shaped wood brackets. There is a hip-on-gable porch on the right faced supported with heavy square wood columns on brick piers with concrete caps. The gable ends are filled with clapboard. There are three bays: a pair of 3/1 double-hung wood windows and a single leaf glazed door (3-light, 3 panel) and a pair of 3/1 double-hung wood windows. There are widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. Brick per foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

33. C 307-309 West Adams Street c. 1930

A one-story drop siding bungalow residence, facing north, with an asphalt hip-on-gable roof with widely overhanging eaves and large shaped brackets. There is a hip-on-gable roof over a large porch set on the left façade, supported with square paneled wood columns on brick piers. There is a pair of rectangular vents in this gable end and a sliding window in the gable end of the main block. There is a long gabled wing on the left rear side with 2 garage spaces, and a single-leaf glazed (1/2) door flanked by 6/6 double-hung wood windows. There are 2 bays: a pair of

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3/1 double-hung wood and a 3-part window with 3 3/1 double-hung wood windows. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

34. C 312 West Adams Street c. 1930

A one-story narrow clapboard bungalow residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. There is a gabled porch on the left façade supported with heavy painted brick columns. Three are three bays: a pair of 6/1 double-hung wood windows, a center single leaf panel door, and a pair of 6/1 double-hung wood windows. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation. There is a 2 car garage on the right rear yard with an asphalt gable roof (modern).

35. NC 314 West Adams Street c. 1970

A one-story modern brick and board and batten commercial building, facing south, with a flat roof. There is one bay: a single-leaf panel door with a single sidelight. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. Concrete slab foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

36. NC 405 West Adams Street c. 1990s

A modern two-story brick apartment complex with a metal gable roof. There is a two-tiered porch across the façade which is recessed under the main roof supported with metal poles and metal balustrade. Sash are 6/6 double-hung aluminum and the doors are single leaf metal.

37. C 100 Bell Street also known as 400 East Jefferson c.1930

A one-story vinyl sided Colonial Revival residence, facing west, with an asphalt hip on gable roof pierced with a large gable dormer filled with three rectangular vents. The wrap-around porch is covered with a hip roof supported with tapered square wood columns. The left side has been enclosed with vinyl siding and a pair of 9/1 double-hung windows. The center entrance is a single-leaf door with a transom behind a storm door. The door is flanked by three-part windows (6/1, 9/1, 6/1). Under the porch on the right side is a single leaf door and a pair of 6/6 double-hung windows. Moderately overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

38. C 101 Bell Street c. 1940

A one-story asbestos and clapboard (under right bay) residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof (widely overhanging eaves) and exposed rafter ends. There are 3 bays: a pair

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of 2/2 double-hung wood windows, a single leaf glazed (3 stepped lights) door, and a 3-part window with 3 2/2 double-hung wood windows (middle sash is larger). All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation. There is a metal awning supported with metal brackets over the door.

39. C 102 Bell Street c. 1935

A one-story drop siding residence, facing west, with an asphalt hip on gable roof with widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. There is a gabled clapboard garage on the left. There is a gabled portico supported by decorative wrought iron posts under a wooden arch. There are 4 bays: a set of 3 6/1 double-hung wood windows, a single leaf door with 6-lights and 3 panels, a 3-part window with 4/1, 6/1, 4/1 double-hung wood windows, and a pair of multi-light casement wood windows. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

40. C 103 Bell Street c. 1940

A one-story drop siding residence, facing east, with an asphalt side-gable roof with a shed roof over an addition on the rear. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf half-glazed door with a storm door flanked by a pair of 2/2 aluminum windows on the left and a 3-part aluminum window on the left with a center fixed sash flanked by 1/1 double-hung window. There is a gabled portico supported with square wood posts. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

41. C 104 Bell Street c. 1940

A one-story clapboard residence, facing west, with an asphalt hip on gable roof, with a shed over a porch that covers the right three-fourths of the façade. The porch is supported with wood round columns. There are 3 bays: a 3-part bay not under the porch (6/6, 9/9, 6/6 double-hung wood windows) and a single leaf door with an oval light (new) set in a surround with pilasters and entablature; and another 3-part window like the first. There is a gabled clapboard garage on the right side. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

42. C 107 Bell Street c. 1930

A one-story drop siding residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. There is a center small porch recessed under the main roof. There are 5 bays: a center single leaf paneled door flanked by 2 pair of 6/6 double-

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hung wood windows. There is a single leaf paneled door into the side of the porch. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

43. NC 108 Bell Street c. 1980s

A brick church, facing west, with a front asphalt gable in front, dominated by a floor to gable peek stained glass window. There is a hip over a porch door on the right side with a tall wood cross projecting from the front corner of the porch. There is a long metal gabled metal-sided building with a full facade porch recessed and supported with metal poles. There are 8 bays in this wing: 3 double leaf half-glazed doors and 5 vinyl windows. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Concrete slab foundation.

44. C 200 Bell Street c. 1920

A one-story clapboard residence, facing west, currently (5/2006) under rehab., with a low pyramidal hip roof with widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. There is a shed covered addition (masonite) at the rear. There is a full facade front porch covered with a shed roof with widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends, supported with square wood posts. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf new door flanked by a pair of new 1/1 double-hung windows (aluminum) and a 6/6 double-hung aluminum. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

45. C 204 Bell Street c. 1940

A one-story drop siding residence, facing west, with an asphalt side-gable roof with a shed roof over an addition on the rear. There are three bays: a center single-leaf half-glazed door with a storm door flanked by a pair of 2/2 double-hung aluminum windows on the left and a three-part aluminum window on the left with a center fixed sash window flanked by 1/1 double-hung sash windows. There is a gabled portico supported with square wood posts. Moderately overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

46. C 205 Bell Street c. 1940

A one-story drop siding and masonite (in gable end of porch) bungalow residence, facing east, with an asphalt front gable roof with widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. There is an almost full width front porch covered with a gable (end) roof (widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends) supported with square wood posts connected with a lattice balustrade. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf door with a small diamond light flanked by 3/1 double-hung wood windows. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

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47. C 208 Bell Street c. 1930

A one-story asbestos shingle and brick (wainscoting) residence, facing west, with an asphalt hip roof. An additional hip roof covers a projecting room on the right façade and a porch on the left facade and a porch on the left facade supported with decorative wrought iron posts. There is a hip over an addition on the left side toward the rear. To the front of this addition is a hip roof over a carport supported with decorative (non-historic) columns. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf wood door with 2 small lights in the top one-third; a boarded up window to the left and a pair of shuttered windows in the projecting section. All eaves are widely overhanging and have exposed rafter ends. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

48. C 209 Bell Street c. 1930

A one-story asbestos shingle and vertical plywood (center of facade) siding residence, facing east, with a low asphalt hip roof with widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. A hipped porch centers the facade and is supported with painted brick columns on brick piers (widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends). There are 3 bays: an off center single leaf panel door flanked by 4/1 double-hung wood windows. Suspect that there was another door beside the present door. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation. There is a small gabled out building in the rear (left) with a center single leaf glazed (4-light, 3 panel) flanked by 6/6 double-hung wood.

49. C 101 Coleman Street c. 1900

A one-story clapboard Colonial Revival residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof pierced by a corbelled brick chimney in the front slope. A gabled room projects on the right side with a round window in the gable end. The eaves are narrow and boxed. A hipped dormer projects from the roof on the left side and has a 1/1 double-hung wood window. A wrap-around porch is covered with a hip roof supported with wood Doric columns which are connected by a turned spindle balustrade. There are 3 windows: a pair of 1/1 double-hung wood windows; a single leaf glazed (1/2) door with multi-light sidelights; and a 2/2 double-hung wood window. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation. There is a carport with a flat roof.

50. C 103 Coleman Street c. 1910

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A one-story clapboard Colonial Revival residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with a gable over a 3-sided bay that has 3 1/1 double-hung wood window with aluminum storms. The eaves are narrow, boxed. A porch with a flat roof and exposed rafter ends begins at the front of the bay and curves around to join the main block. It is supported by wood Doric columns connected by plain square wood balustrade. There are 4 bays under the porch: a single leaf glazed (oval light) door with transom, a 1/1 double-hung wood window, a single leaf glazed (3-lights, 3 panel) door and a 3/1 double-hung wood window. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

51. C 105 Coleman Street c. 1926

A one-story narrow clapboard residence, facing north, with an asphalt hip on gable roof with widely overhanging closed eaves supported with large decorative wood brackets. There is a 3-part window filled with 3 6-light wood fixed sash. A hip roof extends over a projecting porch on the left supported with square brick column with concrete caps and resting on brick piers connected with a brick balustrade. There is a wide plain frieze and widely overhanging eaves and decorative wood brackets. The porch is screened. There are 4 bays: a 3-part window with 3 multi-light-over/1 double-hung wood windows; a single light fixed window, a floor-length 3-part window with 3 multi-light fixed sash. Above this window is a narrow arched flat roof supported with decorative wood brackets. There is a short brick pier under each single-light fixed window. A single leaf half-glazed door provides entrance into the side. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

52. C 107 Coleman Street c. 1890

A one-story clapboard Queen Anne residence, facing north, with a front gable roof which has a hip on the rear. There is a three-part window in the gable end with 6/1 double-hung, 12/1, 6/1 double-hung wood windows; above this bay is a square wood vent. There are fishscale shingles in the gable end. The eaves are slightly overhanging and are boxed. There are five bays on the first floor of the façade: a 1/1 double-hung wood window, a single-leaf (1/2, 3 panel) door with transom and a three-sided projecting bay with 3 1/1 double-hung wood windows. The wrap-around porch is covered with a hipped roof supported with Doric columns connected by a pierced balustrade with a molded rail. A saw-tooth strip defines the bottom of the frieze. Two cross gables extend over the three-sided projection on the left elevation. In the first gable end there is a 6/1 double-hung wood window and fishscale shingles. The second has a Palladian window with a 6/1 double-hung wood window flanked by smaller single-light fixed sash. The 3-sided projecting section has 3 1/1 double-hung wood windows and the sections are connected by

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a plain section with a 1/1 double-hung wood window. At the rear is a screened and glassed porch with a shed roof. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

53. C 504 North East Street c. 1940

A one-story vinyl and brick (wainscoting) residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof. There is a gabled portico supported with square wood posts. There are 4 bays: a pair of 6/6 double-hung vinyl windows; a single leaf paneled (center) door, a 6/6 double-hung vinyl window and a 6/6 double-hung vinyl window. All bays set in plain openings. Narrow boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation.

54. C 600 North East Street c. 1940

A one-story drop siding residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with a gable over a small center porch supported with decorative wrought columns. There are 5 bays: 2 2/2 double-hung aluminum windows, a 8/8 double-hung aluminum window, a single leaf panel door with storm door and a 2/2 double-hung aluminum window in an end gable room on the right. Narrow boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

55. C 602 North East Street c. 1935

A one-story clapboard residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with exposed rafter ends and a gabled dormer with a new window. There is a full facade porch covered with a hip roof supported with square wood box columns on brick piers. There is a hipped addition on the left with a new window. There are 3 bays in the main block: a pair of aluminum windows, a single leaf glazed door (6-light, 2 panel) and a pair of 6/6 aluminum windows. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

56. C 305 Fairground Street c. 1940

A one-story vinyl-sided Minimal Traditional residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a projecting room on the right. There is a gabled room on the left end, as well. There are 5 bays: a 6/6 double-hung vinyl window, a small pair of 6/6 double-hung vinyl windows, a pair of 6/6 double-hung vinyl windows, a single leaf panel door with storm door, and a pair of 6/6 double-hung vinyl windows. Moderately overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings. There is a metal garage with bus-barn shed in the lot to the left.

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57. C 306 Fairground Street c. 1940

A one-story vinyl-sided Minimal Traditional residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with a centered cross gable over a porch supported with wood posts. The gable end vent is covered with vinyl. There are 4 bays: a pair of small 6/6 double-hung wood windows; an 8/8 double-hung wood window and single leaf panel door under the porch; and an 8/8 double-hung wood window. All bays set in plain openings. Moderately overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. A clapboard garage with a gable roof is set behind and to the right of the building.

58. C 308 Fairground Street c. 1900

A one-story drop siding Queen Anne residence, facing south, with a tall asphalt hip roof with a cross gable over a 3-sided projecting room. The gable end is enhanced with fishscale shingles, a vent flanked by sunbursts (wood) and jigsawn bargeboard. There are 3 1/1 double-hung vinyl windows. The porch runs from the projection across the façade and down the side, however the right corner has been enclosed with siding and a set of 3 1/1 double-hung vinyl windows. The porch is covered with an asphalt hip roof supported with square wood columns and pilasters. There are two bays under the porch: a single leaf glazed (3/4) and enhanced with applied molding door with a transom and a 1/1 double-hung wood window. There is a shed roof over a small porch on the right side supported with square posts with a plain balustrade. Close boxed eaves. Brick foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

59. C 311 Fairground Street c. 1929

A one-story clapboard Craftsman residence, facing north, with an asphalt hip roof with widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. There is a cross gable projecting from the roof (front slope) filled with clapboard. There is a center gabled porch supported by fluted wood posts, widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. There are 5 bays: a center single leaf glazed door (6 lights in top one third) flanked by 8/1 double-hung wood windows under the porch; and then by a larger 8/1 double-hung wood window. Brick foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

60. C 312 Fairground Street c. 1900

A one-story narrow clapboard Queen Anne residence, facing south, with an asphalt hip roof with a cross gable over a projecting room which has fishscale shingles in the gable end and a 1/1 double-hung wood window. The wrap-around porch is covered with a hip roof supported by wood Ionic columns. There are 2 bays: a 1/1 double-hung wood window and a single leaf glazed

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(1/2) door. The wall under the porch is beaded board. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

61. NC 313 Fairground Street c. 1970

A one-story brick Ranch, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof over half and another gable over the other half. There is a carport recessed under the main roof on the left façade. There are 4 bays: a pair of 2/2 double-hung aluminum windows, a single leaf paneled door and 2 6/6 double-hung aluminum windows. A slight porch is recessed under the main roof and is supported by square brick columns. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. Concrete foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

62. C 314 Fairground Street c. 1935

A one-story asbestos shingle Craftsman duplex, facing north, with a hip-on-gable asphalt roof. There is a cross hip-on-gable over each of the units. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. Each unit has the same bays: a center single leaf glazed (3 light, 3 panel) door, with an arch door hood supported with plain wood brackets, flanked by 3/1 double-hung wood windows. Brick foundation. All bays set in plain openings. There is an addition on the right side toward the rear with a pair of 1/1 double-hung wood windows and covered by a shed roof that extends forward over a carport supported with a plain post.

63. C 316 Fairground Street c. 1940

A one-story clapboard residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with widely overhanging boxed eaves. The full façade porch is covered by a flat roof supported with decorative metal columns. A shed roof extends from the side over a porte cochere supported by metal poles. There are 4 bays: 2 center doors (a 4-light new door and a single leaf glazed (diamond light in top)) flanked by 2/2 double-hung aluminum windows. All bays set in plain openings. Brick foundation. There is a gabled shed in the rear yard.

64. C 317 Fairground Street c. 1920

A one-story clapboard Colonial Revival residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with a small center cross gable. The full façade porch is recessed under the main roof which is supported with wood Doric columns connected with a plain wood balustrade. There are five bays: a center single leaf paneled door flanked by 2 4/1 double-hung wood windows with

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shutters. All bays set in plain openings. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. Brick foundation. There is a gabled wing on the rear right side.

65. C 318 Fairground Street c. 1920

A one-story vinyl sided residence, facing south, with an asphalt hip roof pierced by a small center gable with fishscale shingles. The porch (left half façade) is recessed under the main roof and is supported by square wood posts connected by a plain (new) balustrade and a similar frieze. There is a corner jigsawed bracket on one post. There are 4 bays: a 2/2 double-hung wood window in the projecting section and a single leaf glazed (4-light, 3 panel) door and 2 2/2 double-hung wood windows. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. Brick foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

66. NC 319 Fairground Street c. 1970

A one-story brick Ranch, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with widely overhanging boxed eaves. The center porch is recessed under the main roof and is supported by wood Doric columns. There are 6 bays: 2 6/6 double-hung aluminum windows, a single leaf glazed (2 small vertical lights-stepped) door, a multi-light fixed window (these two under the porch), and 2 6/6 double-hung aluminum windows. Concrete foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

67. C 320 Fairground Street c. 1930

A one-story drop siding Craftsman residence, facing south, with an asphalt hip roof with widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends, and a stuccoed brick end chimney. There is a cross hip over a room on the right side and front to the left of it is a small porch with a shed roof supported by square wood posts. There are 2 bays: a pair of 2/2 double-hung aluminum windows and a single leaf glazed (1/2) door. Brick foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

68. NC 321 Fairground Street c. 1930

A one-story vinyl-sided bungalow residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with widely overhanging boxed eaves. There is a cross gable over a projecting room (left) and wrap around porch which is supported by non-historic decorative wrought iron columns. There are 4 bays: a pair of 1/1 double-hung aluminum windows and a single leaf glazed door (1/2 and 2 panels) with a vinyl surround under the porch; and 2 1/1 double-hung aluminum windows in the main block. Changes from the original design are the addition of vinyl siding, inappropriate columns, and modern aluminum windows. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

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69. C 322 Fairground Street c. 1910

A one-story narrow clapboard L-front residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a projecting room (with cornice returns) on the left. There are 2 4/4 double-hung wood windows in the projection. The porch is tucked into the "L" and is supported by turned posts. There are 3 bays under the porch: a single leaf glazed (arched full-length light) door and 2 4/4 double-hung wood windows. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

70. C 323 Fairground Street c. 1930

A one-story asbestos bungalow residence, facing north, with an asphalt hip roof. The full facade porch is covered with a flat roof supported with heavy square wood slightly tapered columns resting on tall stuccoed brick piers. There is a shed roof over a porte cochere on the left side supported with square wood columns. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf glazed (4-light, 3 panel) door flanked by 4/1 double-hung wood windows. The porch floor has been lowered down to ground level. All bays set in plain openings. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation.

71. C 324 Fairground Street c. 1950

A one-story brick residence, facing south, with an asphalt hip roof with widely overhanging boxed eaves. There is an end brick chimney (left). There are 3 bays: a center single leaf panel door with a 2/2 double-hung aluminum window on the right and a 3 part (2/2, single light fixed, 2/2 double-hung aluminum) window on the left. There is a very narrow porch recessed under the main roof on the left half of the facade. The roof is supported by metal posts on a pierced brick wall. Concrete slab foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

72. C 325 Fairground Street c. 1950

A one-story asbestos bungalow residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with a gable over a porch on the right side supported by square wood posts. The porch is screened. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf glazed (3-light, 3 panel) door flanked by a pair of 3/1 double-hung wood windows. There is a wood rectangular vent in the gable end of the main block. Moderately overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings. There is a gabled drop siding garage at the rear on the right.

73. C 326 Fairground Street c. 1940

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A one-story brick Tudor residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with an exterior brick chimney on the façade. There is a flared cross gable on the right of the chimney with a small arched window in the gable end. There is a small cross gable over the entry on the left side of the chimney. There is a screened porch recessed under the main roof on the left corner. There are 3 bays: a single leaf paneled door and 2 pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows. There is a flat roof over a porte cochere on the left supported with square wood posts. There is a gabled wing at the rear on the left side which has 2 bays: a single leaf paneled door and a multi-light fixed aluminum window. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings.

74. NC 327 Fairground Street c. 1960s

A one-story masonite residence facing north, with a low asphalt hip roof with a hip over a projecting room. Widely overhanging eaves and exposed rafter ends (sides), boxed on facade. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf panel door flanked by a pair of 1/1 double-hung aluminum windows. There is a small corner roof of the porch recessed under the projecting room supported with a turned post. All bays set in plain openings. Concrete block pier foundation.

75. NC 400 Fairground Street c. 1960

A one-story brick and plywood Ranch, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof. There are 5 bays: 2 6/6 double-hung aluminum windows, a center single leaf panel door, a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows with storms and a garage door. Overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Concrete slab foundation.

76. C 401 Fairground Street c. 1930

A one-story drop siding bungalow residence, facing north, with an asphalt hip roof with a hip over the center, almost full facade, porch supported with square wood box columns. widely overhanging eaves and exposed rafter ends. The porch is screened. There are four bays: two center single leaf glazed (4-light, 3 panel) doors flanked by 4/1 double-hung wood windows. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

77. NC 402 Fairground Street c. 1970

A one-story brick Ranch, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with a shed over a full façade porch supported by square wood posts. There are 3 bays: a 9/6 double-hung aluminum single leaf panel door, and a pair of 9/6 double-hung aluminum windows. There is a carport on the right end of the facade. Overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings.

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78. C 403 Fairground Street c. 1930

A one-story drop siding residence, facing north, with a metal gable roof with a shed over an addition along the right side. There is a gable over a porch centered on the front of the main block, supported with square wood posts with plain brackets. There are 3 bays: a single leaf panel door, a large fixed aluminum sash window, and a 2/2 double-hung aluminum window. The wall under the porch is beaded board. Widely overhanging eaves and exposed rafter ends. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

79. C 404 Fairground Street c. 1950

A one-story brick residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with overhanging boxed eaves. The entrance is on the left end of the façade and is recessed with the recess supported with a wrought iron column. There are 4 bays: a single leaf glazed door (2 vertical lights), a large multi-light casement window and fixed sash window and 2 6-light casement windows. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

80. C 405 Fairground Street c. 1930

A one-story clapboard bungalow residence, facing north, with an asphalt hip roof with widely overhanging eaves and exposed rafter ends. The roof extends to the front over a center porch supported by wood posts. There are 2 center single leaf panel doors with screen doors flanked by 4/1 double-hung wood windows. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

81. C 406 Fairground Street c. 1930

A one-story drop siding bungalow residence, facing south, with an asphalt hip roof with a cross gable over a center porch supported by heavy square wood tapered columns on tall brick piers, lattice panels act as the balustrade. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf panel door with a storm door flanked by pairs of 6/6 double-hung aluminum windows. There is a horizontal rectangular wood vent in the gable end. There is an asphalt shed over a carport on the left end of the house, supported with square wood posts. Widely overhanging eaves and exposed rafter ends. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

82. C 408 Fairground Street c. 1955

A one-story masonite and brick (wainscoting) residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with widely overhanging boxed eaves. There are 4 bays: a large set of louvered aluminum windows, a single leaf glazed (3 small lights in top) door, and 2 2/2 double-hung

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aluminum windows. There is a shed over a carport on the right end supported with metal poles. Concrete foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

83. C 409 Fairground Street c. 1930

A one-story asbestos shingle bungalow residence, facing north, with an asbestos shingle hip roof with a cross gable on the right façade filled with a wooden vent in the peak. There is a gabled portico supported with wood posts. There is a corner porch on the right recessed under the main roof supported with tall square wood tapered columns. The porch is screened. There are 3 bays: a pair of 4/1 double-hung wood windows and the other two are under the porch and cannot be seen because of the screen. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings. Close boxed eaves.

84. NC 410 Fairground Street c. 1960

A one-story vertical plywood siding garage, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf panel door and 2 garage doors. Narrow open eaves. Concrete foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

85. C 411 Fairground Street c. 1945

A one-story brick Minimal Traditional residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with a hip over a room on the left end and a gable over a room behind it. There is a gable over a small center porch supported with turned posts and finished with a lattice balustrade. There are 4 bays: a pair of louvered aluminum windows in the hipped section, a 6/6 double-hung aluminum window, a single leaf paneled door and a 6/6 double-hung aluminum window. Brick pier foundation. Slightly boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings.

86. C 412 Fairground Street c. 1950

A one-story vinyl sided residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with a gable over an addition on the left. There is a gabled portico supported with square wood posts. There are 4 bays: a 6/6 double-hung wood window in the addition, a single leaf glazed (3 stepped lights) door centered in the main block flanked by 12/12 double-hung wood windows. Brick pier foundation. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings.

87. C 413 Fairground Street c. 1950

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A one-story clapboard residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with widely overhanging eaves and exposed rafter ends. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf glazed (1-light, 2 panel non-historic) door flanked by 6/6 double-hung wood windows. The roof extends over the entrance slightly - no supports. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

88. NC 414 Fairground Street c. 1955

A one-story vertical plywood sided residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof. The carport is recessed under the main roof on the right and is supported with a metal post and a wood post and a decorative pierced wood wall. The porch initially extended across the front to the carport but has been enclosed on the left with vertical plywood siding and a 4/4 double-hung aluminum window. The rest of the porch is supported with decorative wrought columns. There are two bays under the porch: a single leaf glazed door (flush with a small rectangular light in top) and a set of 3 6/6 double-hung aluminum windows. There are two bays under the carport: two single-leaf glazed (flush with 6-light in upper section) doors with storms. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings.

89. C 415 Fairground Street c. 1935

A one-story vinyl sided bungalow residence, facing north with an asphalt gable roof with a front gable over a porch on the right facade supported with square wood posts with plain trim at the top and base. An aluminum shed roof supported by square wood posts runs from the edge of the porch to over the driveway in front of the shed over the carport supported with square wood posts on a three foot brick wall. There are 3 bays: a pair of 1/1 double-hung aluminum windows, a single leaf panel door, and a 1/1 double-hung aluminum window. The vent in the gable end of the main block is covered with vinyl. Overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

90. C 416 Fairground Street c. 1935

A one-story clapboard bungalow residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with a gable over a porch on the right facade supported with square brick columns. There are widely overhanging eaves and exposed rafter ends. There is a brick end chimney on the left side. There is a rectangular wood vent in the gable end of the main block. There are three bays: a 3-part wood window (4/4 double-hung, 16 light fixed, 4/4 double-hung), and a single leaf glazed (3-lights, 3 panels) door and a pair of 3/1 double-hung wood windows. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

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91. C 417 Fairground Street c. 1930

A one-story asbestos sided bungalow residence, facing north, with an asphalt pyramidal roof with widely overhanging eaves and exposed rafter ends. The full facade porch is supported with decorative wrought iron columns on tall brick piers (with plain concrete caps). There is a shed roof supported with square wood posts on the left side. There are 3 bays: an off-center single leaf panel door flanked by 1/1 double-hung aluminum windows. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

92. C 418 Fairground Street c. 1930

A one-story vinyl sided residence facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with a gable over a room on the front left. There are 2 bays in this projection: a set of four 4/1 double-hung wood windows with storms and a single leaf glazed (4 lights and 3 panels) door set in an arched opening with a fan light. There is a pair of 4/1 double-hung wood windows in the main block. There is a gabled portico supported with wood posts on the right side of the building. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings. There is a gabled garage with a hipped roof on the front that extends across and back on the right side to cover an addition which has a 1/1 double-hung aluminum window. Widely overhanging eaves and exposed rafter ends.

93. C 103 Galloway Drive c. 1950

A one-story vinyl-sided Minimal Traditional residential building, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof pierced by a brick interior chimney. The entrance is recessed under the main roof and this roof is supported with a wrought iron post. A gable roof extends over the carport on the left and is supported by square wood columns. There are 5 bays: a short 3-part (6/6, 8/8, 6/6 double-hung) wood window; a floor-length 3-part window filled with 4/6 double-hung, multi-light fixed, 4/6 double-hung; a single leaf French door; and 8/8 double-hung window and a 6/6 double-hung window. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

94. C 104 Galloway Drive c. 1930

A one-story drop siding Colonial Revival residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a corner porch, supported with square wood posts and completed with a plain balustrade. A gabled section projects at the rear on the right side and is entered through a single leaf panel door. There are two other bays on the facade: 2 sets of paired 6/6

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double-hung wood windows. The main entrance is into the side off of the porch is a single leaf glazed (2 small lights, flush) door. A gabled garage is set on the left at the rear and is joined to the main house by a hyphen filled with a 6/6 double-hung wood window. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

95. NC 105 Galloway Drive c. 1960

A one-story brick Ranch residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof and a cross gable over a projecting room on the right. A small porch is recessed under the main roof to the left of the cross gable and is supported with square wood posts. There are 6 bays: 3 8/12 double-hung wood windows; a single leaf paneled door; a 3-part window (4/6, multi-light fixed, 4/6); and 8/12 double-hung wood windows. Moderately overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

96. C 106 Galloway Drive c. 1950

A one-story asbestos shingle Colonial Revival residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a center porch that is supported with decorative wrought iron posts. There are cornice returns and a rectangular vent in the stuccoed gable end. There is a brick interior chimney. A gable extends over a carport on the left that includes a room on the end. The carport has a 6/6 double-hung wood window and a single leaf glazed (6 light, one panel) door. There are 3 bays in the main block: a center single leaf paneled door flanked by 6/6 double-hung wood window with shutters. No eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

97. C 108 Galloway Drive c. 1950

A one-story asbestos covered residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a projecting 3-sided bay. A slight shed projects at the center from the gable to cover a small porch supported with decorative wrought columns and a metal balustrade. There are 6 bays: a multi-light octagonal window (fixed); a single leaf glazed (3 lights, 3 panels) door; a pair of 2/2 aluminum (horizontal lights) double-hung windows and 3 of the same window in the gabled bay. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

98. C 200 Galloway Drive c. 1950

A one-story brick (main block) and masonite Ranch residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof. There is a cross gable over a masonite projecting room. The main roof

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projects slightly over the entrance. There are 4 bays: a casement window, a single leaf panel door with a fixed sash beside it; and 2 fixed sash, multi-light windows. Moderately overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

99. C 201 Galloway Drive c. 1950

A large one-story painted brick residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with a wing on each side toward the rear. There is an exterior brick chimney on the main block. The center section of the main roof is raised slightly at the front and covers a porch which is supported by decorative wrought iron columns and brackets. There are 6 bays in the main block: a 4-light round fixed sash window; a 12/12 double-hung wood window, a single-leaf glazed (a square with 4 lights in the top) door, two 12/12 double-hung wood windows, and a 4-light fixed round wood window. The wing on the left has a gable-on-hip roof and four bays: 2 8/8 double-hung windows; a multi-light fixed window; and an 8/8 double-hung window. The wing on the right is covered with a gable roof and is a carport. Moderately overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

100. C 202 Galloway Drive c. 1950

A one-story (random range ashlar) Minimal Traditional residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof. An asphalt gable intersects the roof over the first bay. The gable end is stuccoed and has an arched wooden vent. There are also slight cornice returns. A small offset gable is set above the entrance and a flat roof supported by decorative wrought iron posts acts as a portico. There are 4 bays: a 6/6 double-hung vinyl window; a single leaf paneled door; a 3-part window with 4/4, 6/6, 4/4 double-hung vinyl sash; and a 6/6 double-hung vinyl window. The windows all have plain stuccoed headers. No eaves. Brick pier foundation.

101. C 204 Galloway Drive c. 1950

A one-story brick and vinyl (in the gable end) Minimal Traditional residence, facing south, with a fiberglass shingle gable roof with a projecting offset gable on the left covering the first bay and the recessed entry. The recess is arched on the front and side. There is a 3-sided bay with a hip roof on the east elevation with 6/6 vinyl double-hung sash. There are 3 bays on the front elevation: a pair of 6/6 double-hung vinyl windows; a single leaf panel arched door set in an arched opening and a 3-part window with 4/4, 6/6, 5/5 double-hung vinyl windows. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

102. C 206 Galloway Drive c. 1950

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A one-story brick Minimal Traditional residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof and a projecting cross gable. There is an exterior brick chimney to the right of the projection which is enhanced with an arched recess. The porch on the right end has been infilled with a new sash. There are 5 bays: a 6/6 double-hung wood window; a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows; a single leaf panel door, a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows, and the new window. Moderately overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

103. C 208 Galloway Drive c. 1950

A one-story brick Minimal Traditional residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with a brick end chimney. There is a central projecting gable with asbestos shingled and a round vent in the gable end. There are 4 bays: a 15/15 floor length wood window; a single leaf glazed (3 small arched lights across top and 6 panels) door with a surrounds consisting of fluted pilasters supporting an entablature; a 3-part window with 4/4, 8/8, 4/4 double-hung wood windows; and an 8/8 double-hung wood window. Moderately overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings except door.

104. C 209 Galloway Drive c. 1950

A one-story brick Minimal Traditional residence; facing north, with an asphalt gable roof pierced by a brick interior chimney. A cross gable projects from the center to cover a porch which is supported by wooden Doric columns. An arched vent is found in the gable end. The center entrance is filled with double leaf panel doors with side lights. Flanking the porch are small, narrow multi-light fixed sash windows. On either end of the facade is a large square of different patterned brick than is found in the rest of the house. In the middle of each square is a large multi-light casement window. Overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation.

105. NC 210 Galloway Drive c. 1960

A one-story brick and clapboard (gable end and addition on left end) Ranch residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof and a gable over the addition which has a four part vertical fixed sash. There are 5 bays: a 8/8 double-hung wood window; a 3-part window with 4/4, 10/10, 4/4 double-hung wood windows; a single leaf panel door with sidelights; a smaller 6/6 double-hung wood window; and an 8/8 double-hung wood window. Moderately overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

106. NC 211 Galloway Drive c. 1970s

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A one and a half story brick and vinyl residence, facing north, with a tall asphalt gable pierced by 3 gabled dormers with 6/6 double-hung sash and vinyl siding. A shed roof extends over the porch that covers the end 3 bays and is supported by turned posts and enhanced with a plain balustrade. The wall under the porch is horizontal vinyl siding. There are 4 bays: a pair of 9/9 double-hung vinyl windows; and a single leaf glazed (large oval light) door flanked by 9/9 double-hung windows. A gabled hyphen connects the main house to a gabled brick garage with the gable end to the street. There are 2 shuttered bays. Widely overhanging eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

107. NC 212 Galloway Drive c. 1970

A one-story brick and vinyl residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof. The first bay is 6/6 double-hung vinyl window flanked with the front wall but breaks through the roof and is capped with its own gable roof. The second bay is a 3-sided projection with 4/4 vinyl double-hung window, multi-light fixed, and 4/4 double-hung vinyl window. The entrance is a single leaf glazed (6 lights, 3 panels) door. The other 2 bays are 12/12 and 6/6 double-hung vinyl windows. Overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

108. C 213 Galloway Drive c. 1950

A two-story yellow brick Colonial Revival residence, facing north, with an asphalt hip roof and two exterior corbelled brick chimneys. There is a cross gable over the entrance bay with a 9-light round window and modillions in the gable end. A one-story semi-circular portico with a flat roof supported with slender Doric columns covers the entrance which is a single-leaf paneled door with a fan light and shutters. The portico is flanked by small 4/4 double-hung wood windows. The first bay on the first floor is an 8/8 double-hung wood window. There are three bays on the second floor: 3 6/6 double-hung windows. The hipped sections of the building are not in line with the gabled block, but are canted with the end to the street. The east side elevation has a large multi-light fixed sash on the first floor and a set of three 6/6 double-hung windows in the second floor. The west elevation has the same bay on the second floor and the first floor has a hipped bay window filled with 4/4, 8/8, 4/4 double-hung windows. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

109. NC 215 Galloway Drive c. 1980

A one and a half story brick and vinyl residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof pierce by 3 gabled dormers with 6/6 double-hung aluminum windows. The full width front porch is recessed under the main roof and is supported by square wood columns which are

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connected by a plain balustrade. There are 5 bays: a center single-leaf panel door flanked by two 9/9 double-hung aluminum windows. A gabled breezeway connects the house to a gabled garage on the west side. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

110. NC 109 Goodman Street c. 1920

A one-story clapboard residence, facing east, with an asphalt hip roof with widely overhanging boxed eaves. There is a hip roof to the front and left of the façade over a room (left half) and porch (right half). The porch is supported with square wood posts connected with a plain balustrade. There are three (3) bays: a pair of 2/2 double-hung aluminum windows, a center single leaf glazed (a narrow vertical light), and a 3/1 double-hung wood window. The wrap-around porch was enclosed. All bays set in plain openings. Brick foundation.

111. C 110 Goodman Street c. 1900

A one-story clapboard L-front residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with cornice returns. There is a cross gable to the front over a projecting room. There are two (2) bays in this projection: 2 1/1 double-hung wood windows. There is a porch tucked into the "h" with a hip roof supported with square wood tapered columns on brick piers. There are 3 bays under the porch: a single leaf glazed (1/2 top) door with a transom and 2 1/1 double-hung wood windows. Closed boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings.

112. C 204 Goodman Street c. 1920

A one-story asbestos shingle Craftsman residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. The full facade porch is recessed under the main roof and is supported with square wood columns on stuccoed piers. A plain wood balustrade completes the porch. There are 3 bays: a 4/1 double-hung wood window, an off-center single leaf glazed (French) door, and a 4/1 double-hung wood window. All bays set in plain openings. Brick foundation.

113. C 205 Goodman Street c. 1940

A one-story asbestos shingle Minimal Traditional residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof pierced by 2 gabled dormers with 6/6 double-hung wood windows. There is a cross gable over a projecting room with a 3-sided bay window in front of the gable with a hipped roof and 4/4, 8/8, 4/4 double-hung wood windows with storms. There are 3 other bays: a center

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recessed single leaf panel door with sidelights, and 2 8/8 double-hung wood windows with storms. There is a brick end chimney and a small porch with a shed roof supported with turned posts on the left side behind the chimney. Close boxed eaves. Brick foundation. All bays set in plain openings. There is a 2-car garage with a gable roof, clapboard walls, and a 6/6 double-hung wood window in the gable end on the left toward the rear lot.

114. NC 110 North Huntington Street c. 1990

A one-story brick and metal commercial building, facing west, with a metal mansard awning across the front which extends to cover the entrance and is supported with round columns on brick piers. Bays are plate glass windows and plate glass doors. All bays set in plain openings. Concrete slab foundation.

115. NC 207 North Huntington Street c. 1980

A one-story brick and vinyl (under the porch) commercial building, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof. There is a metal hip over the porch which is supported with Doric columns. There are 8 bays: 6/6 double-hung wood window, single leaf panel door, 2 6/6 double-hung windows, 6/6 double-hung over panel window, single leaf panel door with side lights and leaded fanlight, a 6/6 double-hung window over panel, and a 6/6 double-hung window. Close boxed eaves. Concrete slab foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

116. C 209 North Huntington Street c. 1895

A one-story clapboard residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof. There is a center gabled porch supported by paired Doric columns and pilasters. There is a fanlight in the gable end. Sanborn Insurance maps show portico (1897, 1907) and later reveal a full-façade porch (1914-1949). There are 3 bays: a center single leaf panel door with transom and sidelights flanked by 1/1 double-hung windows (with aluminum storms) over panels flanked by shutters. There is a marble block (step) in front of the house with "WINTERS" carved in it. There are several additions to the rear of the building. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

117. C 210 North Huntington Street c. 1951

First Baptist Church. A two-story brick church, facing west, with an asphalt front gable roof. The center section of the façade is filled with a large concave sandstone arch which has a round stained glass window in the top section and one bay on the ground level filled with center double-leaf paneled doors flanked by single paneled doors. The side elevations are enhanced

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with brick buttresses and stained glass windows set in arched openings along the entire elevation. Three triangular dormers filled with vents pierce the roof on the sides.

118. PL 300 North Huntington Street c. 1913

Storer House. A two-story brick Craftsman residence, facing west, with an asbestos hip roof with a cross gable over an "L." There is a hipped dormer in the hip roof that is filled with a pair of diamond paned fixed sash windows. There is an interior brick chimney. There is a diamond paned fixed window in the gable end. Modillions enhance the widely overhanging eaves. There is a one-story porch with a flat roof supported with square brick columns and enhanced with a wood balustrade with heavy newels on the roof. There are 5 bays: 2 6/1 double-hung wood windows, a single leaf half glazed door with transom, and two 6/1 double-hung wood windows. The windows on the first floor have window heads. Brick pier foundation.

119. C 301 North Huntington Street c. 1848, 1905

Jason Niles House. A one-story narrow clapboard residence, facing east, with a wood shake gable roof with a cross gable to the front with cornice returns. There is a stone faced exterior chimney on the front facade. There is a gable portico supported with fluted square columns. The left corner is canted and has a 3/1 double-hung wood window. There are 3 other bays: a shuttered floor length bay, a single leaf panel door and a set of 3 floor length windows filled with 8 lights fixed, 4/4 double-hung wood window, 8 lights fixed. Moderately overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings except door. This house was built in 1848 at 200 East Washington Street and was moved to its current location in 1905 and was renovated over the years. The 1925 Sanborn Insurance maps show a full-façade porch and shows it removed by 1932.

120. C 303 North Huntington Street c. 1945

A one-story vinyl sided residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof and an interior ridge painted brick chimney. There is a gabled addition that extends from the left to the front and is filled with French doors set in an arched opening (appears as a porch on the 1949 Sanborn Insurance map). There are 2 other bays: a single leaf panel door and a 6/6 double-hung wood windows with shutters. All bays set in plain openings. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation.

121. PL 305 North Huntington Street c. 1895

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Judge Henry C. Niles House. A two-and-one-half story, frame Queen Anne residence, facing east, with a cross gable roof and a polygonal tower rising from the second story on the southeast corner. The three-bay main façade has a projecting gabled bay on the northern end. The central bay of the lower level of the main façade features double-leaf doors having decorative Eastlake molding and glazed panels, and the doors are crowned by a single-light transom. To each side of the main entrance are paired one-over-one, double-hung windows. Extending the full width of the main façade and wrapping around both side elevations is a one-story porch with fluted Ionic columns and balustrade with turned balusters. The central single-leaf entrance of the second story of the main façade opens onto a one-bay porch with turned posts, arched spandrels with drop pendants, and a balustrade with turned balusters. The projecting gable of the main façade has cornice returns and is clad in imbricating shingles, and enhanced with bargeboard in a stylized leaf pattern and a spindlework sunburst ornament at the apex of the gable.

122. C 306 North Huntington Street c. 1900

A one-story clapboard residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof. There is a cross gable over a portico supported with square wood columns and pilasters. There are 5 bays: a center single leaf panel door with transom and a tall entablature above it and shutters flanking it, 4 9/9 double-hung vinyl windows with operable shutters. There is an interior chimney in the rear slope. A gabled wing extends from the rear on the left side and has a shed dormer. The 1925, 1932, and 1949 Sanborn Insurance map shows a full-façade porch, the 1914 Sanborn does not include this area. Narrow boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation.

123. NC 308 North Huntington Street c. 1920

A one-story clapboard Colonial Revival residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with exterior brick chimneys on each end. There is an addition on the right covered with a shed roof. The front half of this is a porch with the roof supported with a Doric column. There is a gabled portico supported by Doric columns. Above this portico is a small gable. There are 5 bays: a center single leaf glazed door with leaded sidelights and 4 double-hung aluminum windows. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings. Changes include the removal of a full-façade porch and the addition of vinyl siding and replacement windows.

124. C 309 North Huntington Street c. 1920

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A one-story clapboard residence, facing east, with an asphalt hip roof with a hip over a porch that covers the first 3 bays. The porch is supported with brick columns and a low brick wall acts as a balustrade. There is a small hipped addition on the left side with a pair of French doors. There are 5 bays: a pair of 9/1 double-hung wood windows, a single leaf French door, and 3 9/1 double-hung wood windows. Sanborn Insurance maps show a wrap-around porch as late as 1949. Moderately overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

125. C 310 North Huntington Street c. 1890

A two-story clapboard Queen Anne residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof and a cross gable over a 3-sided "L." There is a fretwork in the peak of the gable end. The wrap-around porch is covered with a hip roof supported with square paneled wood columns connected by a plain wood balustrade with paneled newel posts. There are 6 bays: a 1/1 double-hung wood windows, single leaf glazed door with transom, a 1/1 double-hung wood window, 3 1/1 double-hung wood windows in the 3 sided "L." Closed boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

126. C 400 North Huntington Street c. 1880

W. J. Hammond House. A one-story clapboard residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a center porch supported with square wood columns with molded bases and capitals. There are pilasters on the front corners of the building. The cornice is adorned with paired brackets. There are interior brick chimneys on either end. There are 5 bays: center double leaf paneled door with sidelights and transom (7 lights); and 4 1/1 double-hung wood windows flanked with shutters. Widely overhanging eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

127. PL 401 North Huntington Street c. 1850. 1936

Niles House. A one-story drop siding (front) and clapboard (sides and rear) Greek Revival residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with 2 stuccoed end chimneys. The full-width front porch is recessed under the main roof and is supported with wood Doric columns. There is a porte cochere on the left side with a gable roof supported with square wood columns. There are 6 bays: 2 center single leaf panel doors with transom (3-light) and 4 9/9

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aluminum double-hung windows. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

128. C 403 North Huntington Street c. 1940

A one-story clapboard Minimal Traditional residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable to the front. There is a flat roof over an addition on the left side. It has 4 2/2 double-hung windows. There are 3 bays in the main block: a 3-part window with 6/6, 8/8, 6/6 double-hung wood windows; a single leaf glazed door (3 stepped lights) with fluted pilasters and a 8/8 double-hung wood window. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings. There is a gabled clapboard garage.

129. NC 404 North Huntington Street c. 1980

A two-story brick apartment building, facing west, with an asphalt mansard roof. There are 8 6/6 aluminum windows with shutters.

130. C 405 North Huntington Street c. 1935

A one-story drop siding residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof that arches over the entrance. There is a gable over a carport on the left side supported with square wood posts. There are 4 bays: a pair of 3/1 double-hung wood windows in what was originally (1949 Sanborn Map) a corner porch; a 3-part window filled with 3 3/1 double-hung wood windows; a single leaf glazed door with fluted and denticulated surround; and another 3-part with 3 3/1 double-hung wood windows. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

131. C 409 North Huntington Street c. 1940

A one-story vinyl-over-clapboard residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable-on-hip roof. There is a cross gable to the front and an arched window hood supported with brackets, over the entrance. There are 4 bays: a 3-sided bay window with 3 6/6 vinyl windows, a 9/9 double-hung window, new single leaf glazed (1-light full) door and a 9/9 double-hung window. There is a gabled open garage on the left side. Overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

132. C 411 North Huntington Street c. 1930

A one-story narrow clapboard bungalow residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends and large Craftsman brackets. There are

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lattice vents in the peaks of the gable ends. There is a stucco ridge chimney. Brick wainscoting has been added to the building. The porch is set to the right side of the facade and is covered with a gable roof supported with decorative wrought iron columns and connected with a metal balustrade. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings. There is a gabled carport with wood posts.

133. PL 500 North Huntington Street c. 1866

John Copeland Lucas House. A two-story clapboard Greek Revival residence, facing west, with an hip roof. The full-façade double-tier gallery is recessed under the main roof, supported with six monumental square modified Tuscan columns. The center entrance is a single-leaf double vertical panel door topped by a three-light transom and sidelights. It is flanked by two 9/9 double-hung wood windows.

134. NC 505 North Huntington Street c. 1910

A one-story vinyl and brick (wainscoting) residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof. There is a gabled portico supported with metal columns. There are 3 bays: a pair of 6/6 double-hung aluminum windows, a single leaf French door, and a pair of 6/6 double-hung aluminum windows. There is a shed to the left side over a carport supported with metal poles. Originally (1925, 1949 Sanborn Map) there was a full façade porch) Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

135. C 506 North Huntington Street c. 1890

A two-story vinyl-sided Queen Anne (Free Classic) residence, facing west, with an asphalt hip roof with a cross gable over a 3-sided projecting room. There are 2 interior brick chimneys in the rear slope. There are 3 1/1 double-hung wood windows in the projection. Under the porch are a single leaf glazed (1/2) door with transom and 2 1/1 double-hung wood windows. The one-story wrap-around porch is covered with a hip roof supported with wood Ionic columns. There is an addition on the right end over the porch covered with a shed roof. There is a single light fixed sash in this addition. There are 6 1/1 double-hung windows on the second floor. A shed roof, lattice sided carport is on the left side. All bays set in plain openings. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation.

136. C 101 South Huntington Street c. 1930

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A one-story stucco gas station, facing east, with a flat roof. There is a flat roof over the pumps supported with metal poles. There are 2 garage door bays, a single leaf plate glass door with transom and plate glass windows.

137. C 105 South Huntington Street c. 1930

A one-story vinyl and brick (around entrance) residence, facing east, with a metal gable roof. There is a metal gable over a porte cochere on the left end and a flat roof over one on the right end. Both are supported with metal posts. There is a cross gable over the entrance set within the main roof. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf glazed door (6-light, 3 panel) brick arched opening flanked by a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows with shutters. The brick around the door is capped with a narrow gable roof. Moderately overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

138. C 107 South Huntington Street c. 1935

A one-story clapboard residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof which extends in the center over the entrance, supported with square wood posts. There are three bays: a center single-leaf panel door flanked by pairs of 3/1 double-hung wood windows. Brick pier foundation.

139. C 109 South Huntington Street c. 1930

A one-story narrow clapboard Tudor residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable to the front set within the main roof. The right side of this gable eave curves gently to the edge of the exterior brick chimney. On the other side of the chimney is a gable set within the main roof over the entrance. There is a corner carport recessed under the main roof set in an arched stuccoed opening. There is a single leaf French door on the back wall of the carport. A small hipped room with a single leaf French door projects from the left side at the rear. The chimney is tapered at the top and is patterned with different colors of brick and topped with chimney posts. There are 3 bays in the main block: a pair of 6/1 double-hung wood windows, a set of 3 diamond multi-light over diamond multi-light double-hung wood windows and a single leaf panel door with fanlight set in an arched opening. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

140. NC 201 South Huntington Street c. 1980

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A modern two-story brick library building, facing east, with a flat roof. The brick walls angle out at various points around the bays which are plate glass windows and double-leaf plate glass doors. Concrete slab foundation.

141. NC 206 South Huntington Street c. 1980

A modern one-story brick office building, facing west, with a flat roof. There are four bays: center double-leaf plate glass doors flanked by plate glass windows. Concrete slab foundation.

142. C 302 South Huntington Street c. 1930

A one-story brick Tudor residence, facing west, with an asbestos gable roof with a cross gable to the front set into the main roof. There is a pair of 9-light wood fixed sash windows in the gable end. There is a gabled projection over the entry. To the right of the entrance is a corner porch recessed under the main roof supported with square brick columns connected with a decorative metal balustrade. There are 2 interior brick ridge chimneys. There are 2 gabled dormers filled with paired 9-light wood fixed sash windows. There is half-timbering in the gable ends of the main block. There are 3 bays: 4 multi-light wood windows, a set of 3 double-hung wood windows (9/9, 12/12, 9/9) and a single leaf arched French door in an arched opening. Brick pier foundation. Close boxed eaves.

143. C 305 South Huntington Street c. 1935

A one-story brick Tudor residence, facing east, with a fiberglass shingle gable roof. There is a patterned brick exterior chimney on the facade that appears to be set up against a small gable in the main roof. There is a gable over the entrance supported with brick walls. There is a corner porch recessed under the main roof on the left supported with square brick columns. There is a single leaf glazed (4-light, 3 panel) door on the brick wall of the porch. There are 3 bays in the main facade; a single leaf arched French door with an arched opening; and 2 4/1 wood double-hung windows. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation.

144. NC 307 South Huntington Street c. 1980

A one-story brick and masonite Ranch residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with a small cross gable to the front on the left end. A shed roof covers the porch supported with round columns. There are 4 bays: 2 pair of 6/6 double-hung aluminum windows; a single leaf glazed (oval light) door, a pair of 8/8 double-hung aluminum windows. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. Concrete slab foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

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145. C 309 South Huntington Street c. 1910

A one-story narrow clapboard and flush board L-front residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over an "L" that has fishscale shingles and an aluminum window in the gable end. There are 3 bays: a set of 3 double-hung aluminum windows; a single leaf panel door with transom, and a pair of double-hung aluminum windows. The porch to the right of the projecting section is covered with a shed roof supported with square wood columns. Overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

146. NC 314 South Huntington Street c. 1990s

A one-story brick and metal commercial building, with a metal gable roof. There are 5 bays: 2 series of louvered windows, 2 single leaf glazed (flush with round light) door with transom and a 2/2 sliding window. No eaves. Concrete slab foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

147. C 316 South Huntington Street c. 1940

A one-story asbestos Minimal Traditional residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable to the front over a slightly projecting room. There are 5 bays: a 1/1 double-hung wood windows, a pair of 1/1 double-hung wood windows, a single leaf glazed door with a surround of pilasters and a pediment; a pair of 1/1 double-hung wood windows, and a 1/1 double-hung wood. Brick pier foundation. No eaves. All bays set in plain openings except door.

148. C 118 South Huntington Street c. 1940

A one-story asbestos Minimal Traditional residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable to the front over a slight projection. There is an addition on the right with a gable roof. There are 5 bays: a pair of 9/9 wood double-hung windows, a single leaf glazed door with pilasters and a broken pediment; a 8/8 double-hung wood window projecting slightly with a shed roof, and 2 6/6 double-hung wood windows. No eaves. All bays set in plain openings except door. Brick pier foundation.

149. C 320 South Huntington Street c. 1935

A two-story asbestos residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with exposed rafter ends. There are 3 bays on the first floor: a center entrance filled with a single leaf glazed

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door flanked by 2 pair of 3/1 double-hung wood windows. There are 2 pair of 3/1 double-hung wood windows on the second floor. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

150. NC 322 South Huntington Street c. 1940

A one-story asbestos sided residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof. There is a shed awning over the entrance. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf glazed door (3-light, 3 panel) and 2 non-historic 1/1 sliding aluminum windows set in blocked down openings. There are exposed rafter ends. Widely overhanging eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

151. C 100 North Jackson Street c. 1920

A one-story brick traditional commercial building, facing west, with a flat roof behind a flat parapet. The storefront is filled with a recessed center single leaf plate glass door with a fixed plate glass sidelight and transom flanked by plate glass windows over glass tiles. There is a transom panel.

152. C 102 North Jackson Street c. 1900

A one-story brick traditional commercial building, facing west, with a flat roof behind a plain parapet. The storefront is filled with a recessed single leaf plate glass door with a sidelight and plate glass window over a metal bulkhead. The transom panel is boarded over. There is a canvas awning stretched across the front storefront set in aluminum.

153. C 104 North Jackson Street c. 1880

A one-story painted brick traditional commercial building, facing west, with a flat roof behind an elaborately corbelled parapet. The center single-leaf glazed (3/4) door with transom is flanked by plate glass windows with transom over paneled wood bulkhead. The bays are divided by cast pilasters. There is a canvas awning across the façade.

154. C 108 North Jackson Street c. 1950s

A one-story brick traditional commercial building, facing west, with a flat roof. The aluminum storefront has center double-leaf plate glass doors flanked by plate glass windows. There is a canvas awning across the façade.

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155. C 110 North Jackson Street c. 1900

A one-story painted brick traditional commercial building, facing west, with a flat roof with a low straight parapet ending in a raised block on either end. A cloth awning covers the storefront. The storefront consists of 2 large plate glass windows, a single leaf plate glass door and 2 large plate glass windows all over a brick bulkhead. There is no transom panel.

156. C 112 North Jackson Street c. 1890

A one-story painted brick traditional commercial building, facing west, with a flat roof with a high corbelled brick in geometric pilasters parapet. The transom panel across the storefront is covered over. The storefront has been altered and now has dark plate glass windows, a single leaf plate glass door with a fixed light inside it. The bulkhead is made of narrow bricks. There is a cloth awning stretching across the facade.

157. C 114 North Jackson Street c. 1880

A one-story painted brick traditional commercial building, facing west, with a flat roof and a tall parapet faced with decorative pressed metal cornice. A suspended metal awning stretches across the facade. The storefront is comprised of center, double leaf wood glazed doors flanked single light plate glass windows over paneled wood bulkhead. Four cast iron pilasters divide the windows from the doors. There is a single light transom over each bay.

158. NC 116 North Jackson Street c. 1900

A one-story brick traditional commercial building, facing west, with a flat roof behind a corbelled decorative brick parapet. The rest of the facade has been completely changed. There is new brick, new multi-light aluminum windows, and a recessed center entrance with 2 single leaf glazed (9 lights, one panel) doors with sidelights and transom into each side of the recess. A non-historic mansard roof runs above the storefront.

159. C 118 North Jackson Street c. 1900

A one-story painted brick traditional commercial building, facing west, with a flat roof and a flat parapet. A suspended metal awning stretches across the facade. The storefront is filled with a recessed center single leaf plate glass door with a fixed plate glass sidelight and transom flanked by plate glass windows over glass tiles. There is a transom panel.

160. C 118 (same address as 159) North Jackson Street c. 1900

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A one-story painted brick traditional commercial building, facing west, with a flat roof with a flat parapet. There is a metal suspended awning across the facade. The storefront steps back as it recesses to a single leaf plate glass door. The storefront display windows are set over glass tiles and the floor in the recess is terrazzo. The transom panel is boarded over.

161. NC 124 North Jackson Street c. 1880, 1970s

A two-story stucco commercial building, facing west, with a flat roof. The facade and north side are accented with vertical panels of wood shakes. The only bay is a set of double leaf plate glass doors. The façade is completely altered.

162. NC 201 North Jackson Street c. 1925

A shed covered one-story commercial building, facing east. The (non-historic) board and batten sided building has a single leaf panel entrance on the side and a recessed entry flanked by 1/1 double-hung aluminum windows on the front. The facade indents into the rear of 100 W. Washington, covering the brick with board and batten. A mansard wood shake awning extends across the facade.

163. NC 206 North Jackson Street c. 1970

A one-story brick commercial building, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof. There are 6 narrow vertical fixed sash windows. There is a center recess which houses a single leaf plate glass door into each side.

164. C 300 North Jackson Street c. 1890

A two-story clapboard (second floor) and drop siding (first floor) Queen Anne residence, facing west, with a standing seam metal hip roof. The full-width one-story porch is covered with a standing seam metal roof which is supported with Ionic columns connected with a spindled balustrade. A gabled center porch on the second story sits on the first floor porch roof. This gable is also supported with Ionic columns and spindled balustrade. In addition, the area from the porch floor to the first floor roof is covered with wood fishscale shingles. There are 5 bays on each floor: a center single leaf half glazed door with transom and vinyl 6/6 double-hung windows. The door on the second floor is single leaf panel with transom and sidelights. Gabled dormers with vents project from each side of the roof. There is a brick interior chimney. Moderately overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

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165. C 304 North Jackson Street c. 1890

A one-story clapboard residence, facing west with an asphalt gable roof (with cornice returns) with 2 end brick chimneys. The full-width front porch is covered with a shed roof supported with square wood posts and connected with a plain wood balustrade. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf French door with transom, flanked by 6/6 wood double-hung windows with shutters. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation. Close boxed eaves.

166. NC 307 North Jackson Street c. 1910

A one-story vinyl sided residence, facing east, with a metal hip roof. The porch has been enclosed with 6/1 double-hung vinyl windows and vinyl siding and an addition has been made on the right side. Many changes. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

167. NC 308 North Jackson Street c. 1980s

A one-story brick commercial building, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof. The center section is recessed and is supported with a round column. There are 3 bays: a single leaf panel door and 2 multi-light fixed windows over panels. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Concrete slab foundation.

168. C 309 North Jackson Street c. 1890

A one-story drop siding Queen Anne, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable to the front over a 3-sided projecting room. There is an interior brick chimney. There are fishscale shingles on the gable end and 3 2/2 double-hung wood windows in the projecting section. The porch is tucked into the "L" and is covered with a flat roof supported with square wood posts enhanced with a spindled frieze and balustrade and fan brackets. There are 3 bays in the main block: a multi-light fixed window a 2/2 double-hung wood windows, and single leaf half glazed door with transom. Widely overhanging eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

169. NC 312 North Jackson Street c. 1980s

A one-story modern brick commercial building, facing west, with a flat roof. There are corbelled brick quoins on the corners and corbelled brick dentils across the cornice. There is one bay: a single leaf flush door. Concrete slab foundation.

170. C 313 North Jackson Street c. 1950

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A one-story asbestos Minimal Traditional residence, facing east, with a series of asphalt gable roofs over stepped facade. The entrance is recessed and the recess is supported by a wood Doric column. There are 6 bays: a single leaf French door, a casement window with a 3-light transom, a large 3 part window (6/6, multi-light fixed, 6/6 double-hung wood), a single leaf paneled door with a small 4-light window, and 2 6/6 double-hung wood windows. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation. Close boxed eaves.

171. C 317 North Jackson Street c. 1880

A one-story flush siding (front) and clapboard (sides) residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof. The full facade porch is recessed under the main roof and is supported with square wood columns that appear to have been repaired and the design changed. There are 5 bays: a center single leaf half glazed door with applied ornamentation with side lights and a 4-light transom; flanked by 2 9/9 double-hung wood windows. No eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

172. PL 402 North Jackson Street c. 1886 Andrew Johnson, Builder

Col. Chap Anderson House. A one-story narrow clapboard vernacular Queen Anne residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof and cross gables over projecting rooms on each end of the facade. The gable ends are enhanced with cornice returns and bargeboard and fishscale shingles. The porch is between the projecting rooms and is covered with a shed roof supported with chamfered posts connected with a pierced balustrade, and arches between the posts and wood brackets. There are 5 bays: a pair of 4/4 double-hung wood windows; 2 4/4 double-hung wood windows, a single leaf half glazed door with transom and a pair of 4/4 double-hung wood windows. Moderately overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

173. C 403 North Jackson Street c. 1910

Jackson Place. A two-story clapboard residence, facing east, with an asphalt hip roof with widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. There is a one-story addition on the left side with a hip roof. There are 3 bays on the first floor: a single leaf glazed (1/2 etched glass) door recessed and flanked by a pair of 1/1 double-hung wood windows on the left and a 3-part 1/1 double-hung wood windows on the right. The recess is enhanced by fluted pilasters supporting a wide entablature. There are 3 bays on the second floor: a pair of 4/4 double-hung wood windows over a panel; a smaller 4/4 double-hung wood window and a pair of 4/4 double-hung wood windows. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

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174. C 405 North Jackson Street c. 1950

A one-story asbestos residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with widely overhanging boxed eaves. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf glazed (3 stepped lights) door flanked by 6/6 double-hung wood windows and a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows. From door to the right end is slightly recessed. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

175. C 406 North Jackson Street c. 1930

A one-story narrow clapboard bungalow residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends and plain Craftsman style brackets. There is a gable roof over a porch on the left side of the facade. The porch is supported with decorative wrought iron columns. There is a paired vent in each gable end. There is a painted brick exterior chimney. There is a cross gable over a room on the right side with exposed rafter ends. There are 4 bays: a pair of 4/1 double-hung wood windows; single leaf half glazed door, a pair of 4/1 double-hung wood windows and a 4/1 double-hung window. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

176. C 407 North Jackson Street c. 1950

A one-story asbestos residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with widely overhanging boxed eaves. The center entrance is slightly recessed. There are three bays: single leaf glazed (3 stepped lights) door flanked by a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

177. C 410 North Jackson Street c. 1895

A two-story clapboard Queen Anne (Free Classic) residence, facing west, with a pressed metal hip roof pierced with a painted brick interior chimney. There is a cross gable over a 5-sided two-story bay on the right side. There is a one-story wrap-around porch covered with a hip roof supported with Doric columns. The porch is screened. There are 5 visible bays and the screened porch: 4 1/1 double-hung wood windows and a single leaf glazed door with transom. There are 3 1/1 double-hung wood windows in the projecting bay. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

178. C 411A North Jackson Street c. 1945

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A one-story brick church, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof. There is a gabled portico supported with brick piers. There are three bays: a center entrance filled with double-leaf paneled doors flanked by a pair of 1/1 double-hung wood windows. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

179. NC 411 North Jackson Street c. 2006

A modern brick church building, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with a gable over an almost full facade center porch supported with tall Doric columns. The gable end is stuccoed. There are 3 bays under the porch: double leaf doors flanked by arched multi-light fixed windows. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. Concrete slab foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

180. C 413 North Jackson Street c. 1950

A one-story asbestos sided residence facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with cross gable over a slightly projecting room. This gable projects over to form a small porch over the entrance, supported with a square wood post on a brick pier. There are 3 bays: a 3-part window (4/4, 8/8, 4/4) double-hung wood windows, a center single leaf panel door and 6/6 double-hung wood windows. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings. Vent in peak of gable.

181. C 502 North Jackson Street c. 1900

A one-story clapboard residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable to the front. There is a 3-sided bay window with a hip roof under the gable end. There is an addition on the right side with a shed roof. There is a porch across the first 3 bays, covered with a shed roof supported with wood columns. There are 7 bays: 2 2/2 double-hung wood windows, a single leaf half glazed door, 3 2/2 double-hung wood windows in bay window, and a pair of 3/1 double-hung wood windows. Moderately overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

182. C 506 North Jackson Street c. 1920

A one-story brick and vinyl Craftsman residence, facing west, with an asphalt hip roof pierced with a gabled vent. There is a full-width front porch with a hip roof supported by decorative wrought iron columns. There is an end brick chimney. The eaves are widely overhanging with exposed rafter ends. There is a shed over a carport on the left side. There are 5 bays: a pair of 6/1 double-hung windows; a 6/1 double-hung windows; and a single leaf glazed

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door with storm door; a 6/1 double-hung window and a pair of 6/1 double-hung windows. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

183. NC 509 North Jackson Street c. 2005

A one-story brick fire station on a rusticated concrete block foundation with a metal hip roof and a hipped portico supported with fluted Doric columns on brick piers. There are five bays: double-leaf plate glass doors with sidelights and transom flanked by 2 1/1 double-hung aluminum windows. A hyphen with a flat roof with 3 1/1 double-hung aluminum windows connects to a three-bay (garage doors) garage with a metal hip roof.

184. C 113 South Jackson Street c. 1930

A one-story concrete block commercial building with brick (sandblasted) facade, facing west, with a flat roof. The storefront is filled with plate glass window, single leaf plate glass door, a boarded up single leaf door and a boarded up window. There is suspended metal awning across the facade.

185. C 115 South Jackson Street c. 1930

A one-story brick commercial building, facing west, with a flat roof with a shed asphalt covered awning across the front. The storefront is filled with a single leaf plate glass door and plate glass windows over brick bulkheads. All bays set in plain openings.

186. NC 133 South Jackson Street c. 1980

A one-story brick car wash, facing west, with a metal mansard roof.

187. C 136 South Jackson Street c. 1930

A one-story concrete block commercial building with brick facade, facing west, with a flat roof. The center area is recessed and contains 2 entrances (plate glass doors) at a slant. Beside the doors are plate glass windows over painted glass bulkheads. There is a suspended metal awning over the facade. All bays set in plain openings.

188. NC 141 South Jackson Street c. 1980

A one-story brick commercial building, facing east, with an asphalt hip roof with widely overhanging eaves. There are plate glass windows, double leaf plate glass doors and plate glass windows. All bays set in plain openings.

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189. NC 101 East Jefferson Street c. 1970s

A modern two-story brick commercial building, facing north, with a flat roof. The roof extends over a two-story "porch" which is supported by metal poles. The brick is corbelled on the corners to form quoins. The entablature is wide and plain. A hip roof covers a one-story drive through supported with metal poles on the left side. There are 4 bays: double leaf glazed doors (9-light and 2 panels) and 3 multi-light fixed sash. Close boxed eaves. Concrete slab foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

190. C 104 East Jefferson Street c. 1902

A one-story brick traditional commercial building, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof. The gable end is to the front and extends slightly over the facade and appears to be supported by square brick piers. The storefront is slanted to the right entrance which is a single leaf plate glass door with transom. The single leaf plate glass window is set over a brick bulkhead. Above the storefront is plain with an area in the center for a sign. All bays set in plain openings.

191. NC 120 East Jefferson Street c. 1910

A one-story brick and stucco traditional commercial building, facing south, with a gable roof behind a stepped parapet. It appears that the storefront has been in filled with stucco and then two new bays cut in. There are 2 bays: plate glass doors recessed and a pair of 1/1 double-hung windows. Behind it is a metal storage building with a metal gable roof.

192. C 127 East Jefferson Street c. 1935

A two-story brick traditional commercial building, facing north, with an arched parapet behind which is a metal gable roof. The storefront is filled with 2 single leaf glazed (3/4) doors, a plate glass window, a single leaf glazed (3/4) door, and a plate glass window. The bulkheads are brick. A canvas awning stretches across the facade. There are 6 6/6 double-hung vinyl windows on the second floor. All bays set in plain openings. There is a patterned brick design over the second floor windows and around each window.

193. C 129 East Jefferson Street c. 1930

A one-story brick traditional commercial building, facing north, with a flat roof behind a flat, concrete capped parapet. The building is divided into four storefronts. The brick has been painted in the storefront area, but has not above. The storefront is filled with plate glass windows over stuccoed brick bulkheads and single leaf plate glass doors. A canvas awning

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covers the first storefront and one long shed awning covers the other storefronts. Above the awnings, the brick is patterned into above each storefront.

194. NC 129A East Jefferson Street c. 1930

A one-story brick traditional commercial building, facing north, without a roof. The building has burned and the storefront is gone. The parapet is flat.

195. NC 131-135 East Jefferson Street c. 1980

A modern one-story brick commercial building, facing north, with a flat roof with a hipped shingled awning across the front. There are 9 bays: a large multi-light fixed sash; a single leaf French door, 2 multi-light fixed sash; double leaf French door, large multi-light fixed sash, a single leaf French door; and a large multi-light fixed sash.

196. C 134 East Jefferson Street c. 1910

A one-story painted brick traditional commercial building, facing south, with a flat roof. There is a center single leaf panel door flanked by 4 multi-light fixed sash. The transom panel extends across the storefront but is boarded up. Three canvas awnings protect the bays.

197. C 136 East Jefferson Street c. 1910

A one-story brick traditional commercial building, facing south, with a flat roof behind a flat parapet. There are two storefronts: the left is filled with center double-leaf glazed doors (1 light, 2 panel) flanked by plate glass windows over brick bulkheads. The right is filled with center plate glass double-leaf doors flanked by plate glass windows. There is a boarded-up transom panel across each storefront and a wood suspended awning stretches across the façade. All bays set in plain openings.

198. NC 201 East Jefferson Street c. 1910

A two-story brick commercial building, facing north, with a flat roof. The façade has been altered: there are 3 bays: a pair of fixed plate glass; double-leaf plate glass doors and a pair of fixed plate glass windows. All bays set in plain openings.

199. NC 205 East Jefferson Street c. 1990s

A one-story brick commercial building, facing north, with a hip roof. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf plate glass door with a multi-light transom and flanked by shutters; and 2 6/6 double-hung wood windows set over a molded panel. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation.

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200. C 207 East Jefferson Street c. 1935

A one-story brick traditional commercial building, facing north, with a flat roof. The storefront is filled with center glazed doors flanked by plate glass windows in aluminum frames (two on each side). There is a transom panel across the storefront. A canvas awning stretches across the storefront. Above the awning is a rectangular panel of decorative brick. All bays set in plain openings.

201. NC 209 East Jefferson Street c. 1940

A one-story brick traditional commercial building, facing north, with a metal gable roof behind a tall plain parapet. The storefront is boarded up.

202. NC 300-306 East Jefferson Street c. 1945, 1980s

A two-story brick commercial building, facing south, with a flat roof. A one-story addition on the left is covered by an asphalt gable roof which extends across the first floor of the two-story building and is supported by metal posts. A brick right chimney pierces the roof of the addition. There are 7 bays, all aluminum: plate glass, single leaf plate glass door, plate glass window, single leaf plate glass door and a fixed sash. All bays set in plain openings. Concrete slab foundation.

203. C 301 East Jefferson Street c. 1915

A one-story clapboard Craftsman residence, facing north, with an asphalt hip roof with cross gables and exposed rafter ends. There are two corbelled interior brick chimneys. A large gabled dormer projects from the center of the roof. There is a pair of 1/1 double-hung wood windows, exposed rafter ends and large brackets decorating the dormer. Flanking the dormer are gabled vents. There is a gabled porch in the center supported with square wooden boxed columns and enhanced with exposed rafter ends and a large bracket. A plain wooden balustrade with heavy square wood newel posts complete the porch. A hipped roof covers the porch that extends to the right of the gabled section. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

204. C 307 East Jefferson Street c. 1930

A one-story brick Craftsman residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with 2 exterior brick chimneys on the right. There is a gable roof over a porch on the right facade supported with square brick columns. There are widely overhanging eaves with large plain wood brackets. There is a cross gable over a slightly projecting bay set in between the chimneys.

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There are paired wood vents in the gable ends. There are 4 bays: a pair of 6/1 double-hung wood windows to the left of the porch; and a single leaf louvered wood door centered under the porch and flanked by 6/1 double-hung wood windows with shutters. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

205. NC 308 East Jefferson Street c. 1990s
A one-story painted brick commercial building, facing south, with a flat roof. There are 4 bays: a fixed sash in aluminum frames, double leaf plate glass doors and 2 fixed sash in aluminum frames. All bays set in plain openings. Concrete slab foundation.

206. C 309 East Jefferson Street c. 1890
C. C. Kelly House. A two-story clapboard Queen Anne residence, facing north, with a tall hip roof with cross gables and a three-story tower capped with a bellcast hip roof. The wrap-around one-story porch is covered with a hip roof supported with turned posts enhanced with a spindle balustrade and frieze. To the right of the tower is a small balcony set under a cross gable supported with turned posts.

207. C 310 East Jefferson Street c. 1872
Chatwin Jackson Home. A one-story clapboard residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable sitting on the roof (flat) of the full façade porch. This gable has a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows. There is also a gabled dormer with cornice returns and a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows. The porch is supported with heavy fluted Doric columns. The cornice is bracketed. There are 5 bays: a center single-leaf glazed door (multi-light) with sidelights and a transom with a plain entablature flanked by 2 6/6 double-hung wood windows flanked by shutters and enhanced with plain entablatures. Brick pier foundation.

208. C 311 East Jefferson Street c. 1935
A one-story brick (entrance area) and clapboard residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a lightly projecting room. There is an exterior brick chimney on the façade. There is a brick gabled projection that houses the entrance (a single leaf glazed (6 small lights in the top) arched door set in an arched opening. There is a pair of multi-light-over-1 double-hung wood windows on either side of the chimney and a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows in the projection. There is a 6-light fixed sash window in the gable end. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

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209. C 312 East Jefferson Street c. 1930

A one-story brick residence, facing south, with a tile-covered hip to gable roof pierced by an exterior brick chimney and an interior slope brick chimney. There is a cross gable over a projecting room that has three 6/6 double-hung wood windows and a small arched fixed window in the gable end. To the left of this gable is a small shed-covered dormer filled with a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows. There is a large shed-covered dormer in the main roof with three 6/4 double-hung windows. There is a shorter gable cover a wing on the right elevation with a small shed-covered dormer with a 6-light fixed sash window. There is a projecting bay in front of the gabled room. The bay is filled with three 1/1 double-hung vinyl windows with a hip roof. A flat roof with a metal balustrade atop it covers the porch, supported with square fluted wood columns. The porch is set in front of the main block beside the projecting section. There is one bay to the left of this section: a small 1/1 arched double-hung wood window in an arched opening. There are three bays under the porch: a center single-leaf glazed (1 light, 3 panel) door with sidelights and fanlight flanked by 6/6 double-hung wood windows. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation.

210. C 314 East Jefferson Street c. 1920

A one-story drop siding Craftsman residence, facing south, with an asphalt hip roof pierced with a triangular wood vent. The full facade porch is covered with a hip roof supported with wood Corinthian columns on stuccoed piers. There are shaped rafter ends and widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. There are 5 bays: a center 6/6 double-hung wood window flanked by a single leaf half glazed door with transom (2-light) and a 6/6 double-hung wood window. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

211. NC 315 East Jefferson Street c. 1949, 1980s

A school complex, facing north, with the gymnasium and part of the classroom building constructed in 1949. The buildings have been enlarged and updated through the years.

212. C 318 East Jefferson Street c. 1900

A one-story clapboard L-front residence, facing south, with a tall asphalt hip roof with a cross gable over a projecting room with cornice returns and a rectangular wood vent. The full facade porch is covered with a hip roof supported with square wood columns. The porch is screened. There are 5 bays: 2 4/4 double-hung wood windows in the projection, a single leaf glazed (1/2 and a panel) door with a transom, a 4/4 double-hung wood and a pair of 4/4 double-

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hung wood. Moderately overhanging boxed eaves. Overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

213. C 319 East Jefferson Street c. 1930

A one-story narrow clapboard bungalow residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with a large gabled dormer with a pair of vents. There is a cross gable over a porch on the left façade supported with heavy stuccoed brick columns. Plain brackets enhance the widely overhanging eaves. A low stuccoed wall completes the porch. A gabled porte cochere supported with the same columns projects from the left side. There are 3 bays: a pair of 4/1 double-hung wood windows, a single leaf French door, and a set of 4 4/1 double-hung wood windows. Widely overhanging eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings. A two-story asbestos siding garage with asphalt gable roof with exposed rafter ends. The ground floor has two openings for autos.

214. C 320 East Jefferson Street c. 1910

A one-story clapboard L-front residential, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a projecting room with a square wood vent in the gable end. There is a hip roof over the wrap around porch that has been enclosed on the corner with asbestos and 3 2/2 aluminum windows. The porch is supported with square wood tapered columns on brick piers connected with a low brick wall. There are 3 bays under the porch: 2 1/1 double-hung wood windows and a single leaf glazed (3/4) door. There is a pair of 1/1 double-hung wood windows in the projecting room. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

215. C 321 East Jefferson Street c. 1935

A one-story brick (white-washed) Tudor-inspired residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof pierced by a gabled dormer with an arched diamond window. There is a front gable with an arched diamond-light fixed window with shutters in the gable end. There is an exterior brick chimney on the facade. There is a gable over the slightly recessed entrance. There is a corner (left) porch recessed under the main roof supported with square brick columns. There are 2 single leaf French doors under the porch, an arched single leaf wood door with a small arched light in the top of the door, and 2 wood casement windows with shutters. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

216. C 322 East Jefferson Street c. 1920

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A one-story asbestos sided residence, facing south, with an asphalt hip roof with a large gabled dormer with 4 9/1 double-hung wood windows and a square wood vent in the front slope and one in the right slope. There is a brick interior chimney. The full facade, wrap around (right) porch is recessed under the main roof and is supported with narrow wood Doric columns connected by a plain wood balustrade. There are 3 bays: a 12/1 double-hung wood window and a single leaf half glazed door, and a pair of 12/1 double-hung wood windows. Widely overhanging eaves shaped exposed rafter ends. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

217. C 323 East Jefferson Street c. 1900

A one-story asbestos sided Queen Anne residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a projecting room with fishscale shingles and cornice returns in the gable end. The wrap around porch is covered with a hip roof supported with wood Doric columns. There are 6 bays: 2 1/1 double-hung wood windows, a new large picture window, a single leaf 3/4 glazed wood door with a transom, and 2 1/1 double-hung wood windows in the projection. There is a cross gable at the rear and a flat roofed addition behind it. Moderately overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

218. C 325 East Jefferson Street c. 1920

A one-story clapboard residence, facing north, with an asphalt hip roof pierced by 2 interior brick chimneys. The wrap around porch is covered by a hip roof supported by round wood columns. Widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf paneled door with side lights and transom flanked by a set of 3 1/1 double-hung wood windows. There is a small cross gable in the center by the porch with a gable end filled with shaped exposed rafters and 2x4 uprights. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

219. NC 326 East Jefferson Street c. 1920

A one-story clapboard residence, facing south, with a wood shake gable roof with a cross gable to the front. The gable extends over a porch to the left of the projecting gable. The porch is supported by decorative wrought iron columns connected by a wrought iron balustrade. To the right of the gable roof projects over a slightly projecting bay window with 3 part window of 6/6 double-hung wood windows. In the projecting gable is a pair of 8/8 double-hung wood windows. Under the porch are a pair of 8/8 double-hung wood windows a single leaf panel door. There is a shed roof over a projecting room on the left rear side filled with a pair of 8/8 double-hung wood windows. The Sanborn Insurance maps show the house as an l-front with a porch on the left end. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

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220. C 327 East Jefferson Street c. 1935

A one-story narrow clapboard Craftsman residence, facing north, with a gable roof with a clipped gable in front of it. The center porch is covered with a shed roof supported with square wood posts. There is a brick ridge chimney and an exterior brick chimney. There is a shed dormer on the left elevation with a fixed sash window. There is also a projecting bay with a pair of 4/4 double-hung wood windows under a shed roof. There are four bays: a 4/4 double-hung wood window, a 6/6 double-hung wood window, a single-leaf paneled door and a 6/6 double-hung wood window. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

221. C 328 East Jefferson Street c. 1945

A two-story clapboard Colonial Revival residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof. The full facade porch is recessed under the main roof and is supported with square paneled wood columns. There is a painted brick end chimney. There is a one-story wing on either side, toward the rear, with a flat roof enhanced with a Chippendale balustrade. There are 3 bays on the first floor: a center single leaf panel door with diamond shaped sidelights and a fan light flanked by 15/15 double-hung wood windows. The second floor has 3 bays: a pair of small 6/6 double-hung wood windows flanked by a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows with shutters. There is a wrought iron balcony supported with plain brackets, under the center door. There is a gabled clapboard garage with a garage door and an interior brick chimney in the left rear yard. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays (except door) set in plain openings.

222. C 335 East Jefferson Street c. 1950

A one-story brick Colonial Revival residence, facing north, with an asphalt hip on gable roof with a gable roof over a section behind the main block. There is a centered porch covered with a gable roof enhanced with a denticulated cornice supported with Doric columns to the ground. The porch is raised only at the entrance. There is a fanlight in the flush gable end. There are five bays: a center single-leaf glazed (one small light) door flanked by 2 12/12 double-hung wood windows. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

223. C 338 East Jefferson Street c. 1940

A one-story clapboard covered residence, facing south, with an asphalt covered gable roof with the gable roof with the gable roof toward the front. There is a rectangular wooden vent in the gable end. There are 3 bays: a 6/6 double-hung wood window; a single leaf French door

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covered by a projecting metal shed awning; and a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows. Widely overhanging eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

224. C 339 East Jefferson Street c. 1900

A one-story L-shaped clapboard covered Queen Anne residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with multiple cross gables including one over a projecting room. These gable ends are enhanced with cornice returns and fishscale shingles. The once wrap-around porch is covered by an asphalt covered hip roof which is supported by turned posts. It is enclosed on the left side. There are 4 bays: a 3/1 double-hung wood windows, a single leaf half glazed door; and a pair of 2/2 double-hung wood windows. Non-historic shutters flank the windows. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings. Overhanging boxed eaves.

225. C 340 East Jefferson Street c. 1935

A one-story clapboard Craftsman residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with two cross gables. There are large brackets enhancing the widely overhanging eaves. The corner porch of the right is recessed under the cross gable and is supported by wood supports on elephantine brick piers with concrete caps. A balustrade with heavy square boxed newels and plain balusters completes the porch. There are two bays: a pair of 8/1 double-hung wood windows under the porch and a 3-part window in the main block (6/1, 10/1, 6/1 double-hung wood). The single leaf French door with 4-light transom provides entrance into the side elevation. Widely overhanging bracketed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

226. C 341 East Jefferson Street c. 1940

A one-story narrow clapboard Colonial Revival residence, facing north, with an asphalt shingle gable roof which is pierced by two interior brick chimneys and a large centered dormer. The dormer is covered by an asphalt shed roof enhanced with exposed rafter ends and has a three-part window with 3 6/1 double-hung windows. There is a porch over the left half of the facade which is an asphalt gable roof supported by Doric columns. The roof continues over the driveway as a porte-cochere. This part of the roof is supported by metal poles. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf glazed door flanked by a 3-part window with 3 6/1 double-hung wood windows with shutters. There are two interior brick chimneys. Moderately overhanging boxed eaves on the sides, closed boxed on the facade. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

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227. C 342 East Jefferson Street c. 1950

A one-story residence, facing south, with clapboard sides and vertical board siding on the facade. The gable roof is covered with asphalt shingles. There are 4 bays: a multi-light-over-multi-light double-hung window; a single leaf glazed wooden door, a multi-light-over-multi-light double-hung window; and a multi-light fixed sash. The full facade front porch is recessed under the main roof and is supported by decorative wrought iron columns. Overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

228. C 343 East Jefferson Street c. 1935

A one-story brick residence, facing north, with asphalt covered steep gable roof with a cross gable over the recessed entry. There is a corner porch (left) recessed under the main roof which is supported by a brick arch on the facade and two arches on the side. The entrance is a single leaf glazed round arched wooden door set in a round-arched opening. There is a pair of 9/9 double-hung wood windows to the right of the entrance. Under the porch is a single leaf French door. A hipped addition at the back extends over the driveway and acts as a carport. This addition has 3 bays: a 3-part window with an 8/8 double-hung wood window flanked by 6/6 double-hung windows; a 6/6/ double-hung window; and a single leaf French door. Close boxed eaves on the front, moderately overhanging box eaves on sides. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

229. C 344 East Jefferson Street c. 1935

A one-story clapboard residence, facing south, with an asphalt covered hip roof. The L-shaped porch is covered with an asphalt covered hip roof which is supported by non-historic wrought iron columns. There is a brick end chimney on the right elevation. There are 3 bays: a pair of 4/1 double-hung wood windows, a center single leaf glazed (4-light, 3 panel) door and a pair of 4/1 double-hung wood. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

230. C 401 East Jefferson Street c. 1940

A one-story brick residential Colonial Revival building, facing north, with a flat roof. A porch covers the middle three bays and is an asphalt gable roof supported with tall Doric columns. A heavy plain entablature and an arched vent complete the porch. There are 5 bays: 2 floor-length 12/12 double-hung wood window; double leaf glazed (3/4 single light, 1 panel) wood door with a heavy entablature; and 2 12/12 double-hung floor length double-hung wood

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windows. There are shutters on the end windows and an arched panel above the windows beside the door. Brick pier foundation. Close boxed eaves on porch.

231. NC 403 East Jefferson Street c. 1940

A one-story vinyl sided residential building, facing north, with an asphalt covered gable roof and a cross gable over a porch that covers the first 2 bays on the left side of the facade. There are 3 bays: 2 pair of non-historic 6/6 double-hung windows set in blocked down openings and a center single leaf glazed (3 stepped light) door. The porch is supported by decorative wrought iron supports and there is a rectangular vent in the gable end. There is a brick end chimney. No eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

232. C 404 East Jefferson Street c. 1910

A one-story clapboard L-front residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a three-sided projecting room. There are 3 1/1 double-hung wooden windows in this room. There are 2 other bays: a pair of narrow 1/1 double-hung wood windows and a single leaf panel door with transom. The porch to the left of the projecting room is covered with a shed roof and is supported with plain wood posts with plain wooden braces and a plain wooden balustrade. Overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

233. NC 405 East Jefferson Street c. 1940

A one-story vinyl and asbestos sided residence, facing north, with a metal roof. There is a gable over a small porch supported by round columns. There are 3 bays: 2 multi-light vinyl windows and a single light French door. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation. Overhanging boxed eaves.

234. C 407 East Jefferson Street c. 1935

A one-story vinyl sided residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof. There is a gable over an almost full width front porch which is supported by round columns. There are 4 bays: 2 4/1 double-hung wood windows and 2 single leaf glazed (4-light, 3 panel) doors in the center. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

235. C 408 East Jefferson Street c. 1935

A one-story asbestos sided Craftsman residence, facing south, with an asphalt hip roof and a hip over the center porch which is supported by square posts and finished with a single wood balustrade. There are exposed rafter ends in the widely overhanging eaves. There are 3

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bays: 2 pair of aluminum 2/2 double-hung windows and a single leaf (center) glazed (large oval light) door. There is a large 3 sided out building with a gable roof. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

236. C 409 East Jefferson Street c. 1955

A one-story asbestos-covered residence, facing north, with an asphalt-covered gable roof. There are 4 bays: two 8/8 double-hung windows; a 6/6 double-hung window, and a single-leaf glazed door.

237. C 410 East Jefferson Street c. 1955

A one-story board and batten sided residence with an asphalt gable roof. There is a carport on the left side recessed under the main roof. There are four bays: 3 12/12/ double-hung wooden windows and a single-leaf paneled door.

238. C 500 East Jefferson Street c. 1935

A one-story brick Tudor residence, facing south, with an asbestos gable roof and a cross gable over the entrance and one over the other bay. There is a tall exterior brick chimney between these two gables. There is half-timbering in the gable end over the second bay. There are 2 bays: a single leaf paneled door and a pair of 8/8 double-hung wood windows. The brick is set in an arched pattern around the door. There is a porch set under the main roof on the right with a screened arched opening. There are exposed rafter ends and widely overhanging eaves on the main gable and boxed eaves on the cross gables. Brick pier foundation.

239. C 502 East Jefferson Street c. 1935

A one-story asbestos covered residence, facing south, with an asphalt covered gable roof and a cross gable over a projecting room on the right. There is a brick exterior chimney on the front of this projection. The entrance is recessed behind an arched opening on the front and left side of the projection. There are 5 bays: a small pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows; a 6/6 double-hung wood windows; a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows; and 2 single 6/6 double-hung wood windows. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation. Overhanging boxed eaves.

240. C 503 East Jefferson Street c. 1935

A one-story clapboard Craftsman residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof. There is an asphalt gable roof over the carport on the left supported by a metal post. There are 4

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bays: 3 3/1 double-hung windows and a single leaf panel door covered by an arched wood awning supported by large decorative brackets. There are exposed rafter ends in the widely overhanging eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

241. C 504 East Jefferson Street c. 1955

A one-story asbestos sided residence, facing south with an asphalt gable roof with an exterior brick chimney. There are 5 bays: 3 pair of 2/2 double-hung aluminum windows; a single leaf paneled door; a 3-part aluminum window. There are 2 cross gables over projecting roofs and a porch between them with a shed roof. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

242. C 505 East Jefferson Street c. 1950

A one-story asbestos shingle Minimal Traditional cottage, facing north, with an asphalt stepped gable roof. There are 5 bays: a center single leaf paneled door and 4 8/8 double-hung wood windows. Moderately overhanging boxed eaves. The center porch is recessed under the main roof which is slightly raised over this section and is supported with decorative wrought iron columns. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

243. NC 506 East Jefferson Street c. 1960

A one-story brick Ranch residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a projecting roof on the left facade. There is an interior brick chimney. The "L" shaped porch is recessed under the cross gable and main roof and is supported with wood Doric columns. The carport is recessed on the right facade. There are 4 bays: a 12/12 double-hung wood window in the projection and a single leaf panel door, a pair of 12/12 double-hung wood windows and a single 12/12 double-hung wood window under the porch. Overhanging boxed eaves. Concrete slab foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

244. C 507 East Jefferson Street c. 1935

A one-story asbestos shingle residence, facing north, with an asphalt hip roof with a cross gable over the center three bays. There are 5 bays: a 3-sided bay window with 3/1 double-hung wood sash; a center entrance filled with a single leaf glazed door (with a projecting arched window head) flanked by 3/1 double-hung wood windows; and a pair of new aluminum windows on the right. Overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation. There is an asbestos sided gabled garage.

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245. C 508 East Jefferson Street c. 1950

A one-story brick Minimal Traditional residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a slightly projecting entrance (there is brick in the gable end). There are 5 bays: a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows; a center single leaf paneled door flanked by narrow vertical fixed sash windows; and a large multi-light fixed window. Shutters flank the windows. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

246. C 509 East Jefferson Street c. 1945

A one-story drop siding Minimal Traditional residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with two cross gables to the front and a gable over a small portico supported by paired square posts. There is a corner porch recessed under the main roof (left) supported with a square wood post and screened with a wood balustrade. There are 6 bays: an off center single leaf glazed door flanked by 3/1 double-hung wood windows; a pair of 3/1 double-hung wood windows; and 2 single 3/1 double-hung wood windows. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

247. NC 511 East Jefferson Street c. 1950

A one-story asbestos sided residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof and a cross gable over a projecting room. There is a porch to the left of the projecting room covered with a flat roof supported by square wooden posts. There are 4 bays: all non-historic double-hung windows. There is a lower gable over the left end with a shed with exposed rafter ends over a slight projection with a single leaf French door. There are 3 other bays: a small 6/6 double-hung aluminum windows and 2 6/6 double-hung aluminum windows. The entrance is a single leaf glazed door into the side of the projecting room. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain opening

248. C 512 East Jefferson Street c. 1955

A one-story brick residence, facing south, with an asphalt hip roof with a cross hip. There are 5 bays: a pair of 1/1 double-hung aluminum, 2 smaller 1/1 double-hung windows, a single leaf panel door, a 3-part window with fixed sash flanked by 1/1 double-hung aluminum windows, and a 1/1 double-hung aluminum windows. There is a carport on the right under a cross gable supported with square wood columns. The entrance is recessed slightly. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

249. C 515 East Jefferson Street c. 1945

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A two-story painted brick Colonial Revival residence, facing north, with a low asphalt gable roof and two brick end chimneys. There is a flat roof over a full-width two-story porch which is supported by two-story Doric columns. There are 3 bays: a center entrance filled with double leaf paneled doors with sidelights and a fanlight flanked by 12/12 double-hung wood windows with shutters. A one-story hipped roof wing on the left is filled with 2 8/8 double-hung wood windows and it has a brick end chimney. There is a gabled one-story wing with an 8/8 double-hung wood window. There are 3 bays: a center entrance filled with single leaf glazed (9-light, 2 panel) door flanked by 2 6/6 double-hung wood windows.

250. C 519 East Jefferson Street c. 1945

A one-story clapboard Minimal Traditional residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable. There is a flat roof supported with a square wood post covering the entrance. There are 4 bays: a 8/8 double-hung wood window; a single leaf glazed door, a 3-part window with 4/4, 8/8, 4/4 double-hung wood windows; and a 6/6 double-hung window. There is a detached garage on the right side with a gable roof. Widely overhanging boxed eaves.

251. C 520 East Jefferson Street c. 1955

A one-story brick Minimal Traditional residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with a gable over a small porch attached to the left end. This porch is supported with square wood posts. There is a gable over a squatty portico which is supported by square wood columns. There are 5 bays: a 6/6 double-hung wood window, a 12/12 floor length double-hung wood window; a single leaf glazed door; a 12/12 floor length double-hung window and a 6/6 double-hung wood window. Shutters flank all windows. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation. Moderately overhanging boxed eaves.

252. C 521 East Jefferson Street c. 1955

A one-story wood shake Minimal Traditional residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with a brick end chimney. The porch covers the center two bays and is recessed under the main roof which is supported by decorative metal columns. There are 4 bays: 8/8 double-hung window; single-leaf glazed door; pair of 8/8 double-hung windows and a single 8/8 double-hung window. Close boxed eaves.

253. C 522 East Jefferson Street c. 1955

A one and a half story brick residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with cross gables over projecting rooms on each end of the façade. The gable ends are brick and the left has

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a large 9-light fixed sash. There is an interior brick chimney. The porch is between the projecting gables and is recessed under the main roof. There are 6 bays: 2 casement windows; a single-leaf paneled door flanked by floor length casement windows and a multi-light fixed window. All windows are flanked by shutters. Close eaves.

254. C 523 East Jefferson Street c. 1950

A one-story asbestos sided Minimal Traditional residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof. There is a brick exterior chimney on the façade. There are four bays: a 6/6 double-hung wood window, a single-leaf glazed (fanlight and 2 panels) door, a three-part bay window with three 6/6 double-hung windows, and a 2/2 (horizontal lights) double-hung window. A gabled garage is attached on the right.

255. NC 525 East Jefferson Street c. 1960s

A one-story brick Ranch residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with an interior brick chimney. There is a cross gable over a projecting room on the left facade. There are 5 bays: a multi-light fixed window in the projection; a single leaf panel door with storm door, a 16-light fixed aluminum window a single leaf panel door and a 12-light fixed window in to the garage. Moderately overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings.

256. C 526 East Jefferson Street c. 1955

A one-story brick Ranch, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with a gable over a section on the left end. There are 4 bays: a 6/6 double-hung wood window, a 8/8 double-hung wood window, a recessed single leaf glazed door (oval light) a sidelight, and a 12/12 double-hung wood window. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

257. C 527 East Jefferson Street c. 1950

A one-story asbestos sided residence, facing north with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a projecting room. There are four bays: a 6/6 double-hung window; a single-leaf glazed door; a pair of 6/6 double-hung windows; and a pair filled with new sash.

258. NC 529 East Jefferson Street c. 1935

A one-story clapboard residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof and a cross gable over a projecting room. There is a corner porch that wraps around the side that is covered by a gable supported by turned posts. There are three bays: a 6/6 double-hung window; a single-

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leaf glazed door; and a pair of 6/6 double-hung windows. It appears that the windows are new and the openings have been made smaller to accommodate the new sash.

259. C 531 East Jefferson Street c. 1955

A one-story asbestos residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with cross gables to the front. The smaller gable covers the center entrance which is double leaf doors with 2 arched lights. The entry is flanked by a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows and a smaller 6/6 double-hung wood window. All bays are covered by storm windows. There is a gabled garage in the right yard. All bays set in plain openings. Close boxed eaves.

260. C 606 East Jefferson Street c. 1940

A one-story drop siding residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable to the front, flush with the edge of the wall. There is a slight, smaller gable roof to the front of this gable, set to the left side of the gable. The corner porch is recessed under the roof on the right façade and is supported with boxed columns and completed with a spindle balustrade. There is an exterior chimney to the left of the porch with a small gable behind it. There are three bays: a 6/6 vinyl double-hung window on either side of the chimney and one under the porch. The entrance is into the side off the porch and is a flush door with a small fanlight in the top section. Overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

261. C 609 East Jefferson Street c. 1955

A one-story brick Minimal Traditional residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a projecting room. There is a four light fixed round window in the gable end. There are four bays: 3 double-hung vinyl storm windows and a single-leaf glazed door. The porch to the right of the projection is covered by a flat roof supported by square wood posts. A plain wood balustrade completes the porch. There is a detached garage at the rear.

262. C 611 East Jefferson Street c. 1950

A one-story brick Tudor-inspired residence with a tall asphalt gable roof with a cross gable to the front which has an exterior brick chimney which extends through the roof ridge. A shed roof covers a projecting bay on the left. There are four bays: a three-part window with 4/4 double-hung-multi-light fixed-4/4 double-hung window; a large multi-light fixed window; a single leaf glazed arched door; and a 3/1 double-hung window. The gable end is stuccoed. All bays set in plain openings.

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263. C 613 East Jefferson Street c. 1950

A one-story asbestos sided residence, facing north, with an asphalt hip roof with cross hips and gable. There are five bays: a three-part window that slightly projects, covered with a shed roof (and single-leaf French flanked by multi-light fixed sashes), an 8/8 double-hung wood window, 2 pair of 8/8 wood windows and a single 8/8 double-hung window. The porch is covered with a flat roof in between the two projecting gables and is supported with decorative wrought iron columns. Plain eaves. All bays set in plain openings. There is a hipped garage on the right side, rear yard.

264. PL Court House Square, West Jefferson Street c. 1897

Attala County Court House. A two-story brick Classical Revival court house in a Greek cross plan, with porticos projecting from the north and south. The building has a central block topped with a hipped roof and resting on a brick foundation. On either side of the central block are two-story two-bay wings of slightly smaller proportion. The wings are topped with a flat roof. The building is enhanced with a concrete water table. All windows are 1/1 double-hung with concrete sills and are topped with a pressed metal lintel resembling brackets and hood-molds.

265. C 101 West Jefferson Street c. 1892

A one-story brick traditional commercial building, facing north, with a flat roof and a stepped parapet. The building is divided into two storefront with the one on the left being larger than the other. The left has a canted entrance filled with a single-leaf plate glass door. The corner is supported with a square column. The rest of the storefront is filled with plate glass windows over brick bulkheads. The right storefront is filled with a center single leaf door flanked by plate glass windows over brick bulkheads. Awnings cover each storefront.

266. C 105 West Jefferson Street c. 1897

"City Hall" (1897). A two-story brick traditional commercial building, facing north, with a flat roof. The storefront is recessed and entered by brick steps. There are three non-historic bays: a center single leaf glazed door (12 light, 4 panel) with transom, fluted pilasters and an arched entablature. The second story is filled with three arched 1/1 double-hung wood windows set in arched openings. The bays are further enhanced as they are set within corbelled brick rectangles.

267. C 109 West Jefferson Street c. 1902

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A two-story brick traditional commercial building, facing north, with a flat roof and a plain parapet. The storefront is filled with a slightly recessed single-leaf panel door on the left that provides access to the second floor; plate glass windows set over a brick bulkhead and double-leaf plate glass doors. The transom panel is covered with wood. An awning stretches across the façade. All bays set in plain openings.

268. C 113 West Jefferson Street c. 1897

A two-story brick traditional commercial building, facing north, with a flat roof. The storefront is filled with plate glass aluminum doors and plate glass windows over stuccoed bulkheads. There are 4 bays in the second door: 4 multi-light casement windows. There is a canvas awning stretched across the front. All bays set in plain openings.

269. NC 114 (however is on the odd side of the street) West Jefferson Street c. 1907

A one-story brick traditional commercial building, facing north, with a flat roof and a plain parapet. The storefront has been completely altered and is bricked in on the left. The right has been blocked down by siding and now has a recessed entry with plate glass door and multi-light fixed window.

270. NC 117 West Jefferson Street c. 1895

A two-story brick traditional commercial building, facing north, with a flat roof and a plain parapet. The storefront is filled with a center single-leaf plate glass door with transom flanked by large multi-light fixed windows. There is an awning over the storefront. There is one double-hung window on the second floor (new). All bays set in plain openings.

271. C to the right of 117 West Jefferson Street c. 1880

A two-story brick traditional commercial building, facing north, with a flat roof. The storefront is filled with recessed double-leaf plate glass doors flanked by plate glass windows over brick bulkheads. A cloth awning stretched across the façade. There are three windows on the second floor filled with new sash. All bays in plain openings.

272. NC 131 West Jefferson Street c. 1895

A two-story brick traditional commercial building, facing north, with a flat roof. The second floor is completely changed and is covered with metal panels and two projecting bays covered with wood shakes, false arched shutters and ironwork. The storefront is filled with plate glass windows over brick bulkheads, double leaf plate glass doors and wood panels.

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273. C 201 West Jefferson Street c. 1930

A one-story brick traditional commercial building, facing north, with a flat roof with a stepped parapet. The front facade above the storefront windows and on the side above the side storefront window are covered with a vertical metal siding. A suspended metal awning protects the storefront and wraps the corner. The entrance is on the left side and is double leaf half-glazed windows and the remainder of the facade is filled with 2 plate glass windows set over a brick bulkhead. The storefront wraps around the side. The transom panel is boarded up.

274. C 203 West Jefferson Street c. 1950

A one-story brick traditional commercial building, facing north, with a flat roof behind a plain parapet. A suspended metal awning covered with canvas spans the facade. The storefront is filled with plate glass (aluminum frames) windows over a brick bulkhead and double leaf plate glass doors with a transom.

275. C 204 West Jefferson Street c. 1920

A one-story stuccoed concrete block public building, facing south, with a metal-covered gable roof over the tall section on the right and a flat roof over the section on the left. There is a stepped parapet with the highest point centered over the entrance on the right of the facade. A small porch covers the entrance with a metal-covered hip roof supported by four square wooden columns and 2 like pilasters. There is a three-part vent in the wall above the entrance. There are four bays: three-part window with 3 6/6 double-hung aluminum windows, a 6/6 double-hung aluminum window, a single-leaf half-glazed door with sidelights and a transom, and a 6/6 double-hung aluminum window.

276. C 204A West Jefferson Street c. 1945

A one-story brick public building, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof and a cross gable. There are three bays: a single-leaf metal flush door, a metal casement window and a 2/2 aluminum double-hung window. The front gabled section housed fire engines at one time (1949 Sanborn) and the door has been infilled with wood siding.

277. C 204B West Jefferson Street c. not available
Water tower.

278. NC 213 West Jefferson Street c. 1945

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A one-story brick traditional commercial building, facing north, with a flat roof. A non-historic wood shake mansard covers the top half of the walls with a taller vertical metal covering above the entrance, which is two-story section. There are 8 bays: in the two-story section-double-leaf plate glass doors flanked by arched multi-light fixed sash, floor-length windows; a large plate glass window on the right of the entrance and 4 of the same on the left of the entrance. All bays set in plain openings.

279. C 216 West Jefferson Street c. 1945

Attala County Fire Station. A one-story brick fire station, facing south, with a flat roof behind a stepped parapet. The front wall is extended forward, covered with a flat roof. There are 3 bays: roll-up garage doors for the fire vehicles.

280. NC 221 West Jefferson Street c. 1945

A one-story brick and stucco (top half of the building) traditional commercial building, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof. A porch covered with a wood shake shed roof supported with square wood posts extends across the facade. The facade is covered with new brick, plate glass windows and a single leaf plate glass door.

281. C 223 West Jefferson Street c. 1890

A two-story clapboard residential building, facing north, with a pressed metal gable roof. The full facade one-story porch is covered with a standing seam metal shed roof supported with paneled wooden slightly tapered square columns resting on paneled wood bases. A plain wooden balustrade completes the porch. There are 4 bays: a 3-part window with 1/1 double-hung wood window; a single leaf glazed (one third light with panel) door with transom; and 2 1/1 double-hung wood windows. There are two rectangular louvered windows above the porch roof. Overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

282. NC 229 West Jefferson Street c. 1980

A one-story modern brick commercial building, facing north, with a metal gable roof. The full facade porch has a shed roof supported with iron columns. There are four bays: a single-leaf panel door and three 4/4 double-hung aluminum windows over wood panels. All bays set in plain openings.

283. NC 230 West Jefferson Street c. 1955

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A one-story concrete block commercial building, facing south, with vertical metal siding on the front. The metal-covered gable roof is hidden by a stepped parapet on the front. There is a roll-up metal garage door and a single-leaf plate glass door and plate glass window.

284. C 301 West Jefferson Street c. 1950

A one-story concrete block commercial building, facing north, with a metal gable roof with a stepped parapet. There are nine bays: a plate glass window with transom, a single-leaf glazed door with transom flanked by plate glass windows, a plate glass window with transom and a garage door flanked by plate glass windows. All bays set in plain openings.

285. NC 309 West Jefferson Street c. 1990

A one-story modern metal commercial building, facing north, with a flat roof. There are plate glass windows and doors.

286. NC 310 West Jefferson Street c. 1945

A one-story metal commercial building, facing south, with a metal covered gable roof. There are 2 roll-up garage doors, a single leaf glazed door and a plate glass single light window. Widely overhanging plain eave on front, no eave on sides. Concrete slab foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

287. C 310 Knox Street c. 1920

A large concrete block and metal industrial building (perhaps three stories in height), facing south, with a very tall metal roof. There are two garage doors and a single-leaf plate glass door.

288. NC 319 Knox Street c. 1970s

A modern brick industrial/manufacturing building with a flat roof.

289. NC 402 Knox Street c. 1990s

A one-story metal building, facing south, with a metal gable roof. There is a single-leaf plate glass door flanked by aluminum fixed sash.

290. NC 404 Knox Street c. 1980s

A large one-story metal building, facing south, with a metal gable roof. There are two garage doors and a single-leaf metal door flanked by aluminum fixed sash.

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291. C 410 Knox Street c. 1950s
A one-story brick commercial building, facing south, with a metal gable roof behind a tall plain parapet. There are four bays: three 1/1 double-hung aluminum windows and a single-leaf full glazed door.
292. NC 500 Knox Street c. 2006
A two-story brick public assembly building, facing south, with a metal gable roof. There are large multi-light fixed aluminum windows between brick piers which project through the roof.
293. NC 501 Knox Street c. 2000
Jason Niles City Park Building. A modern commercial building with a gable roof.
294. C 103 Landrum Street c. 1950
A one-story drop siding residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with another gable on the right end and a cross gable over a projecting room. There is a shed roof over a carport on the left end supported with wrought iron columns. A shed roof covers the porch that stretches from the projection to the end of the main gable. It is supported with wrought iron columns. There are 4 bays: a 6/6 double-hung wood window in the projection; a single leaf glazed door (1/2, 3 panel) and a 6-light fixed picture window under the porch, and single leaf glazed door and a 6/6 double-hung window. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.
295. NC 105 Landrum Street c. 1955
A one-story asbestos shingle commercial building, facing east, with a metal shed roof. There are 5 bays: a plate glass window, 2 single leaf glazed doors and 2 plate glass windows. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.
296. NC 203 Landrum Street c. 1960s
A one-story clapboard residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof. A shed roof supported with square wood posts covers the door. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf panel door flanked by 2/2 double-hung aluminum. There is a shed with a shed roof in the left rear yard. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

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297. NC 206 Landrum Street c. 1960

A one-story board and batten (facade except gable ends) and masonite residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable to the right side over a carport supported with square wood posts. There is a gable over a small center porch (with flared eaves) supported with square wood posts connected with a plain wood balustrade. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf panel door flanked by 6/6 double-hung aluminum windows. There is a single leaf panel door on the back wall of the carport. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

298. NC 207 Landrum Street c. 1960

A one-story drop siding residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof. There are 2 bays: a single leaf panel door with storm and a 2/2 double-hung aluminum window. There is a square wood vent in the gable end. Exposed rafter ends. Brick pier foundation.

299. C 209 Landrum Street c. 1955

A one-story drop siding residence, facing east, with a metal gable roof with widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. There is a small shed over a door on the left end. There are 5 bays: a single leaf panel door flanked by a pair of 2/2 double-hung aluminum windows. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

300. C 301 Landrum Street c. 1950

A one-story drop siding (under porch) and asbestos siding residence, facing east, with an asphalt hip roof. The corner porch (left) is recessed under the main roof and is supported with decorative wrought iron columns. There are 3 bays: a 4/4 double-hung wood window and a single leaf panel door under the porch and a 4/4 double-hung wood window.

301. C 303 Landrum Street c. 1935

A one-story drop siding duplex, facing east, with a clipped gable roof with two cross clipped gables to the front-one over each unit. Each unit has a center single leaf panel door flanked by 3/1 double-hung wood windows. There is an arched window hood with heavy wood plain brackets over each door. Widely overhanging eaves All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

302. NC 305 Landrum Street c. 1970s

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A one-story brick Ranch, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a projecting room. Part of the roof is slightly higher than the rest of the gable roof. There is a carport recessed under the main roof on the right side supported with square wood posts. There is a porch recessed across from the projection to the carport. There are 6 bays: a 6/6 double-hung aluminum window with a fanlight, a single leaf panel door and 3 6/6 double-hung aluminum windows under the porch and a single leaf panel door under the carport. Overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Concrete slab foundation.

303. NC 305 1/2 Landrum Street c. 2000

A one-story vinyl and brick (sides) sided residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with 2 cross gables to the front in the center. There is a porch recessed under the main roof on the right facade supported with square wood posts and a plain wood balustrade. There is a gable over a carport on the left end. There are 2 bays: an 8/8 double-hung aluminum window with fanlight and an 8/8 double-hung aluminum window. The entrance is into the side and is a single leaf panel door. Overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Concrete slab foundation.

304. NC 307 Landrum Street c. 2000

A one-story brick and vinyl (gable ends) residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with cross gables. There is a cross gable over a carport supported with square wood posts. A small corner porch is recessed under a cross gable and is supported with a square post. There are 4 bays: a 9/9 double-hung aluminum window with fanlight, a single leaf panel door, a pair of 9/6 double-hung aluminum windows and a single leaf panel door under the carport. Overhanging boxed eaves. Concrete slab foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

305. NC 308 Landrum Street c. 1970

A one-story brick Ranch, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof. The carport is recessed under the main roof on the left side and is supported with fluted wood columns. The porch is recessed in the middle section and is supported with fluted wood columns. There are 5 bays: a single leaf panel door flanked by 2 12/6 double-hung aluminum windows. Overhanging boxed eaves. Concrete slab foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

306. C 309 Landrum Street c. 1950

A one-story drop sided duplex, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. Two small gables break the roof over the entrances.

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There are 4 bays: 2 center single leaf glazed (6-light, 3 panel) doors flanked by pairs of 6/6 double-hung wood windows. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

307. NC 310 Landrum Street c. 1960

A one-story brick and vertical wood siding Ranch residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof. The carport is recessed on the left facade which is supported with wrought iron columns on a tall brick wall. The carport is entered from the end. There are 5 bays: a 3-part aluminum window (2/2 double-hung, fixed single light, 2/2 double-hung); a single leaf half glazed door; a pair of 2/2 double-hung aluminum windows; a small 2/2 double-hung aluminum window, and a 2/2 double-hung aluminum window. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings. Overhanging boxed eaves.

308. C 311 Landrum Street c. 1950

A one-story asbestos shingle residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a carport on the left end. There is a center gable porch supported with paired metal posts. There is a rectangular wood vent in each gable end. There are 3 bays: an off center single leaf glazed door (one square light) flanked by 6/6 double-hung aluminum windows. At the back of the carport is a single light fixed sash. Overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

309. NC 312 Landrum Street c. 1960s

A one-story brick and vertical siding Ranch residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof. There is a gable over a carport supported with metal poles. There are 6 bays: a 2/2 aluminum single leaf panel door with storm door, a 3-part window (2/2, fixed, 2/2 aluminum), 2 2/2 double-hung aluminum windows, a single leaf panel door. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings. Overhanging boxed eaves.

310. C 313 Landrum Street c. 1930

A one-story asbestos shingle bungalow residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable to the front over a porch set to the left facade supported with metal columns on brick piers. There is a small hipped room on the left end. Widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends and shaped brackets in the gable end. There are 5 bays: a 3/1 double-hung wood window in the shed room, a pair of 3/1 double-hung wood windows and a single leaf glazed door (3-light, 3 panel), a single leaf panel door (these 3 under the porch), and a pair of 3/1 double-hung wood windows. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

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311. NC 314 Landrum Street c. 1960

A one-story brick (wainscoting) and asbestos sided residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof. The carport on the left is recessed under the main roof and is supported with metal poles. There are 4 bays: a 3-part window with 3 fixed aluminum sash windows, a single leaf panel door and 2 2/2 double-hung aluminum windows. Overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

312. C 316 Landrum Street (but faces Knox Road) c. 1890

A two-story vinyl-sided Queen Anne residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a three-sided projecting section with a Palladian window and fishscale shingles in the gable end. There is a wrap-around porch with a hip roof supported with wood boxed columns. There is a hipped addition on the left with a single-leaf French door. There are 5 other bays: a small fixed light window, a single-leaf glazed (1/2, 3 panel) door, and 3 multi-light diamond/1 double-hung wood windows in the three sided projection. All bays set in plain openings. Close boxed eaves.

313. C 106 Lewis Street c. 1930

A one-story narrow clapboard bungalow residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof. There is a gable roof with widely overhanging eaves and exposed rafter ends over the porch. The roof is supported with square wooden posts. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf glazed (4-light, 3 panel) door flanked by 4/1 double-hung wood windows. Widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

314. C 108 Lewis Street c. 1930

A one-story narrow clapboard bungalow residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof. A gable roof covers the front porch and is supported with square wood columns. There are exposed rafter ends and a rectangular vent in the gable end. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf glazed (4-light, 3 panel) door flanked by 4/1 double-hung wood windows. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

315. C 110 Lewis Street c. 1930

A one-story narrow clapboard bungalow residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof. A porch on the right side of the facade is covered with a gable roof supported with tapered square wooden columns resting on brick piers. There are exposed rafter ends and a rectangular

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vent in the gable end of the main house. There are 4 bays: 3 4/1 double-hung wooden windows and a single leaf glazed door with 4 lights and 2 panels. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

316. C 105 Love Street c. 1930

A one-story narrow clapboard bungalow residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with a wood square vent in the gable end. A gable covers the porch set on the left façade and supported with square tapered wood columns on stuccoed brick piers, widely overhanging eaves and exposed rafter ends. There are 3 bays: under the porch is a pair of 4/1 double-hung wood windows and a single leaf glazed (4-light, 3-panel) door; and a pair of 4/1 double-hung wood windows. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

317. NC 106 Love Street c. 1920

A one-story clapboard residence facing south, with an asphalt gable roof. The porch, an almost full façade, has been removed. There are 5 bays: a center single leaf glazed door (oval light – new), flanked by 2 4/4 double-hung wood windows. Closed boxed eaves. Porch has been removed. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

318. C 107 Love Street c. 1930

A one-story clapboard bungalow residence facing north, with an asphalt hip-on-gable roof with a center cross gable porch supported with sets of 3 square wood posts at the front and a wide plain pilaster at the house which supports a plain wide board under the exposed rafters. There are 3 bays: an off center single leaf glazed (3 stepped lights) door flanked by a pair of 9/6 double-hung aluminum windows. Widely overhanging eaves and exposed rafter ends. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

319. NC 110 Love Street c. 1930

A one-story vinyl sided bungalow residence facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with widely overhanging boxed eaves. A gable over a projecting room on the right facade originally covered a porch. This is now enclosed with siding and a set of 3 4/4 double-hung aluminum windows. The entrance is into the side of this room and is a single leaf panel door. There is a pair of 6/6 double-hung aluminum windows on the left façade. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

320. NC 111 Love Street c. 1930

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A one-story bricked (new) residence, facing north, with an exterior chimney on the right and one on the left which has been mostly removed. There is a gabled porch on the left facade supported with square brick columns on a low brick wall. There are 2 bays: a 3/2 double-hung aluminum window under the porch and a pair of 3/2 double-hung aluminum windows. The entrance is into the side on the porch and is a single leaf panel door. The gable ends are filled with masonite. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

321. NC 112 Love Street c. 1920

A one-story vinyl sided residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a center porch supported with non-historic decorative wrought iron columns. The original full facade porch has been removed. There are 3 non-historic bays: a center single leaf panel door flanked by sliding windows. Overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

322. NC 306 Lucas Street c. 1970s

A one-story brick Ranch residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof. A large end brick chimney on the façade pierces the roof. There is a screened porch on the left end covered with a gable roof supported with brick columns. On the opposite end is a carport covered with a flat roof. There are 5 bays: 2 3-sided bays with 3 multi-light fixed sash, a single leaf glazed door, and 2 9/12 double-hung wood windows.

323. NC 307 Lucas Street c. 1970

A one-story brick residence, facing north, with an asphalt hip roof and a hip over a garage on the right side toward the rear. The full-width front porch is recessed under the main roof and is supported with turned posts connected with a plain wood balustrade. There are 5 bays: a center single leaf paneled door and 4 9/6 double-hung aluminum windows. Overhanging boxed eaves.

324. NC 308 Lucas Street c. 1970

A one-story brick and flush siding Ranch residence, facing south, with an asphalt hip roof with widely overhanging eaves. The carport is recessed under the main roof and is supported with square wood posts. There are four bays: 2 8/8 double-hung wood windows, a single-leaf French door, and a three-part window with 6/6 double-hung, 8/8 double-hung, 6/6 double-hung windows. A single-leaf French door is found in the carport.

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325. C 309 Lucas Street c. 1935

A one-story vinyl-covered clapboard residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable to the front which is accented with a rectangular vent. There is a gabled carport on the left side. There is an exterior brick chimney on the façade. There are 4 bays: a pair of 3/1 double-hung wood windows, a single-leaf glazed (3 stepped lights) door, and 2 3/1 double-hung wood windows. Close boxed eaves.

326. C 310 Lucas Street c. 1920

A one-story asbestos shingled bungalow residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with overhanging eaves and exposed rafter ends on the sides. There is a corner porch recessed under the main roof on the right enclosed with lattice and a single-leaf paneled door. There is a pair of 3/1 double-hung wood windows on the left of the porch. There is a wood vent in the peak of the gable end. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

327. C 311 Lucas Street c. 1950

A one-story asbestos shingle residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof. There is a gabled portico supported with brackets. There are three bays: a center single-leaf glazed door (3 stepped lights) flanked by 3-part windows filled with 2/2, 2/2, 2/2 (horizontal) double-hung aluminum windows. All bays set in plain openings. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation.

328. NC 312 Lucas Street c. 1980

A one-story brick Ranch, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof. There is a carport recessed under the main roof on the right side supported with a decorative wrought iron column. The main roof extends over a slight porch which covers the three bays to the left of the carport. There are 4 bays: 3 9/9 double-hung aluminum windows and a single leaf flush door. All bays set in plain openings. Concrete slab foundation.

329. C 315 Lucas Street c. 1940

A one-story asbestos shingle Minimal Traditional residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with a gable over the carport on the right end supported with a decorative wrought iron column. There is a gabled portico supported with decorative wrought iron columns. There are four bays: a single leaf paneled door centered in the main block and flanked with 2 8/8 double-hung wood windows on the left and a single 8/8 double-hung wood window on the right. All bays set in plain openings. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation.

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330. NC 316 Lucas Street c. 1980

A one-story brick and vertical siding (wood) Ranch, facing south, with an asphalt hip roof. There is a carport on the right side recessed under the main roof, supported by brick columns. A small porch at the entrance is recessed under the main roof as well and is enhanced with a plain metal balustrade. There are four bays: 2 6/6 double-hung aluminum windows, a single leaf glazed (6 light) door, and a pair of 6/6 double-hung aluminum windows. In addition, there is a single leaf glazed (6 light) door in the carport. All bays set in plain openings. Concrete slab foundation.

331. C 317 Lucas Street c. 1950

A one-story vinyl-covered residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable to the right side over a carport supported with brick columns. There is a gabled porch supported by square wood columns and connected with a plain wood balustrade. There is a square plain vent in the gable end of the porch. There are four bays: 2 center single leaf glazed doors and two 9/6 aluminum double-hung windows. The door has a single small light in the upper section. Over hanging boxed eaves.

332. C 318 Lucas Street c. 1900

A one-story clapboard L-front residence, facing south, with a pressed metal gable roof with a cross gable over a projecting 3-sided room on the left of the façade. There is a brick interior chimney in the rear slope of the main roof. The porch stretches across the façade from the edge of the projecting room and is covered with a metal shed roof supported with square wood columns with molded caps. There are six bays: 3 4/4 double-hung wood windows, a single-leaf paneled door with transom, and 2 4/4 double-hung wood windows.

333. C 319 Lucas Street c. 1900

A one-story vinyl-over-clapboard L-front residence, facing north, with a standing seam metal roof. There is a cross gable over a projecting room on the right of the façade. To the left of this projection is the porch covered with a metal hip roof supported by square wood posts connected by a spindle frieze and a spindle balustrade. There are four bays: a pair of 2/2 double-hung wood windows, a single-leaf glazed door with a stained glass transom, under the porch and two 2/2 double-hung wood windows in the projection. Close boxed eaves.

334. NC 321 Lucas Street c. 1955

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A one-story asbestos shingle residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof. The roof extends slightly over the right two thirds of the façade. There are three bays: a window infilled at the bottom with the new window in the top of the opening; and a single leaf panel door with screen door and a blocked up pair of new windows under the roof extension. The blocked up windows are half of their original size. All bays set in plain openings. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation.

335. C 323 Lucas Street c. 1935

A one-story drop sided residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with a smaller gable over an added room on the left end. There is a gabled portico supported with decorative wrought columns. There are 4 bays: a 1/1 sliding aluminum window, 2 pair of 2/2 double-hung aluminum windows, and a single-leaf paneled door. Room on the left was a porch. Widely overhanging eaves. Exposed rafter ends.

336. NC 325 Lucas Street c. 1980

A one-story brick Ranch residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with a gable over another section on the right end. There is a porch recessed under the main roof, the right half of the main block, supported with square wood posts. There are four bays: a single-leaf glazed door, a set of 3 6/4 double-hung windows, and 2 6/6 double-hung windows. Overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Concrete slab foundation.

337. C 326 Lucas Street c. 1940

A one-story drop siding residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with an asphalt shed over a carport supported with metal posts and an asphalt shed to the right of it supported with metal posts. There is a small centered porch covered with an asphalt shed roof with exposed rafter ends and supported by square wooden posts connected by a plain wood balustrade. There are three bays: a center single leaf paneled door flanked by replacement 2/2 double-hung aluminum windows. Widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends.

338. C 329 Lucas Street c. 1950

A one-story asbestos sided residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof and a cross gable over a projecting room. A gable roof covers a drop-sided addition on the right end of the main block. There is a small hipped room added on the left side toward the rear and attached to it a carport with a shed roof. There are 5 bays: a 3-part window (4/4, plate glass, 4/4), a single

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leaf paneled door, a pair of 2/2 double-hung aluminum windows, (in the main block) and 2 2/2 double-hung aluminum windows (in the addition). Close boxed eaves.

339. C 331 Lucas Street c. 1950

A one-story brick residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof which extends slightly over a porch (on the right half) supported with decorative wrought iron posts. There are 4 bays: a pair of 2/2 (horizontal lights) double-hung wood windows, a 2/2 (horizontal) double-hung window, a 3-part window (2/2, fixed single light, 2/2), and a single-leaf glazed door (3 stepped lights). Close boxed eaves.

340. NC 400 Lucas Street c. 1935

A one-story clapboard (original block) and stucco (addition) residence, facing south, with an asphalt hip roof with a hipped addition on the right side. There is a hipped porch supported by square wood columns across the original faced. There are three bays: a center pair of French doors flanked by pairs of 4/4 double-hung wood windows. There are three bays in the addition: 3 9/6 vinyl double-hung windows. Originally the main block had a wrap around porch (both sides).

341. NC 401 Lucas Street c. 1970

A one-story vinyl-sided Ranch, facing north, with an asphalt hip roof. There is a carport under a cross hip on the left side. There is a center hipped porch supported by square wood posts connected with a plain wood balustrade. There are four bays: a pair of 9/6 double-hung vinyl windows, a single-leaf panel door, and a 9/6 double-hung vinyl window under the porch and a single 9/6 double-hung window right of the porch. Overhanging boxed eaves.

342. C 407 Lucas Street c. 1955

A one-story vinyl-sided Minimal Traditional residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a projecting room. There is a small porch to the right of the room. It is covered by a shed roof supported by decorative wrought iron columns. There are four bays: a 6/6 double-hung wood window, a single-leaf glazed door, a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows and a 6/6 double-hung wood windows and a 6/6 double-hung wood window. The door is a single-light three-panel and it and the paired windows are located under the porch. The eaves are narrow and boxed. All bays are set in plain openings.

343. C 410 Lucas Street c. 1910

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A one-story and a half story clapboard residence, facing south, with an asphalt hip roof that flares to cover a porch that wraps around both side elevations. The porch is supported with heavy rectangular wood columns. A large hip-on-gable dormer projects to the front and is filled with a set of three diamond-over-one double-hung wood windows set in the "fishscaled" gable end. A small gable sits atop the porch roof at the entrance. There are four bays on the façade: an off center single leaf paneled door flanked by 2 1/1 double-hung wood windows on the left and a 1/1 double-hung wood window on the right. There is a hip-on-gable roof over a two-story 3-sided projecting room. There are three diamond/1 double-hung wood windows on the second floor in the bay with a small arched fixed window with diamond lights to the right of this bay. There is a large corbelled center ridge chimney. A hip-on-gable roof covers a similar three-sided bay on the left elevation as is on the right elevation. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation. There is a gabled garage in the rear yard.

344. NC 411 Lucas Street c. 1970

A one-story drop siding Ranch, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof and a gable over a vinyl-sided addition on the right end. This addition has a set of three 6/6 double-hung aluminum windows. There is a large brick exterior chimney. There are five bays in the main block: a 6/6 double-hung aluminum window on either side of the chimney, a single-leaf panel door, 2 pair of 6/6 double-hung aluminum windows and a single 6/6 double-hung aluminum window. All bays set in plain openings. Overhanging boxes eaves on the main block and plain eaves on the addition.

345. C 501 Lucas Street c. 1950s

A one-story brick Minimal Traditional residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof. The off-center entrance is recessed, as is a section to the left of the entrance which is slightly less recessed. There are four bays: a 6/6 vinyl double-hung window, a three-part window that projects slightly (6/6, multi-light fixed, 6/6 double-hung), a single leaf door behind a heavy dark storm door flanked by 4-light sidelights, and a 6/6 double-hung vinyl window. Close eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

346. NC 503 Lucas Street c. 1980s

A one-story brick and vinyl Ranch residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof. There is a cross gable over a projecting room. There is a shed roof over an addition on the right end. There is an interior brick chimney in the front slope. There are nine bays: a pair of 2/2 (horizontal lights) aluminum windows, a single-leaf glazed door, a rectangular fixed sash, a

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multi-light fixed sash, two 2/2 double-hung windows, a single leaf glazed door and a 2/2 double-hung window. All are aluminum.

347. C 505 Lucas Street c. 1950

A one-story asbestos sided residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof and a cross gable to the front center. There is a corner porch recessed under the cross gable, supported with square wood posts enhanced with curved brackets and a turned wood balustrade with decorative newels. The carport is recessed under the main roof and is supported with square wood posts on a brick knee wall. There are three bays: an 8/8 double-hung wood window, a three-part (4/4, 8/8, 4/4) window, and a small rectangular stained glass fixed window. The entrance is into the side off the porch and is a single-leaf glazed (1/2 light, 3 panel) door. Close eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

348. C 507 Lucas Street c. 1955

A one-story asbestos shingle Minimal Traditional residence, facing north, with an asphalt hip roof and a hip over a carport on the right. A small corner porch is recessed under the main roof and is supported with a square wood post. There are two bays: an 8/8 double-hung wood window and a three-part (6/6, 1/1, 6/6 double-hung wood) window. The entrance is into the side on the porch and is a single leaf glazed (1 light, 3 panel) door. Close eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

349. C 509 Lucas Street c. 1950

A one-story asbestos covered Minimal Traditional residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with a across gable to the front over a slightly projecting room. The porch to the right of this room is covered with a flat roof supported with square wooden posts. There is a rectangular wood vent in the gable end. There are three bays: an 8/8 double-hung wood window, a single leaf paneled door (with storm) and a multi-light fixed sash. Both windows are covered with storm windows. There is a projecting room on the left elevation covered with a gable roof. Close eaves.

350. C 513 Lucas Street c. 1950

A one-story asbestos covered Minimal Traditional residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof. There is a cross gable over a projecting room on the right of the façade. A center porch covers the middle two bays and is covered with a flat roof supported by decorative wrought iron columns. There are four bays: a 6/6 double-hung wood window, an 8/8 double-

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hung wood window, a single leaf paneled door and a 6/6 double-hung wood window. There is a shed roof over a carport on the left side of the house. Close boxed eaves.

351. C 515 Lucas Street c. 1950

A one-story asbestos-covered Minimal Traditional residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with a shed roof supported with decorative wrought iron columns over a carport on the right side. The center section of the roof extends slightly to form a porch supported with decorative wrought columns. There are 4 bays: two 6/6 double-hung wood windows, a single leaf paneled door and an 8/8 double-hung wood window. The left section extends slightly. Close boxed eaves.

352. C 517 Lucas Street c. 1950

A one-story asbestos shingle Minimal Traditional residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof and a cross gable to the front on the left façade. The porch is on the left façade and is recessed under the main roof and is supported with wood posts. There is a gable supported by metal poles over a carport on the left end. There are three bays: an 8/8 double-hung wood window, a single-leaf paneled door, and a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows. Close eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

353. C 519 Lucas Street c. 1940

A one-story asbestos shingle Minimal Traditional residence, facing north, with an asphalt hip roof pierced by an eyebrow vent in the front slope. There is a carport on the right elevation covered by a shed roof supported by metal poles. The corner porch (left) is recessed under the main roof and is supported by square wood posts. There are three bays: an 8/8 double-hung wood window and a single-leaf paneled door under the porch and a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows. Close eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

354. C 521 Lucas Street c. 1950

A one-story asbestos shingle Minimal Traditional residence, facing north, with a stepped asphalt gable roof. There is a carport on the left covered with a shed roof supported with square wood posts. There is a gabled portico supported by wood posts. There are five bays: a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows, a 6/6 double-hung wood window, a single leaf glazed door, and 2 6/6 double-hung wood windows. The door has 3 stepped lights.

355. C 523 Lucas Street c. 1950

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A one-story asbestos shingle Minimal Traditional residence, facing north, with an asphalt hip roof. The roof projects slightly over the entrance and is supported by decorative wrought columns. There are four bays: a set of 3 louvered windows in a partially enclosed corner porch (left façade), a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows, a single leaf glazed door (3 small lights, four panels), and a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows. Close eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

356. C 101 North Madison Street c. 1900

Littleton-Clegg Building. A two-story brick traditional commercial building, facing east, with a flat roof and a tall corbelled brick parapet. The storefront is filled with plate glass windows set in aluminum frames and set over a tiled bulkhead and center double-leaf plate glass door with a transom. The transom panel is covered. Four cast-iron pilasters divide the façade. On the side elevation there is a series of round windows across the second floor. All bays set in plain openings.

357. C 117 North Madison Street c. 1880

A two-story brick traditional commercial building, facing east, with a flat roof behind a plain parapet. There are two storefronts: the left storefront has a center entrance filled with double-leaf full-glazed wood doors with a 4-light transom flanked by plate glass windows over brick bulkheads. The transom panel is made up of glass blocks. The other storefront is the same except for the door which is a single leaf plate glass door with sidelights and a transom. There is a canvas awning over this second storefront.

358. C 133 North Madison Street c. 1880

A two-story painted brick traditional commercial building, facing east, with a flat roof and a stepped parapet. The storefront is filled with plate glass windows over stuccoed bulkheads. The two entrances are recessed and are single leaf glazed (oval light) with transom. There is a large transom panel under a full façade awning. There are 3 bays on the second floor: 3 pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows. All bays set in plain openings.

359. C 137 North Madison Street c. 1887

A one-story stucco traditional commercial building, facing east, with a flat roof. The storefront is filled with plate glass windows over brick bulkheads and a recessed single leaf half-glazed door. There is a canvas awning stretched across the front. All bays set in plain openings.

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360. C 141 North Madison Street c. 1935

A two-story brick traditional commercial building, facing east, with a flat roof behind a tall plain parapet. The storefront is filled with plate glass windows over stuccoed bulkheads and two recessed single leaf glazed (1/2) doors. The transom panel is boarded up. All bays set in plain openings.

361. C 201 North Madison Street c. 1926

A one-story painted brick traditional commercial building, facing east, with a flat roof and a flat parapet. The storefront is filled with double leaf plate glass doors (off center) and plate glass windows over brick bulkheads. There is a window over a brick bulkhead on the side as well. There is a canvas awning across the façade. All bays set in plain openings.

362. C 203 North Madison Street c. 1926

A one-story painted brick traditional commercial building, facing east, with a flat roof. The storefront has been infilled with vinyl siding, two French doors and two 6/6 aluminum windows. There is a metal awning over the storefront.

363. NC 205 or 207 North Madison Street c. 1926

A two-story painted brick traditional commercial building, facing east, with a flat roof. The storefront is recessed and filled with a plate glass door, plate glass window, single leaf French door, and a projecting plate glass window over a board and batten bulkhead. It appears that this building was originally one story and that bays have been cut into the top of the wall as they are cut into the transom panel. There are 3 bays on the new second floor: 3 floor length bays covered with shutters. There is a non-historic balcony across the façade with a decorative metal balustrade. All bays set in plain openings.

364. C 211 North Madison Street c. 1926

Strand Theater. A one-story stucco theater building, facing east, with a gable roof. There are 2 bays: a ticket window (aluminum) and 3 plate glass doors. There is also an aluminum and glass movie poster adverting space on the façade. There are 3 arches inset into the upper wall. There is an aluminum lighted marquee with "STRAND" above it. All bays set in plain openings.

365. NC 217 North Madison Street c. 1960s

A one-story brick commercial building, facing east, with a flat roof and a wood shake mansard roof. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf glazed (2 lights in top panel) door flanked

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by 8/8 double-hung aluminum windows. There is an elaborate door surround with pilasters and a broken pediment. There is a molded window head over each window and a molded panel under each.

366. NC 221, 223 North Madison Street c. 1960s

A one-story brick commercial building, facing east, with a flat roof and an asphalt mansard attached to the façade. There are 4 bays: a plate glass door with transom, 3 plate glass windows over plywood bulkheads separated by brick pilasters and a single leaf glazed door with transom.

367. NC 241 North Madison Street c. 1926

A one-story painted brick commercial building, facing east, with a flat roof behind a stepped parapet. There are 3 storefronts which have been altered: a single leaf paneled door flanked by 9/9 double-hung aluminum windows; a pair of 9/9 double-hung aluminum windows and a single leaf paneled door; and a single leaf paneled door with 2 9/9 double-hung aluminum windows. All bays set in plain openings.

368. C 100 block South Madison Street c. 1926

A two-story brick commercial building, facing west, with a flat roof behind a stepped parapet. There is a one-bay two-story addition (brick) on the right side that has a large roll up door (loading dock). The main block has bricked-in opening except for new double-leaf plate glass doors with plate glass sidelights and in the middle of the building is a roll-up door.

369. NC 103 South Madison Street c. 1930

A one-story brick traditional commercial building, facing east, with a flat roof. There is a single-leaf paneled door with a transom on the left façade and a one without a transom on the right. The storefront in between has been bricked-up. The transom panel is boarded and bricked. There is a suspended metal awning.

370. NC 105 South Madison Street c. 1930

A two-story brick traditional commercial building, facing east, with a flat roof. The storefront has been bricked up and only a plate glass door with a fixed sash beside it and a transom remain. There are only 2 of what appear to be 6 windows on the second floor. Remaining are 6/6 double-hung aluminum windows set in slightly arched openings. There is a metal suspended awning over the door.

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371. C 111 and 113 South Madison Street c.1955

A two-story brick commercial building, facing east, with a metal gable roof over what was probable originally a flat roof. The storefront is filled with a single leaf plate glass door with transom, a series of plate glass windows over exposed aggregate bulkheads, and a recessed single leaf plate glass door with transom. A metal suspended awning stretches across the front. There are 2 2/1 aluminum windows on the second floor.

372. NC 115 South Madison Street c. 1950

A one-story brick commercial building, facing east, with a flat roof and a stepped parapet capped with tile. The storefront has been completely altered and now has 3 bays: a center single leaf panel door flanked by pairs of single light plate glass windows. All bays set in plain openings.

373. C 117 South Madison Street c. 1955

A one-story brick traditional commercial building, facing east, with a flat roof. The storefront slants to the right to where the single leaf glazed wood door with transom is. There are 2 large plate glass windows in aluminum frames over brick bulkheads. All bays set in plain openings.

374. C 117A South Madison Street c. 1955

A one-story brick traditional commercial building, facing east, with a flat roof. The storefront is very slightly recessed. There is a center single leaf plate glass door with transom flanked by a pair of 1/1 double-hung aluminum windows with storms. There is a suspended metal awning across the storefront. All bays set in plain openings.

375. C 119 South Madison Street c.1950

A one-story brick traditional commercial building, facing east, with a flat roof behind a flat (tile-topped) parapet. The recessed storefront is filled with a center single leaf glazed wooden door with a transom flanked by plate glass windows over brick bulkheads. All bays set in plain openings.

376. C 203 South Madison Street c. 1895

A one-story drop siding bungalow residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with a small gable to the front over a projecting room – left facade. There is a porch to the right of the

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projection, recessed under the main roof supported by square wood tapered columns on brick piers and plain wood balustrade and a spindle frieze. The window in the projection is covered with lattice panels and an awning. There are 2 bays under the porch: a single leaf panel door and a pair of 3/1 double-hung wood windows.

377. NC 204 South Madison Street c. 1930

A one-story board and batten (non-historic siding) residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with widely overhanging boxed eaves. The full facade porch is recessed under the main roof and is supported with square boxed wood columns. There are 4 bays: a center single leaf panel door flanked by 2 9/6 double-hung aluminum windows set in blocked-down openings and covered with dark storm windows. The door surround has a denticulated entablature. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. single leaf glazed

378. C 205 South Madison Street c. 1940

A one-story asbestos shingle residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof, a brick chimney (right), and a cross gable over a center porch supported with decorative wrought iron columns and an arched wood vent. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf French door flanked by a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows. No eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

379. C 207 South Madison Street c. 1930

A one-story brick residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with a brick end chimney (left). There is a shed dormer fitting with a pair of 6-light fixed sash windows. There is a flared cross gable over a porch on the left facade with a rectangular wood vent in the gable end. The porch is supported by a brick wall with a large wide arch and a narrow arch. There are 3 bays: a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows and a single leaf Craftsman wood door under the porch and a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows. No eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

380. C 208 South Madison Street c. 1900

A two-story clapboard Queen Anne, facing west, with an asphalt pyramidal hip roof with cross gables projecting to the front on the right façade and to the left elevation. There is a one-story porch covered with a hip roof from projection to projecting section around the main block. The porch is supported with turned posts and completed with a spindled frieze and balustrade. There are 3 bays: a single-leaf glazed (1/2, 3-panel) door with transom and a large one-light

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fixed with stained glass transom under the porch and 2 1/1 double-hung wood windows in the projecting section. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation. The cornice is enhanced with bargeboard and cornice returns.

381. C 209 South Madison Street c. 1930

A one-story narrow clapboard bungalow residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with a vertical board enhanced gable end. There is a gable porch (half timbers in the gable end) on the right supported with brick columns and square wood posts on brick piers. There is an exterior brick chimney with a chimney pot on the right. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf half glazed door flanked by 4/1 double-hung wood windows. Widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

382. C 210 South Madison Street c. 1930

A one-story brick Tudor residence, facing west, with an asbestos shingle roof with a cross gable to the front with a pair of diamond-light fixed sash windows. There is an exterior brick chimney on the facade topped with chimney pots. There is a shed roof over a dormer which is filled with a pair of multi-light diamond fixed sash. There are 4 bays: a single leaf arched panel door set in an arched opening, a multi-light fixed arched window set in an arched opening, a 3-part window with 3 multi-light fixed sash, and a pair of French doors set in an arched opening.

383. C 211 South Madison Street c. 1890

A one-story clapboard Queen Anne residence, facing east, with an asphalt hip roof with a cross gable to the front on the left façade over a three-sided room filled with three bays: a center art glass-over-art glass double-hung wood window over panel flanked by 1/1 double-hung wood windows over beaded panel with transom. There are cut brackets. A small gable projects catty corner from the right corner with a pair of new 1/1 double-hung windows. There is a shed roof over a porch in between the projecting gables. It is supported with turned posts with decorative brackets. There is a brick interior chimney. There are two bays under the porch: a single-leaf glazed door (1 light, 3 panel) with transom and a 1/1 double-hung window. All bays set in plain openings. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation.

384. C 214 South Madison Street c. 1930

A one-story narrow clapboard Craftsman residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with a gable over a porch set on this left facade supported with heavy stuccoed brick columns on the corners and square wood posts with brackets and denticulated frieze. The

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balustrade is lattice. Widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends and large wood plain brackets. There are bays: a center single leaf panel door flanked by a pair of 4/1 double-hung wood windows. There is a gabled porch on the right side supported with large stuccoed brick columns, lattice balustrade, Widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends and large wood brackets. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

385. C 219 South Madison Street c. 1900

A one-story clapboard Queen Anne (Free Classic) residence, facing east, with an asphalt hip roof that transitions to a gable on the left elevation. There are two gabled dormers with cornice returns and 2/2 double-hung wood windows. There is a cross gable on the right façade, flush with the wall, with a sunburst pattern around a round window with 4 fixed lights. The wrap-around porch is covered with a hip roof supported with square wood boxed columns. There are three bays: a center single-leaf glazed (1 light, 3 panel) door with sidelights and a transom flanked by a set of 3 4/4 double-hung wood windows on the left and a pair of 4/4 double-hung wood windows on the right. Close boxed eaves.

386. NC 220 East Monroe Street c. 1950s

A one-story brick garage, facing south, with a metal gable roof behind a stepped parapet. There are metal louvered windows, single leaf panel doors, garage doors, a pair of 1/1 double-hung aluminum, and a single leaf half-glazed door. Concrete slab foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

387. NC 100 block West Monroe Street c. 1955

A one-story brick commercial building, facing south, with a flat roof. There is one single leaf panel door, the rest of the façade has been bricked up.

388. C 110 West Monroe Street c. 1950

A two-story asbestos shingle apartment building, facing south, with a flat roof. There are 8 bays: a casement window, a single leaf panel, 2 casement, 2 single leaf panel, and a casement window. Overhanging boxed eaves. Concrete slab foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

389. NC 111 East Monroe Street c. 1980s

A one-story metal building, facing north, with a flat roof and a painted brick facade. There is a metal garage door and a single leaf plate glass door. Concrete slab foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

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390. NC 113 East Monroe Street c. 1980s
A one-story metal building, facing north, with a brick facade and a metal gable roof. There are double leaf panel doors flanked by plate glass windows. Concrete slab foundation. All bays set in plain openings.
391. NC 200 block West Monroe Street c. 1970s
A one-story metal commercial building, facing south, with a metal gable roof. There are metal double doors on the side.
392. NC 207 West Monroe Street c. 1960s
There are nine 4-plex apartment buildings and an administration building. They are reverse board and batten plywood sided with 2/2 double-hung aluminum windows and flush single leaf doors with storms. Over each entrance the roof extends over a small porch supported with square wood posts. Administration building has same siding, however, the roof is comprised of 2 sheds back to back with one higher than the other. The off-center door is recessed and flanked by a shuttered window and 12-light fixed aluminum window. All bays set in plain openings. Overhanging boxed eaves. Concrete slab foundation.
393. NC 101 North Natchez Street c. 1970s
A one-story brick commercial building, facing east, with a flat roof. There are 5 bays: center double-leaf plate glass doors with transom flanked by 2 large plate glass windows. All bays set in plain openings. Concrete foundation.
394. NC between 101 and 113 North Natchez Street c. 1960
A one-story concrete block with brick on the facade commercial building, facing east, with a shed (new) roof over the flat roof. There is a single leaf plate glass door flanked by plate glass windows and a tall metal garage door. All bays set in plain openings. Concrete foundation.
395. C 113 North Natchez Street c. 1930
A one-story painted brick traditional commercial building, facing east, with a flat roof behind a stepped parapet. There is a large square brick addition to the left with 2 pair of plate glass windows. The main block has a center plate glass door with transom flanked by 3 large plate glass windows over brick (narrow) bulkhead. All bays set in plain openings. There is a metal suspended awning.

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396. C 300 North Natchez Street c. 1873
Mills Davis Battles House. A two-story clapboard residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with 2 brick end chimneys. There is a one-story center porch with a hip roof supported with square wood columns with molded capitals and plain bases. The porch floor is concrete. There are 5 bays: a center single-leaf panel door with sidelights, pilasters as side surrounds and a six-light transom, flanked by 2 6/6 double-hung wood windows with molded window heads. The second floor has 5 bays: a short 6/6 wood window (flanked by plain narrow pilasters with molded caps) in the center flanked by 2 6/6 double-hung wood windows. All have molded window heads and shutters. Close boxed eaves. Brick foundation.
397. NC 301 North Natchez Street c. 1940
A one-story vertical plywood siding (on the façade) and drop siding on the sides residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with a vent in the gable end. There is a gabled portico over the entrance supported by square wood posts with a plain wood balustrade. There are 2 bays: a single leaf French door and a 6/6 double-hung wood window. All bays set in plain openings. Brick foundation. Widely overhanging boxed eaves.
398. C 302 North Natchez Street c. 1935
A one-story asbestos shingle residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a center porch supported with turned posts. The siding under the porch and in the gable end is drop siding. There are 4 bays: a 3/1 double-hung wood window, a single leaf glazed (3 lights) door and a 3/1 double-hung wood window under the porch, and a pair of 3/1 double-hung wood windows. No eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick foundation. There is a clapboard garage with a metal gable roof on the left rear.
399. C 303 North Natchez Street c. 1895
A one-story clapboard L-front residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a projecting room with cornice returns. The porch is tucked into the "L" and is covered with a shed roof supported with square wood columns connected with a plain wood balustrade with a molded rail. There are 5 bays: 2 6/6 double-hung wood in the projecting section and a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood and 2 single leaf glazed (3 stepped lights) doors. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick foundation.
400. C 305 North Natchez Street c. 1940

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A one-story L-shaped stucco commercial building, facing east, with an asphalt gable over the left wing and a hip gable over the other wing. The gable end has 2 8/8 double-hung wood windows. There is a porch covered by a shed roof that runs along both inside elevations by the "L" supported by large wood square posts. Widely overhanging eaves. Concrete foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

401. C 305A North Natchez Street c. 1935

A one-story drop siding duplex, facing east, behind 305. The building has an asphalt gable roof with widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. Each unit has the same bays and the units are side by side: a center single leaf louvered door flanked by a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows. There is an arched hood supported with brackets over each door. There is a 2-car garage with a gable roof with widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends to the right of the duplex. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

402. C 306 North Natchez Street c. 1945

A one-story drop siding residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof pierced with 2 gabled dormers with 4-light fixed windows with storms. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf panel door flanked by a pair of 4/4 double-hung wood windows. There is a gabled portico supported with square wood posts with molded bases and jigsaw brackets. The porch floor is brick. Close boxed eaves. Brick foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

403. C 308 North Natchez Street c. 1940

A one-story asbestos shingle residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with a center cross gable flush with the front wall. There is a gabled portico supported with square wood posts. There are 3 bays: a center single glazed (oval light) flanked with a pair of 4/4 double-hung wood windows. Close boxed eaves. Brick foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

404. C 309 North Natchez Street c. 1930

A one-story brick bungalow residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with a gable to the front over a projecting room. There is a brick end chimney. The porch that extends from the projection past the edge of the main block is covered with a hip roof supported with square paneled wood columns (heavy, short) on tall brick piers. Widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. There are 3 bays: a pair of diamond-shaped over 1 double-hung wood windows, a single leaf French door and a set of 3 diamond-shaped lights over one double-hung

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wood windows. There is a round wood vent in the gable end of the main block. All bays set in plain openings. Brick foundation.

405. NC 310 North Natchez Street c. 1900

A one-story aluminum siding residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with a center porch covered with a metal flat roof supported with metal poles. There are 3 bays: a single leaf panel door with sidelights and a 4-light transom flanked by 6/6 double-hung wood windows. All bays set in plain openings. Brick foundation. Close boxed eaves. Originally there was a full-façade porch.

406. C 312 North Natchez Street c. 1920

A one-story asbestos shingle residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with a square wood vent in the gable end. There is a corner (left) porch recessed under the main roof supported by square wood posts and enhanced with a plain wood balustrade. Widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. There are 2 bays: a 6/6 double-hung aluminum window under the porch and a pair of 6/6 double-hung aluminum windows. Brick foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

407. C 401 North Natchez Street c. 1900

A one-story clapboard L-front residence, facing east, with a cross gable over a projecting room. The porch is tucked into the "L" and is covered with a hip roof supported with Ionic columns. The wall under the porch is beaded board. There are 3 bays a 4/4 double-hung wood and a single leaf glazed door (9 light, 3 panel) under the porch and 2 4/4 double-hung wood windows in the projection. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick foundation.

408. C 402 North Natchez Street c. 1940

A one-story asbestos shingle residence, facing west, with an asphalt hip roof with cross hip over projecting rooms on each end with a porch in between with the hip of the main block extended over it supported with square wood columns. There are 4 bays: 4 8/8 double-hung wood windows. The entrances are in either projection into the side off of the porch and are single leaf panel doors. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick foundation.

409. C 403 North Natchez Street c. 1955

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A one-story asbestos shingle Minimal Traditional residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a center portico. Close boxed eaves. There is a gabled wing on the left at the rear with 3 single leaf French doors. This wing ends in a cross gable over a garage. There are 3 bays in the main block: the center single leaf glazed door (3 stepped lights) flanked with 8/8 double-hung wood windows. There is a brick wainscoting on the facade. Brick foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

410. C 407 North Natchez Street c. 1878, 1918

Warren Potts House. A two-story clapboard Neo-classical residence, facing east, with an asphalt hip roof. There is a hip over the full façade porch supported with grouped (3) Ionic columns resting on brick piers connected by a plain, narrow picket, balustrade with a molded handrail. There is a center projecting section of the porch with the same grouped columns. There are 5 bays on the first floor: a center single leaf full glazed door with sidelights flanked by 2 9/1 double-hung wood windows. There are 5 bays on the second floor: a center Palladian window flanked by 2 9/1 double-hung wood windows with shutters. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick foundation.

411. C 407A North Natchez Street c. 1900, 1940

A one-story clapboard garage with a metal gable roof. There are 3 openings for vehicles. On the left end of this section is a gabled 2-bay room with 2 9/6 double-hung wood windows. A gabled porch extends from this end supported with square posts. Brick foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

412. C 408 North Natchez Street c. 1935

A one-story narrow clapboard Craftsman residence, facing west, with an asphalt hip-on-gable roof with widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. There is an off-center gabled portico supported with square tapered wood columns on tapered piers with a metal balustrade. There are 3 bays: a pair of 3/1 double-hung wood windows and a single leaf paneled door with a fluted pilaster surround. There is a room on the right at the rear covered with a hip-on-gable roof and a garage on the left with a hip-on-gable roof. Brick foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

413. C 409 North Natchez Street c. 1900

A one-story drop siding residence, facing east, with an asphalt hip roof with a full facade porch covered with a flat roof supported with square wood columns with molded capitals and

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plain bases. There are 5 bays: a center single leaf half glazed door with sidelights and a 6-light transom flanked by 2 sets of 3 light by 3 light (over panels) windows with shutters. Close boxed eaves. Brick foundation. All bays set in plain openings except entry.

414. C 410 North Natchez Street c. 1935

A one-story drop siding Minimal Traditional residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof pierced by triangular vents. There is a gabled portico supported with decorative metal columns. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf glazed (oval light) door flanked by a pair of 3/1 double-hung wood windows. Brick foundation. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain opening.

415. C 412 North Natchez Street c. 1940

A one-story drop siding Minimal Traditional residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof pierced by 2 triangular vents. There is a gabled portico supported with square wood posts. There are 3 bays: a single leaf glazed (oval light) door flanked on the left with a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows and a series of 3 French doors on the right. There is a gabled garage on the left at the rear.

416. C 416 North Natchez Street c. 1940

A one-story asbestos shingle Minimal Traditional residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with a gabled hyphen to a cross gable over a slightly projecting section (probably was a garage). There are 6 bays: a 6/6 double-hung wood window over a panel, a 3-sided projecting bay with 3 floor length fixed French doors, a single leaf glazed (oval light) door, a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood window, a 3-part bay with 10, 15, 10 fixed light sashes, and a set of 3 floor-length fixed French doors. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. Brick foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

417. C 500 North Natchez Street c. 1930

A one-story vinyl sided residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with a center gabled porch supported with square wood posts connected with a plain wood balustrade. There are 4 bays: a new aluminum double-hung window, a single leaf paneled door and 2 new double-hung aluminum windows. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. Brick foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

418. C 501 North Natchez Street c. 1890

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A one-story clapboard Queen Anne residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable to the front with cornice returns and an interior brick chimney. There is a three-sided bay window in this projecting gable which is topped with pyramidal hip roof. There are 3 4/4 double-hung wood windows sitting on a paneled base and capped with a paneled frieze. The porch is set to the left of the projection and is covered with a hip roof supported with turned posts and completed with a spindled balustrade and frieze. There are 2 bays under the porch: a pair of 4/4 double-hung wood windows and a center single leaf half-glazed door with sidelights and a 2-light transom. Close boxed eaves. Brick foundation. All bays set in plain openings. There is a gabled clapboard garage behind the house.

419. NC 505 North Natchez Street c. 1970

A one-story brick residence, facing east, with an asphalt hip roof with a gabled wing on the right rear. There are 3 bays in the main block: a center single leaf paneled door with fluted pilasters and molded entablature flanked by 8/8 double-hung aluminum windows set over wood panels. There are 4 bays in the wing: a single leaf paneled door, 2 6/6 double-hung aluminum windows and a garage door. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. Brick foundation. All bays except entry in plain openings.

420. NC 507 North Natchez Street c. 1910

A one-story bricked L-front residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable to the front enhanced with cornice returns and fishscale shingles. The full façade porch is covered with a hip roof supported by decorative metal posts. The porch was lowered to ground level when the brick veneer was added. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf paneled door with side lights and a 3-light transom flanked by a pair of 4/4 double-hung wood windows. Close boxed eaves. Brick foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

421. C 600 North Natchez Street c. 1910

A two-story narrow clapboard American Foursquare residence, facing west, with an asphalt hip roof pierced with a gabled dormer with 2 center 4 fixed light windows flanked by vents. There are three bays on the first floor: An off center single-leaf full-glazed door with transom flanked by 1/1 double-hung wood windows. The full-façade one-story porch is covered with a hip roof supported with Doric columns connected with a turned balustrade. There are three bays on the second floor- three 1/1 double-hung windows positioned over the first floor bays. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation. Close boxed eaves.

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422. NC 601 North Natchez Street c. 1980s
A one-story brick convenience store with a flat roof and a metal awning across the front.
423. NC 603 North Natchez Street c. 1970
A one-story metal building with a metal gable roof. All bays set in plain openings. Overhanging plain eaves.
- 424a-i. NC 604 North Natchez Street c. 1980s
A modern apartment complex with seven apartment buildings and an administration building.
425. C 104 South Natchez Street c. 1940
A two-story brick traditional commercial building, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof. There are 4 bays on the first floor: a louvered door, 2 boarded up storefront windows: and a single leaf panel door. There are 3 bays on the second floor filled with 4/4 double-hung wood. The gable end has a 4-part sash window filled with a board; a vent; a 4/1 double-hung window; and a board. There is a dormer on either side of the roof with a pair of 4/4 double-hung wood windows. There is a one-story addition on the right with a slight shed roof. Close boxed eaves. Concrete slab foundation. All bays set in plain openings.
426. NC 103-105 South Natchez Street c. 1970
A one-story brick commercial building, facing south, with a flat roof and a shed on the middle section. There are four storefronts with large modern fixed window, French doors, and panel doors.
427. NC 107 South Natchez Street c. 1980s
A non-historic brick commercial building, facing south, with an asphalt hip roof with widely overhanging boxed eaves. There are 3 bays: 2 vertical, fixed sash and a single leaf glazed door. All bays set in plain openings. Concrete slab foundation.
428. C 109 South Natchez Street c. 1837
A one-story vinyl-over-clapboard Greek Revival residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with 2 exterior end brick chimneys. The full facade porch is recessed under the main roof and is supported with Doric columns. There are 5 bays: a center entrance filled with double

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leaf paneled doors with sidelights and a transom flanked by 9/9 double-hung windows. Overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

429. C 113 South Natchez Street c. 1930

A one-story clapboard residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with a center interior brick chimney. The full facade porch is recessed under the main roof and is supported with decorative iron columns. There are 4 bays: a single leaf glazed (3 long lights, one panel) door; 2 pair of 3/1 double-hung wood windows and a single leaf glazed (3 long lights, one panel) door. Widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

430. NC 120 South Natchez Street c. 1980

A one-story brick commercial building, facing north, with an asphalt clipped gable roof. The front porch is recessed under the main roof and is supported with square wood posts. There are 3 bays: a single leaf panel door and 2 9/9 double-hung vinyl windows. No eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Concrete slab foundation.

431. NC 201 South Natchez Street c. 1900

A one-story drop sided Queen Anne residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a projecting 3-sided room. The wrap-around porch is covered with a hip roof supported with square wood posts connected with a lattice balustrade. There is an addition on the left side with 3 new fixed sash windows. There are 3 new fixed sash windows in the projecting section. Under the porch are a single leaf glazed door (1/2, 3 panels) with sidelights and transom and a pair of new fixed sash. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

432. C 202 South Natchez Street c. 1950s

A one-story asbestos residence, facing east, with an asphalt hip roof with hips over a projecting room on back side of the front elevation. There are exposed rafter ends. A porch extends across the front between the two hipped sections and has a flat roof, supported with paired wood posts with X's between them. There are 4 bays: 4 8/8 double-hung wood windows. There is an entrance, single leaf half-glazed door into each hipped room. Widely overhanging eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

433. C 207 South Natchez Street c. 1950s

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A one-story brick T-shaped church, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof. There is a two-story tower with a cross set in the corner of the tower. There are concrete clock window surrounds. The front gable has center double leaf panel doors flanked by casement windows. There are double leaf panel doors in the tower. Moderately overhanging plain eaves. Concrete slab foundation.

434. C 301 South Natchez Street c. 1900

A one-story clapboard shotgun residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof. The full-width front porch is covered with a low hip roof supported by 3 turned posts which are enhanced with spindle corner brackets. There are 2 bays: a 1/1 aluminum double-hung window and a single leaf glazed door with wood screen door. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

435. C 310 South Natchez Street c. 1900

A one-and-a-half story drop siding residence, facing north, with a steep metal hip roof pierced by three gabled dormers with 6/6 double-hung windows in them on the façade and two dormers on each side elevation. There are five bays: a center single-leaf panel door with three light transom enhanced with a surround comprised of pilasters supporting a denticulated entablature. There is a three-sided projecting bay on the right elevation toward the rear filled with 4/4, pair of 4/4, 4/4 double-hung windows and covered with a hip roof. A 1 ½ story metal gabled garage is set on the right side at the rear and is connected to the main house by a gabled breezeway. No eaves.

436. C 400 South Natchez Street c. 1920

A one-story narrow clapboard Craftsman residence, facing west, with an asphalt hip roof and a hip over a wrap-around porch supported with tapered wood columns on brick piers. There are widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. There are 6 bays: a 4/1 double-hung wood window and a single leaf glazed door at the back of the porch on the side and in the main block a center single leaf glazed (1 light, 3 panel) door flanked by 2 4/1 double-hung wood windows. The porch roof extends over a porte cochere on the right side. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

437. C 401 South Natchez Street c. 1910

A one-story clapboard Colonial Revival residence, facing south, with an asphalt hip roof with a cross gable to the right side. A large gabled dormer is centered in the hip and has a 3-part

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window filled with a Craftsman multi-light fixed sash window flanked by narrow diamond light fixed sash. The wrap-around porch stretches across the front and the left side and is recessed under the main roof, supported by wooden Doric columns. The right end of the porch has been enclosed with 2 1/1 double-hung wood. There are 3 bays: a center entrance filled with a single leaf glazed (3/4) door with sidelights and a transom flanked by multi-light over one double-hung wood window. Overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

438. C 403 South Natchez Street c. 1920

A one-story masonite-over-clapboard residence, facing south, with an asphalt hip roof topped with a low gable. There is a hipped bay on the left side. There are 6 bays: a 4/4 double-hung wood in the hipped bay; a center entrance filled with a single leaf glazed door (3/4 and 1 panel) with transom and flanked by 2 4/4 double-hung wood window. The full-width front porch is covered with a shed roof supported with decorative (non-historic) iron columns. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

439. C 405 South Natchez Street c. 1935

A one-story brick and vinyl residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with a gable over the porch on the left of the facade and a gable over a portico. All gable ends are covered with vinyl siding. The facade is enhanced with a large round arched opening for the porch and a smaller arch for the portico. Both arches spring from concrete square blocks on the brick columns. There are 4 bays: a 6/1 double-hung wood window, 2 single leaf glazed doors and a pair of 6/1 double-hung windows. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

440. NC 406 South Natchez Street c. 1980

A one-story board and batten residence, facing west, with an asphalt hip roof with a 2 car carport recessed under the left end of the roof. There are 5 bays: a single leaf panel door, 2 pair 1/1 double-hung windows; a single leaf panel door and a pair of 1/1 double-hung wood windows. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Concrete slab foundation.

441. NC 407 South Natchez Street c. 1930

A one-story drop sided residence, facing south, with an asphalt hip roof with cross gable over the right side. It appears that the center entrance has been infilled and was probably a recessed entrance with a gabled portico. The new center entrance is a single leaf glazed (1/2) door flanked by narrow stained glass fixed sash. The gable is supported with oversized wood

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decorative brackets. There are also 2 1/1 double-hung wood windows. There is an exterior brick chimney at the rear. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

442. C 409 South Natchez Street c. 1940

A one-story drop siding residence, facing south, with an asphalt hip roof with cross hips over a projecting room on each end of the front facade. There is a porch set between these projecting rooms covered with a flat roof supported by square posts enhanced with jigsaw brackets. There are 4 bays: 4 8/8 wood double-hung windows spaced evenly across the facade. There are entrances into the side of each projecting room - single leaf panel. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation

443. C 410 South Natchez Street c. 1930

A one-story narrow clapboard bungalow residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with widely overhanging eaves with large plain wood brackets. There is a gabled porch supported with large brick columns, set on the left facade. There are 4 bays: a 4/1 double-hung wood window and a single leaf glazed door (4-lights, 3 panel) under the porch and a single leaf glazed door (4-lights, 3 panel) and a pair of 4/1 double-hung wood windows. There is a brick ridge chimney. Widely overhanging eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

444. C 411 South Natchez Street c. 1945

A one-story clapboard residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof and a gable over a room on the left side. The roof extends over a porch on the right side that is supported with decorative wrought iron columns on brick piers. There are 4 bays: a 6/6 vinyl window in the left wing; a 8/8 double-hung wood window; a single leaf glazed (fanlight in top) door; a 3-part window with a 6/6 double-hung wood window flanked by 2/2 double-hung wood window. A small gabled portico extends over the door and is supported by decorative wrought iron columns. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings. No eaves.

445. C 412 South Natchez Street c. 1938

A one-story asbestos sided bungalow residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with a pair of rectangular wood vents in the gable end. There is a gable over a porch set on the right facade. It is supported with brick piers and is enclosed with lattice panels. There is a shed roof over a carport on the right end, supported with square wood columns on brick piers. There

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is a series of 3 1/1 double-hung wood windows on the left of the porch. No other bays are visible. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

446. C 413 South Natchez Street c. 1935

A one-story narrow clapboard sided Craftsman residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof enhanced with exposed rafter ends. There is a small gabled projection on the right at the rear. There are 3 bays: a center entrance filled with a single leaf glazed (3-light, 1 panel) door flanked by pairs of 3/1 double-hung wood windows. There is a slight portico with a flat roof and square wood posts. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation. widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. There is a gabled carport at the end of the driveway.

447. NC 414 South Natchez Street c. 1900

A one-story board and batten residence, facing north, with a hip asbestos with cross gables. There are 2 interior brick chimneys. The main entrance is on a canted corner and is a single leaf half-glazed door with transom set within a surround of pilasters and a bracketed pediment. There is a gable roof projecting slightly from the main roof over the entry. There are 3 other bays: 2 1/1 double-hung wood windows and a single leaf panel door with transom set in a similar surround as the main entry. Bracketed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings except doors. Originally had a wrap-around porch, the left side was taken off and the front and right section were enclosed.

448. C 416 South Natchez Street c. 1945

A one-story asbestos Minimal Traditional residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof pierced by a painted brick interior chimney. There are 4 bays: a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows, a single leaf panel door with fluted pilaster surround, a 6/6 double-hung wood window, and a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood window. Slight, plain eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings except door.

449. C 419 South Natchez Street c. 1930

A one-story drop siding Minimal Traditional residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable and a gable over a projecting room on the left. There are 3 bays: a center entrance filled with a single leaf glazed (1/2, 2 panel) wood door flanked by pairs of 1/1 double-hung wood windows. A gabled portico protects the entrance and is supported with narrow wood Ionic columns. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

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450. C 422 South Natchez Street c. 1945

A one-story asbestos sided Minimal Traditional residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof. There is a gable over a slight projection on the right toward the rear. There is a gable projection on the left end and another gable (hyphen) to the left of it that attaches to the front gable garage. There are 5 bays: an aluminum window in the hyphen, a center (of the main block) single leaf glazed door flanked by a pair of new windows on the left and a series of 3 new aluminum windows on the right. The entrance is enhanced with a surround of pilasters and plain head. There is a slight gable over the door. No eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings except door.

451. C 424 South Natchez Street c. 1950

A one-story drop siding residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof. There is a 3-sided bay on the left with 2/2, pair 2/2, 2/2 double-hung wood windows. This bay is topped with a hip roof with exposed rafter ends. There is one other bay: a single leaf glazed door protected by a gabled portico supported with large plain wood brackets. Widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

452. C 424A South Natchez Street c. 1930

A one-story drop siding residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable to the front and a cross gable over a projecting room on the left facade. There is a metal flat roof over the porch that runs from the edge of the projection across the facade and is supported with Doric columns. There are 4 bays: a pair of 4/1 double-hung wood windows in the projection, a single leaf glazed door (2 light, 6 panel) with sidelights, a single leaf glazed (2 light, 6 panel) door and a pair of 4/1 double-hung wood windows. There is a round fixed sash in the gable end. Widely overhanging plain eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

453. C 426 South Natchez Street c. 1955

A one-story masonite and board and batten residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof. The roof on the right half extends slightly over the entrance (supported with a wrought iron column) and over a slightly projecting section. There are 5 bays: a pair of 2/2 aluminum windows, 2 2/2 aluminum windows, an off center single leaf panel door, and a 3-part window with a 2/2, single light fixed, 2/2 double-hung window. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

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454. NC 500 South Natchez Street c. 1975

A one-story brick Ranch, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof. There are 5 bays: a pair of casement windows, a center single leaf panel door, a set of 3 casement windows and a pair of casement windows. The area from the door to the right end is slightly recessed under the main roof. Overhanging boxed eaves. Concrete slab foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

455. C 501 South Natchez Street c. 1935

A one-story brick residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with a gable wing extending from the rear. There is an exterior brick chimney, with decorative corbelling on the facade. To the left of this chimney is a slightly projecting gable with an arched multi-light fixed sash window in the gable end. There is an enclosed with glass porch on the left end, a pair of 9/9 double-hung wood windows, a set of 3 9/9 double-hung wood windows and then on the other side of the chimney, an arched single leaf panel door set in an arched opening, under a plain gable window hood. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

456. NC 502 South Natchez Street c. 1915

A one-story asbestos and clapboard (projecting section) L-front residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a projecting room with cornice returns. The porch has been removed. There are 6 bays: a 4/4 double-hung wood, a single leaf glazed (6-light, 3 panels) door (was originally a window), a single light fixed sash window, a single leaf panel door with 2-light transom, a single light fixed sash window, and a pair of 4/4 double-hung wood windows. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

457. C 504 South Natchez Street c. 1910

A one-story clapboard L-front residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a projecting room with cornice returns. There is a pair of 4/4 double-hung wood in this projection. There is a hip roof over the porch that stretches across the facade from the projecting section. The porch is supported with square wood columns and enhanced with jigsaw brackets and a spindle balustrade. There are 3 bays: 2 4/4 double-hung wood windows and a single leaf glazed (new) door. Overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings. There is a gabled gable in the rear.

458. NC 505 South Natchez Street c. 1910

A one-story clapboard residence, facing east, with a metal gable roof. There is a hip over a full facade porch supported with turned posts enhanced with a spindle frieze and cut brackets.

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There are 5 bays: a center single leaf glazed (1/2) door with transom flanked by 2 1/1 double-hung aluminum windows. There is a metal gabled wing on either side toward the rear of the building. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings. Overhanging boxed eaves.

459. C 506 South Natchez Street c. 1910

A one-story narrow clapboard L-front residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a projecting room with cornice returns. There is a hip roof over a porch across the facade from the edge of the projection. This is supported with turned posts. There are 5 bays: 2 1/1 double-hung wood windows in projecting section, a pair of 3/1 double-hung wood windows, a single leaf glazed (1/2) door, and a 3/1 double-hung wood window under the porch. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

460. NC 507 South Natchez Street c. 1920

A one-story asbestos residence, facing east, with an asphalt hip roof. There is a hip over the full facade porch supported with square wood posts. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf French (new) door flanked by a pair of new 6/6 aluminum window on the left and a large multi-light fixed sash window on the right (which was a pair of double-hung windows originally). Overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

461. C 508 South Natchez Street c. 1940

A one-story drop siding residence, facing west, with an asphalt hip-on-gable roof with a cross gable over a projecting room with a 3-part wood vent in the gable end. There is a brick end chimney. There are 4 bays: 6/1 double-hung wood window, a center (in main block) single leaf glazed (1/2) door, 6/1 double-hung wood window, and a pair of 6/1 double-hung wood window. All bays have storms. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation. Widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends.

462. C 509 South Natchez Street c. 1920

A one-story asbestos sided residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof. There is a full facade hipped porch that continues over the right end as a porte cochere. The porch is supported with square wood columns with plain capitals and bases. Widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. The porte cochere end is supported with metal poles. There are 3 bays: an off center single leaf glazed (4-light, 3 panel) door flanked by pairs of 4/1 double-hung wood windows. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

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463. NC 510 South Natchez Street c. 1970
A one-story brick Ranch, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable (wide) in the center over a porch supported with Doric columns. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. There is an interior brick chimney in the rear slope. There are 5 bays: center double leaf panel doors flanked by a 12/12 floor length aluminum window and an 8/8 double-hung aluminum window set over a panel. Concrete slab foundation.
464. C 511 South Natchez Street c. 1930
A one-story narrow clapboard bungalow residence, facing east, with a hip-on-gable asphalt roof with widely overhanging eaves and large plain wood brackets. A cross hip-on-gable roof covers a porte cochere on the left side and is supported with metal posts. There is a hip-on-gable roof over the porch on the left facade supported with metal posts. There are 4 bays: a single leaf glazed (single light, one panel) door under the porte cochere; a Craftsman-over-one double-hung window and a single leaf glazed door under the porch; and a pair of Craftsman-over-one double-hung windows. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.
465. C 512 South Natchez Street c. 1920
A one-story asbestos residence, facing west, with an asphalt hip roof with an interior brick chimney. There is a full facade porch supported by square boxed columns. Close boxed eaves. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf half-glazed door with sidelights flanked by pairs of 4/4 double-hung wood windows. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.
466. C 513 South Natchez Street c. 1930
A one-story asbestos sided residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with an interior brick chimney and a brick end chimney. A brick gabled hyphen connects to a large asbestos sided 2-car garage that has a 4/1 double-hung wood window in the gable end. The hyphen has a multi-light fixed window and a single leaf panel door. The main block has 5 bays: a center single leaf glazed (fanlight in the top) door flanked by 2 4/1 double-hung wood windows. All windows flanked by shutters. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation. Widely overhanging eaves.
467. C 514 South Natchez Street c. 1955
A one-story brick Ranch, facing west, with an asphalt gable-on-hip roof with an interior brick chimney. The carport is recessed under the main roof on the right end. There are four bays: a 1/1 double-hung aluminum window, a single leaf paneled door with one sidelight, a

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multi-light fixed aluminum window, and an aluminum casement window. All bays set in plain openings. Concrete slab foundation.

468. C 515 South Natchez Street c. 1955

A one-story brick Ranch, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof. The gable over the center section is raised and extends to cover the center porch supported with decorative wrought iron columns. There is an interior brick chimney. There is a carport recessed under the roof on the right end supported with a brick wall. There are 5 bays: an 8/8 double-hung aluminum window over a panel, a single leaf panel door with one sidelight, 2 8/8 double-hung aluminum windows over panels, and a 6/6 double-hung aluminum window over a panel. Overhanging boxed eaves. Concrete slab foundation.

469. NC 516 South Natchez Street c. 1930

A one-story asbestos residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with a shed over an addition on the left. There is a gable portico supported with wrought iron columns. There are 4 bays: 3 pair double-hung and a single leaf glazed door – all are new. The porch on the left facade was enclosed. All bays set in plain openings. No eaves. Brick pier foundation.

470. C 517 South Natchez Street c. 1940

A one-story asbestos Minimal Traditional residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof. There is a gabled portico (center) supported with square wood posts. There are 3 bays: a 3 part window (6/6, 6/6, 6/6 double-hung wood windows), a center single leaf panel door with storm and a multi-light fixed window. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

471. C 518 South Natchez Street c. 1930

A one-story asbestos Minimal Traditional residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable to the front and a small cross gable over the entrance. A porch is recessed under the main roof on the right facade and is supported with a square brick column on a brick pier. There are 4 bays: a set of 3 9/1 double-hung wood windows, a single leaf panel door with a fanlight set in arched opening with an arched vent above it with gable end, a single leaf louvered door (wood) and a pair of 9/1 double-hung wood windows the last 2 bays under the porch. There is gable carport in the rear yard – right side. Brick pier foundation. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings except door.

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472. C 519 South Natchez Street c. 1935

A one-story brick Tudor residence, facing east, with an asbestos clipped gable roof with a flared cross gable to the front, an exterior brick chimney, topped with chimney pots, on the facade. A shed dormer pierces the roof and is filled with 3 diamond-light fixed sash windows. To the right of the chimney is a slightly projecting gable over the entrance set in an arched opening. There is a 6-light fixed arched window in the gable end of the flared gable. There is a porch recessed under the main roof on the right side supported with brick columns, and screened. There is a single leaf French door on the back wall of the porch. There are 3 bays on the facade: a pair of 8/8 double-hung wood windows, a 3-part window with 3 diamond lights over diamond lights double-hung wood windows, and a single leaf vertical panel door. A gabled hyphen at the rear of the building connects to a gabled carport supported with brick piers. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

473. C 520 South Natchez Street c. 1940

A one-story drop sided duplex, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof. There is a wide breezeway between the units recessed under the main roof. Close eaves with exposed rafter ends. The bays of the units are the same for each: a center single leaf panel door flanked by 2 6/6 aluminum double-hung windows. A metal awning covers each entrance. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

474. NC 521 South Natchez Street c. 1945

A one-story asbestos and brick (wainscoting) residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof. A hipped portico supported with large plain brackets. There are 4 bays: an off center single leaf glazed (1/2, 3 panel) door flanked by a 4/4 aluminum window on the left and 2 of the same on the right. All 3 windows have been blocked down to fit the new sash. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

475. NC 522 South Natchez Street c. 1980s

A one-story Ranch, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a projecting room. Beside the projection is a small shed roof supported with a Doric column over the entrance. There is a carport recessed under the main roof on the right facade, supported with metal posts. There are 4 bays: a 6/6 double-hung aluminum window, a single leaf glazed door (2-lights in the top), an 8/8 double-hung aluminum window, and a 6/6 double-hung aluminum window. All bays set in plain openings. Concrete slab foundation. Close boxed eaves. There is

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a gable over an asbestos shingled shed in the rear (right) yard, with 2 6/6 double-hung wood windows.

476. C 523 South Natchez Street c. 1935

A one-story asbestos sided Minimal Traditional residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with a gable supported with wood brackets over the entrance. There are 4 bays: an off center single leaf half-glazed door flanked by a 3/1 double-hung wood window on the left and 2 3/1 double-hung wood windows on the right. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

477. C 525 South Natchez Street c. 1935

A one-story drop siding Minimal Traditional residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with a gable supported with wood brackets over the entrance. There are 4 bays: an off center single leaf French door flanked by a 3/1 double-hung wood window on the left and 2 3/1 double-hung wood windows on the right. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation. There is a gabled carport with clapboard siding on the right rear yard.

478. NC 526 South Natchez Street c. 1960s

A one-story concrete block and brick church, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof. The L-shaped building has two bays on the main elevation: a casement window on either side of a cross make out of yellow brick. Concrete slab foundation.

479. NC 205 Sailor Street c. 1970

A one-story brick Ranch residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof. The center section of the roof extends over a narrow porch supported by Doric columns. The carport on the right side has been enclosed with lattice and plastic. A single leaf screen door provides access into this room. There are 4 other bays: a 6/6 double-hung aluminum window; and a center single leaf panel door flanked by 12/8 double-hung aluminum windows. All bays set in plain openings. Widely overhanging eaves. Brick pier foundation.

480. NC 209 Sailor Street c. 1970

A one-story brick Ranch residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with widely overhanging eaves. A carport is recessed under the main roof and is supported by a square wood post on the corner. There are 5 bays: a single leaf glazed (flush with small light) door in the carport; a floor length pair of 3 (horizontal)/2 (horizontal) double-hung aluminum windows; a

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single leaf panel door and 2 aluminum siding windows. All bays set in plain openings. Widely overhanging eaves. Brick pier foundation.

481. NC 307 St. Matthew Street c. 1970

A one-story brick Ranch, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with a central gable filled with wood shakes and a porch recessed on the left supported with turned posts. The right side has a smaller gable over a projecting room from which projects a 3-sided bay window with a hip roof and 4/4, 8/8, and 4/4 double-hung aluminum windows. There is a gable on the right end over a 2-car carport. There are 2 bays to the left of the 3-sided bay: a pair of 6/6 double-hung aluminum windows and double-leaf glazed (1/2 with panel). There is a pair of 6/6 double-hung aluminum windows on the right of the bay window. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. Concrete slab foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

482. NC 311 St. Matthew Street c. 1970

A one-story brick Ranch, facing east, with an asphalt hip roof with an exterior brick chimney on the right end. The center section is slightly recessed under the main roof and has a center door (single leaf flush with a small rectangular light) and a large fixed window. These bays are flanked by 2 sets of sliding wood windows set over a horizontal wood panels. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. Concrete foundation.

483. C 315 St. Matthew Street c. 1955

A one-story drop siding residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a center portico supported with square wood boxed columns. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf panel door flanked by a pair of 6/1 double-hung wood windows with shutters. A gabled wing connects at the left side rear and has a carport. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

484. C 307 St. Matthew Street 1958

St. Matthew Episcopal Church. A one-story drop siding church, facing east, with a tall asphalt front gable roof, a pointed arch stained glass window and double-leaf paneled doors in this main block. A gabled portico covers the entrance and is supported by square wood box columns. Connected with a metal balustrade. On top of this gable is a large square box, with vents in each side, which supports an eight-sided steeple with a pyramidal roof which ends in a wall with a cross atop it. The building is a "T" with the top of the "T" being a long gabled wing with the same bays in each half: a 2/2 double-hung wood window and a single leaf French door

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with sidelights, protected by a gabled portico supported by square boxed wood columns. There is a gabled room extending to the rear from the right side of the "T." Widely overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

485. C 214 Tipton Street c. 1940

A one-story narrow clapboard residence, facing west, with an asphalt hip roof with a gable over a projecting room on the right. The wrap-around porch is covered with a low hip roof supported by square wood columns with plain capitals and bases. There are 3 bays: a pair of windows filled with new aluminum sash; a single leaf glazed (3 stepped lights) door with transom; and a bay filled with an aluminum sash. All bays set in plain openings. Widely overhanging eaves. Brick pier foundation.

486. C 218 Tipton Street c. 1940

A one-story narrow clapboard bungalow residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof. The full width front porch is recessed under the main roof and is supported by square wood columns resting on brick piers. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf glazed door (4-lights, 2 panel) flanked by pairs of 4/1 double-hung wood windows. Widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation. There is a metal gabled shed.

487. NC 220 Tipton Street c. 1970

A one-story board and batten residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof. There are 3 bays: a pair of 1/1 double-hung aluminum windows; a single leaf paneled door with storm door and a 1/1 aluminum sliding window. Overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

488. NC 222 Tipton Street c. 1980

A yellow brick one-story Ranch residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof which extends slightly to the front left over a porch supported with square brick columns. There is a carport recessed under the main roof on the left. There are 4 bays: 3 double-hung aluminum windows and a single leaf glazed door. There is a single leaf wood door in the carport. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

489. C 229 Tipton Street c. 1930

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A one-story drop siding bungalow residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with exposed rafter ends. The full width front porch is recessed under the main roof which is supported by square tapered wood columns. There are 4 bays: 2 single leaf glazed doors (4-light, 2 panels) and 2 4/4 double-hung wooden windows. There is a new single balustrade and a wheelchair ramp. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

490. C 301 Tipton Street c. 1930

A one-story narrow clapboard bungalow residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof. The full facade front porch is recessed under the main roof and is supported by paired wood posts in-filled with cutwork. There are 4 bays: 2 single leaf panel doors (center) and 2 4/4 double-hung wood windows. There is a single wooden balustrade. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

491. C 312 Tipton Street c. 1894

A one-story vinyl-over-clapboard church, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof which is pierced by a square steeple with a bay roof. There are 3 bays: double-leaf paneled doors with a boarded up transom and 2 bays which have been blocked down and filled with aluminum double-hung sash. Next door (left) is a small metal gabled building with metal windows and a single leaf door (Christian Education Black Cultural Site.) Moderately overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

492. C 309 Victoria Lane c. 1930

A one-story drop siding residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof. The full-width front porch is recessed under the main roof and is supported with square wood columns resting on concrete blocks. The porch floor has been replaced with concrete. There are 4 bays: 2 center single leaf panel doors and 2 double-hung aluminum replacement windows. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

493. C 312 Victoria Lane c. 1955

A one-story, brick residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof. The roof slope on the right continues over an addition with a single leaf panel door, and a 1/1 aluminum window. There are 3 bays in the main block: a center single leaf paneled door and 2 2/2 aluminum double-hung windows. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Concrete slab foundation.

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494. C 314 Victoria Lane c. 1949
A one-story drop siding duplex, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with exposed rafter ends. There are 6 bays: a 4/1 double-hung wood window, a pair of double-hung wood windows with 4/1, 3/1; 2 single leaf glazed doors (1/2); a pair of 3/1 double-hung windows and a 4/1 double-hung wood window. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.
495. NC 317 Victoria Lane c. 1960
A one-story board and batten residence, facing north, with an asphalt gable roof with a shed over a center porch supported with paired wood posts with pieces between it as decoration. There are 3 bays all new: center door (single leaf) and 2 windows. All bays set in plain openings. Widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends on porch. Brick pier foundation.
496. C 318 Victoria Lane c. 1940
A one-story drop siding residence, facing south, with a standing seam metal gable roof with exposed rafter ends. There is a porch recessed under the main roof on the left side supported with square wood posts. There are 2 bays: a single leaf new door and a 4/4 double-hung wood window. There is a door filled in on the side off the porch. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.
497. C 320 Victoria Lane c. 1950
A one-story narrow clapboard residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with exposed rafter ends. The full width front porch is recessed under the main roof supported with square wood columns. There are 4 bays: 2 center single leaf glazed (1/2) doors and 2 4/4 double-hung wood windows.
498. C 321 Victoria Lane c. 1950
A one-story clapboard residence, facing north, with a standing seam metal gable roof. There is a metal covered shed roof over a center porch supported by heavy square wood columns. There are 4 bays filled with new double-hung windows (3) and a new single leaf glazed door. All bays set in plain openings. Closed boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation.
499. C 322 Victoria Lane c. 1950
A one-story vinyl covered residence, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof with exposed rafter ends. There are 3 bays: a 4/4 double-hung wood window, a single leaf glazed

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(new) door and a 4/4 double-hung wood window. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

500. C 100 East Washington Street c. 1920

A one-story brick traditional commercial building, facing south, with a flat roof behind a stepped parapet. The off-center entrance is filled with double leaf glazed wood doors flanked by plate glass windows over stuccoed bulkheads. The transom panel is covered with wood panels. Concrete slab foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

501. C 104 East Washington Street c. 1920

A one-story painted brick traditional commercial building, facing south, with a flat roof behind a stepped parapet. The storefront has been remodeled and now has 4 sliding 1/1 windows (aluminum) and a new single leaf glazed door. The transom panel is covered with panels. A cloth awning stretches across the front. Concrete slab foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

502. C 106 East Washington Street c. 1886

A one-story brick traditional commercial building, facing south, with a flat roof behind a pedimented parapet. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf new door flanked by 2 new 6/6 double-hung aluminum windows. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

503. C 108 (408) East Washington Street c. 1880

A one-story brick traditional commercial building, facing south, with a flat roof behind a flat corbelled parapet. There is a standing seam shed awning over the facade supported with metal poles attached to the building at a 45° angle. There storefront is filled with double leaf (1/2) glazed doors (wood) flanked by plate glass windows over molded panel bulkheads. Cast iron pilasters divide the storefront. There is a tall transom panel across the facade.

504a. C 110 East Washington Street c. 1925

First Methodist Church. This church has two buildings: east and west. The east building is a two-story brick and stone church building with an asphalt gable roof with cornice returns and brick quoins along the sides of the façade. The center section projects slightly and is covered with a gable which appears to be supported by the four plain Doric pilasters equally spaced across the façade. There are three double-leaf paneled doors with transoms between the pilasters on the first floor and 3 9/6 wood windows on the second floor between the pilasters. Atop the roof is a square-based steeple that has a square section on top of the base filled with arched vents

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flanked by paired pilasters off each side. Atop this is an 8-sided block which is capped with a tall pyramidal roof.

504b. C 110 East Washington Street c. 1950s

First Methodist Church. The west building is a one-story front gabled brick church on a tall raised basement. There are hipped wings on each side. The full-façade porch is recessed under the main roof supported with tall Doric columns, paired on the ends. There are three bays: 3 tall oversized panels with fanlights with small doors set into the panels.

505. NC 113 East Washington Street c. 1900

A one-story brick and stucco traditional commercial building, facing north, with a hip roof behind a metal covered parapet. There is a wood-shake covered mansard across the façade. There are 3 bays: an off-center single leaf plate glass door flanked by plate glass windows. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

506. NC 115 East Washington Street c. 1900

A one-story brick traditional commercial building, facing north, with a flat roof behind a corbelled flat parapet. The storefront has been covered with vertical plywood siding and then new bays have been inserted. The storefront is divided into 2 storefronts, the left wider than the first. The left is a single leaf glazed door (3/4) recessed flanked with plate glass windows and a 1/1 double-hung aluminum window. The right storefront is single leaf glazed (3/4) recessed and flanked with plate glass and a double-hung aluminum window on the left and a plate glass on the right. All bays set in plain openings.

507. NC 117 East Washington Street c. 1960

A one-story brick traditional commercial building, facing north, with a flat roof with a shed in the middle sloping to the left. There is a wood shake mansard attached to the façade. The storefront is filled with plate glass windows set in aluminum frames over brick bulkhead. The off-center door is single leaf plate glass. All bays set in plain openings.

508. PL 200 East Washington Street c. 1900

D. L. Brown Home. A two-story clapboard Queen Anne style residence, facing south, with an asphalt hip roof with cross gables enhanced with keyhole windows. The two-tiered full-façade porch is supported with columns joined by a turned balustrade. The right end of the porch is enhanced with a turret which has a modillioned cornice.

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509. NC 201 East Washington Street c. 1990

A one-story brick commercial building, facing north, with a flat roof. One entrance on the left is recessed under the main roof and is supported with a decorative wrought column. There are 2 bays: a single leaf plate glass door and a plate glass window. All bays set in plain openings. Concrete slab foundation.

510. NC 221 East Washington Street c. 1970s

A two-story modern brick and concrete bank building, facing north, with a flat roof. There are a series of plate glass windows and doors on the first floor and series of plate glass windows and concrete panels on the second floor. There is a portico with a flat roof supported with metal posts at the entrance. All bays set in plain openings. Concrete slab foundation.

511. C 222 East Washington Street c. 1930

United States Post Office (Kosciusko City Hall). A one-story brick former post office building, facing south, with a flat roof. A stone belt course runs around the building and connects into a slightly projecting entry. This projection has stone pilasters supporting a pedimented entablature with modillions. The entry is new double-leaf French door with a fanlight. On either side of the door are 2 new 10/10 double-hung vinyl windows set over panels with fanlights above set in arched openings with keystones. The panels sit on a watertable that runs around the building. There is an addition on the rear that appears to have been designed as a loading dock when the building was a post office. There are corbelled quoins on each corner of the main block.

512. PL corner East Washington Street and North Huntington c. 1899

First Presbyterian Church. A brick Romanesque Revival church building, with an asphalt shingle hipped roof over a predominantly square plan. There are two towers and two large gable bays. The south tower forms the main entrance to the building at the corner of Huntington and Washington streets, with an entry door (multi-panel wood with stained glass fanlight) and steps addressing each street. Both towers possess intricate brick detailing, double-hung windows, crenellation, and arches.

513. C 100 West Washington Street c. 1890

A two-story painted brick traditional commercial building, facing south, with a flat roof. The storefront is filled with plate glass windows over new vertical siding bulkheads, double leaf

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aluminum plate glass doors with transom. There is no transom panel. The second floor has 2 multi-light casement windows. The right elevation has 6 1/1 double-hung wood windows on the second floor. There is a two-story addition at the rear shorter than the main block.

514. C 102 West Washington Street c. 1890s

A one-story brick traditional commercial building, facing south, with a flat roof. The storefront is filled with a large plate glass window over a new brick bulkhead and a recessed single leaf glazed wood (3/4) door with transom. There is a fluted aluminum panel across the front of the plate glass. There is no transom panel.

515. NC 106 West Washington Street c. 1890s

A one-story brick traditional commercial building, facing south, with a flat roof. The upper third of the facade is covered by a pierced metal panel. The storefront is filled with display windows with plate glass over tall new brick bulkheads. The center entry is a single leaf plate glass (aluminum) door with sidelights and transom. There is no transom panel. All bays set in plain openings.

516. NC 122 West Washington Street c. 1890

A two-story brick and exposed aggregate (1st floor) traditional commercial building, facing south, with a flat roof. The first floor has 4 bays: a plate glass window, double leaf plate glass doors, a plate glass window, and a single leaf plate glass aluminum door. No transom panel. There are 3 bays on the second floor: 6/6 double-hung wood windows with a wood arched panel above each.

517. NC 124 West Washington Street c. 1910

A one-story brick traditional commercial building, facing south, with a flat roof. The storefront is all new plate glass with plate glass doors. There is no transom panel.

518. NC 126 West Washington Street c. 1950

A one-story brick traditional commercial building, facing south, with a flat roof. The façade is filled with new plate glass windows. No transom panel.

519. NC 132 West Washington Street c. 1890

E. Claude Spain Grocery Building. A one-story painted brick traditional commercial building, facing south, with a flat roof. The façade is divided by cast iron pilasters. There are

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three sets of plate glass windows over wood panels and double-leaf glazed (3/4) doors with transom and panel above.

520. NC 134 West Washington Street c. 2006

Merchants and Farmers Bank. A three-story modern brick corner commercial building, facing south, with a flat roof and a square clock tower in the corner with a standing seam metal pyramidal roof with a square vent with hip roof projecting from the top. The building sits on a stuccoed base with pilasters of brick extending from raised stuccoed bases to just below the parapet. The pilasters support a heavy molded cornice on each side elevation. The entrance is on the canted corner and is aluminum plate glass doors. A gabled (standing seam metal roof) covers the portico supported with concrete paired Doric columns on tall bases supporting a wide plain entablature. Above the portico is a pair of 4/1 double-hung alum and above that on the third floor, a pair of double leaf French doors with a balcony supported with large consoles and finished with an iron balustrade. There are three of these on the third floor on the south elevation with a pair of French doors. On the third floor of the west elevation there is a double-sized balcony in the middle with three pair of French doors, flanked by two of the smaller sized balconies. On the first floor south elevation are a two-light fixed window with transom and two pair of 4/1 double-hung aluminum windows with transoms. The second floor has three of the same windows without transoms. The west elevation has a gable centered on the roof, flush with the wall.

521. C West Washington Street c. not available
A wooden and metal train caboose.

522. NC 230 West Washington Street 1975

Attala County Chancery Court Building. A one-story brick public building, facing south, with a slate gable roof with paired end chimneys. There are two gabled dormers with 6/6 double-hung wood windows. The rear slope of the roof is pierced by a 6-sided cupola with a pyramidal roof. There is a tall center porch covered by a gable roof (with a fan light in the gable end) supported with wood Doric columns. The center entrance is double-leaf paneled doors with a multi-light transom set in an opening flanked by fluted pilasters supporting a plain entablature. On either side of the porch are 2 8/8 double-hung wood windows with shutters.

523. NC 218 West Washington Street c. 1970s
(number is correct, but out of sequence with adjacent properties)

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A one-story clapboard commercial building, facing south, with an asphalt gable roof pierced by three arched vents. There are five bays: a center single-leaf panel door with sidelights flanked by 2 9/9 vinyl windows. The center porch is covered by a shed roof supported by wood Doric columns connected with a metal balustrade.

524. NC 229 West Washington Street c. 1980s

A one-story brick commercial building, facing north, with a flat roof. There is a hipped wood shake roof over an awning that protects the corner. It is supported by metal poles. The bays are plate glass windows under the awning and double-leaf plate glass doors.

525. C 108 North Wells Street c. 1930

A one-story narrow clapboard residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. A gabled portico is supported by decorative wrought iron posts and the gable end is arched. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf glazed (4-lights, 3 panel) door flanked by pairs of 4/1 double-hung wood windows. There is a large two-story clapboard garage with a standing seam metal gable roof. There are 3 bays on the first floor: a pair of 3/1 double-hung wood windows; double leaf clapboard doors and an opening for an automobile. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

526. NC 109 North Wells Street c. 1990s

A one-story metal commercial building, facing south, with a metal gable roof with a metal portable building next to it.

527. C 110 North Wells Street c. 1930

A one-story narrow clapboard residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof. There is a large exterior brick chimney on the facade with a cross gable directly behind it. A corner porch on the north side is screened and the opening on the facade is arched. There are 2 bays: a pair of 3/1 double-hung wood windows and a single leaf glazed door with fanlight. A small hipped door is supported by heavy wooden brackets. Brick pier foundation. Moderately overhanging eaves. All bays set in plain openings.

528. NC 111 North Wells Street c. 1980s

A one-story metal commercial building, facing east, with a gable roof and metal awnings. There are plate glass doors and plate glass windows.

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529. C 112 North Wells Street c. 1930
A one-story vinyl-over-narrow clapboard residence west, with a metal covered gable roof. There is a large painted exterior brick chimney on the facade with a cross gable centered directly behind it. A larger cross gable with cornice returns projects from the other end of the facade and a small porch is recessed on the right with a small gabled roof supported by decorative wrought iron columns projecting slightly. There are 4 bays: a series of 3 wooden louvered sash; a single leaf panel door; and 2 multi-light casements windows. Widely overhanging eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.
530. NC 115 North Wells Street c. 1980s
A one-story brick commercial building, facing east, with a flat roof and a flared hip awning all the way around. There are plate glass doors on either end and three sets of vertical fixed glass floor-length windows.
531. PL 121 North Wells Street c. 1884
Jackson-Niles House. A two-story clapboard Queen Anne residence, facing east, with a hip roof and cross gables. The one-story wrap-around porch has a hip roof supported with turned posts, highlighted by a turned balustrade and spindle frieze. There are two balconies on the front and rear elevations which contain the same ornamentation. The right corner of the house is dominated by a three-story tower capped with a hip roof. Windows are 1/1 double-hung wood and the entrance is a single-leaf glazed door with transom.
532. NC 130-140 North Wells Street c. 1980s
A modern one-story brick commercial building, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof which extends over a porch the width of the building. 21 bays, 7 storefronts. Plain eaves. Concrete slab foundation.
533. C 203 North Wells Street c. 1880
A one-story brick Queen Anne residence, facing east, with an asphalt hip roof with a cross gable over a projecting room with cornice returns, jigsawed vergeboard, cresting, and a Palladian window in the gable end. There is cresting along the ridge of the room. There is an eight-sided tower on the right façade capped with a pyramidal roof and a weathervane. There is a small gabled dormer in the main roof with a multi-light fixed sash. There is a flat roof over the porch that is set on the right of the projecting section. The roof is supported with fluted composite columns resting on brick piers with concrete caps and a brick knee wall. The cornice

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of the porch and the main block are bracketed (paired). There are 6 bays: a large fixed multi-light window with stained glass (rectangular) transom all set in arched openings, a single-leaf glazed (1/2) door with sidelights and transom set in an arched opening, and 3 1/1 double-hung wood windows all set in arched openings.

534. C 205 North Wells Street c. 1920

A one-story brick bungalow, facing east, with an asphalt hip roof with 2 interior brick chimneys. The gabled front porch extends from the left side of the facade and is supported with tapered square wood columns on brick piers. There are wood shakes in the gable end and a diamond wood vent. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf French door and 2 pair of 6/1 double-hung wood windows. Widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

535. C 210 North Wells Street c. 1930

A one-story clapboard residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with exposed rafter ends. There is a corner porch (left) recessed under the main roof supported with square wood columns (resting on a low brick wall) in arched openings. The gable ends are supported by large plain brackets. There are 2 bays: a pair of multi-light/1 double-hung wood windows and a 4/1 double-hung wood window. The single leaf glazed door with one side light is set into the side of the porch. Widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

536. C 212 North Wells Street c. 1920

A one-story clapboard residence, facing west, with an asphalt hip roof with a gable to the right. The full facade porch is covered with a hip-to-gable roof (really an extension of main roof) and is supported with square box wood columns. There is a large gabled dormer with a pair of single light fixed sash window. There are 5 bays: a center single leaf French door with multi-light sidelights flanked by 1/1 double-hung wood windows. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

537. NC 213 North Wells Street c. 1990

A one-story brick (wainscoting) and vinyl residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof. The left front bay projects and the porch runs from the edge of this bay across the facade and is recessed under the main roof supported with metal posts. There are 4 bays: 3 pair 9/9

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double-hung windows and a single leaf French offset door. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

538. PL 107 South Wells Street c. 1882

Jackson-Browne House. A two story clapboard L-front Queen Anne residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof and a cross gable with fishscale shingles in the gable end. There is a three-sided bay window on each end of the L, which is capped with a three-sided porch with low hip roof. These bays are accented with a bracketed cornice (1st floor) and spindle balustrade, turned posts and jigsawn frieze. A two-tiered porch occupies the width of the house from the left of the projection. The first floor porch extends to the front edge of the projection and has a hip roof, while the second floor porch is recessed back and is covered with a shed roof. Both floors have turned posts and spindle balustrades and jigsawn friezes. The entrance is a single-leaf one-light, one-panel wood door with transom.

539. C 201 South Wells Street c. 1910

A one-and-a-half story vinyl-over-clapboard residential building, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof. While the house has a Wells Address, the original façade faces Goodman Street. The original full façade porch is recessed under the main roof which is supported by large wood Doric columns with a vinyl entablature. A porch has been added along the east elevation and is covered with a shed roof supported with fluted columns. The east elevation has four bays on the first floor: three 6/6 double-hung vinyl windows and a single-leaf glazed (1/2) door. There are shutters on each window. There are two bays in the gable end with 6/6 vinyl double-hung windows. No eaves.

540. C 203 South Wells Street c. 1935

A one-story vinyl-over-clapboard residence, facing east, with and asphalt gable with widely overhanging eaves. There is a small gabled portico supported with paired square wood posts. A trellis (4') connects the posts to the house. There are 3 bays: a center single leaf glazed door and 2 pair of fixed windows (new sash). Widely overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

541. C 205 South Wells Street c. 1945

A one-story clapboard residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with cross gables at either end of the facade over slightly projecting bays. There are 7 bays: a pair of windows with shutters closed; 3 large multi-light fixed windows; a single leaf glazed door (fanlight with 4

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panels); a pair of 6/6 double-hung windows; and a 9-light fixed sash window. There is an interior ridge brick chimney. No eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

542. C 207 South Wells Street c. 1935

A one-story narrow clapboard bungalow residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with cross gables which have large wooden brackets. There are 5 bays: a pair of Craftsman-over-one double-hung wood; a pair of multi-light wood casement; a single leaf glazed door, a pair of multi-light wood casements; and a pair of Craftsman-over-one double-hung wood windows. The gabled porch extends from the right end of the facade and is supported by two heavy brick piers. There is an interior brick chimney. Widely overhanging eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

543. PL 209 South Wells Street c. 1871

Johnson-Sullivant House. A one and a half story clapboard Greek Revival residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof which is pierced by three narrow gabled dormers filled with 2/2 double-hung wood windows. The porch extends across the three bays, but not full-width, and is covered with a hip roof supported with square box columns with molded capitals and enhanced with jigsaw brackets. There is a jigsaw balustrade connecting the columns. The center entrance is a four panel door with sidelights and transom flanked by 6/6 double-hung wood windows.

544. C 210 South Wells Street c. 1900

A one-story drop siding Queen Anne residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a three sided projecting room. There is a porch with a hip across the main block supported with square wood columns connected with a plain wooden balustrade. There are 6 bays: 2 1/1 double-hung wood windows; a single leaf glazed (1/2) door with transom; and 3 1/1 double-hung wood windows. Widely overhanging eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation. There is a detached drop sided garage with an asphalt gable roof.

545. NC 211 South Wells Street c. 1930

A one-story clapboard Craftsman, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over what was originally a porch. This porch has been enclosed with aluminum windows and double-leaf glazed doors. The tapered, square wood porch posts are still visible and rest on

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brick piers. There are two other bays: a 4/1 double-hung wood window and a pair of non-historic sash. There are exposed rafter ends.

546. C 213 South Wells Street c. 1955

A one-story vinyl, vertical siding, and brick residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof. There are 6 bays: a fixed 8/12/8 window; a single leaf panel door; 3 8/8 double-hung wood windows; and a 6/6 double-hung wood window. The narrow porch is recessed under the main roof and is supported by paired wood square columns. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

547. C 214 South Wells Street c. 1935

A one-story brick residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof. There is a gable over a small off-center projecting room with a corner porch supported with metal posts. There is a single leaf glazed (4-light, 3 panel) door into the side of this porch. There is a gable over a room on the right side toward the rear. This has a bay filled with glass blocks. There are 4 other bays: a 3/1 double-hung wood window a pair of 4/1 double-hung wood windows, a glass block fixed window, and a pair of 4/1 double-hung wood window. Overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

548. C 216 South Wells Street c. 1955

A one-story brick and vertical siding residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable to the front over a projecting room. The carport is recessed under the main roof and is supported with a brick column and a 2/2 double-hung aluminum window in the rear wall of the carport. There is a small corner porch in the "L" which is supported with a decorative wrought iron column. There are 4 bays: a 2/2 double-hung aluminum window, a pair of 2/2 double-hung aluminum windows; a single leaf panel door with a storm door with 1 sidelight and 2/2 double-hung aluminum window. All bays set in plain openings. Widely overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation.

549. C 218 South Wells Street c. 1920

A one-story asbestos sided bungalow residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with a hip over a full-width front porch supported with decorative wrought columns. There are 3 bays: a pair of 4/1 double-hung wood, a single leaf glazed (4-light, 3 panel) door, and a pair of 4/1 double-hung wood windows. Widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends on porch

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and sides. There is a drop siding gabled garage on the left. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

550. C 219 South Wells Street c. 1940

A one-story asbestos sided residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable on hip roof with a projecting hip to the front. There is a vent in the gable end. There are 3 bays: a 6/6 double-hung wood window, single leaf glazed (6-lights, 3 panel) door and a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows. There is a 2-bay gabled garage on the left rear. Overhanging boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

551. C 220 South Wells Street c. 1935

A one-story clapboard bungalow residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with widely overhanging eaves and exposed rafter ends. There is a cross gable over a porch set on the left of the facade that is supported with square wood columns. There are 4 bays: a pair of 4/1 double-hung wood windows, a single leaf glazed (oval light) door, a pair of 4/1 double-hung wood windows and a smaller 4/1 double-hung wood window. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

552. C 221 South Wells Street c. 1930

A one-story vinyl-over-clapboard bungalow residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with widely overhanging eaves and larch Craftsman brackets. The corner porch is recessed under the main roof and is supported with a square wood post. There are 4 bays: a pair of 4/1 double-hung wood windows, a 4/1 double-hung wood window a single leaf glazed (4-lights, 3 panel) door and a 4/1 double-hung wood window. There is a pair of vents in the gable end. There is a detached carport on the right with a gable roof supported with wood posts. Widely overhanging eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

553. C 222 South Wells Street c. 1935

A two-story asbestos and masonite sided residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof. The carport is recessed on the right side. There are 4 bays on the first floor: 2 3/1 double-hung wood windows, a single leaf panel door, a pair of 3/1 double-hung wood windows. There are 5 bays on the second floor: 2 3/1 double-hung wood windows, a pair of 3/1 double-hung wood windows and 2 3/1 double-hung wood windows. Wood stairs on the right side provide access to the second floor apartment. No eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

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554. C 223 South Wells Street c. 1950

A one-story asbestos sided Minimal Traditional residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with a gable over a slight projection on the left side of the facade. There are 3 bays: a 8/8 double-hung wood window, a single leaf glazed (new oval light) door with an elaborate surround (pilasters and entablature), and a 8/8 double-hung wood window. The peak of the gable end of the main roof is filled with a wood vent. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

555. C 224 South Wells Street c. 1945

A one-story asbestos and masonite sided residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof. There is an addition on the rear with a shed roof. There is a shed covered portico supported with square wood posts. There are 3 bays: a 2/2 aluminum double-hung window, a single leaf glazed (6-light, 3 panel) door and a 6/6 double-hung wood window. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

556. C 225 South Wells Street c. 1940

A one-story asbestos sided Minimal Traditional residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable to the front and a small gabled portico supported with square wood columns supporting a small wood arch. There are 5 bays: a set of casement windows, a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows, a single leaf panel door, a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows and a pair of smaller 6/6 double-hung wood windows. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

557. C 227 South Wells Street c. 1940

A one-story drop-siding Minimal Traditional residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with exposed rafter ends and 2 triangular vents piercing the roof. There is a shed covered addition on the left side with a French door. There is a portico with a shed roof supported with square wood columns. There are 3 bays in the main block: a center single leaf panel door flanked by a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

558. NC 228 South Wells Street c. 1970s

A one-story board and batten and concrete block residential, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with a shed over a tall garage, and one next to it over a pair of garage doors. There is

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a full width front porch supported with square posts and connected with a heavy plain wood balustrade. There are 3 bays: a pair of 9/6 double-hung aluminum windows, single leaf glazed door and a 9/6 double-hung aluminum window. Widely overhanging eaves. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

559. C 229 South Wells Street c. 1935

A one-story asbestos residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable to the front and a cross gable over the entrance supported with paired square wood columns (with plain caps and bases) resting on a low asbestos wall. The gable end is arched. There is a large glassed in porch on the left side. The entrance is a single leaf panel door with a small fanlight and is set in a plain opening. There is a pair of 6/6 vinyl (replacement) windows with a sunburst patterned wood window head. Brick pier foundation. Close boxed eaves.

560. C 230 South Wells Street c. 1945

A one-story vinyl sided Minimal Traditional residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof and a cross gable over a projecting room to the front (gable end has cornice returns. There are 4 bays: 6/6 double-hung wood window; a 3-sided bay with 4/4 double-hung wood window; a single leaf panel door in a plain opening and a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood window. There is a corner (left) porch in the projection supported with a square wood post. All bays set in plain openings. Close boxed eaves. Brick pier foundation.

561. C 231 South Wells Street c. 1935

A one-story clapboard residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof. There is a high-peaked cross gable projecting from the center of the roof over the entrance. There is a screened porch on the left corner which is hidden behind a large metal awning. There are 4 bays: a pair of 6/6 double-hung wood windows, a single leaf glazed (4-light square) door (centered in the main block); a pair of 4/4 double-hung wood windows and a 6/6 double-hung wood window in a gabled room set back on the right. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

562. NC 232 South Wells Street c. 2006

A one-story vinyl sided residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with a cross gable over a projecting room. There are widely overhanging eaves. There are 3 bays: a 4/4 double-hung vinyl window, a single leaf panel with transom with a surround highlighted by fluted pilasters and a flat entablature; and a bay window with 3 4/4 double-hung vinyl sash

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windows with small transoms over each. All bays except door set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

563. C 234 South Wells Street c. 1955

A two-story brick (first) and vinyl (second) residence, facing west, with an asphalt gable roof with 2 gables piercing the roof above the bays. There is a metal gable roof over a first addition on the right side. There are 4 bays: an 8/12 double-hung aluminum window, a single leaf glazed door (2-lights, 4 panels), a 8/12 double-hung aluminum window and a 6/9 double-hung aluminum window. Close boxed eaves. All bays set in plain openings. Brick pier foundation.

564. C 237 South Wells Street c. 1950

A one-story drop siding residence, facing east, with an asphalt gable roof with widely overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. There is a gabled room on the left side toward the rear that has a 2/2 double-hung aluminum. There are 4 bays in the main block: a pair of 2/2 double-hung aluminum, a single leaf panel door, a pair of 2/2 double-hung aluminum windows, and a 2/2 double-hung aluminum window. There is a gable over the door set into the main roof. Brick pier foundation. All bays set in plain openings.

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The Kosciusko Historic District is eligible for National Register listing under Criteria A, within the theme of Community Planning and Development and Criteria C, within the theme of architecture.

Attala County, located in the hill section and the geographical center of Mississippi, was founded in 1833. The location of the county seat was chosen for its abundant supply of spring water and its location on the Natchez Trace, the most heavily traveled and important highway in the old southwest. The site of Kosciusko was called Red Bud Springs prior to 1830 and it had been a favorite overnight camping place on the Natchez Trace as it was on high solid ground with plenty of water. Early settlers came from Alabama, North and South Carolina, Kentucky, and Tennessee with some of them settling in the county on their return from the War of 1812. An early pioneer, Chafian Smith, received a federal land grant here in 1834. He donated forty acres to the county as a site for local government. The lots around it were sold to the highest bidders who then built log buildings to house their businesses. In 1837, a brick courthouse was constructed in the center square. This building burned in 1858 and was replaced shortly thereafter. The new court building burned to the ground in 1896, but was replaced by the current courthouse, in use today.

In 1848, the Board of Commissioners laid out a grid and lot system which consisted of the courthouse square, six streets (Adams, Washington, Jefferson, Madison, Jackson, and Natchez) and one hundred building lots. Most of the early houses were rude log huts, and the town grew little until 1847, when it was incorporated. During this time, Attala County was populated primarily with yeoman farmers, with cotton being the main crop. However, there were also over forty industries including tanners, steam mills, and lumber mills. By 1853, the population of Kosciusko was about 350 and the town had three churches, three schools, two hotels, fourteen stores, three printing shops, a weekly newspaper, five doctors and eight lawyers. This strong economy was due in part to a central location and proximity to the Trace, an overland route connecting Natchez, Mississippi and Nashville, Tennessee.

The population of Kosciusko steadily increased to 637 by the beginning of the Civil War. During the war, one-half of all male adults in the city went off to war. The only military actions the city would see were Union raids to steal food, horses, and other goods. Money was tight, taxes were increased and the meager accumulation of prosperity realized during Kosciusko's first thirty years was lost.

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Kosciusko struggled through the years of Reconstruction as most of the state did. The population in 1870 was 577, 60 people less than the 1855 high of 637. The local officials understood that without adequate transportation, as Kosciusko was not situated on a river, it was difficult to transport crops or bring in new residents. Therefore, in 1874, they levied taxes to buy the right of way to bring the railroad from Durant to Kosciusko. On June 2, 1874, the first train arrived in the city. The coming of this railroad and the completion of 88 miles of the Illinois Central line from Aberdeen to Kosciusko in 1884 allowed this inland community to reach far and wide, attracting new residents and increasing its population from 577 in 1870 to 1,126 in 1880. During this period of expansion, large Queen Anne style residences were constructed, some replacing early log structures, others fill in empty spaces. The 1886 Sanborn Insurance maps, the earliest available for Kosciusko, show a considerable number of large residences.

While new buildings were under construction during this period, including a new building for First Baptist Church, fires caused considerable damage to Kosciusko's built environment. In 1886, every building except for one burned on the east side of the square, as well as, the post office and building beside it on the east and all buildings for another block on the east. This economic boom period saw the establishment of an electric light system in 1892, the organization of the Merchants and Farmers Bank (still in existence today), the necessity of a top-notch school system from which any graduate could enter a state college or university, and the founding of Central Mississippi College (1892) to educate Negro youth.

The next decade was a period of great progress with the population continuing to increase from 1,394 in 1890 to 2,078 in 1900. The large influx of people came to Kosciusko because of new factories. The Kosciusko Ice and Coal Company was established in 1896 over one of the Redbud Springs, the Kosciusko Cotton Factory was started in 1899 and by 1901 had 5,000 spindles, and the Kosciusko Oil Mill and Fertilizer Factory was organized in 1900. Additional factories established during this period were the Kosciusko Warehouse and Compress (1899), the City Bottling Company (1903), and the Kosciusko Manufacturing Company (1902) which produced spokes, axles, ax handles, and wagons. It is no wonder that the newspaper Star Herald reported a housing shortage in 1900. Thirty of the buildings in this district were constructed during the 1890s. The residences were designed in the Queen Anne style, both high-style examples (#531, #538) and smaller Queen Anne cottages (#383).

There were thirty-four more buildings constructed in the district in the next decade with many of these designed in the Queen Anne style, Free Classic (#385), or L-front (#332) cottage. Further

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amenities during this time were new brick sidewalks, telephone lines and two new church buildings. The first decade of the twentieth century was proclaimed the best trade years Kosciusko had ever known by the Star Herald.

Another building boom hit Kosciusko from 1910 to 1920s with fifty-nine of the buildings in the district erected at this time. The remnants of the Queen Anne style were evident in the L-front cottages constructed, followed by those cottages influenced by the Craftsman style. The population increased from 1,394 in 1890 to 2,078 in 1900 to 2,300 in 1920. Concrete roads were under construction within the city limits and Jason Niles Park (#293) was established to provide a recreational area for residents. Kosciusko Creamery was built (1919) providing more opportunities for employment. The success of this business encouraged the town's leadership to create an economic development entity, the Attala County Development Association, in 1926, which would seek new business by advertising the amenities of life and business in the "Bee Hive of the Hills." Two large concerns- Pet Milk Condensary (1927) and Attala Milling and Produce Company (1928) located as a result in Kosciusko. The prospect of good paying jobs in a progressive city helped to increase Kosciusko's population by almost a third to 3,235 in 1930. Despite the national depression, 129 buildings were constructed within the district in the 1930s. The majority of these residences reflected the styles most popular during this time with the Craftsman bungalow being by far the most prevalent, followed by Tudor-inspired designs.

Kosciusko struggled through the Depression as did the rest of the nation. They took full advantage of all the New Deal programs offered by the government. This included the use of WPA labor to build the Attala County Hospital in 1937. In 1930, the Kosciusko Stave Mill was constructed, a natural gas system was installed, and the post office building (# 511) was under construction. The 1930s also witnessed the beginning of the development of the Natchez Trace Parkway by the National Park Service with 12.5 miles completed by 1937 and construction to bring the parkway to Kosciusko underway in 1938. Also in 1938, the city's first subdivision, just outside of the central business district was developed. "The Oaks," an early subdivision, is contained within the district and the tree-dotted boulevard of Galloway Street is lined with houses dating from the 1930s to the 1970s (#93-#109) designed in the Colonial Revival, Minimal Traditional, and styles of each decade.

Into the 1940s, the highway system linking communities was expanded and bus lines became more popular, creating the demise of the passenger train. The last passenger train pulled out of Kosciusko in 1939. Gone too was the horse and carriage. In the early years, the downtown area

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was dotted with stables, as is evidenced on the Sanborn Insurance maps. The last such building in downtown was razed in 1940.

Kosciusko climbed out of the Depression and there were 75 new homes under construction or had been built in 1940. According to the Star-Herald, business had never been so good. Most stores around the square had been remodeled to a "new look." Seventy-two buildings within the district were constructed during the 1940s, Minimal Traditional (#556, #557) and Colonial Revival (#249) being the styles most employed. The population jumped from 3,235 in 1930 to 4,291 in 1940 and would jump again by 1950 to 6,753 in part because of a successful annexation which doubled the city's area and added about 2,000 people to the tax roles.

The 1950s also witnessed an increase in population because of the location of a large automobile plant in Kosciusko. Superior's Pathfinder Coach Division selected the city for its school bus manufacturing plant. This was followed by a new Nehi Bottling plant (1955), Wayne Knitting Mills (1956), and Luvel Dairy (1958). This explosion in job creation and therefore increased population, created the need for more housing. One hundred and two buildings were construction in the district in the 1950s, second only in number to the 1930s. These buildings are Minimal Traditional, Ranch, and commercial, and in many cases took the place of earlier residential and commercial buildings.

Historic architecture also took a hit during the early 1970s when an Urban Renewal plan was adopted within the confines of South Natchez on the south, Wells on the west, Adams on the north and Huntington on the east; essentially the heart of historic Kosciusko. The main purposes of the project were to improve traffic control; to provide more parking; to buy and clear sub-standard properties in the downtown area and resell those properties for redevelopment; to move light industry out of the downtown area (Nehi and Luvel); and to refurbish the square by means of canopies, new sidewalks, benches and landscaping.

Through this program, West Washington Street, which had historically dead-ended at Natchez Street, was extended, resulting in the demolition of an early residence and its outbuildings. The Oleander Hotel (1920s), East End Grocery, Smythe Building, Luvel factory and entire side of that block on East Jefferson, the old Baptist Church on North Jackson, Kosciusko Ice and Coal Company and the Ray house next to it, McCool House on N. Huntington, and the old three-story high school building on S. Huntington were all demolished. On the site of the ice company the city built a bicentennial park in 1976. A few other buildings have since this time been razed.

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However, the district retains its integrity of location, feeling, and association through the wealth of intact historic resources which remain from all periods of Kosciusko's history. These resources exist to help define the "Beehive of the Hills: a beehive of industry, of hardworking people who have found the honey of a good life."

Architecture

The district is locally significant because it contains the greatest concentration of architecturally important residential, commercial and government buildings in the city, including Kosciusko's earliest extant buildings dating to 1837, 1848, and 1850 (all Greek Revival residences). The district contains examples of Queen Anne, Colonial Revival, Tudor, Craftsman, Romanesque Revival, Neo-classical, American Foursquare, Minimal Traditional and the Ranch style.

The earliest extant building in the district is the Greek Revival vernacular cottage located at 109 South Natchez Street (#428). Built in c. 1837, the one-story frame cottage has a full-width porch supported by simple Doric columns and features a double-leaf door with sidelights and transom. The Greek Revival style, in both the high style and a vernacular companion, was highly popular throughout Mississippi in the middle of the 19th century reflecting the strong Jeffersonian principles that governed politics in the state. The Niles House, 401 N. Huntington Street (#127) (NR-1998) is another fine example of a vernacular Greek Revival house. The high style is represented by the John Copeland Lucas House, 500 N. Huntington (#133) (NR-1993), built c. 1866. The Lucas House features a full-façade double gallery supported by six monumental square Tuscan columns. Characteristic of the Greek Revival style, the house is sparsely ornamented with a modest entablature and single-leaf door with a transom and sidelights. Although the popularity of the Greek Revival style receded in the decades following the Civil War, the style was still found in Kosciusko. For example, the Johnson-Sullivant House, 209 South Wells (#543) (NR-1986), was built in 1871.

As the popularity of the Greek Revival style waned, picturesque styles became popular. This is best reflected in Kosciusko by the Old Presbyterian Church, East Washington and North Huntington (#512) (NR-1992), built in 1899 in the Romanesque style. The church is dominated by square towers featuring battlements and topped by pyramidal roofs. Large Gothic arched windows open on two elevations while the doors in the corner tower are capped with segmented arches.

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The Queen Anne style is well represented in the district reflecting the rapid growth of the city in the quarter century following the construction of the railroad in 1874. Examples of the Queen Anne style in Kosciusko are generally one-story clapboard residences with hip roofs with cross gables, wrap-around or corner porches supported with wood Doric columns or turned posts, 1/1 or 2/2 double-hung windows and ornamentation featuring jigsawn brackets and patterned shingle in the gable end. This vernacular Queen Anne style is represented by the house at 211 South Madison (#383), built c. 1890. The L-front cottage with a cutaway bay has intersecting gable roofs, jigsawn brackets and turned posts supporting the porch roof. There are also several examples of "high style" Queen Anne houses in the district. These grand houses are two-story clapboard residences with classic Queen Anne characteristics including multiple roof shapes and porches, jigsawn ornamentation, turned posts and spindle balustrades and friezes. A good example is the Col. Chap Anderson House, 402 North Jackson Street (#172) (NR-1987), built by noted North Mississippi architect/builder Andrew Johnson in 1886. The Anderson House is a one-story frame house with a central block flanked by gable-front wings. Another fine example of the Free Classical variation of the style is 310 N. Huntington (#125), built in c. 1890. The two-story-frame residence has a second-floor cutaway bay, a wraparound porch and a scrollsawn truss in the gable.

With the turn of the century new styles found their way to north Mississippi. The Tudor Revival is generally represented by one-story brick residences with gable roofs with flared cross gables, tapered chimneys (some on the façade), half-timbering and diamond-paned windows. The house at 109 S. Huntington (#139) is a good example. The 1930 frame house has a steep gabled roof with a projecting cross gable that gently curves to the exterior chimney, which is tapered and features decorative brickwork and double chimney pots. Nearby, at 302 S. Huntington (#142), is another fine Tudor Revival house. This house is clad in brick and has a round arched door inset in a brick arched entrance.

The number of Neoclassical buildings in the district is limited. However, the 1878 Warren Potts House, 407 N. Natchez Street (#410), was remodeled in 1918 with Neoclassical details, such as the full-façade porch is supported by Ionic columns grouped in threes and the second floor Palladian window. The First Methodist Church, 110 East Washington Street (#504a), built in 1925, has a prominent pediment supported by four Doric columns with three double-leaf doors below fanlights.

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The Colonial Revival style is prominent throughout the district and these houses are generally one-story, clapboard-sided with a hip roof and dormers, wrap-around or full-façade porches with Doric columns. Other features include Palladian windows, cornice returns and 6/6 double-hung windows. The house at 104 Galloway Street (#94), built in the Oaks subdivision in 1930, represents an early vernacular Colonial Revival form with a cross gable roof and pedimented porch with square columns. The house at 213 Galloway Street (#108), built in 1950, shows the longevity of the style. This two-story brick house has a gable front with dentils and a round nine-light window in the apex. The entrance, a single-leaf door with a fanlight, is under a semi-circular portico with slender Doric columns. The Kosciusko City Hall, 222 East Washington Street (#511), is one of the finest examples of a high-style Colonial Revival building in the district. Designed in 1930 by the Office of the Supervising Architect of the Treasury as a post office, the one-story brick building has a slightly projecting entry with stone pilasters supporting a pedimented entablature with modillions. Fanlights cap the doors and windows flanking the entrance.

The Craftsman style is well represented throughout the district. These houses are generally clapboard-sided, one-story buildings with gable roofs highlighted by exposed rafter ends and widely overhanging eaves. The porches vary from wrap-around, full-façade, or corner and are supported by tapered boxed columns, generally on brick piers. Craftsman-inspired doors and surrounds, windows, and vents in the gable ends, complete these residences. Examples are found at 307 East Jefferson Street (#307), built c. 1930, and 214 S. Madison Street (#384), also built c. 1930.

The Minimal Traditional and Ranch styles are also well represented in the Kosciusko Historic District. The Minimal Traditional houses are generally small, brick or clapboard buildings topped with gabled roofs with cross gables. There is little ornamentation, but often a cross-gabled portico supported with square box columns highlights the façade. The house at 225 S. Wells (#556), built c. 1950, is a good example of the Minimal Traditional house.

The Ranch style spans the 1950s and into the 1970s, with those constructed within the period of significance featuring masonry walls, gable roofs, carports recessed under the main roof (on an end) supported by decorative wrought iron columns, and porticos or small porches with wrought columns. The house at 514 S. Natchez Street (#467), built c. 1955, is a good example. The one-story brick house has a low-pitched gable roof, a horizontal axis and an integral carport, all

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Ranch-style elements. Another early ranch house is located 526 E. Jefferson Street (#256), also built c. 1955. This one-story brick house has a partial basement and a side-entry garage.

The Kosciusko Historic District also contains single examples of architectural styles not more widely found in the city. An American Foursquare house, 600 N. Natchez Street (#421), is the sole example of that house form identified in the district. The two-story frame residence, built c. 1910 has a three-quarter front porch and a gabled dormer centered on the hipped roof. The shotgun house, commonly found both in town and in rural areas in Mississippi, is represented by a sole example in the district, 301 S. Natchez Street (#434).

The district includes Kosciusko's city and county governmental buildings- city hall (originally the post office) (#511), the police station, chancery court building (#522) and county court house (#264) (NR-1997); and other public buildings- the library (#140), two fire stations (#183, #279), and a school (#211). Linking these public buildings are traditional commercial buildings within the historic central business district which date for the most part between 1890 and 1920. The traditional commercial buildings are generally one or two-story brick buildings with flat roofs or gabled roofs hidden behind flat or stepped parapets. The storefronts are filled with double-leaf full-light wood or aluminum doors flanked by large plate glass windows set over wood-paneled or brick bulkheads. Some storefronts are enhanced with cast iron pilasters and transom panels across the façade. Typical of the downtown commercial buildings which retain a high degree of integrity are 104 N. Jackson Street (#153), c. 1880, which still has its cast-iron storefront and decorative brick cornice. The building at 114 N. Jackson Street (#157), also c. 1880, keeps its cast-iron storefront and pressed metal cornice.

The district's period of significance extends from 1837 to 1958. This period begins with the earliest extant building to 50 years from the date of this nomination.

The nomination form for the Kosciusko Historic District, Attala County is being returned for substantive and technical issues. The nomination form is well put together, but there are some technical problems in the supplemental information and there are deficiencies in the narrative statement of significance.

The Kosciusko Historic District is being nominated under Criterion C, as an architecturally significant district. Section 8, though, provides only a history of the town and a sketch of the number and types of buildings constructed in select decades. There is no architectural context and no analysis of the architecture that indicates why the district is significant. Please provide a context for the built environment of the district, including an analysis of the types, periods, and styles of buildings.

The narrative of Section 8 does provide a basis for establishing significance under Criterion A, Community Development/Planning. It appears that the physical environment of the town, the location of government and business buildings, the layout of residential district, all reflect the organic and planned growth of the town as it responded to internal and external economic factors. With a little additional information and an analysis of the events, I think that a strong case could be made for Criterion A. Concentrate on the factors that fueled growth, especially in the early 20th century.

In Section 7, when listing the resources previously listed in the National Register, the C. C. Kelly House is cited. We have no record of such a listing; in fact, we show only 11 individual listings for the town, not the twelve cited.



The Kosciusko Historic District, Kosciusko, Attala County, Mississippi, will be considered by the Mississippi Historic Preservation Professional Review Board for nomination to the National Register of Historic Places at its meeting on September 18, 2008.

The National Register of Historic Places is the country's official list of buildings, sites, districts, and structures that merit preservation because of their significance in American history. Listing in the National Register results in the following for historic properties.

1. Consideration in planning for Federal, federally licensed, and federally assisted projects. The Advisory Council on Historic Preservation must be given an opportunity to comment on all federally related projects affecting listed properties. For further information see 36 CFR 800.
2. Eligibility for Federal tax provisions: The Federal Internal Revenue Code encourages the preservation of depreciable historic structures by allowing favorable tax treatments for rehabilitation and also provides for charitable contributions for conservation purposes of partial interests in historically important land areas or structures. For further information see 36 CFR 67.
3. Eligibility for state tax credits: In March 2006, Governor Haley Barbour signed Senate Bill 3067, which created the Mississippi state historic preservation tax incentives program to encourage the rehabilitation of historic buildings. For further information, contact the Mississippi Department of Archives and History at 601-576-6940 or refer to the Department's web site: www.mdah.state.ms.us
4. Consideration of historic values in the decision by the State and Federal government to issue a surface coal mining permit where coal is located. For further information see 30 CFR 700 et seq.

Owners of private property nominated to the National Register may concur in our object to the nomination in accord with 36.CFR 60. Any owner or partial owner who objects to listing should submit a notarized statement (certifying ownership and objection to listing) to Kenneth H. P'Pool, Deputy State Historic Preservation Officer, P.O. Box 571, Jackson, Mississippi 39205, before the time the Review Board reviews the nomination on September 18, 2008. Each owner or partial owner has one vote, regardless of how many whole or partial properties in the district are owned by that party. If a majority of private property owners object to the nomination, it will not be listed; however, the State Historic Preservation Officer shall submit the nomination to the Keeper of the National Register for a determination of eligibility for inclusion in the National Register. If the property is determined eligible but not formally listed, the Advisory Council must still be given an opportunity to comment on Federal projects which may affect the district.
