Pleasant Valley School District #2 (c.1889) sits on one acre of native prairie grasses, on the SW corner of SW $\frac{1}{4}$; Section 24; Twp. 15; Range 20. It stands in a rural area, at the intersection of two gravel roads four miles west of Wellsville, Franklin County, Kansas, (population 1,800). The one-story building has a front-faced gable roof. Along the front façade is a full-length width porch, with a pent roof, supported by four turned spindle supports. The building rests on a cement foundation. The dual, four-panel entrance doors, on the southern elevation are accompanied by transom windows. The north (rear) elevation of the building was widened (c.1920), extending the continuous gable roof. Both the main gable roof and the porch roof were originally covered by wood shingles which remain under the composition shingles. The building is sided with horizontal white pine weatherboard. A brick chimney is on the west eave wall.

The interior space of the building is comprised of a large central classroom, with one small coatroom on the west wall. The flooring is 3" oak or pine; the classroom is sided halfway up the length of the building with vertical wainscoting, above which are affixed the original long blackboards. The two side elevations are symmetrically fashioned, with three long, narrow single pane, double hung windows piercing both elevations; two smaller windows are found on the north and south ends of both elevations. Both the door and window surrounds are plain, milled boards, with no molding. The stage stands at the north end of the classroom, with an outside access door opening south in the extension.

On September 9, 1963, electricity was added to the schoolhouse; light fixtures were attached to the 11 ft. ceilings. A 1960s refrigerator was added, and later, an electric cook stove for community dinners. There is no inside plumbing to date. The school building is used monthly by the Pleasant Valley Community Club. The playground equipment, bell tower, hand pump and flag pole are gone. The building itself is suffering from age, neglect, plus some minor vandalism. The roof and windows are in need of repair, and there is some rotting in the northwest corner of the stage floor.

Pleasant Valley School District #2 (c. 1889) is being nominated to the National Register under criteria A and C for its historical association with education in Franklin County, Kansas, and for its architectural significance as a one-room schoolhouse. The present Pleasant Valley School District #2 served rural Wellsville, Franklin County, Kansas from its completion in 1889 until 1954, when consolidation forced its closure. Use of the schoolhouse has continued to present, by Pleasant Valley Community members for a regular meeting place. The building retains a high degree of architectural integrity; the structural integrity has suffered from weather and neglect.

School District Number 2 was organized in 1863. The first school was held in the Roussey family home, then in their log corn crib. This property is one half mile north of the current school building, and owned by Joe Broers. The first teacher was Miss Rosie Styll, 18 years old. In 1869, the district hired George Lovitt to build a school on the Knoeppel farm (now owned by the Lester Coffman family, ½ mile south of current location) from native lumber. Spelling, Rays' Arithmetic, Grammar, Reading and Geography were studied. Due to flooding, this building was considered unfit and sold to the Henry Matile farm to be used as a barn.

In 1883, Henry Rand was hired to build again, on the present location, and a school board was organized. The oneacre parcel of land was purchased for 1.00 from Albert Johnson and the school was built for 419.08. There were between 60 - 80 students attending. It burned six years later, due to a faulty flue. In 1889 Henry Mignot built the schoolhouse from white pine. On December 16, 1916 the school became the tenth standardized school in Kansas. School attendance ranged from 30 to 45 pupils, ages 5 to 25 years. The district served an area of roughly three square miles.

Pleasant Valley School exemplifies the prototypical, one-room country schoolhouse in its form and design. The one-story, front-gabled schoolhouse is typical of the one-room prairie schoolhouses constructed in rural Kansas during the last half of the nineteenth century. It was fronted by a full width, shed roof porch, which provided shade toward the southern exposure. The transom windows above the typical four-panel entry doors provided much needed breezes to cool the classroom. During cold weather, it was heated with coal.

The school represents one of many one-room schoolhouses that were constructed every three miles or so in each township. These schools were funded with public money and usually stood on an acre of land donated by a farmer. Until consolidation forced the closure of many of Kansas' one-room schools in the 1950s and 1960s, Kansas children learned their ABCs and algebra in small groups taught by only one teacher.

<u>Ramsey's Year Record of Classification and Attendance for District and Graded Schools</u> were the record books used for Pleasant Valley School, with the subjects graded being reading, Orthography, Arithmetic, Geography, History, Grammar, Physical Education Writing, Civic Government, Philosophy, Bookkeeping, and Deportment. Many other interests were pursued by Pleasant Valley, such as quilting for the Junior Red Cross, a Pleasant Valley Baseball team, and a Pleasant Valley Band. In 1892, the students sewed and displayed a large flag for a Columbus Day celebration in October of the same year. Well over 200 people attended, and the Ottawa Herald recorded the celebration.

The typical teacher contract secured an agreement that the young female teacher would refrain from keeping company with young men, be home between the hours of 8:00 pm and 6:00 am unless in attendance at a school function, not to dress in bright colors, or ride in a carriage or automobile with any man, save her brother or father. She must not dye her hair, wear a dress any shorter than two inches above the ankle, wear at least two petticoats, and must sweep and scrub the schoolhouse, start the fire at 7:00 am. For her efforts she would be awarded a salary of \$75.00 monthly. The earliest in hand school records were for 1893-1894 school year, teacher C. W. Taylor, Superintendent J. F. Maxey, with 57 students registered.

Pleasant Valley School served the families of District #2 for sixty-five years as the educational center, as well as public meeting place. Its historical significance spans the years 1889, when it was rebuilt and the doors opened, until 1953, the National Register fifty year cut off date for significance, although the building remained in active use as a school until the following year, and as a public meeting place to date. Today the building is maintained by the Pleasant Valley Community and used monthly for meetings and other events.

Verbal Boundary Description

The nominated property is located on the SW corner of SW ¼; Sec. 24; Twp. 15; Range 20, in Franklin County, Kansas, on a tract measuring from the SW corner of SW ¼, north 208.7 feet, east 208.7 feet, south 208.7 feet, west 208.7 feet to point of beginning.

Boundary Justification

The nominated property includes the one-acre parcel, which incorporates the school building, measuring 24.3 x 35.8, with a 32 x 12.4 addition. The property is located in a rural, rolling prairie setting, four miles west of Wellsville, Franklin County, Kansas. The north and east boundaries are fenced with barbed wire, across which are cattle pasture grounds. The south and west exposure face Texas Road and Tennessee Road, both quiet gravel roads, with pasture and hayground on each side.
