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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Northeast Gainesville Residential District is one of the oldest residential neighborhoods in Gainesville, having survived from the 1870's to the present day. The houses located within this 160 acre area represent a spectrum of architectural styles used in the late 19th and early 20th centuries and, though conservative, are nonetheless good examples of their times and clearly reflect the area's continuing evolution as an important residential neighborhood. The District also has an important spatial quality resulting from several planned green spaces located within its boundaries.

The District is laid out in a grid pattern. The blocks within the District are of approximately the same size and are defined by streets running north and south and avenues running east and west. Lot sizes within these blocks, however, are irregular and may account for the varying density and size of the buildings. The grid is interrupted in a few key places in the District: the Thomas Center (fig. 2) occupying an approximate 2-block area; the Kirby-Smith Elementary School (fig. 3) also occupying an approximate 2-block area, and the Sweet Water Branch (fig. 4) which runs north to south over a nine-block area bisecting the District. The buildings in the District are almost exclusively one and two-story residences with the major exceptions being the former Hotel Thomas (fig. 2), the Methodist Church (which includes Epworth Hall (fig. 5)), and the Kirby-Smith Elementary School (fig. 3). Intrusions (i.e., fig. 6; 506 East University Avenue) are mainly limited to the south and west portions of the District where professional office buildings have encroached because of adjacent city/county facilities. Within the past few years, however, professional offices have been established in a number of historic residential structures; i.e., 636 Northeast 1st Street (fig. 7), 406 East University Avenue (fig. 8), 115 Northeast 7th Avenue (fig. 9), and 618 Northeast 1st Street (fig. 10).

One of the two oldest sections in the District incorporates three of the above mentioned structures. Original Gainesville, platted in 1854, is delineated by Northeast 5th Avenue, Sweet Water Branch, Northeast 1st Street and East University Avenue (fig. 1). Within this area and with the exception of 321 Northeast 3rd Street (fig. 11; recently demolished), most of the oldest structures survive in good to excellent condition. The concentration of these houses, built between 1875 and 1900, can be seen, for the most part, along Northeast 3rd Street and Northeast 4th Avenue. Structures, such as the Bodiford House (fig. 12; 216 Northeast 3rd Street) and its mirror image, the Richards House, with their irregular massing, verandas with pavillions, and turned post balustrade and frieze on the porch; the Blanding House (fig. 13; 306 Northeast 3rd Street) with its variety of exterior fabrics (drop siding and wood shingles) and turned post balustrade and

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Northeast Gainesville Residential District is significant for the concentration and evolution of an early residential neighborhood in a sixty-three block area. The buildings, which reflect architectural styles prevalent in Florida during the 1880s through 1920s, and the public green spaces depict the development of Gainesville between these years. The northeast quadrant of the city incorporates nine former subdivisions: Original Gainesville, Home Investment Company Addition, Robertson's Addition, Sun-Kist Addition, Doig and Robertson's Subdivision, Highland Terrace, and Highland Heights. The development of these subdivisions and the incorporation of these areas into Gainesville's city limits reflects typical residential growth patterns of Florida cities in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. The District has also been an area where several persons important in the community's development established their residences.

Gainesville was chosen as the county seat for Alachua County in 1853 and platted in 1854. The City was laid out in a grid pattern (excepting the eastern boundary which followed the Sweet Water Branch). The original 103 1/4 acre plat, bought from Major James B. Bailey and from the estate of Nehemiah Brush, was designed with four intersecting ninety-foot thoroughfares, which form the courthouse square in the center of the city. Thirty-foot streets formed the boundaries and forty-five foot streets were used elsewhere in the grid.² These paired, ninety-foot thoroughfares divided the city into four quadrants with the original northeast quadrant comprising a portion of the Northeast Gainesville Residential District (fig. 1; that eighteen block section marked by Northeast 5th Avenue, Sweet Water Branch, East University Avenue and Northeast 1st Street). 24 extant structures built before 1900, 19 are located within this portion of the district. Construction of these buildings occurred primarily during the 1880s. Reflecting the popular style of the period, a large number of these homes were built in the Queen Anne style. Some of these are located on Northeast 3rd Street - 216 (fig. 12; its mirror image at 215), and 306 (fig. 13). Another example is 420 Northeast 5th Street (fig. 18).

The early growth of Gainesville was limited until the completion of the Florida Railroad in 1859. Prosperity, however, was curtailed throughout the 1860s and 1870s by the Civil War and Reconstruction. The establishment of several industries (citrus, fertilizer, phosphate and an iron foundry), in the 1880s brought Gainesville out of this economic slump.



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and frieze; 304 Northeast 4th Avenue (fig. 14) with its irregular massing; and the Klein-Graham House (fig. 15; 417 Northeast 4th Avenue) with its irregular massing and variety of exterior fabrics (wood shingles, horizontal siding and concrete block); represent the Queen Anne style which was prominent in Florida during that period. Other houses reflecting the Queen Anne style can be seen in the Original Gainesville portion of the Northeast Gainesville Residentail District, i.e., the Bowman House (fig. 16; 406 Northeast 5th Avenue); 406 East University Avenue (fig. 8); the McCollum-Palmer House (fig. 17; 206 Northeast 3rd Street) and the H. L. Phifer House (fig. 18; 420 Northeast 5th Street).

The eastern portion of the District contains a secondary concentration of pre-20th century structures. Found in the areas of the subdivisions of Robertson's Addition and Doig and Robertson's Addition (both of which were not platted until the early 20th century) (fig. 1), these houses are visible on the 1884 Bird's Eye View of Gainesville and also have most of the characteristics associated with the Queen Anne style, i.e. 804 Northeast 3rd Avenue (fig. 19) with its irregular massing and variety of roof forms and 107 Northeast 8th Street (fig. 20) with its decorative bargeboard and turned frieze. Two Italianate style houses are also visible on the 1884 Bird's Eye View and still exist in these subdivisions: the James Doig House (fig. 21; 708 East University Avenue) with its bracketted cornice, bay windows and T-shaped plan and the W. L. Seigler House (fig. 22; 304 Northeast 9th Street) with its monumental portico and segmentally arched windows.

Significant construction occurred in the District between 1900 and World War I. Between 1900 and 1910 houses were mainly constructed in the Original Gainesville plat section and reflect the transition from the Queen Anne style to the Colonial Revival style. For example, the structure at 529 Northeast 1st Street (fig. 23) has irregular massing, a variety of exterior fabrics but has classical detailing with a boxed cornice and a veranda with Ionic columns. By this time (in 1907), the entire area comprising the District had been incorporated in the city limits and new construction (after 1910) was scattered throughout the area. Two new subdivisions had been platted by this time -- The Home Investment Company's Addition (1902) and the Robertson Addition (1906) however little new construction was undertaken in these new subdivisions until after 1910 (fig. 1). The Colonial Revival style reigned as the preferred style of the day. In the Home Investment Addition, the Padgett Apartments (fig. 24; 424 Northeast 6th Street) with its symmetrical

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facade, and slightly projecting central pavillion with Palladian window which is flanked by bay windows and 406 Northeast 6th Street (fig. 25) with its rectangular plan, and main entrance with transom sash and sidelights are noteworthy examples of the style. One of the earliest bungalows in the Gainesville District, 834 East University Avenue (fig. 26), was constructed during this period. This one story structure has a broad gable end facing the street and stone surfaced battered columns. Several other bungalows were constructed in the district throughout the 1920s.

As a result of the economic boom of the 1920s in Florida, a significant amount of the new construction in the District occurred. Growth in the Highlands subdivisions (fig. 1) was considerably influenced by the interest of the Highlands Realty and Investment Company in the Northeast portion of the City of Gainesville. Development in the 1920s reflected the architectural styles popular during this period -- the bungalow, the Mediterranean Revival, the Prairie and the continuing influence of the Colonial Revival. Examples along Northeast Boulevard near the Duck Pond (fig. 27) reflect this diversity: the Colonial Revival is represented by 708 Northeast Boulevard (fig. 28); the Bungalow, by 421 Northeast Boulevard (fig. 29); the Prairie, by 634 Northeast Boulevard (fig. 30); and the Mediterranean Revival, by 714 Northeast Boulevard (fig. 31). An example of the Tudor Revival style, a style represented by six buildings in the district, can be best seen at 535 Northeast 9th Avenue with its use of half-timbering and brick (fig. 32). A moderate version of this style emphasizing form rather than detail is located at 425 Northeast 10th Avenue (fig. 33).

Alterations to the houses in the district are confined primarily to changes in materials or to the enclosing of porches. For example, the Padgett Apartments (fig. 24; 424 Northeast 6th Street), a frame structure originally covered with weatherboards, was later altered by sheathing the house with aluminum siding. (The Padgett Apartments, however, is currently being restored to its wood siding). The structure at 734 Northeast 3rd Avenue (fig. 34), a weatherboard sided house, has had the porch enclosed with masonite siding of a markedly different width.

The houses of the District are primarily used as single-family residences as originally designed. However, some have been altered to accommodate multiple occupancy, i.e., the H. L. Phifer House (fig. 18) and the Bodiford House (fig. 12), while others have been converted to professional or office use, i.e., 636 Northeast 1st Street (fig. 7) and 115 Northeast 7th Avenue (fig. 9).

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Several green spaces exist in the district and although they break its grid pattern, they provide a sense of continuity since the district itself is heavily landscaped with trees and well maintained yards (fig. 35). Live Oak trees were planted along Gainesville's rights of way sometime between 1854 and 1884. Landscaped medians bordered the courthouse square and extended several blocks in each direction along the paired thoroughfares. In 1884, the median along Northeast 1st Street was limited to one block between the courthouse square and Northeast 1st Avenue. This median was subsequently extended by 7 blocks and exists today from Northeast 1st Avenue to Northeast 8th Avenue (fig. 36). Another landscaped median on Northeast 3rd Avenue between Northeast 7th Street and Northeast 9th Street is in the Southeast section of the district (fig. 37).

Other large green spaces presently used as public parks are found along the Sweet Water Branch (fig. 4, 27), in Roper Park (fig. 38) and around the Thomas Center (fig. 2). Roper Park, occupying an entire block, was originally the parade grounds for the East Florida Seminary. In 1911, it was dedicated by the city for use as a public park. The linear green space along the Sweet Water Branch extends for six blocks and was originally platted as a private park for the residents of the Highlands subdivisions. It is now used as a public park. The grounds of the Thomas Center occupy approximately two blocks and today accommodate the citizens of Gainesville as recreation space. The Thomas Center itself, besides providing the City with office space, is used for public functions.

The scale (one and two stories) and set-back of the structures throughout the District is largely uniform and reinforced by the continued use of traditional building materials -- wood and brick. Because the area has evolved over a century as a residential neighborhood, most later construction has been infill of a similar character for a similar use.

The surrounding areas of the Northeast Gainesville Residential District clearly define the established boundaries of the district. To the west, several massive commercial buildings have recently been constructed. A large, modern senior citizens' residence marks one of the northwest corners of the district (Northeast 2nd Street and Northeast 8th Avenue). The north boundary is defined by Northeast 10th Avenue, an east/west thoroughfare. The houses at 204-224 Northeast 10th Avenue are included as they are the northern visual terminus

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of Northeast Boulevard and are of the appropriate era. Part of the eastern boundary is marked by Northeast 7th Street, which separates the district from a post World War II subdivision (fig. 39). The remainder of the eastern boundary is Northeast 9th Street a major north/south thoroughfare of 4 lanes. The southern boundary is defined by East University Avenue a 4-lane east/west highway and the recent City Hall Complex (fig. 40).

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There are twenty-four houses in the district which date from the 1880s and 1890s and probably reflect the new prosperity. One such structure, the James Doig House, was built by 1882. This 2-story, Italianate residence (fig. 21; 708 East University Avenue) remains virtually unaltered. James Doig, a Scotsman, came to Gainesville in the 1850s and in 1882 established an iron foundry which handled the repairing of steam engines and boilers and the manufacturing of iron goods.

Economic prosperity continued well into the first decade of the 20th century with the establishment of the phosphate industry in Alachua County. Two residences in the district, constructed during the 1900s, housed executive members of the Dutton Phosphate Company, one of the largest producers in the state prior to World War I.7 The structure at 306 Northeast 6th Avenue (fig. 41) was begun by Charles W. Chase, president of the Company, in 1906. Chase died in 1909 before his house was completed The unfinished house was acquired by William Reubin Thomas who completed it the following year. Thomas was instrumental in bringing the University of Florida and the Chautauqua to Gainesville. He also served as the mayor of the city for seven years and as a Florida State senator for four years. In the mid-1920s Thomas saw the need for a resort hotel in the city and converted his house into the Hotel Thomas. The Hotel (National Register) became the social center for Gainesville in the late 1920s and remained so until it closed in 1968.

Another personality associated with the phosphate company, and later the military, purchased property in the present-day district. Albert H. Blanding bought a house (fig. 13; 306 Northeast 3rd Street) from Mr. and Mrs. Horatio Davis in 1901. Blanding was employed as the mine superintendent and assistant manager for the Dutton Phosphate Company from 1896 to 1910. Blanding was mustered into the United States Army as brigadier general in 1917 and was appointed Major General of the U. S. National Guard in 1924. 11

As a result of population increase, the city, in 1900, constructed Gainesville Graded and High School, a 12-room brick public school in the rapidly developing Northeast quadrant. In 1912 a second building was added in order to accommodate the increasing number of students. In 1939 these two buildings were connected. The school, named Kirby-Smith Elementary School in 1940, In appears today as it has since the 1930s renovation (fig. 3; 619 East University Avenue).

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In 1902 a subdivision was created in the area presently defined by Sweet Water Branch (Northeast Boulevard), Northeast 5th Avenue, Northeast 7th Street and Northeast 2nd Avenue (fig. 1). 15 This subdivision, known as the Home Investment Company's Addition to the City of Gainesville, contains 29 residences built between 1910 and the 1920s which reflect many of the historical architectural styles of the era. A variety of Colonial Revival houses were constructed during the early 1910s, e.g. 206 Northeast 7th Street (fig. 42), 406 Northeast 6th Street (fig. 25) and the Padgett Apartments (fig. 24; 424 Northeast 6th Street). A few bungalow style residences, e.g. 425 Northeast 6th Street (fig. 43), exist in the subdivision.

A movement in the early 1900s to consolidate eight higher educational facilities in the State of Florida into two state universities resulted in the passage of the Buckman Bill in 1905. Having the already-established East Florida Seminary within its city limits (and within the district boundary), Gainesville was chosen to become the site for the University of Florida. The East Florida Seminary Classroom and Administration building (later named Epworth Hall by the First United Methodist Church [National Register] [fig. 5; 419 Northeast 1st Street]), served the University until 1911 when it was purchased from the state by the Methodist Church. Also in 1911, the Seminary parade grounds to the east of the building were dedicated by the city as the first municipal park. Presently known as Roper Park, this area remains as one of Gainesville's earliest historic green spaces (fig. 38).

Growth of the city continued steadily through the early 1900s. A second subdivision, Robertson's Addition (defined by East University Avenue, Northeast 8th Street, Northeast 3rd Avenue and Northeast 9th Street) was officially platted in 1906 (fig. 1)¹⁸ and grew quickly during the 1910s. Many of the buildings also represent good examples of the architectural styles found elsewhere in the District. Queen Anne cottages, 107 Northeast 8th Street (fig. 20); Colonial Revival houses, 810 East University Avenue (fig. 44); and a number of bungalows, 834 East University Avenue (fig. 26), are scattered throughout the area.

In 1907 the Florida State Legislature passed Senate Bill 274, "An Act Extending and Enlarging the Territorial Limits and Powers of the City of Gainesville," thus incorporating the rest of the extant proposed District into the official city limits. 19

In 1917, W. R. Thomas had his property platted (fig. 1; Northeast 2nd Street, Northeast 9th Avenue, Northeast 6th Street and Northeast 6th Avenue) into his Sun-Kist Subdivision. 20 Although several buildings were

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present before this date, the Thomas House (Hotel Thomas) (1906), 306 Northeast 7th Avenue (extant in 1884) (fig. 2), most of the houses were constructed during the 1920s and reflected the popular styles of the day. Examples include the Mediterranean Revival style, 714 Northeast Boulevard (fig. 31) and the Prairie style, 634 Northeast Boulevard (fig. 30).

Other large landholdings were subdivided within the city in the 1920s. The Doig and Robertson Subdivision was platted in 1920 (fig. 1) and contains some of the oldest buildings in the district. Although most of these were constructed during the 1910s, some of the others represent the pre-1900 era. Of these, besides the James Doig House and its associated outbuilding (fig. 45; 9 Northeast 7th Street), the W. L. Seigler House (fig. 22; 304 Northeast 9th Street) is also found on the 1884 Birds Eye View. Two noteworthy Colonial Revival houses of the 1910s are 321 Northeast 7th Street (fig. 46) and 120 Northeast 8th Street (fig. 47).

In 1922 the Highland Realty and Investment Company was established by M. Tucker, J. H. Parrish, and J. A. Phifer. This company purchased property in the northeast quadrant of Gainesville for investment and development purposes. They began by acquiring and replatting the Sun-Kist Subdivision. They renamed the area "Highlands" and the new plat showed a 100 foot wide private park which included sections of the Sweet Water Branch. The park is located between two 25 foot right of ways on its east and west sides. Highland Realty then purchased the J. W. Phifer Estate and W. B. Phifer Property (fig. 1; platted in 1923) in 1925 and renamed the subdivision "Highland Terrace." An additional acquisition in 1925 included the Highland Heights Subdivision (fig. 1). The Highlands subdivisions became popular residential sections for the "well-off" of Gainesville and remained an exclusive residential neighborhood in the city throughout the 1930s.

Houses in the Highlands subdivisions reflect the prominent styles of the 1920s. J. H. Parrish, one of Highland Realty's founders, built a Colonial Revival house at 224 Northeast 10th Avenue in 1929 (fig. 48).26 This house was later leased by the University of Florida and served as its president's residence from 1930 to 1948.27 Both John J. Tigert and J. Hillis Miller, the third and fourth presidents respectively lived in the house. Other excellent examples of Colonial Revival houses include 505 Northeast 6th Avenue (fig. 49) and 708 Northeast Boulevard (fig. 28). An example of the bungalow style is located at 438 Northeast 9th Avenue (fig. 50). A Mediterranean Revival house, 430 Northeast 9th Avenue (fig. 51), typifies the style prevalent in Florida in the 1920s. Tudor

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Revival, a style also popular during this decade, is evidenced by the house at 425 Northeast 10th Avenue (fig. 33). The Prairie style is exhibited by the residence at 620 Northeast Boulevard (fig. 52).

Although not officially zoned as a "residential" area until 1932, ²⁸ the Northeast Gainesville Residential District has remained residential in character since its inception in 1854. Buildings constructed since 1930 have been consistent in both scale and use with the area as it originally developed. With few exceptions, buildings of more recent decades have also been designed as single-family residences reinforcing the District's original residential character.

PROPOSED BOUNDARIES OF N.E. DISTRICT RESIDENTIAL


