Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

7. Description

Located in southeastern Boyle County, on a prominent rise overlooking the Wilderness Road, is the Thomas Lillard House. Built between 1858 and 1860, the Lillard House is a three-bay, two-story, Greek Revival structure with Italianate influence. The brick is laid in common bond and rests on a limestone foundation. The house is capped by a hipped roof covered by standing seam metal. Large wood brackets punctuate the cornice. The windows are paired and have 4/4 pane sash with stone sills and lintels. The front entrance in the center bay is framed by a transom and sidelights.

An 1879 photograph of the house shows it with the original front porch: a one-story porch with balustrade supported by octagonal posts. Massive interior chimneys extended high above the roof ridge. Together the chimneys and porch give the house a Gothic Revival air, a popular style in Boyle County. (See Three Gothic Revival Villa's, Boyle County, listed in the Register July, 1977.)

A 1910 photograph shows the original porch in deteriorated condition. In 1940, the existing two-story tetra-style portico was added. Other changes to the exterior included lowering of the chimneys and the changing of the central second-story windows into a door with transom.

The interior floor plan is composed of a central hall, 16' x 40' deep with two rooms (17' x 19') off each side. The single flight stair is located on the north side of the hall. The first floor woodwork is composed of shouldered architrave trim with cornice, while the second floor shouldered trim has no cornice. The north front parlor is distinguished from the other first floor rooms by the egg and dart molding below the cornice. Each room has a fireplace, with a built-in press to one side.

The original floor plan remains essentially unaltered and the house itself is in excellent condition. The original two-story porch in the rear was enclosed with frame and weatherboard construction (c. 1940) to accommodate plumbing.

A brick smokehouse located approximately 40' to the rear of the house is included in the nomination.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Thomas Lillard House is significant as one of two, two-story, double pile, hipped roof Greek Revival structures found in Boyle County, an agriculturally rich county in the Bluegrass region. (A comprehensive survey of historic sites was conducted in 1976. The predominant building plan for Greek Revival structures found in the county were two-story, single pile with rear ells.) The Lillard House's original floor plan remains intact, as well as its shouldered Greek Revival trim.

Thomas Lillard (1815-1891), the builder of the house, was born in Madison County, Ky. In 1849, a year after his marriage to Mary Bright of Lincoln County, he acquired the 490 acres where the house is located. As a young man, Lillard worked as a drover and stock trader, spending his winters in Charleston, South Carolina, and his summers, herding livestock to the markets in New York. After his marriage and purchase of Spring Hill, he turned to farming. He raised livestock, hay, and orchard grass seed, his money crop.

The Lillards had eleven children. The youngest sons, Thomas and William, acquired Spring Hill at their father's death in 1891. The property was sold out of the family in 1901.

In the mid-20th century the house fell into disrepair. Several years ago it was acquired by the present owners and sympathetically restored.
