Description of physical appearance & significant architectural features: (Include additions, alterations, ancillary structures, and landscaping if applicable)

This is a small, 1 1/2 story brick cottage designed in the English Tudor style. The house has a basic T-plan with the principal facade dominated by the forward facing gable. Main elements consist of an external chimney, a porch hood over the offset front door, and exposed rafters under the eaves. The roof is quite steeply pitched and the basic design is asymmetrical. Alterations include a new tar asphalt paper roof covering and aluminum storm windows and doors. The cottage retains its historic character.

Statement of Historical Significance:

Built in 1935, the Logan Fish Hatchery Caretaker's Residence is part of the Public Works Buildings Thematic Resources nomination and is significant because it helps document the impact of New Deal programs in Utah, which was one of the states that the Great Depression of the 7930s most severely affected. In 1933 Utah had an unemployment rate of 36 percent, the fourth highest in the country, and for the period 1932-1940 Utah's unemployment rate averaged 25 percent. Because the depression hit Utah so hard, federal programs were extensive in the state. Overall, per capita federal spending in Utah during the 1930s was 9th among the 48 states, and the percentage of workers on federal work projects was far above the national average. Building programs were of great importance. During the 1930s virtually every public building constructed in Utah, including county courthouses, city halls, fire stations, national guard armories, public school buildings, and a variety of others, were built under federal programs by one of several agencies, including the Civil Works Administration (CWA), the Federal Emergency Relief Administration (FERA), the National Youth Administration (NYA), the Works Progress Administration (WPA), or the Public Works Administration (PWA), and almost without exception none of the buildings would have been built when they were without the assistance of the federal government.

The Caretaker's Residence at the Logan Fish Hatchery is one of 233 public works buildings identified in Utah that were built during the 1930s and early 1940s. Only 130 of the 233 buildings are known to remain today and retain their historic integrity. This is one of 2 residences built at state fish hatcheries. In Cache County a total of 18 buildings were constructed, 13 of which are still standing.

This building was constructed in 1935 by the Federal Emergency Relief Administration (FERA) and its Utah affiliate, the Utah Emergency Relief Administration (UERA).
