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The Frederick and Caroline Richards Cabins are two one story, one room log structures located on the Harold and Vera Dutton Ranch in Perkins County, South Dakota. The log and earthen structures reflect the native terrain, in spite of their present location amongst more modern non-historic buildings. The Dutton Ranch yard sits on the northern bank of the Moreau River overlooking the land the Richards siblings homesteaded in 1893-94. The log cabins remain in good condition due in large part to the dedication of the Dutton Family.

Frederick's cabin was constructed circa 1893-94 and measures 16'6" by 15'. The cabin's rock/dirt foundation has allowed it to sink slightly into the surface soil. The walls of the house are constructed completely of v-notched joined cottonwood logs, chinked with a mixture of grass, wood shavings, and mud. The façade (west elevation) has a latching double door located at the southwest corner. The north and south elevations each have a single window opening. The east elevation is featureless. The low gable roof is supported by ash and cottonwood poles, split depending on size, and covered with a layer of soil in which native grasses continue to grow.

Caroline's cabin is similar in material and style to Frederick's with a few notable differences. Likely constructed a year after Frederick's in circa 1894-95, Caroline's cabin measures 18' by 15'. A rough lumber-framed door is located at the southwest corner of the west side of the house. There is a small window on the west and south elevations, and two small windows on the east. The north wall is bare.

The interiors of both cabins are simple and rustic. The walls, dirt floors and roofs of the one-room cabins exhibit the same ruggedness as their exterior. The only changes are the chicken boxes and blacksmith wares added after later.

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The Frederick and Caroline Richards Cabins in Perkins County, South Dakota, were originally built in circa 1893-94 by the pioneering siblings. The cabins represent a type of shelter built in the late 19th and early 20th century by homesteaders settling South Dakota west of the Missouri River under the Homestead Act of 1862. Perkins County is a predominantly rural county in West River South Dakota dependent largely upon livestock production. The Richards Cabins represent the type of structures the early homesteaders and cowboys built during the settlement of the virgin prairie in pursuit of this livelihood. The cabins are significant under criterion A for their role in the social history and settlement of the area and also qualify under criterion C for their vernacular architecture.

The Homestead Act of 1862 facilitated the settlement of the plains west of the Missouri River, and Perkins County was no exception. Settlement increased in the 1890s when the Cheyenne River Indian Reservation boundary was moved east, opening up thousands of new acres to the west for prospective homesteaders. Frederick and Caroline squatted on two half-sections of land around 1890, but did not file with the county Register of Deeds until 1912. The cabins were built from the surrounding resources available to homesteaders in this pre-railroad era of settlement in western South Dakota. The railroad ended east of the Missouri River, which limited the materials available for constructing new buildings.

Frederick Richards was shot and killed in 1913 during a dispute with his father-in-law. Another early settler, Frank Stillwell, subsequently bought the land, which included an attached barn and cabin. In 1915, Hiram and Mary Dutton purchased the cabin and barn on the property, relocating them to their homestead approximately one half-mile east. While disassembling the buildings, they carefully marked each piece to ensure proper reconstruction. The barn was used for livestock until it was torn down in 1980. The cabin was used as a blacksmith shop and still contains many tools associated with that trade. Harold, their son, fixed the roof in 1982 using native materials in the repair. After Caroline defaulted on a mortgage taken out to prosecute her brother's killer, Hiram and Mary purchased her property and relocated her cabin to their homestead in 1915. The cabin was used as a chicken house after relocation.

The cabins are significant under criterion C for their architectural contribution to the cultural landscape and important because of their scarcity and construction. The cabins constructed along the rivers, where trees were accessible, are different from the dwellings homesteaders built in the rest of West River South Dakota. They are distinctly different from their sod counterparts built in treeless areas as well as the log cabins built further west in the Black Hills. Although the cabins were relocated in 1915, they still possess historic integrity in physical appearance and setting.

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The cabins also meet the requirements under criterion A for their association with the settlement of South Dakota under the auspices of the Homestead Act of 1862. The 1890 census showed a disappearance of a definable frontier line, ushering in a new era of settlement in much of the west. The days of pioneers, cattle drives, and the nomadic American Indian horse culture of the northern plains were drawing to a close and were all but extinct by the next few decades. The cabins also predate the railroad era in western South Dakota, which brought the machines and materials that modernized construction throughout its reach. The availability of milled lumber, iron nails, and the transportation to distribute them soon provided a convenient, less labor intensive construction alternative. These last vestiges of pioneer life represent the crude and makeshift existence characteristic of the homesteaders who arrived around the turn of the century.

The Frederick and Caroline Richards Cabins satisfy the requirements for eligibility under criteria A and C of the National Register of Historic Places. The cabins are significant under criterion A for the role they played in the settlement and social history of West River South Dakota. The homesteading of the free range changed the dynamic of the land and the relationship between the white settlers and the American Indians indigenous to the area. The cabins also qualify under criterion C for their vernacular architecture.

Verbal Boundary Description

The boundary is an imaginary line encompassing the two cabins. Starting at a point 3 feet northeast of the northeast corner of the northernmost cabin the line runs south to a point 3 feet to the southeast of the southeast corner of the northernmost cabin. The line then runs southwest to a point 3 feet from the southeast corner of the southernmost cabin, it then runs west to 3 feet south of the southwest corner of the southernmost cabin, the boundary then goes north to a point 3 feet northeast of the northwest corner of the southernmost cabin, the boundary then runs northeast to a point 3 feet to the northwest of the northwest corner of the northernmost cabin, the boundary then runs east to its original starting point.

Boundary Justification

The boundary includes the two homesteader cabins on the Dutton Ranch that maintain historic integrity. The rest of the property has been excluded based on dates of construction and lack of historic integrity.
