HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

The Herbert Hoeltz House was built for Hoeltz in 1932, 10.20 and occupied by him until his death, in 1964. Thought to be a retired farmer prior to moving to Menomonee Falls, Hoeltz became sole owner of the Libby-McNeal Canning Company in Jackson, Wisconsin. A member of the Masonic Lodge, Hoeltz remained active in community service organizations.

DESCRIPTION

Constructed of Lannon stone veneer and covered with a bluish-grey slate roof, the Hoeltz House form is composed of a hip roofed main block with a two-story gabled bay projecting from the south end of the facade and a one-story mansard roofed addition on the west side. Second story shed-roofed wall dormers extend through the cornice. Round arched single and double windows with stone voussoirs and stone sills characterize the lower story of the facade and the upper story of the cross gable. The arches of the leaded glass windows on the first story of the facade and on the west elevation are visually supported by inset stone corinthian columns, with shafts carved in a twisted pattern. Other stone window wells are supported by small consoles. A winding walk leads to the arched entrance surrounded by large stone voussoirs, which has a door ornamented with a leaded glass window in a Star of David design. A large stone wall chimney decorated with a blind arch in the stonework is located on the east side.

Two windows and part of the wall of the lower west elevation were removed when the one-story family addition, designed by architect, Rae R. Reuss (Menomonee Falls) in 1973, was constructed. Featuring a bay window and a rear glass patio door, the addition was constructed on stone veneer in a color similar to the original stone. A second-story wooden porch (altered from the original one-bay porch) projects over the patio, extending across the west half of the rear elevation.

The exterior, which is based on the central hall plan, has retained many of the "quality" materials and furnishings. Exhibiting the original oak floor and dark oak trim throughout the first floor and the original maple floor in the four bedrooms on the second floor, A the Hoeltz House also has retained the arched leaded glass windows in the (Continued on next page)

ARCHITECTURAL/ENGINEERING SIGNIFICANCE

The Herbert Hoeltz House is significant under Criterion C as a good, well-preserved example of the French Eclectic Style built during the 1920's and 1930's Period Revival Era. Based on the rural French farmhouse and manor house, the French Eclectic styled Hoeltz House exhibits the essential characteristics of this relatively uncommon style, including a slate high-pitched hip roof, stone construction roof and through-the-cornice dormers, and Renaissance details such as the arched windows and door. The house also features the uncommon cross gable that is more typical of the related English Tudor Style.

Exceptionally well constructed of quality materials, the Hoeltz House was designed by architect/engineer Matthew H. Berres of Milwaukee in 1932 for Herbert Hoeltz. The Hoeltz House has had a succession of owners in recent years.

dining and living rooms (stained glass in the living room is a recent addition), wrought iron stair railings, some original light fixtures and the blue/rust/beige tiled 3. entrance floor. Wide plaster molding in an acorn leaf pattern painted in rust, green, and gold colors borders the top of the living 4. and dining room walls. A narrower molding in a less ornate pattern decorates the solarium and the entrance hall. The plain, massive living room fireplace in the living room is constructed with blocks of Lannon stone.

Most of the alterations of the interior occurred in 1973 when the family room was added and the kitchen remodeled to create one large open space. Although the hot water radiators remain, the heat source has been changed from oil to gas.
