

Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Located at the southeast corner of Iglehart and Howell Avenues in St. Paul, the Triune Masonic Temple is a rectangular red brick structure erected in the Neo-Classical style popular in civic buildings in the first decade of the 20th century. The principal facade has four large Roman Doric columns. Recently the original color scheme was restored with the fascia, columns, and trim done in creme, the window sash and storms in black, and the doors in a varnished cherry stain. With the exception of the concrete retaining wall that was added on the perimeter of the site and the cast-iron based, rooftop flagpole that was removed around 1923, the exterior has been restored to its 1910 appearance.

Several interior modifications have been made over the years. The wooden floor on the basement level was replaced with poured steel-based concrete in 1940. The main lodge room's frescoed ceiling was painted over and the wooden benches (presently stored on the balcony) were replaced with folding theatre seats. Some of the original light fixtures were removed in favor of florescent lights during the post-World War II years. Wall to wall carpeting was installed in the 1960s throughout the main floor. The principal lodge room, however, retains its original white-globed light fixtures and one of the rooms on the basement level retains fixtures similar to those replaced upstairs.

A series of engaged columns of five different architectural orders frame the interior of the main lodge room and are particularly outstanding. These, together with a flight of winding stairs of groups of three, five, and seven steps, are distinctive features of this Masonic building which are symbolic in the order's ritual work. In addition, a handsome series of stenciled panels, framed by the columns, gives the illusion of silk-screened wall coverings.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

St. Paul's Triune Masonic Temple is significant as one of Minnesota's earliest and best preserved buildings erected exclusively for the use of a single Masonic Blue Lodge. Its architect, Henry C. Struchen (1871-1947), was one of the earliest contractors to work primarily with re-enforced concrete in Minnesota. (Triune Masonic Temple, it should be noted, is the only structure in the state to have Mr. Struchen's name inscribed on it.) Triune Lodge was, and continues to be, one of the most important social bodies in the Merriam Park area of St. Paul. Many of its founding members were among the influential business and social leaders of the area. Triune was chartered as a Masonic lodge in 1891. Plans call for the restoration of the lodge building to its original exterior and interior appearance. Located on the corner of Iglehart and Howell Avenues, the imposing red brick structure is a pivotal building in the Merriam Park district.
