The Paddock House, built ca. 1870 is constructed of native limestone. It is free from any attempt at ornamentation except for the projecting keystone and stone window-sills. The house, like many of the more permenant residential structures of this period, 1880's, is best characterized as venacular architecture.

The roof is gabled with a very simple treatment of the eaves-line. The upper story projects into the roof area making the house one and a half stories.

The house is composed of two volumes. A large volume sets to the south and a smaller set-back portion sets to the north. The larger south portion has been plastered and painted at some date after its original construction. The plaster has cracked in many places which accentuates the areas where the masonry has not withstood the stresses produced by time and uneven foundation settlement. The walls of the smaller set-back section have no visible cracks and appear to be relatively unweathered. A small frame, porch-like structure now connects to the rear of the small section.

Governor Paddock built the house in 1870 but did not move into it until 1873, when he took permenant residence in Beatrice. In ca. 1873 a brick addition was constructed which connected to the south of the side of the house. This addition was L shaped and contained a kitchen and a large dinning area. Through the years Beatrice grew to the north and in 1927 when 10th street extended through the Paddock addition of Beatrice, the brick addition had to be torn down because it projected too close to the street. The house now stands in it's original form.

When the house was originally built it was situated to the rear of its grounds, serving as a farm house. The entrance was oriented toward the west with an access drive from 9th street. After the town had expanded out to the house and it became a part of the residential district, the entrance changed orientation to 10th street which is the east side of the house.

The house has remained unaltered except for the south brick addition which was torn down in 1927. It has survived relatively well and until 1968 it was occupied as a family residence. It is still known throughout the Beatrice area as the Paddock House and reflects an early period in residential development.

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Algernon Sidney Paddock was born at Glens Falls, New York, November 9, 1830. He died at Beatrice, Nebraska, October 17, 1897. His father, Ira A. Paddock, was a well-known and prominent lawyer of Glen Falls, New York. Algernon S. Paddock attended Union College, latter a university at Schenectady, New York. He was forced to leave the college, upon entering his senior year because of financial affairs. After leaving college Paddock taught school and in his spare time read law. He was admitted to the New York bar and in May, 1857, came to Omaha.

Paddock came to Nebraska at a most opportune time. Nebraska had not yet gained statehood and was in the process of formulating it's political and governmental factions. Paddock was a participant in the organization of the Republican party in Nebraska. He was a delegate to the 1860 Chicago Convention that nominated Lincoln for President. Paddock was nominated Secretary of Nebraska Territory and entering the position on April 1, 1861. While attending his duties as Secretary of the Territory he took an active part in organizing the First Nebraska regiment; bonded the territorial debt, and obtained orders for organizing two companies of carry which latter became the Second Nebraska Callvary. Upon the admission of Nebraska to the Union, March 1, 1867, Mr. Paddock returned from the office of Secretary.

In 1873 Paddock moved from Omaha to the residence of this nomination, in Beatrice, which was his home for the remainder of his life. In 1875 he was elected United States Senator for Nebraska for a term of six years. In 1882 he was appointed to the very important "Utah Commission" by his friend President Arthur and served the commission until October 1, 1886, when he resigned. Paddock served another term as U.S. Senator for Nebraska from 1887 to 1893.

As a citizen of Beatrice, Senator Paddock was also a driving force in the communities development. He platted and laid out the Fairview and Paddock additions to Beatrice and also through private developments exhibited his interest in the prosperity of the city.

The Paddock House is located in the Paddock addition of Beatrice. Judging from property evaluations and the cornerstone of the house, which is inscribed 1870, the house had already been built when Senator Paddock moved to Beatrice in 1873. A tax evaluation jump from \$1200 in 1872, to

\$2300 in 1874, is substantial verification of the south brick addition being made upon Paddock's arrival.

The Paddock House is a very good example of a Nebraska venacular architecture. While viewed by Senator Paddock's contemporaries, at the time of its construction, as a very handsome and even elegant residence, it remained unpretentious, portraying the quiet dignity of the early successful statesman and businessman of Nebraska.
