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Description

This circa 1938 school building, located in the rural White County community known as New Mt. Pisgah, has a style, plan and construction method very similar to other 1930's rural schools that were built with government funds. Its frame construction is covered with native field stone, which was the primary material used by Works Progress Administration, National Youth Administration and Civilian Conservation Corps builders. Its style, which incorporates several features found in earlier Craftsman and Prairie School designs, is also unique to federally-funded school buildings from this period. Set in a grassy, tree-shaded area, the site also includes a small wellhouse located across the road from the school.

The school's rectangular, one-story floorplan is topped with a hipped roof covered with the original composition shingles. Four small gable-roofed dormers - two on the front (south) elevation and two across the rear (north) elevation - add to the building's Craftsman-like appearance, as does the roof's wide eave overhang and exposed rafters. The building (now being used as a single-family residence) is intact and in good condition, although it does contain some alterations to its original appearance. Three new aluminum windows replace the original ones across the front elevation; two are two-over-two double-hung sash and the third is a stationary plate flanked by two smaller two-over-two double-hung sash windows. Aluminum screens cover the two front multi-paned doors, and a strip of aluminum siding across the rear elevation hides the upper half of the original nine-over-nine windows.

The dominant exterior detail of this building is its one-bay, central-front porch made of native stone. The porch's arched entryway is capped off with a flat, parapeted roof that extends beyond the school's main roofline, a feature that helps to distinguish this as a federally-funded structure. Other exterior details include a row of eleven nine-over-nine windows along the rear (north) elevation that is separated by an interior brick chimney; two door openings with concrete stoops on either end of the rear elevation; and a continuous foundation constructed of native stone.

The wellhouse located across the road from the school is rectangularly shaped with diagonal lattice walls, a metal gable roof, and a stone pier foundation. It was built at the same time as the main structure, but its condition is more deteriorated.

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Significance

Although slightly altered with the addition of aluminum windows, the New Mt. Pisgah school retains all of its other original architectural features, including the early composition shingle roof. It is significant as one of the few examples of government-funded buildings in the county and the only such building in extremely rural New Mt. Pisgah. Its setting in a grassy, tree-shaded area adds to its significance, as does the inclusion of the original wellhouse on the site. As discussed in the associated property type for Depression Era Religious and Institutional Buildings, the native stone construction material and distinctively government-funded architecture that characterizes this building were responsible for influencing the design of other buildings throughout the county after the Depression. Therefore, the school is locally significant under National Register Criterion C for embodying and generating a particular form, method of construction and style of the period.

Historically, the fact that this building even exists in the tiny community of New Mt. Pisgah can be traced to the federal relief programs that dominated the Depression era [see Historic Context 3: Boom and Bust: The War and Depression Years]. Arkansas' small rural areas were hardest hit by the economy's collapse, primarily because many farmers were still reeling from the effects of severe flooding in 1927 and a drought in 1930. The community's one-room schools were forced to close until the Federal Emergency Relief Administration [FERA], established by Congress in 1933, began pouring funds for education into the state. When Arkansas' government finally began providing matching funds, and the Works Progress and National Youth Administrations began providing workers, rural school construction took off in earnest, with most of the work occurring between 1935 and 1939.

This federally-funded school building changed the way of life for residents of New Mt. Pisgah. It not only provided up-to-date educational and recreational facilities for children in the community, but also served as an attractive community center for the rest of the townspeople -- something that they most likely would have never been able to build for themselves. For this reason, this property is also locally significant under Criterion A for its association with the federal relief programs' economic, cultural and educational influences upon the area.

Please revise the boundaries to include the property historically associated with the resource. If a portion of the original setting has lost its integrity, please explain.

In Section 3, the well house should be listed as a structure, rather than a building.
