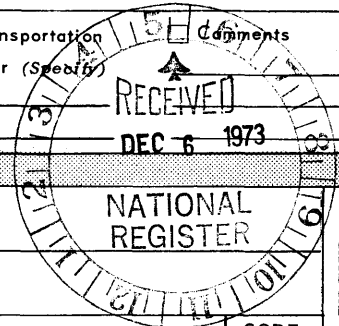

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Dyche Hall, on the campus of the University of Kansas, is a four-story building with a full basement. The building faces east and features a tower on the east side.

The exterior, which is basically a Romanesque style, is of rough hewn limestone laid in irregular courses. The individual stones vary in size. Belt lines are featured at the floor lines plus a very decorative corbel belt along the fourth floor line. One of the building's highlights is the combination of column and arched roof detailing on the facades to give the impression of massive window units. These large false windows are very ornate and detailed in trim, including two carved stone gargoyles on each false window. On the front are double towers, an octagonal one of three stories and a square one rising three stories above the roof line. The top floor is all columns and windows reaching to the detailed cornice with an arcade directly above the arched main entry. The main entrance was said to have been modeled after one of the world's most beautiful portals--that of St. Trophime at Arles, in southern France.

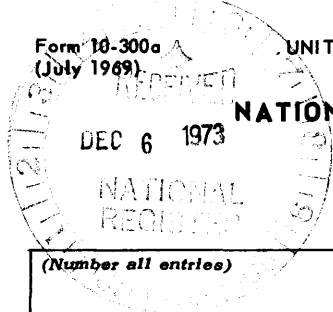
The roof form is in a hipped style and covered with red clay tile shingles. A detailed cornice provides a break between the walls and the roof. The main tower extends well above the roof to enhance the roofing structure. The tower's roof itself is a steeply pitched octagonal form with smaller roof elements on each of the tower's four sides.

The windows vary considerably from floor to floor. Few windows are placed on the first and second floors, except in the towers. Third floor windows are mainly thin rectangles with arched heads. The fourth floor windows sit behind the arcade and are basically rectangular in shape.

An addition was built to the north in 1963 to provide more classroom space.

8. In 1932 Dyche Museum was declared to be structurally unsafe and closed by the State Architect. The concrete floors were not adequately reinforced or supported and had been weakened by the weight of the displays. Consequently the building was not used for nine years during which time the university attempted to obtain sufficient funds to allow for the strengthening and refurbishment of the structure. The interior had to be completely rebuilt, and when that was completed, two more years were needed to clean and repair the displays.

The museum was reopened on June 6, 1941, after an expenditure of \$125,000. A wing was added in 1963, and the building continues in use as the university's museum of natural history.

Dyche Hall is regarded as one of the most distinctive buildings on the university campus. Together with nearby Green Hall and Spooner Hall, it forms a small core of architectural tradition on the campus.

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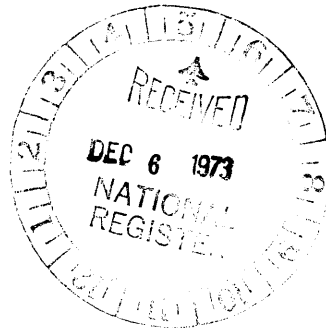

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Dyche Museum of Natural History on the campus of the University of Kansas at Lawrence was built in 1901-1902. Dr. Francis H. Snow, the chancellor of the university, had been asking the Kansas legislature for funds to construct such a museum since the early 1890's. But it was not until 1901 that the legislature appropriated \$75,000 for construction. Following a design competition among a number of architects, the firm of Root and Siemens of Kansas City, Missouri, was selected as having the best design. The contract for the building's construction was awarded to Henry Bennett of Topeka.

From the time of its conception in the mind of Dr. Snow, the building was intended to house the nationally renowned collections of Lewis Lindsay Dyche, Professor of Taxidermy. Dyche enrolled at the University of Kansas in 1877 and joined the teaching staff after his graduation. An avid outdoorsman, he made numerous trips to the Rocky Mountain region where he obtained many specimens to enlarge the university's collection. More than 100 of his mounted animals were displayed in the Kansas exhibit at the Chicago World's Fair in 1893. His work was widely acclaimed because of the natural, lifelike stances of the mammals. Dyche's trips to collect specimens ranged far and wide, including a trip to Greenland in 1895 with Emil Diebitsch, brother-in-law of Robert E. Peary, to rescue Peary. He also accompanied Dr. Frederick S. Cook on one of his polar expeditions. Altogether he made 23 expeditions in the interest of the university museum. Dyche was regarded as one of the nation's leading hunters, explorers, naturalists, taxidermists and lecturers.

The museum was first used in October, 1902, while still under construction. It housed classrooms and laboratories but was mainly the home of Dyche's growing wildlife collection. Following the death of Professor Dyche in 1915, the building was officially named Dyche Museum.

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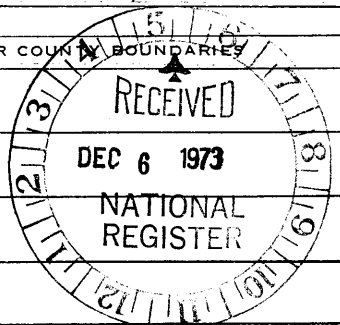
