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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Crowley's Ridge is an unusual land formation running from east central Arkansas into southeast Missouri. Just below the Arkansas-Missouri Border the St. Francis River crosses Crowley's Ridge and causes a distinct break in the ridge line. Where the ridge ends just south of the St. Francis River is the area known as Chalk Bluff.

In 1857 Arkansas Geologist David Dale Owen wrote that "the base of the [bluff] is a potter's clay of considerable purity, and nearly as white as chalk; hence the name Chalk Bluff." Owen measured the height of the bluffs at 135 feet and observed that they were covered with a growth of black and white oak.

At present the bluffs are seventy to eighty feet in height and have serious erosion problems in spots. This may be due to a lack of ground foliage, possibly caused by the clay deposits of the bluff. Tree growth, mostly of black oak, seems to be retarded and may also be a result of the clay deposits. The ferry landing site and road are still recognizable, along with some remains of Civil War rifle entrenchments.

The Chalk Bluff road once crossed over Crowley's Ridge on its way down to the St. Francis River. The ferry site lay where the road met the river. This much traveled 19th century road is now no more than a gulley. Both erosion and scattered undergrowth have made the original roadway barely visible today. Frequent flooding of the St. Francis often leaves the ferry site under water.

The rifle entrenchments used during Chalk Bluff's Civil War skirmish are still in evidence, though not readily visible. Vegetation now covers several scattered mounds of earth which once protected soldiers.

IGNIFICANCE			
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The Chalk Bluff site is important both geologically and historically. The Chalk Bluff overlooks the St. Francis River and lies at Arkansas' northeast point of Crowley's Ridge, an extensive ridge of land which extends from Helena in Phillips County north into Missouri. It is named for the white clay, nearly as white as chalk, which lies at the base of the bluff. In 1857 David Dale Owen, Arkansas' first State Geologist, began the first geological survey of the state at the Chalk Bluff.

During the 19th century Crowley's Ridge provided the best north-south transportation route across the lowlands of northeast Arkansas. An Indian trail and later a military road crossed the St. Francis River at the Chalk Bluff. About 1840 a ferry was established at the site.

The first permanent white settlers at Chalk Bluff arrived in 1840. The Seitz clan, Abraham, Jacob, David, and George, used the nearby open range to raise cattle and horses. Abraham Seitz put a ferry boat into operation between the Arkansas and Missouri sides of the St. Francis River, and opened a small store in his house for the provisioning of travelers.

A small hamlet soon grew up around the Seitz ferry and store, taking the name of the nearby bluff. In 1850 a post office was established at Chalk Bluff, and by 1860 the village had three churches, three merchants, two doctors, a brick mason, a gunsmith, a blacksmith, a cabinet maker, and a surveyor.

### 8. Significance (Chalk Bluff - Page 2)

During the Civil War Chalk Bluff was a strategic point between Confederate Arkansas and Union Missouri. The Chalk Bluff overlooked the only major road between southeast Missouri and northeast Arkansas, and whoever controlled the Bluff controlled the road. Moreover, its location on the St. Francis River made the Chalk Bluff community the collection point for supplies to be shipped downstream to Confederate troops further south.

The first Civil War skirmish at Chalk Bluff came about in May, 1862, when Union forces attacked the area. Their aim was to destroy Confederate supplies stored at Chalk Bluff, and they were successful.

In the spring of 1863, the Chalk Bluff area was again the site of several minor military engagements. The Union cavalry attacked twice in March, destroying the ferry and burning several buildings. In early April, the Rebel forces retaliated against a small Federal force camped across the river from Chalk Bluff.

The engagement known as the "Battle of Chalk Bluff" occurred on May 1 and 2, 1863. In April Confederate General John S. Marmaduke had invaded southern Missouri with a force of 5,000 men. Their efforts to capture Union supplies were fruitless, and they were forced to retreat before superior forces. When they reached the Missouri side of the St. Francis River Marmaduke's men fought a successful delaying action while the bulk of the army crossed the swollen river on a quickly constructed floating log bridge.

Despite the heavy property damage in 1863, Chalk Bluff survived the Civil War and continued to prosper for several years. However, in 1882 the St. Louis, Arkansas, and Texas railroad crossed the St. Francis River two

miles south of Chalk Bluff. The town of St. Francis was laid out at the new crossing, and as the new community grew, the old community gradually died. About 1900 a highway bridge was built at St. Francis, causing the Chalk Bluff ferry crossing to be completely abandoned. Like many early Arkansas communities Chalk Bluff had been totally dependent on traffic routes.


As an early river settlement and Civil War battle site Chalk Bluff was an important part of 19th century Arkansas history. Today the citizens and soldiers are long gone from the site, and even the Chalk Bluff has changed greatly in appearance since the old settlement took its name from the unusual color of the local geography.

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
