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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Designed and built by David L Evans, Master Builder: the first floor between 1859 and 1864; the second floor in 1869 or soon thereafter, using uniform materials and in a vernacular Italianate style.

This is a 2-story, rectangular residence with hip roof and deck, of brick and masonry load-bearing construction. The building's length is at right angles to the street. The facade faces south. A service wing stands at the rear. Railing above the deck is non-extant. An expansion of the house in 1917 added $\frac{1}{2}$ -story to the service wing, a 2-story addition at the east, and a pergola and oriel window on the west. A garage was also built at this time near the northeast corner of the house.

The frieze consists of eyebrow windows alternating with panels each separated by brackets around the house. An architectural belt of two courses also surrounds the house and acts as transition between the Flemish brick bond of the first floor facade and the common brick bond of the second floor facade. Brick color varies slightly between the two floors. The building's material culture confirms its construction in stages as Hedge also mentions.* A stone water table is on the facade.

The building's main block measures 28'x43'. The building stands on a lot $136\frac{1}{2}'x90\frac{1}{2}'$.

The immediate neighborhood is residential. Two churches and a telephone company building stand to the west. Here, broadly, is the boundary between downtown Oskaloosa and the residential section called, at the turn of the century, the "Paradise Block" because of admiration for its showplace homes. High Avenue East is 80' wide. Homes are uniformly recessed from the street. The two houses adjacent to the Seeberger-Loring-Kilburn House to the east are also individually significant and the entire neighborhood is probably eligible as a National Register Historic District. A National Register property, the Smith-Johnson House, stands in the next city block east. Dutch elm disease wrecked havoc with the neighborhood's landscaping in the 1960s.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Seeberger-Loring-Kilburn House calls attention to the career of David L Evans, Master Builder, and to a significant vernacular statement of the Italianate style in Oskaloosa, Iowa.

Evans (1825-1897) was born in Wales and emigrated to America at the age of 14. He arrived in Oskaloosa in 1845 via Ohio and St Louis. Nothing is known about his early training in construction. His father was a clergyman in Wales.

This house is the oldest, extant dwelling built by Evans and documented. The architectural belt which surrounds the house separates the Flemish bond construction of the first floor facade from the common bond construction of the second floor facade. The use of this technique as a transition demonstrates the careful attention to detail and skillful craftsmanship characteristic of Evans, "one of the most thoroughly reliable workmen that has ever been in the city" (obituary).** Three commercial buildings remain in Oskaloosa of his design and construction, the Evans Block the most notable.

Evans was a man of conviction. "It is alleged that Mr. Evans was the first man in Iowa who worked to bring about shorter hours of labor. He came up from St. Louis, Mo., where he had been a young architect, saw men laboring for 12 hours a day, and determined to do something about it."# The old sources are silent on this point. Iola Thomas recorded the above information in the 1930s, apparently from oral tradition. We do know that Evans served as a City Councilman in 1875 and was defeated in his bid on the Greenback ticket for Mahaska County Coroner in 1877. Thomas relates that Evans' progressive ideas about labor met cold response from Oskaloosa's business community.

Frank E Wetherell, AIA, planned a sympathetic expansion of the Seeberger-Loring-Kilburn House in 1916. He was a prominent Des Moines architect. Reared in Oskaloosa, Wetherell designed dozens of homes for his hometown and also the Oskaloosa Band Stand, public library, and YMCA (non-extant). His credits of state importance include: libraries (Bloomfield, Boone, Osceola); courthouses (Sigourney, Leon); as well as urban planning, notably Keosauqua Way and the Des Moines Riverfront improvement project of the 1930s and 1940s in Des Moines.

The Seeberger-Loring-Kilburn House is a good, vernacular statement of the Italianate style. The belt course and eyebrow windows distinguish the house from the other handful of brick dwellings in the Italianate style in Oskaloosa. The building also calls attention to David Evans' career and skill as a builder.
