### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

St Anthony's Catholic Church is located in a mixed residential and commercial neighborhood, two blocks from downtown Sterling. It is a single detached structure of red brick laid in courses of stretcher bond. The style of the church is Romanesque-Revival and the shape the typical cruciform associated with the Romanesque style. There is a flat-roofed two stor tower to one side of the gabled nave and a three story tower with pyramidal roof to the other. Both towers are decorated with crenellations and a pattern of corbels.

The main entrance is within a compound round arch with tympanum and half pillars, which is within a pointed arch. Above is a large rose window. The gable of the nave is decorated with brick corbels. There are two smaller entrances to each side of the main entrance, opening into the towers.

The windows of the church are almost all round-arched with stone sills. Arches over windows and doors and the surround of the rose window are all of light colored brick, giving added emphasis to decorative elements of the building. Windows are all filled with leaded, staine glass.

The outside of the church appears very much as when it was built. The inside was renovated in 1958 with the addition of a choir loft and balcony platform. The lighting was improved and an exit door built in the southeast corner of the church. Another renovation took place in 1973 when the church was rededicated. At that time the interior was updated by replacing the old altar with a new one, and moving the choir risers and the organ to the north amber of the church. The beautiful stained glass windows are the origina

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

St Anthony's Catholic Church is significant for its handsome architecture and for the important role it has played in the lives of several of Sterling's major immigrant groups.

The Catholic minority in Sterling struggled with discrimination and poverty amidst the predominantly Protestant early settlers of the area. It was not until well into the twentieth century that the various immigrant groups blended into the community.

The Catholic Church in Sterling started as a mission with the pastor of the Catholic Church of Brighton, Colorado, visiting the area whenever convenient. Services were conducted in a private family home. In 1888 the first Catholic Church in Sterling, St. John the Baptist, was built on Walnut Street. It was the fourth church to be built in However, the structure was not substantially built and was destroyed by a wind-It was 1902 before the parishioners were able to abandon temporary church facilities and again consider having their own building. An old brick church building on the corner of Chestnut Street and North Fifth Street was purchased, improvements made, and later an addition built. Sterling became a parish on September 1, 1908, when the Most Rev. Nicholas Matz, Bishop of Denver, appointed the Rev. P.U. Sasse as the first resident pastor.

The first Catholic immigrants in the area were Italian, some from earlier settlements in Kansas and others from the coal mines around Trinidad, Colorado. The next group to come were the Irish. With the introduction of sugar beet cultivation in the region at the turn of the century, a large number of German-Russian immigrants arrived to work in the beet The German-Russians were part of a group which had emigrated to Russian during the time of Catherine the Great, proudly retaining their German language and customs over the next hundred years. Members of the group fled to America at the end of the 19th century when the Russians began a program of "russification." These Volga-Germans eventually constituted the largest immigrant group in the Sterling area, and their descendants still form a significant part of the town's population.

A large number of the Volga-Germans were of the Catholic faith and they soon swelled the number of congregants for the small church on Chestnut Street. It was obvious that a new building was needed. In 1910 ground was purchased at the corner of South Third and Cedar Streets, the contractor Neal Hogg of Sterling hired, and construction began. The Romanesque-Revival style was used throughout the church, which was built to seat five hundred congregants.

The church was dedicated on Sunday, November 5, 1911. The name St. Anthony's was chosen in honor of the patron saint of Anthony Giacomini, a member of the church. Mr. Giacomini was one of Sterling's oldest settlers and a generous contributor to the church. He came to

Sterling after having first tried Argentina and then several places in Nebraska. A well educated man who could speak four languages, Giacomini operated a properous homestead. Descendants of the Giacomini's still live in the area.

Architecturally, St. Anthony's is one of the most distinctive examples of the Romanesque Rivival in Sterling. Historically, it is the most significant remaining structure connected with the early history of an important segment of the town's population. It is a most fitting monument to those groups.
