DESCRIPTION

The Guilford, Sr. and Anne Dallas Dudley House was built in 1928 and is a notable example of the Tudor Revival style. The dwelling was constructed at the top of an 850' hill south of downtown Nashville and was originally the center of a large estate. Also known as Hunter's Hill, the dwelling is now sited on a wooded 6.2-acre tract in the incorporated community of Forest Hills. The house faces north and has a commanding view of downtown Nashville. To the northeast of the dwelling is a swimming pool and poolhouse. A paved driveway follows the contours of the hill and leads to the house. At the rear are landscaped gardens and the slopes of the hills are covered with mature trees. The dwelling has not been extensively altered since its construction, and it retains much of its original design and setting.

The Guilford, Sr. and Anne Dallas Dudley House is a two-story stone veneer Tudor Revival style dwelling. The house has a stone foundation, gable roof of metal standing seam, interior and exterior wall stone chimneys, and an exterior of random course stone. On the main (north) facade is the main entrance with a three-light glass and wood Gothic arch door. The door has three Gothic arched panels, quatrefoil panels, and a stone ashlar finish surround. Windows in the dwelling are original multi-light leaded glass casement design. Above the windows are Gothic arch transoms. The windows have stone sills and surrounds.

The main entrance of the dwelling is located in a central projecting bay. On the second story of this bay is a projecting bay window with four leaded glass casement windows and transoms with Tudor arches. This bay window has a stone surround and crenelated parapet. The walls of this projecting bay have wall buttresses. At the northwest corner of the projecting bay is a corner turret with a conical roof. The north facade's west wing has an exterior wall brick chimney and doors have leaded glass lights and Gothic arched transoms. Within the arches are circular leaded glass windows. The west facade has similar doors and wall buttresses. At the second story is a stone balcony with large brackets, a Tudor arched railing, and quatrefoil design inset above the doors. The doors leading to the balcony are leaded glass design.

On the south facade is a projecting polygonal bay with a castellated parapet wall. This facade also has leaded glass doors leading to an exterior stone patio. On this facade is a stone patio and ca. 1970 wrought iron pavilion with a hipped metal roof. At the southwest corner is a three-story octagonal tower with a castellated parapet wall, Tudor arches, and stone exterior. Windows in the tower are three-light casement design. On the east facade is a two-story garage wing. This wing has a stone foundation and exterior of stucco and half timbering. Windows are original paired eight-light casement design. The garage has four bays built into the basement level and the doors are ca. 1970 overhead track glass and wood design. On the south facade of this wing is a greenhouse of metal and glass panels added ca. 1970.

The interior of the dwelling retains much of its original floor plan and detailing. The interior features original wood floors, and plaster walls and ceilings. The main entrance opens onto an entry hall, which has floor-to-ceiling wood panels with tri-part Gothic arches. The hall has original wood parquet floors. Leading from the hallway into the first floor rooms are original, paired Gothic arched wood doors. Within the entry hall is a two-story staircase with Gothic arched balusters and newel posts with floral design capitals. The entry hall also retains an original hanging wrought iron light fixture.

The living room has original parquet wood floors and an elliptical plaster ceiling. This room retains an original stone Gothic arched mantel. The dining room has original wood floors and a beamed plaster and wood ceiling. The room has an original mantel of stone with tri-part Gothic panels. The library has an added tile floor surface, original built-in Gothic arched bookcases and an original wood and stone mantel and hearth. The kitchen was remodeled in the 1980s with added floor and wall surfaces and wall cabinets. The second floor contains five bedrooms, which have carpeted and wood floors, and plaster ceilings and walls. Several of the bedrooms retain original fireplaces with Gothic arched marble mantels. The second floor doors are Gothic arched with original nickel alloy hardware. The two bathrooms on this floor retain their original Gothic arched shower and tub areas and some original tile walls.

To the north of the dwelling is a ca. 1970 concrete block and stone veneer pool house and in-ground swimming pool. The pool house is a non-contributing building to the property and the swimming pool is a non-contributing structure. The pool house has multi-light glass and wood doors and a flat roof. At the entrance are original stone gates with castellated parapets and Gothic arches. This stone wall and entrance gates are included as a contributing structure to the property.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Guilford, Sr. and Anne Dallas Dudley House is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under criterion C for its architectural significance. The dwelling is a notable example of the Tudor Revival style of the early 20th century. The dwelling has not been extensively altered and retains a high degree of its architectural integrity. It features Gothic arched windows and doors, multi-light leaded-glass casement windows, wall buttresses, and an exterior of random course stone. The dwelling is also eligible for the National Register under criterion B for its association with Anne Dallas Dudley. Ms. Dudley is significant for her social activism and prominence in women's rights. She was a leading proponent of women's suffrage in Tennessee and played a key role in getting female suffrage approved in the state in 1920. Passage of women's suffrage in Tennessee in 1920 was critical in amending the U.S. Constitution giving women nationwide the right to vote. After 1920, Mrs. Dudley was also prominent in state and local social issues. This dwelling is the house most closely associated with her prominence in the early 20th century. The Guilford, Sr. And Anne Dallas Dudley House meets the registration requirements set forth in the Multiple Property Documentation Form, "Historic and Architectural Resources of Forest Hills."

Guilford Dudley, Sr. (1853-1945) was a prominent businessman in Nashville, Tennessee, and one of the founders of the Life and Casualty Insurance Company in the early 20th century. The company grew from selling nickel and dime "sick" insurance out of a oneroom office in 1903 to offering life and accident policies throughout the southeast from its own five-story office building in 1925.¹ By the 1920s, this company was one of the most successful life and accident insurance companies in the Southeast. Dudley's wife, Anne Dallas Dudley (1876-1955), was a prominent figure in the women's suffrage movement in Tennessee. In 1911, she became president of the first Nashville Equal Suffrage League. After holding that position for four years and advancing the organization's membership from several hundred to 1,200, Dudley resigned her post in 1915 to accept the presidency of the state suffrage organization. Among other political activities, Dudley is credited with leading the first suffrage parade in the South in Nashville and bringing the National Suffrage Convention to the city in 1915.² In 1917, Anne Dallas Dudley became the vice president of the American Woman Suffrage League, a national suffrage organization. She held this position for four years. In 1920 she directed the suffrage forces in Tennessee when it became the 36th state to ratify the 19th amendment, which extended voting rights to women. As the amendment required the support of thirty-six states in order to become law, Tennessee was the deciding state in this political battle.³ Following the success of women's suffrage, Dudley remained active in politics and in 1920 became the first woman associate chairman of the State Democratic Committee and was named the first female delegate-at-large to the national Democratic convention.

In 1928, the Dudleys had the large Tudor Revival style dwelling constructed on Hillsboro Pike. The house was designed by the Nashville architectural firm of Dougherty and Gardner, and it was built by Foster and Creighton contractors. The firm of Dougherty and Gardner was headed by principals Edward E. Dougherty and Thomas W. Gardner. This partnership was in business from 1918 to 1930 and they designed numerous buildings throughout the Southeast. They were especially familiar with the Gothic and Tudor Revival styles and designed a number of notable churches such as the First Baptist Church of Knoxville (NR 3/8/97). The firm was also the associate architect for the War Memorial Building in Nashville and designed the Belle Meade Country Club in Belle Meade.⁴ The Dudley's named their home Hunter's Hill and it originally sat on 500 acres with the farm extending north to Estes Road. The Dudley's purchased approximately 250 acres of this land from Anna Compton, a member of one of the first families to settle in the Forest Hills area, on August 10, 1926.⁵ Construction of the house was completed two years later.

During the Dudley's occupation of the house, Anne Dallas Dudley remained active in civic affairs. In the late 1920s she helped to organize the Womens' Civic League to promote good government and during the early 1930s she also served as president of the Maternal Welfare Organization of Tennessee which promoted women's health issues and birth control.⁶ Unfortunately, the financial constraints of the Great Depression forced the Dudleys to sell the dwelling and 400 acres. The Dudley's sold Hunter's Hill and 46.8 acres to Otto and Louise Shwab Lindenberg on June 3, 1935. The Dudleys then moved to a new home, "Northumberland," on Harding Place on 100 acres of their original estate. During World War II, Mrs. Dudley was appointed to the national Red Cross Board for special volunteer services. She also remained active at a local level particularly in the area of historic preservation. Dudley became chairman of the Association for the Preservation of Tennessee Antiquities and played a key role in obtaining \$125,000 in appropriations from the State to preserve the antebellum Belle Meade Mansion in Nashville.⁷ Mrs. Dudley died in 1955 and her social activism was recognized when she was inducted into the National Women's Hall of Fame in 1995.⁸ Since her death, "Northumberland" has remained in the possession of the Dudley family.

Otto and Louise Lindenberg occupied the dwelling for many years and later willed the property to Elise Lindenberg Houston and her husband P.D. Houston, Jr., and Enid Lindenberg Carney. Paul Montcastle, president of the Life and Casualty Insurance Co., and his wife Lucy purchased the home and 28.9 acres of the property in 1951. The current owners, Harold Stream, and Jamie R. Stream purchased the house and 6.2 acres of the property in 1992 from the Montcastle estate.⁹

The Guilford, Sr. and Anne Dallas Dudley House is a notable example of the Tudor Revival style. The house has not been extensively altered since its construction in 1928, and it retains much of its original design. The house is also notable for its association with Anne Dallas Dudley, who was a leading figure in Tennessee politics and social welfare. The dwelling occupied by the Dudleys prior to 1928 is no longer extant, and this house reflects her prominence from the period from 1928 to 1935. During these years she continued to be active in women's and children's issues on the state and local level.

VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION

The boundary for the Guilford, Sr. and Anne Dallas Dudley House is all of parcel number 57 on Davidson County tax map 130-16. This parcel includes 6.2 acres and is bounded on the north, west, and south by lot lines, and on the east by the right-of-way of Hillsboro Pike.

VERBAL BOUNDARY JUSTIFICATION

The boundary for the Guilford, Sr. and Anne Dallas Dudley House includes the house, adjacent pool house, driveway and entry gates historically associated with the property. Originally part of a 500-acre estate, the land around the dwelling has been continually subdivided and the dwelling now sits on a 6.2 acre parcel. No outbuildings associated with this property exist on any other parcels.




