Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Hampden Congregational Church is a rectangular frame building sheathed in clapboards. Its overall Greek Revival style character is modified by the use of Federal and later Italianate period details. A narrow porch is attached to the front elevation and a short square bell tower surmounts the roof.

The church's symmetrically composed front (west) elevation features a broad gable framing the porch and a Neo-Palladian window. The porch is composed of four Doric columns supporting an entablature and low hipped roof. A paneled two-leaf door framed by a wide, flat three-part surround is recessed behind the columns on a flush sheathed wall. It is bordered by a fluted reveal. Each leaf consists of five panels two of which display Greek frets and a third now carrying a window. The door was further altered with an incision made between the third and fourth panels that reduced its functional height. The narrow wall at either end of the porch contains a three-panel door below a square, nine pane window. Immediately above the porch is a large fifteen-over-fifteen double-hung sash window that is surmounted by a louvered fan with keystone and flanked by wide molded panels. It has a decidedly Palladian effect. Wide paneled pilasters located at the corners of the facade rise to short cornice returns.

Mounted atop the roof ridge is the Italianate style bell tower. It has a short two-stage base capped by broad eaves. The belfry itself features wide corner boards, round arched openings with keystones and imposts on each of four sides and a balustrade in the arch. A denticulated cornice featuring paired brackets is sheltered by the wide eaves of the low pyramidal roof. A weathervane crowns the bell tower. The tower is remarkably similar to the belfry on the 1854 Washington County Courthouse in Machias. Church records suggest that it may have been added in the 1860s.

The three-bay nave contains symmetrically placed six-over-four-over-two triplehung sash windows with three-part surrounds and deep hood moldings. The entablature carries along both side walls and makes short returns at the endwall. A hip roofed chancel with narrow two-over-two windows on both sides is attached to the rear elevation. The chancel is a later addition replacing the original pulpit window. The nave and chancel rest on a modern concrete basement punctuated with windows.

Inside, the church contains a vestibule that is located within the front porch and a portion of the nave. A trio of paneled doors, including a center two-leaf unit, open into the nave. Their plain surrounds in the vestibule are matched in the nave by bold symmetrically molded surrounds with corner blocks. The doors are located below a balcony (now enclosed) that features a paneled parapet employing a Greek fret decorative band. Immediately in front of the balcony and behind the pews are two octagonal posts. The spacious and well-lit nave containing its original pews is organized around a wide central aisle with narrow side aisles. Moldings similar to those found on the door are also employed around the windows. A raised platform framed by a low balustrade announces the sanctuary. Tall fluted pilasters are located at the corners of the rectangular sanctuary opening. A paneled parapet is located at the rear of the chancel.

Interior renovations were made to the church in 1904 and again in 1907. At some point the chancel was added. During the 1970s the ceiling was lowered, the gallery enclosed and pressed tin (perhaps dating to the early twentieth century renovation) was removed from the walls.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Erected in 1835 by an as yet unknown builder, the Hampden Congregational Church is a handsome rectangular frame building which blends Federal and Greek Revival style features with an Italianate bell tower. The robust character of its Greek Revival details and the unusual front porch distinguish the church from the majority of its vernacular contemporaries.

Hampden Congregational Church traces its origin to an organizational meeting held on May 6, 1817, by Rev. Jehudi Ashmun of the Maine Charity School.<sup>1</sup> This meeting was apparently held at the School's temporary quarters in the Hampden Academy. In November of 1834 a lot was given to the Church for the purpose of erecting a meeting house. The present building was constructed during the following year and dedicated on December 16, 1835. In 1888 a sketch of the church building was prominently illustrated in the record of the Sixty-third Annual Meeting of the Penobscot County Conference of Congregational Churches.<sup>2</sup> The building continues to serve the congregation.

Church records refer to repairs made to the pulpit, gallery and vestry windows in 1846 and money subscribed for expenses of the belfry in 1863. Presumably it was about this time that the tower was added to the building. Of particular note is the remarkable similarity which exists between this tower and the belfry of the Washington County Courthouse (N.R. 11/7/76) in Machias. The latter, built in 1854, was designed by Bangor architect Benjamin S. Deane.<sup>3</sup> Whether he was responsible for the design of this addition has not yet been determined.
