DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The New Bitterman building is located at 202-204 Main Street next to the Old Bitterman building; both structures are joined by a common party wall. (Photo 1) Although evidence indicates that a building has occupied this site since at least the 1850's, the present edifice was erected in approximately 1923 after a fire damaged several buildings in the downtown area.

Like the Old Bitterman structure, the newer three-storied Bitterman building has a rectangular plan. The main facade is three bays wide and is laid in smooth-dressed limestone; the remainder of the building is set in a common bond brick pattern. (Photo 2) The structure's design is derived from the utilitarian style of the Chicago commercial school of architecture. Although the building's exterior contains little embellishment, the first floor is trimmed with cast iron and marble paneling which extends around the base of the facade. The double glazed wood doors at the entrance to the building feature a single-light transom. Of special interest is the original curved glass entranceway surrounded on either side by large fixed sash display windows.

The Chicago-style lights on the upper two elevations are divided into three parts-- a large central light with narrow flanking lights and a transom bar, all with fixed sashes. The window-heads are flat with plain moulding on the sides, and the sills and window surrounds are made from smooth-faced cut stone, as is the parapet entablature capping the edifice. · · . the second second second · · ·

8 SIGNIFICANCE

The New Bitterman Building at 202-204 Main Street adjoins the older Bitterman Building. A photograph dating back to the 1880's shows that a more embellished structure occupied this site at that time; it was probably designed by local architect Frank J. Schlotter (1864-1943), who began his practice with the Reid Brothers firm in 1882. In approximately 1923, a fire heavily damaged the building, which was then extensively remodelled into a more functional and modern edifice. The design of the new structure is the work of Clifford Shopbell (1871-1939) and Company, one of Evansville's most prominent architectural firms.

In stark contrast to the more ornate features of the adjoining Old Bitterman Building, the New Bitterman Building is a locally rare example of the Chicago commercial school of architecture. Its utilitarian style is most evident in the plain but handsome three-part Chicago lights. Two bays in width, the windows feature a large central light with two narrower flanking lights, in addition to a transom bar. The parapet entablature is also unaffectedly simple and modern in design and continues to bear the inscribed name "Bitterman", which for nearly a century represented one of the city's most prominent retail jewelry businesses in downtown Evansville.




