Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Georgian Revival-style Fergus Falls City Hall occupies a steeply sloping site on the south bank of the Otter Tail River. The site allows a building design that utilizes a full basement level, open at the west side and rear of the building to house the city fire hall and garage. The front facade remains relatively low and appealing. The Independence Hall-inspired city hall has a central portion that is just over two stories high with gable ends at the sides. Centered in this is a projecting, gable-roofed pavillion. Six raised brick pilasters, in pairs at the ends, separate windows - rectangular on the second level and arched elsewhere in the pavillion as well as in the rest of the building. The front entrance is arched and set between two arched windows. A modillioned cornice and raised brick belt-coursing are used throughout the building. Two enclosed end chimneys mark the ridgeline of the central section.

The east and west wings of the hall are similar but not identical. The east wing is a single story. At the east end is a single door, enclosed in a heavy stone surround consisting of a transom, full-return gabled pediment, and pilasters. The remaining fenestration consists of multi-paned, arched windows.

The west wing is three stories high, accomplished by additional levels below the first floor that take advantage of the sloping site. Arched windows are smaller than those used in the east wing. Raised brick arches on the west facade now house only a single door. They once were entries to the fire hall, now removed. The rear facade has arched and rectangular windows and a single, garage-type door leading to the city garage.

Projecting above the roof-line of the central bay is a

clock-tower. It consists of a balustraded square section surmounted by an octagonal, open belfry with pointed arched openings, a dome roof, and weather vane.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Fergus Falls City Hall is significant for its function in the community as the center for many of the essential community services and for its architectural design, a variation on Philadelphia's Independence Hall. A former city hall burned in The need for a new city hall was acute, and the city 1927. council soon made plans for a new and substantial seat of city government. Half a city block - a site that sloped steeply to the Otter Tail River - was donated for the hall by Vernon A. The new hall was designed to house city offices, the Wright. fire department, and the city garage. Six Minneapolis-St. Paul architects submitted plans in a competition for the hall. William N. Ingemann of St. Paul won the competition with a de-~ sign based on Independence Hall. With only minor alterations, his plans were used. The basic form of the building, a central block flanked by lower, symmetrical wings does show the influence of Independence Hall; the clock tower is a near duplicate of the more famous structure. School children raised money for the The city hall is well preserved and retains its exterior clock. integrity with only minor alteration of the fire hall entrance.
