DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Boxwood, a three-bay brick structure, faces south with a lower frame wing added to the west. The original three-bay structure is laid in fivecourse common bond, with Flemish bond above the quarter round water course on the south facade. The first floor fenestration is of note because of the elongated windows and wooden inset lintels. The front facade is further elaborated by a dentiled wooden cornice. The east gable wall is stuccoed and receives fenestration only at the attic level.

To the west facade a frame wing has been added, flush with the north wall. The wing is two rooms in length with an enclosed winding stair between the rooms. Above, the stair is open to a narrow cross hallway, dividing the two subsidiary bedrooms. On both floors a door gives access to the main portion of the house.

The west room in the main house is the smaller of the two major rooms. Surrounded by a chair rail and crown moulding, the single-bay room features a paneled west wall, with a brick flat-arched fireplace flanked by an open winding stair. The east, or great, room is also bordered by chair rail and crown moulding, and features an open winding stair. The detailing, however, is slightly more sophisticated, including dog-ear corners over the connecting doorway and chimney panel.

On the second floor, the east and west walls are again paneled, but the stairways are enclosed. Crown moulding and chair railing also border the rooms. The bedrooms remain mostly unaltered, with the exception of a bathroom installed in the northwest corner of the two-bay east room.

Bexweed is a remarkably well preserved example of a typical Delaware two-story hall-and-parlor house built during the middle years of the eighteenth century. It stands in the Manor of Frieth, a large rectangular tract on the headwaters of Duck Creek that was granted by the Penns to themselves as a private development enterprise. One of the first settlers on the manor was James Jones, a Welsh immigrant who arrived on the property around 1733. He may have built the present Boxwood house.

The first documented reference to the house is a 1792 survey of Enoch Jones' 717-acre estate, on which this house is clearly shown as the mansion house.

The name Boxwood was applied by its present owners.
