Exterior.

The Old Bergen Church is a Greek Revival style cut-brownstone building with a brick front which is stuccoed. The front has a gracious full length Greek Revival portico with pent supported by six turned columns with square bases. Between the center columns is the church tablet (white marble on black marble) and cornerstone insert. Flanking the tablet and between the columns are two doorways with six paneled doors leading to the vestibule.

The structure is one story high with a balcony and has a wooden decorative belfry atop the roof. Each fa ade of the belfry has two pair of pilasters flanking the louvers. There is a bell within the belfry.

The windows of the church are 162 feet high and four in number on each side.

The corners of the church are pilastered.

A frieze extends around the structure below the eave, but this frieze is not original. It was originally a two baseboard frieze, but was changed to a narrow clapboard sometime after 1947.

The large Sunday School in the Northwest was added about the turn of the 20th century, and a chapel has been recently built.

Interior.

Two symetric doorways lead into the front vestibule of the Old Bergen Church. To either side of the vestibule are stairways to the balcony and basement. The vestibule has three doors to the worship area, the center door leading to the main aisle and the flanking doors to the back of the main 15 feet pews. The central pews are divided by a six foot aisle. There are side pews against the windows on each end.

A low wainscoat screen divides the congregation from the minister. The raised pulpit platform is in this section of the church, centered at the back, the pulpit to the right, and with a center stair. The Communion table is immediately behind the stair, and is flanked by four chairs which are shared by elders during services. The original church terminated here, but later a section was provided for the choir and organ. (In addition to a large Sunday School).

The balcony, entered from the vestibule has thirty pews, in groups of three, separated by aisles, and tiered for maximum vision.

Religion.

The Dutch were the first Europeans to attempt permenant settlement in New Jersey. The first planned town of New Jersey, named Bergen (now Jersey City), was founded in 1660.

Commensurate with the establishment of Bergen, the Bergen Church was founded. Until 1680 meetings were held in any number of private and public buildings. Then, in 1680, an Octagonal stone church was erected at Bergen Avenue and Vroom Street. In 1773 a new building was constructed on the site of the present church, which was built in 1842. The inscription stones of both previous churches appear over the door on the South side of the present church. There are also many of the stones used in the earlier churches in the present one.

Most historians feel that the Old Bergen Church has the oldest religious congregation in New Jersey, and one of the oldest in the East.

Architecture.

The Old Bergen Church, a Dutch Reformed Church, is a classic blending of Greek Revival details and form with New Jersey Dutch influences.
