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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The A. M. Brown house is a one and a half story nine room structure with an attic. The first floor of this bungaloid style building is constructed of rusticated cement blocks while the upper portions are of wood.

A steep gable roof has a double pitch and extends to form the roof of the front porch. This porch crosses the entire front of the house and extends halfway around both sides of the house. Rusticated conrete pilars connected by smooth concrete blocks support the porch roof. A small gable located over the entrance to this porch projects several inches from the porch roof.

A large dormer section located on the center front of the roof has four large windows. The gables contain a central triple window flanked by single windows on either side.

There are two stained glass windows on the first floor, one on the right of the front door and one around the side porch to the right. The front door has a fanlight and sidelights.

The interior walls are of plaster and the molding and door frames are of oak. The floors are hardwood.

The Dr. A. M. Brown House was the home of one of Birmingham's first Black doctors, and was constructed by W. A. Rayfield, an early Black architect.

Arthur McKinnon Brown was born in Raleigh, North Carolina in 1867. On completing his schooling in Raleigh, he was sent to Lincoln University in Pennsylvania, and later entered Michigan Medical School in Ann Arbor. In 1891 he graduated with honors in surgery and opthamolgy, and in that same year he received a license to practice in Alabama. He began his career in Bessemer, later moving to Birmingham. Brown also served in the Spanish-American War.

Brown was instrumental in founding Children's Home Hospital, a small hospital which for many years was the only place in which Black doctors could treat their patients in the area. He was also responsible for instituting what was known as National Negro Health Week, later changed to National Health Week.

After an illness of about a year, A. M. Brown died in 1939.

The house was constructed around 1908, by W. A. Rayfield, a pioneer Black architect who moved to Birmingham in 1907 from Tuskegee Institute where he had worked after his graduation from Pratt Institute. Rayfield designed a number of other residences in Birmingham, although his specialization was churches.

The house remained in the family after Brown's death, and in 1972 Dr. Walter Brown, a son, granted a fifty year free lease to the Birmingham Art Club in memory of his parents. The club uses the building as a community center for arts and crafts.
