Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Kershaw Depot is parallel to the railroad tracks off Cleveland Street between the commercial district and a major residential area in the town of Kershaw in southern Lancaster County. It was constructed by the Southern Railway in 1926 and is typical of frame railroad depots built in small South Carolina towns in the early twentieth century.

#### Additional Information

The Kershaw Depot is a one-story frame building (30' x 88') on wood pilings, covered with shiplap siding to seven feet (height of the door), where molding separates the clapboard from the staggered wooden shingles that cover the remaining wall surface. The hipped, crimped-metal roof has slightly flared eaves, with a six foot overhang supported by stylized knee brackets and braces. Metal hip finialsare located at the ends of the roof's ridge. The track or west facade has eight bays consisting (facing west from right to left) of three double windows, a single entrance, a canted-bay window, a single entrance, a double window and a double loading door. There is a hipped canted dormer over the canted bay with a central louvered panel with flanking square nine-light windows. The east facade also has eight bays (facing east from left to right.) consisting of a single entrance flanked by small, six-light, eye-level windows, a double window, a single door, a double window, a single door, and three sets of double windows. The north facade has two small, eye-level, six-light, single-sash double windows while the south facade has a single, eye-level, six-light, single-sash double windows. All doors have rectangular transoms except for the six-light transom over the double loading door. Double windows have nine-over-one double-hung sash, except for the central window in the canted bay which has twelve-over-one light double hung sash.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Kershaw Depot, built in 1926, is significant both as an intact example of early twentieth-century depots built in South Carolina and for its association with the transportation of passengers and freight on the Southern Railway in the period 1926-c. 1940. It was the second or third depot built at Kershaw, which developed in the 1880s after railroad service was introduced to that section of Lancaster County. This depot replaced an earlier passenger and freight depot/cotton platform which burned in 1926. Its primary use was to handle passengers; it also handled cotton, cottonseed and cotton oil products from nearby farms and cotton oil mills, and textiles from nearby textile mills. The Southern Railway sold the depot to the present owners in 1945; it has since been used as a florist and craft shop.(1)

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The interior plan is basically intact with a central ticketing area flanked by white and "colored" waiting areas. Men's and women's lounges and restrooms are located in the south end, adjacent to the white waiting area. Storage and loading areas are located on the opposite end and have been divided but this has not permanently damaged its integrity. Details such as beaded-board paneling on the ceilings and walls, and the ticket counter, are intact.
