DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Clay County Courthouse, which is situated in the courthouse square in Clay Center, is a two-story Romanesque style structure with a full basement and an attic. The rectangular building measures approximately 80 feet long and 60 feet wide with the main tower reaching a height of 65 feet. Main entrances are located on the south, west and north sides facing the town's business district. The exterior walls are constructed of rough hewn stone laid in alternating courses of narrow and wide stone, which give the building a banded This effect is further emphasized by smooth-cut stone bands at each floor line and the roof line. The shingled hip roof converges at the central clock tower. A smaller pyramidal roof accents each corner. The clock tower is also roofed with a shingled pyramidal roof. Projecting entrance features at each of the four sides are roofed with a gable behind the stone facade. Stone-faced dormers are located on each of the exposed sides of the corner tower roofs and on each side of the clock tower.

Window openings on the basement and first floors are simple rectangles with wood double hung sash windows. These windows rise from stone sills and have massive monolithic stone lintels. The first floor cut stone band occurs at the window sill. Window openings on the second floor are large with semicircular arched heads and stone sills at the second floor band. The small dormer windows are of the rectangular sash type. The main building entrances on three sides occur in large semicircular arched openings at ground level. The projecting entrance feature on each side extends above the roof line and terminates in a stone gable flanked by square stone spires. Corbeled stone work is used to accent the facades and the roof cornice. The dormers in the clock tower are the most ornamental features of the building.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The clay County Courthouse at Clay Center was constructed in 1900 1901 on land donated in the 1860's for use as a public square by the town's founder, Alonzo F. Dexter. An election on November 6, 1866, determined that the county seat should be permanently located at Clay Center. A temporary courthouse was built on the northwest corner of the square in 1868 by John Dexter and Bros., and in later years county offices were housed in various commercial buildings.

In July, 1898, the county commissioners decided to place before the voters the proposition of levying a tax for the purpose of building a courthouse. The proposition was approved the following November, and the county was authorized by the 1898 legislature to collect a three mill levy for three years to prevent indebtedness after completion of the courthouse.

The county commissioners accepted the architectural plans of J. C. Holland of Topeka in January, 1900, and the contract for construction was let August 7, 1900, to J. C. and H. H. Zeigler and J. T. Dalton of Junction City for \$33,770. On August 28 A. F. Dexter and other dignitaries took part in the groundbreaking ceremonies. The contractors commenced work immediately but after completion of the foundation had to suspend work until spring because of bad weather conditions. Cornerstone ceremonies were held April 23, 1901, with people from various parts of the county participating in a parade, banquet, speeches and other activities. In September the contract for furnishing the offices and courtroom was awarded to the A. H. Andrews Co. of Chicago for \$3,448. The building was occupied by December, 1901, free from any bond indebtedness. The final cost of the structure was approximately \$40,000.

Romanesque architecture in Kansas. The use of alternating bands of stone and the massive stone masonry and the dominant central clock tower make this one of the outstanding buildings in the state and one of the most impressive courthouses in north central Kansas.
