Describe present and historic physical appearance.

#### Summary

Established in 1908, Walnut Creek Ranger Station is located in the northwest part of the Prescott National Forest, roughly 34 linear miles northwest of Prescott, Arizona. Today, the station consists of a dwelling, a storage structure, a barn, several small temporary sheds, two permanant sheds, some temporary mobile housing (trailers), a generator, and surrounding pastures. Of the current buildings, structures, and objects only the dwelling and the barn are contributing elements to the Depression-era Multiple Property Nomination. Non-contributing elements include two sheds and a generator.

#### Setting

Walnut Creek Ranger Station lies between the Santa Maria and Juniper Mountains in a broad, uneven valley. While vegetation at the Ranger Station reflects a pervading pinon/juniper habitat type, other tree species such as cottonwoods, walnut, and grasses also occur. An intermittant stream, Walnut Creek, is adjacent to the Ranger Station.

#### Physical Description

Residence: The residence was built according to standard plan A-5, with a few variations. The A-5 series calls for a standard 4 room bungalow-type structure and a floor plan that is a massed rectangle with no projections. Although the roof of the A-5 plan is typically side gabled with a dormer, the Walnut Creek residence is a simple gable roof with no such dormer. Two porches, one full length porch adjacent to the living room on the north side of the structure and one smaller porch located off of the entry to the kitchen, are standard features of the A-5 plan and both exist at the Walnut Creek residence. The windows are double hung sash with six over six lights on the larger windows. Although the plan does not identify a basement, a basement has been added to the residence. Also, adjacent to the residence lying on the south side is small storage structure. This shed was constructed sometime during the 1960s and is considered to be a non-contributing building.

Barn/garage/shop: The barn/garage/shop was built using standard plan C-10, which is very similar to plan C-1 except for use of horizontal board siding. The barn/garage/shop is a bungalow-type with frame construction. The floor plan has

three stalls, two garages, a store room, and a shop on the ground floor. A loft and an additional storage area occupy the second story. The roof is gabled with double roof planes. Five sets of bay doors are on the primary facade. Across a graveled parking area from the barn are a small shed and a generator. These were added to the site during the 1960s and are considered to be non-contributing elements.

#### Integrity

Walnut Creek Ranger Station has undergone no significant alterations since it was constructed. There are no buildings or structures outside the property boundary that impact the visual integrity of the site. The complex retains integrity of design, workmanship, materials, settng, feeling, and association and, therefore, is a good representation of a USDA Forest Service administrative complex from the Depression.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

#### Summary

The Walnut Creek Ranger Station is significant under criterion A [36 CFR 60.6 (a)] for its association with the history of the development of the US Forest Service and the Federal response to the Depression in Arizona between the years 1929-1942. In addition, the station is significant because it lies along an important travel route for central Arizona, plus, a small portion of the site appears to have been used by the military between 1869 and 1871 when Camp Hualapi was occupied.

Walnut Creek Ranger Station dwelling and barn are also significant under criterion C [36 CFR 60.6 (c)] because it embodies a distinctive style of architecture developed by the Forest Service during the Depression-era.

#### Historic Contexts/Background

The Walnut Creek area has played an important role in the history of central Arizona. Although it had long been used by prehistoric and historic Native Americans, the first documented exploration took place in 1853-54 by U.S Army Lt. Amiel W. Whipple. while searching for a railroad route. Following Whipple's visit, scattered farms and ranches began to appear along Walnut Creek during the 1860s. Also during this period a toll road was built from the community of Hardyville which was located along the Colorado River, to Prescott, Arizona. This important road passed through the Walnut Creek area, actually following the creek itself. It went by farms, ranches, small settlements, and a military installation known as Fort Hualapai. After the military abandoned the area in 1871, the population remained fairly constant, never reaching large numbers.

In 1908 when the Prescott Forest Reserve became the Prescott National Forest, a

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Ranger Station was established at the present site of the Walnut Creek Work Center. The land for the ranger station was purchased on May 21, 1908 from a Mr. Charles Allen as a 120 acre tract. Included in the purchase price of \$750.00, the Forest Service also received a five-room house, log barn, chicken house, cellar, store room, two wells, and a cook stove and cooking utensils. Interestingly, one of the wells was apparently dug by the military when Camp Hualapai was occupied.

After the Forest Service purchased Walnut Creek Ranger Station, it appears that several structures, including the house and barn, needed to be "practically rebuilt" due to their "dilapidated " condition. To meet the needs of a new Ranger Station, the house may have been turned into an office and, perhaps residence as well. This work was probably completed by 1912. Later, in 1929, both the office and residence were consumed by fire, apparently from a wood stove.


In addition to the "dilapidated" condition of the house, the log barn also needed repairs. However, instead of rebuilding the old barn, it appears that a new barn was constructed of materials from an "old house" in the area. The barn seemed to have lasted until 1936, when the present barn was built.

Within approximately two years following the fire, during the Depression-era, a new office and residence were constructed. According to an informant, the office was later transported to Mingus Mountain Lookout (Personal communication Mr. Jack M. Foster). In addition, during 1936 or 1937, a new barn was built. Although other depression-era facilities were probably constructed at the Ranger Station, only the residence and the barn have survived.
