


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This farm was settled in 1712, the date of the marriage of Joost Zabriskie and Christina Mabie. At his death in 1756 their youngest son Albert inherited 2433 acres out of the farm, with the homestead and mills; the remainder (now in New Milford), was inherited by eldest son Casparus. Albert's property, confiscated in 1779, was purchased by Col. Isaac Nicoll who lived here from 1783-84 to 1796 when he moved to the portion on the Flatts in New Milford. Reserving the fulling mill to be used as the first schoolhouse planned in 1794, he sold 100 acres to Thomas Lawrence in April, 1796, who sold 20 acres to John Meyers. In November, 1797, Lawrence sold 80 acres with the homestead and one mill to John W. Christie. In April, 1816, the Christie heirs sold to Nicholas Kipp, son of Col. Isaac Kipp. The Kipps lived here until they moved to River Edge in February, 1856 when they sold to Cornelius S. Cooper. He sold 60 acres with the homestead and mill to William H. Melick in November, 1864. The following March, Melick sold 12 acres with the buildings to Peter J. Durie, Sexton of North Church. The acreage remained the same during the ownership of Samuel H. VanDerbeek, 1883-5; Agnes Kennedy, 1885-1908; Wilhelmina and August Persina, 1908-12; Sara and William Mountford, 1912-17; Wilhelmina Persina, 1912-22. In March, 1922, Mrs. Persina sold the homestead with "one acre more or less" to Louis and Elizabeth Dinesen. In August, 1933, the homestead at No. 2 Colonial Court was purchased by the author.

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On June 10, 1779 the three commissioners of Bergen County handling forfeited property sold to Isaac Nichols a tract of land that had belonged to Albert Zabriskie of Schraalenburg (now Dumont), then part of the township of Hackensack. Zabriskie was charged with having joined the army of [the] King of Great Britain in December 1770. The property contained two hundred forty-three and one-half acres with houses, stables, barns, and the like. The consideration was forty-seven hundred and thirty-four pounds. Since he wing of the present house is definitely pre-Revolutionary, it has been assumed that it was probably built by Zabriskie. Nichols was apparently from the number of holdings on record a land speculator. He sold to one Thomas Lawrence on April 18, 1796 a plot of one hundred acres for twenthfive hundred pounds; this plot contained the site of the house. Lawrence sold the following year to John W. Christie. Just when Christie died we do not know, but on April 4, 1816 his widow and heirs sold to Nicholas Kipp for ten thousand and fifty dollars the homestead farm of John W. Christie. Therefore, the main part of the house was built before 1816...

Nicholas Kipp held possession until 1857 when he sold to Cornelius S. Cooper. From that time until 1923 nine transfers are recorded. The [then] present owner [Mrs. McCann] purchased it that year from the Franklin Society for Home Building and Savings.
