DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Bradford House in Lewiston, designed by George Coombs and built in 1876, is a fine and well-preserved urban example of the Mansard style residence.

The house, which faces south, is of brick construction with wood and granite trim,  $2\frac{1}{2}$  stories, a slate roof, and brick chimney. The foundation and entrance steps are of granite, as are the window frames of the lower two stories. The bracketed cornice and ornate trim of the half-story dormers are of wood. A rectangular wooden portico, with square columns supporting a bracketed cornice, covers a central facade entrance. All fenestration is 1/1, except for small rectangular casement windows at the cellar level.

The facade is 3 bays wide. The right-hand bay projects from the main wall of the house, allowing a single window in the first and second stories to face west along the facade.

The west side of the building is distinguished by a 3-sided projecting bay which contains 3 windows in each of the lower 2 stories.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The primary significance of the Bradford House lies in its architectural merit as a high style Mansard urban residence which set the tone for what was in the 1870's a fashionable neighborhood surrounding this city park. Built in 1876 by George Coombs, Lewiston's leading architect of the period, the house was occupied later in the century by a prominent physician, Dr. William H. Bradford.

Dr. Bradford, born in 1866, was the son of Dr. Herbert Cary Bradford, a homeopathic physician who enjoyed a wide-spread and excellent professional reputation. Also the son of a doctor, he was responsible in part for the training of a number of medical students who later practiced in Lewiston.
