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### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Yust Homestead is located on a 4000-acre cattle ranch in a picturesque setting in the broad expanse composing Middle Park. The area, approximately one hundred miles northwest of Denver, is well suited for cattle and sheep ranching, which has been its historic use since the days of settlement in the late nineteenth century. The historic complex consists of a house and eight outbuildings, principally of log and frame construction. The one and one half-story house is clapboarded log with a shed roofed frame section on the east (front) added prior to 1900, and an addition on the north wall off the kitchen. The front porch was added in the early 1900s. The roof is steeply pitched and was originally covered with wood shingles (which can be seen underneath the present aluminum covering in Photo 2). Perhaps the most decorative feature of the exterior is the bay window located on the south wall in the frame addition.

Formal entrance to the house is on the east side through the enclosed screened porch, with another entrance located on the north side leading into the kitchen. The downstairs is composed of a large dining/living room in the frame section with a bathroom, bedroom and kitchen in the addition on the north wall. The log portion contains two rooms on the first level and two rooms in the upper story, all used as bedrooms. The dining room and kitchen have tongue and groove wainscotting, tongue and groove sheathing on the ceiling and plain door and window frames. The original pine flooring remains throughout the house. The walls in the log section are plastered and papered. The two rooms on the second floor are finished, with plastered and wallpapered interior walls with plain window and door frames and baseboards.

In addition to the main house, the nomination includes eight outbuildings:

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ice house — the oldest structure, which was originally used as the residence until
the main house was completed. Log, single pen. (poor condition)
milk shed — located to the immediate north of the house. Double pen, log (poor condition)
outhouse — frame (fair condition)
woodshed — log, single pen (fair condition)
bunkhouse — log, single pen (fair condition)
blacksmith shop — log (fair condition)
blacksmith shop — (deteriorated condition)
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The concrete foundation to the south of the house supported a one-room cabin which was moved to that location and removed elsewhere about 1950. The house, although vacant for 45 years, receives some maintenance and is in fair condition.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The E. C. Yust Homestead, with its extensive collection of log and frame outbuildings in essentially unaltered condition, is significant in being one of the most complete pioneer homesteads remaining in the Middle Park region. It is also of historic interest by its association with early ranching activity in this area.

Middle Park was opened up to settlement by the mid-1870s with the establishment of a wagon road over Rollins Pass in 1873. Grand County was created the same year. Small scale mining booms brought in settlers in the 1870s and 80s; however a decline in mining activity ended the boom era by 1885. The 1885 census of Grand County reveals a population of just fifteen people.

Settlers continued to trickle into the area throughout the 1880s, with cattle ranching and hay production as the main industries. Cattle ranching prospered and remained the largest single industry in the vast area of northwestern Colorado until the 1920s.

The Yust homestead served as a nucleus for the Yust family who settled on the property in 1885. Edward Charles Yust, the original homesteader, was a prospector in the Fairplay-Leadville area between 1872-78, during which time he helped to build the Dudley Smelter in Alma. He resided thereafter in the mining boomtown of Breckenridge until 1885. A blacksmith by trade, E. C. Yust was able to fabricate most of the tools and equipment a small, growing ranch required to operate.

Located in a rural area, the ranch served a social function for some years prior to the founding of the town of Kremmling. The main house living room was one of few places with adequate space to accommodate dances.

The Yust complex is one of few original homesteads remaining in Middle Park and one of the most complete in the state. The house, which is still imagood state of preservation, is unaltered, with all of its original features, such as tongue-and-groove wainscotting in the kitchen and living room, original flooring, original wall covering in all the rooms, intact. The homestead is also noteworthy by the fact that it is one of the few original historic homesteads in Middle Park that is still actively used for agricultural production under original family ownership.



#### Justification

The complex is located in open pasture on a large 4,000-acre ranch. The boundaries are drawn to include the historic complex, following in most cases the fencing that isolate it from open range.
