The Old Chiswell Place is a frame, log, and brick structure built in three stages. The south wing sits at right angles to the main block of the house, giving it a modified "L" plan. The east end of the south wing is the oldest part of the house. It is a frame, 1 1/2 story, A-roofed building sitting on a stone foundation. On either end it has external chimneys (the one on the west end now enclosed by the addition). The facade is three bays with a central doorway; the sheathing is beaded clapboards.

To the west, a one bay log addition was added. The logs are laid up with inverted "V" notches; where the log and frame sections abut, the ends of the logs of the front and back walls are tenoned into mortises in an upright post.

In plan, the frame section is two rooms divided by The staircase is a "T" approached the boxed staircase. from either room with two steps leading to a landing from which the straight run rises. The landing has two wedge-shaped steps built out and resembling winders The log section is approached from opposite sides. two steps down from the frame section; it has a fireplace on the east wall with a narrow, boxed staircase rising between the chimney and the south exterior wall. fireplaces in the west chimney have both been closed off but the mantles are still in place. The east chimney is open but the surround has been replaced with newer brick and the shelf has been removed.

The second floor of the frame section has two rooms on either side of the small hallway. The partitions and ceiling are boards of random widths. On the south facade, a long dormer window has been added since the only light came from the small gable windows flanking the chimneys. The second floor of the log section is completely separate from the frame section.

The two-story Federal style, brick section is connected by a one-story, frame passageway. When the present road was cut through and the facade of the house reversed, the passageway was given a brick "square front" on the west side to mask the lean-to roof. The passage has one room and a hallway across the west facade.

The brick section is laid-up in Flemish bond on the main facade and common bond on the ends and rear facade. It has a three bay facade and a flush gable chimney on the north end. The entrance in the south bay has a transom light; the reveals are panelled. The windows are nine over six double hung sash on the first floor and six over six double hung sash on the second floor.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The significance of "The Old Chiswell Place" is the existence today of a community of buildings which have comprised a working farm for at least 170 years. Beside the residence there is a meathouse of log with an attached springhouse. (The springhouse was moved from its original site by a spring and attached to the meathouse to be near a new well dug more than 85 years ago.*) There is a small log house probably used for storage with sandstone chips used between the logs. There is an early corncrib made of frame and logs, still used as a corn crib. The site is remarkable for giving the immediate impression of a plantation from Colonial days.

It has the further significance of having been the home of three men distinguished in their period. George Frazier Magruder bought this farm in 1778 and moved from Prince George's County where he had been a fourth generation resident and planter, a Grand Juror as a "Loyal Civil Services" during the Revolution, and took the "Oath of Fidelity and Support" to Maryland. He later took the same oath in Montgomery County. (1) He was a large slaveholder and a man of prominence in the community.

When this farm is offered for sale in the estate of George Frazier Magruder in 1803, it is described as "a frame dwelling house, 28x24 ft. with 3 rooms on the lower floor and two on the upper, a kitchen adjoining the house and all other necessary outhouses" (2) etc. Colonel Solomon Simpson bought it but died soon thereafter and Colonel Thomas Fletchall bought the property at public sale in 1804. He willed this farm to his daughter, Sarah Fletchall in 1819. In 1809 Sarah had married William Chiswell whose father had given him 414 acres (in 1810) which adjoined this land.

William Chiswell, the next verifiable resident, was an attorney whose name appears on many transactions between 1810 and 1846. For many years he was the County

7. DESCRIPTION, continued

In plan, the brick wing has an end hall and single The fireplace surround is paneled with a carved roll frieze and a moulded shelf. On either side of the fireplace there are cabinets about 4 feet high with drawers. The window and door frames have mouldings of squarish profile and the corner blocks have a square motif instead of the more usual bullseye. The fascia of the window surrounds does not run below the window sills; instead, either end of the sill is supported by console brackets.

The second floor plan is similar to the first except for an additional small room at the head of the stairs. The bedroom has a fireplace with a surround and mantle similar The staircase continues to that on the first floor. to the attic in an open double run.

Several domestic dependencies have survived. is a small stone springhouse built adjacent to a log meathouse. There is also a small log barn or shed. The log buildings have inverted "V" notched joining and have "A" roofs. The springhouse is shed-roofed.

SIGNIFICANCE, continued

Surveyor for Montgomery County. In 1836 he was one of three designated to purchase land for the County. In 1846 he was appointed to a committee to prepare a draft of a constitution for the Montgomery County Agricultural Society. In 1821 he was one of a group to withdraw from their church and found a new congregation for which he furnished land for its new building.(3) He was a planter, attorney, and surveyor in a section of Maryland that was still frontier land.

The architecutral features of the large brick part of the house indicate that it was built in the 1820's and the fact that William and Sarah mortgaged land in 1826 to raise \$7,100 leads to the belief that this is when the brick addition was built. Elderly descendants point out an indentation near the creek "where I've always been told the clay came from to make the brick for Great Grandfather's house."(4) The addition contained one large drawing room and hall on the first floor and one large and one small bedroom on the The kitchen, dining room, and bedrooms in the second floor. original house continued in use connected to the brick house by a room and a partially enclosed passageway.

8. SIGNIFICANCE, continued

Six of the ten Chiswell children grew to adulthood and one son, George, continued in his paternal home throughout his lifetime. Although its most celebrated occupant, he never held title to this farm. When his mother, Sarah, made her will, George was in Virginia fighting in the Civil War, so she prudently willed the farm to her grandchildren, "the children of my son, George." (5)

In 1862 Captain George Chiswell of Maryland marched "from that State with a full company to join White's Cavalry" (6) in Loudon County, Virginia. Having commanded his company in many engagements under Colonel Elijah V. White, Captain Chiswell objected to joining the Army of the C.S.A. "claiming that as Marylanders they owed no allegiance to the Comfederacy" (7) but finally relented and became part of "Gen. Jones Brigade." (8) "Composed largely of men from the Poolesville area, Co. B, 35th Battalion of Rangers was formed between June and Oct, 1862 at Charlottesville. In December, under Capt. George Chiswell, the company raided its home neighborhood in Montgomery Co."(9)

Capt. Chiswell commanded with distinction and bravery in the almost constant fighting in Virginia. A book written by an officer who served with him (10) as well as his personal letters, reflect the pressure, danger, activity, and devotion to duty which characterized his service. He was seriously wounded at Brandy Station, Va. June 9, 1863 and was returned to his home in secret to be nursed back to health. An eye bolt visible today in the ceiling of the large bedroom held the rope and pully to suspend his injured leg. In Oct.1864 he writes his wife from Paris, Va. "I have thrown away my crutches or rather given them to Elijah Veirs." (11) He continued in service until he was honorably discharged April 8, 1865 to return to his home where he lived until 1891.

8. SIGNIFICANCE, continued

An 1865 map published by Simon and Martenet shows the location of the house and the marking "George W. Chiswell." When a road was commissioned in 1869 "for the public convenience" the property is shown on the plat (12) belonging to "Sarah Chiswell's Heirs" who received \$20 damages for 110 perches.

Having bought full title to the farm from their brothers and sister Captain George's two maiden daughters continued to farm the Old Chiswell Place. They lived in the frame house and used the beautifully furnished brick part of the house for "summer boarders" who came regularly from Baltimore and Washington to spend a few weeks in the country.

Today the house, ancient farm buildings, and 145 acres are owned by speculators. Health authorities of Montgomery County have advised the owners that unless a new well and septic system are installed the house must be condemned. The owners do not value the house, which is occupied by renters, and have advised the County authorities that they will probably tear the house down rather than comply. Notified by this committee of the historicity of the place they have said they will reconsider ("think it over").

When Russell Wright visited Poolesville in July, 1973, he strongly urged that this property be nominated to the National Register of Historic Places because of the existence of the community of farm buildings and residence.
