The McGowan family became the leading family in the immediate vicinity, and their plantation was a gathering place for political, social, and religious functions. Hamilton and Elbert McGowan were twins, and, along with their younger brother, Robert, they helped to construct the first Methodist church in the area, McGowan's Chapel in 1857.	PHOTOS
The plantation was entirely self-sufficient. Cotton, corn, vegetable crops and melons were cultivated. A cotton gin was operated on the place and cotton ginned for the neighbors. There was also a grist mill, saw mill, and molasses mill located on the original homestead.
