The Deming Armory is a two-story brick structure on a poured concrete foundation. The main entrance is an arch and lobby (at the head of a flight of concrete steps enclosed by brick guards) leading to a double metal door. The facade is described by the Deming Graphic of January 14, 1915 as "castellated" (with reference to the decorative concrete parapet and coats of arms). The facade is embellished with belt courses and niches. The roof is pitched, with a single ridge, and has asphalt shingles. It drains to four sumps inside the roof parapets. The building has an attic which can be reached by a set of hinged retractible steps. Above these steps there is a hatch in the roof.

There are doors in the west end of the building at the main floor and basement level. The building has a full basement. Concrete lateral stairways lead under the main stairway to the basement entrance. The basement level windows are protected by wire mesh and steel rod barricades. There are two rows of windows above these at the main floor and balcony levels.

The principal dimensions of the building are as follows:

132' X 50' = 6600 sq. ft. main room, main floor 4608 sq. ft. (96' X 48') main room, ground floor 1728 sq. ft. (54' X 32') total interior floor area: 14,000 sq. ft.

The main floor (the "drill hall") has a maple floor. The basement level was originally intended as a social and meeting area for the Guards; it was furnished with chairs and reading tables. Card and locker rooms and showers occupied the basement level rear. The long room on the north side of the basement was equipped for target practice. This space also served as a bowling alley and billiard room.

The plumbing and wiring in the building seem to be, at least in part, replacements of the originals. The building has not been altered otherwise.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Deming Armory was built in response to the Mexican Revolution which kept Mexico in a state of turmoil for the decade following 1910, and gave rise to fears of invasion or guerrilla attacks across the border. It was also a response to the war in Europe, and the possibility that the United States might be drawn into the conflict. It therefore illustrates and commemorates America's passage from national or continental military and political concerns, to international involvement and responsibility. The building is also significant architecturally, as a highly specialized structure designed by the prominent firm of Trost and Trost in El Paso. H. C. Trost was the first professional architect to devote a major portion of his career to New Mexico and his firm dominated the State's architectural scene between 1905 and 1925.


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
A local contractor named W. W. Barracks oversaw the construction of the building. Excavation for the foundation and basement was completed on January 13, 1915, according to the Deming Graphic; the finished structure was accepted by the Armory Board (Adjutant General H. T. Herring, chariman) on May 25, 1916, from G. A. Trost and W. W. Barracks.

The Armory was vacated by the National Guard on February 8, 1976. In the course of its fifty-year history, the Armory was a training facility for soldiers in two world wars, a recuiting center in war and peace, and a USO headquarters. It also served Deming as a social club; the guard regularly sponsored or permitted dances and fiestas there.


It now serves as the Luna County Historical Society headquarters and Deming Luna Mimbres Museum.
