Name: Brownville - Summerville Residential - Commercial Historic District,
Phenix City, Russell County, Alabama

Location: *Roughly bounded by 15th and 23rd Sts, and behind 14th Ave.*

Runs north and south along Broad Street and Summerville Road, continues east and west on Railroad Street, including side streets up to four blocks west of Summerville Road.

Acreage: Approximately 87

Verbal Boundary Description:

The district begins at the intersection of Broad and 14th Street. It includes part of 16th Street and turns north to 5th, 6th, and 7th and stops at 8th Avenue. At the base of Summerville Hill, Broad Street becomes Summerville Road, where it intersects with Railroad Street. Railroad Street runs east and west from 6th Court to 11th Avenue. Summerville Road branches off east and west to include 19th Street, 10th Court, 10th Avenue, 9th Avenue and part of 20th Street. Summerville District continues north to the top of Summerville Hill and runs west taking in 10th Court, 11th Avenue, 22nd and 23rd Streets and stops at the corner of 24th Street. Description:

The Brownville - Summerville Residential - Commercial Historic District encompasses intact streets of residential housing, two schools, two churches, and two small commercial areas. The houses are detached, wood frame and brick single-family residences. They range in size from relatively large mansions (by Phenix City standards) to small shotguns and date from late 19th century to mid-20th century. Styles represented include Greek Revival, Victorian, Neo-Classical and Bungalow. Many houses are rather plain and simple, others feature elaborate detailing. The few examples of Greek Revival cottages are located on Summerville Road and 20th Street. Victorian cottages are well represented and are scattered throughout the entire district. Most of these houses have elaborate ornamentation, decorative shingles, attic vents and porch post. Gingerbread can be found on even the smallest house. The larger cottages have detailing in the gables as well as on the porches. Neo-Classical style homes are found in small clusters on Summerville Road and 9th Avenue. One features a monumental portico supported by Corinthian columns. Bungalows begin at the base of Summerville Hill and are scattered to the top. However, one small neighborhood of Bungalows is located at the top of Summerville Hill surrounding the 1921 Elementary School.

Most of the houses, especially those on Broad Street and Summerville Road, are situated near the middle of their rectangular shaped lots and are set back from the street. These houses have a sidewalk in the front yards. The lots are informally landscaped. Two churches are located in the district and both front Broad Street. The 1911, Gothic style Catholic Church is simply landscaped with small shrubs. The major intrusions in the district are two gas stations, a Handi-Mart, one grocery store and a drug store, which all front Summerville Road and Broad Street.

The Brownville - Summerville Commercial District encompasses two historic commercial areas. One located near the site of the depot on Railroad Street has three buildings left; the first gas station built in Phenix City, a coal and ice company and a small grocery store. The second commercial district is located on Broad Street. The Masonic Lodge, built in 1922, and a few one-story brick commercial structures remain.

Significance:

Architecture. The Brownville - Summerville Residential - Commercial Historic District is architecturally significant for its collection of mid-1880's to 1930's commercial and residential structures. Only a few pre-1880 houses remain, being c. 1850. Having Greek Revival designs, these homes are one story, central hall plans, with five bays on the front facade. The trabeated entrance is flanked by two windows to either side. While these buildings are not by any standard excellent examples of the Greek Revival style, they are the earliest examples of it in this area.

The majority of houses in this district are late Victorian workers cottages. The structures are simple in craftsmanship, yet employ extensive carved, decorative woodwork around door and window frames, and on porch columns. These houses represent the type of buildings being utilized by millworkers in the Columbus cotton mills. They suggest by their small size, and poor quality materials that the owners were not of financial means, yet the ornate gingerbread on the porches and milled door and window surroundings suggest the importance of decorative house detailing and the need to follow popular building trends of the time. Moving throughout this district are Neo-Classical homes of various sizes, from a two-story monumental porticoed home, to one-story Victorian homes with Neo-Classical porch detailing which was added to update

homes in order that they would be in keeping with contemporary styles. Once again these buildings show an awareness and understanding of the current building trends.

The third significant style of building in the district is the Bungalow. Several one-story brick and stucco homes are found on Summerville Road. These buildings are significant as they represent the final building boom prior to World War II. They are collectively the finest example of this construction period in Phenix City.

The commercial architecture in this area is the finest collection intact in the city limits. Two 1920's corner gas stations, each in a different area, a three-story Masonic Hall and several one-story commercial buildings, all of brick, provide examples of commercial construction during the pre-World War II era of the roaring twenties.

Commercial. The Brownville - Summerville Residential - Commercial Historic District is significant commercially for the series of commercial centers scattered throughout the neighborhood. Built as a group of small neighborhoods which blended into each other, the center of each was a commercial district which serviced the surrounding houses. Two are intact in the district, one includes a coal and ice company, and the first gas station in Phenix City, while the other contains a Masonic Hall, a gas station, and several one-story commercial buildings. These areas were the commercial centers, while major shopping would have had to have been done in Columbus.

The Brownville - Summerville Residential - Commercial Historic District had its origins in the economics of the development of the Columbus cotton mills - such as Muscogee Mill Company, and the Eagle and Phenix Mill. Mill owners recognizing the existing factors in Phenix City,

determined that property could be purchased cheaper, and houses built on lesser standards. The Columbus Ironworks constructed cheap housing with ornamental wood work to make them appealing, and the Eagle and Phenix Mill, in particular, imported workers from Tallapoosa County, Alabama, to work the machinery. By providing cheap housing and commercial centers, the mills were able to manage workers and keep control over them, thus making more effective the economics of the mill.

Community Planning. The Brownville - Summerville Residential - Commercial Historic District, to some degree, reflects gridiron planning efforts seen in Columbus. The original Brownville area began around the 14th Street Bridge with commercial buildings, two churches and a school in a ½ mile radius from the bridge. Residential areas were to the immediate north. Summerville was located on the hill above Brownville and was made up of large dwellings which are no longer extant. These homes were owned by wealthy Columbusites and provided shelter from the sicknesses of the lowlands. The existing area shows the outward growth of Phenix City through architectural styles, with the few remaining Greek Revival homes close to the 14th Street Bridge and Victorian homes moving up Summerville Hill. By the 1920's and 1930's, residents were building Bungalows on Summerville Hill, and a new school of Bungalow/Prairie style was constructed in 1921. Homes were clustered around this school, creating an entire planned neighborhood facing the school. The community planning in this section of town, or lack thereof, provides insights into the growth and architectural tastes of the citizens.

6. House (1014 23rd Street): c. 1930; Brick Cottage; one-story, brick, high gable roof with intersecting front gable with italianate brackets; side screen porch enclosed with brick.
10. Hester House (1009 22nd Street): c. 1890; Victorian Cottage, one story, wood, gable roof; recessed front porch with turned columns, eaves brackets and spool and cutout gingerbread; turned balusters, transom with entablature.
11. Parker House (1011 22nd St): c. 1890; Shotgun, converted from old schoolhouse; one-story, wood frame, gable roof with boxed return eaves; turned posts on front porch.
12. Summersville School (about 1012 22nd St.): 1921; public school building; one-story, wood frame with stucco, hip roof with gable in hip; flat roof 1945 cafeteria addition; square bays protruding on either side of an open-gable stoop; recessed porches connect rooms in back of building.
13. McLendon House (2200 10th Ct.): c. 1930; Bungalow; one story, hip roof, wood frame with aluminum siding; battered pier columns on brick bases support a gable roof front porch with louvered vent.
14. Glenn House (2202 10th Ct.): c. 1930; Bungalow; one-story, wood frame, hip roof with intersecting front porch gable, rectangular vent in gable; modified porch columns, wrought iron.
15. Ramsey House (2204 10th Ct.): c. 1930; Bungalow; one-story, wood frame with aluminum siding, hip roof with intersecting front gable, rectangular vent in gable; modified porch columns, wrought iron.
16. Windham House (2206 10th Ct.): c. 1925; Bungalow; one-story, hip roof, flemish bond brick; front gable in hip with louvered vent and eaves brackets; shaped exposed rafters; brick porch supports and fanlight over front door; ornamental brickwork in chimney.
17. Kent House (2207 10th Ct.): c. 1921; one-story, stucco, gable roof with tri-part louvered vent in front gable and eaves brackets; porch and side carport have massive stucco supports and similar brackets; transom over front door.
18. Dobbs House (2208 10th Ct.): c. 1930; Bungalow; one-story, wood frame, gable roof; extended front porch with open front gable and double post supports on brick bases; transoms over all windows.

House (1805 Summerville Rd.): c. 1880; modified Greek Revival; one-story, wood frame, hip roof with metal shingles; 9x9 windows and double leaf front door with transom; c. 1930 modified front porch, multiple post construction porch supports on brick bases and similarly framed attached side carport extending full front porch.
32. Rental house (1806 Summerville Rd.): c. 1890; Victorian Cottage; one-story, wood frame with asbestos siding, gable roof; full recessed front porch with battered pier columns on brick bases, more recent; small rear addition.
33. Rental House (1808 Summerville Rd.): c. 1880; Greek Revival; one-story, wood frame with asbestos siding, gable roof; transom and sidelights; full recessed front porch with recently added ornamental iron posts and railing.
34. Ray House (1810 Summerville Rd.): c. 1880; Greek Revival Cottage; one-story, wood frame, gable roof; recessed full front porch; 9x9 windows; more recent brick porch with ornamental iron posts and railing.
35. Greer House (1812 Summerville Rd.): c. 1870; Greek Revival Cottage; one-story, wood frame, hip roof; large full recessed front porch; transom and sidelights; modifications of porch--brick porch with wooden pier supports on brick bases.

39. Claridy House (1901 Summerville Rd.): c. 1885; Victorian Cottage; one-story, wood frame, gable roof with double intersecting front gables with cutout vents; transom and sidelights; boxed return eaves; modified front porch altered in shape, size.
41. Gillens House (1903 Summerville Rd.): c. 1890; Victorian Cottage; one-story, wood frame, hip roof; transom over front door, full length front windows; porch modified pre-1929 with stucco columns and a carport side extension.
42. Rental House (1904 Summerville Rd.): c. 1900; Victorian Cottage; one-story, wood frame, hip roof; transom and sidelights; full recessed front porch modified with hollow square wooden columns on brick bases; vinyl siding.
43. Morgan House (1905 Summerville Rd.): c. 1870; Greek Revival Cottage; one-story, wood frame, gable on left, hip on right; transom and sidelights; small 9x9 windows; full recessed front porch with beveled solid wood columns.
44. Old Baird House (1906 Summerville Rd.): c. 1900; Neoclassical Style Victorian Cottage; one-story, wood frame, high hip roof with intersecting front gable; transom over front door with pilasters and entablature; L-shaped shed-roof porch with fluted corinthian columns, frieze and dental molding.
45. Burch House (1907 Summerville Rd.): c. 1920; Bungalow; one-story, wood frame, hip roof; recessed front porch with large brick columns; transom over front door.
46. Moler House (1908 Summerville Rd.): c. 1895; Queen Anne Victorian Cottage; one-story, wood frame, gable roof with elaborate bargeboard and cutout vents; floor-length front windows on partial front porch; boy window with recessed panels above and below, beneath extended front gable; transom and entablature; recent wrought iron porch posts substituted for turned posts and gingerbread.
47. Black House (1909 Summerville Rd.): c. 1900; Victorian Cottage; one-story, wood frame, gable roof with intersecting front gable, boxed return eaves; transom with pilasters and entablature; shed roof front veranda with solid beveled wooden posts and gingerbread.
48. Locke House (1010 Summerville Rd.): c. 1900; Neoclassical Style Victorian Cottage; one-story, wood frame, hip roof with intersecting front and side gables with pediments and tri-part vent windows; L-shaped porch with Tuscan columns, frieze, dental molding; ornamental bargeboard; transom and sidelights in leaded glass; stained glass window in side bay.

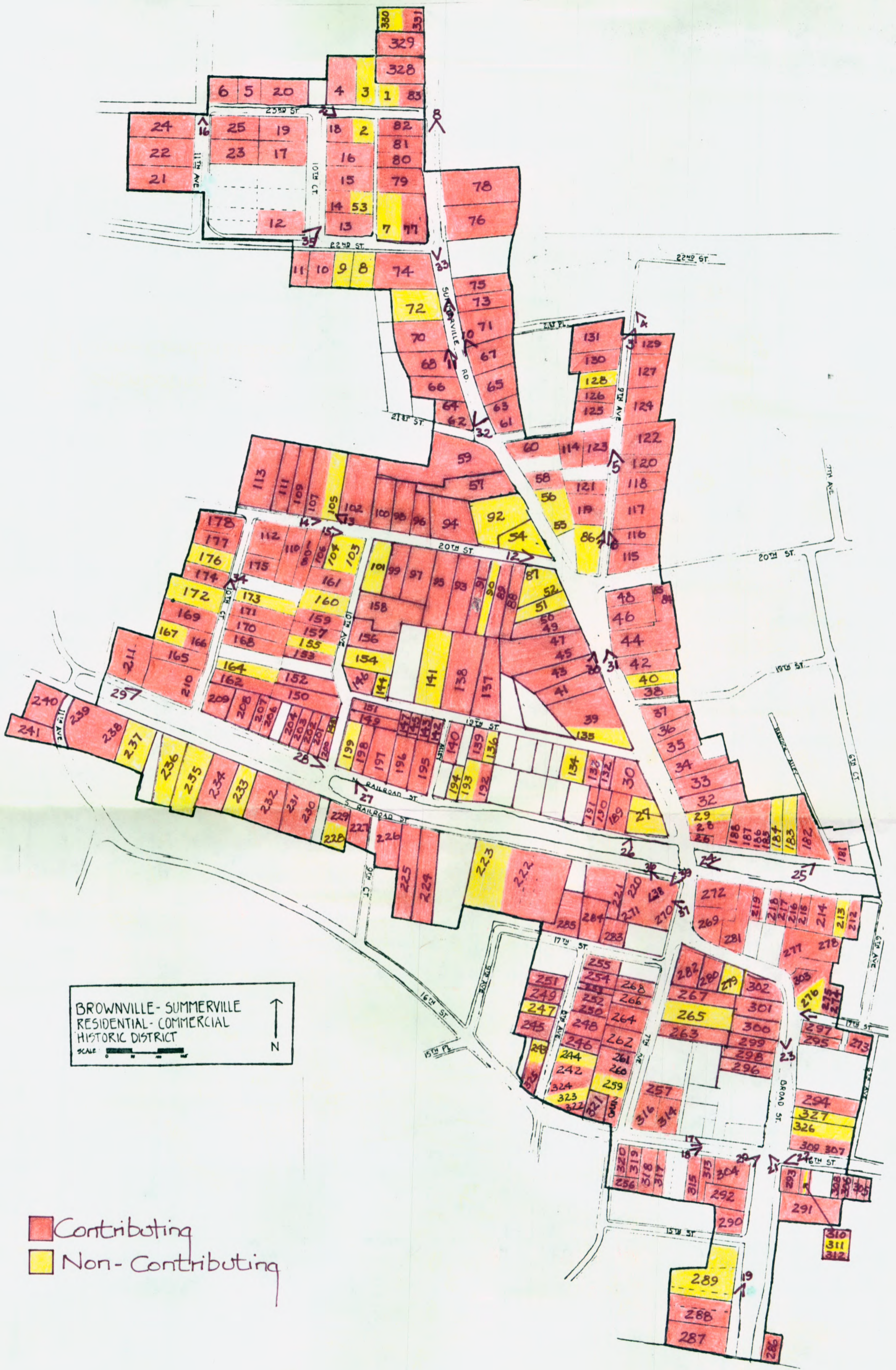
