

DESCRIPTION

The Lake Carlos State Park WPA/Rustic Style Historic District consists of two buildings and one structure located along the northwest shore of Lake Carlos in the public use area of the park. The park is situated on the north end of Lake Carlos, east of the town of Carlos and to the north of Alexandria. One non-contributing building is also included. Architects for the park buildings were from the Central Design Office of the National Park Service and the State of Minnesota.

Department of Natural Resources building identification numbers are placed after the name of each building.

1. Structure: Water Tower 1-296 Builder: WPA Architect: National Park Service Date: 1938-39

The Water Tower and Pump House consists of a 14'6" square section for the Water Tower and an adjacent 11'6" x 10' one story section for the Pump House. The tower is constructed with split stone which rises to a height of 7'10" and is followed by a 10' frame section with vertical boards and battens. The tower is capped by a hip roof which adds an additional 4' to the building. Louvered openings are placed just under the eaves on both the north and south facades. The entrance is sheltered by a canopy which is supported by timber brackets. The pump house is also constructed with split stone but is covered by a shed roof. The original casement windows have been infilled.

2. Building: <u>Sanitation Building</u> 1-294 Builder: WPA Architect: State of Minnesota Date: 1940

The Sanitation Building is a 28' x 18' structure covered with a gable roof. Split stone walls rise to a height of 3 1/2' with rough 10" horizontal siding employed above the stonework. Board and batten siding is utilized in the gable ends. Four-light casement windows which hinge at the bottom are organized in pairs on all four sides of the building. The stonework on the south (lake) facade extends beyond the end walls to

form entrance screens. The screens are completed with vertical boards which rest on the low stone walls. Lookouts project from the gables. The building's original wooden shingles have been replaced with asphalt and new fixtures and skylights were added during a 1963 remodeling.

3. Building: <u>Bath House</u> 1-297 Builder: WPA Architect: O. Newstrom Date: 1941-42

The Bath House is a standard design utilized in many state parks with overall dimensions of 82'2" x 22'6". It consists of a split stone gable roofed central section containing a concession, restrooms, and storage areas flanked on either side by loggias which allow circulation through the building. Partially enclosed changing wings were originally constructed on either side of the building and could be accessed from the loggias. The wings consisted of a low stone wall followed by 1" x 10" rough siding "sawed irregular from native logs." The walls were completed with a stone cap. The women's changing area, located on the west facade. was 2'8" longer than the corresponding men's wing and also contained individual changing booths. Foot showers were originally located in a small indentation on both end walls.

A 7' counter for the concession was located on the lake facade. It was sheltered by a canopy supported by timber brackets and could also be closed with wooden shutters.

The changing wings have been removed, although the low stone walls remain intact, and in 1974 a vending wing with a steel roll-up type door was added to the east end of the building. Restrooms were added and now fill the entire space once occupied by the concession space. Skylights were also added.

4. Building: <u>Shelter</u> 1-295 Builder: Unknown Architect: DNR Date: 1968

The Shelter is a $40'2" \times 24'2"$ building constructed with $4" \times 8"$ cedar timber walls. Two 7'2" openings are placed on both the north and south facades and one opening is placed on the east facade. The building is covered with a gable roof. The Shelter is non-contributing.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Lake Carlos State Park WPA/Rustic Style Historic District is historically significant for its association with the social, political, and economic impact of the Great Depression and the subsequent development of the various Federal Relief Programs such as the Works Progress Administration which was responsible for its construction. The park buildings are also historically significant for their association with the development of the Minnesota state park system. The park was considered an important link in the state park system by providing a recreational facility located in one of the state's summer resort centers in west central Minnesota. The park attracted a large local population as well as tourists coming from other states.

The Lake Carlos State Park WPA/Rustic Style Historic District is architecturally significant for its examples of Rustic Style split stone construction featuring irreplaceable labor intensive methods and finely crafted detailing. These buildings are characterized by nonintrusive and environmentally sensitive designs based on National Park Service design philosophy and master planning.

Lake Carlos State Park was established in 1938 with funds appropriated by the State Legislature in 1937. The park is one of fourteen established between 1937 and 1938.
