DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

City Hall is one of three buildings in Columbus which show the influence of the Romanesque style. The building consists of a central mass four bays square, with east-west masses six bays long and two bays wide attachedon the north and south; a four story tower is centrally placed at the north end, with its base projecting slightly from that elevation. Each mass has a steeply pitched slate roof, the tower has a square pyramidal roof, and there are prominent parapet gables on the ends of the east-west wings. Flanking the gables and at the corners of the tower are octagonal corner buttresses capped with conical finials.

The elevations consist of a high basement of rock-faced ashlar limestone beneath smooth brick walls, with a string course between the first and second floors and machicolations under the eaves. The basement windows are deeply recessed square openings; those above have only slight reveals, and are topped with round arches of header coursing. All windows have their original two-over double-hung sash; those of the second floor additionally had large transom lights, now replaced with solid panels. In each of the gables there are two fixed single-glazed square windows in file with the openings below, and the apex is filled with diagonally laid coursing.

The treatment of the tower on the main (north) elevation is the building's principal feature. In the base, the main entrance is recessed within a large round arch, whose smooth surfaces contrast with the rock-faced coursing from which it springs. There are two sets of entrance doors; outer weather doors and heavily carved inner doors. All doors are double glazed leaves, with transom and side lights. Immediately beneath the impost of the arch on either side are inscriptions with the date of construction and the names of the architect and builder; the the wall above the entry, a large tablet lists the names of the mayor and city council. The two windows on the second story of the tower are rectangular, with no visibly expressed lintel; directly above them is a tablet with the building's name. At the third floor level a single round window with four lights set inside header coursing is centered on the north wall. A string course separates the third and fourth tower levels above them, wooden louvers fill masonry openings idential to those of the second floor windows, and brackets of corbelled brick extend beneath a masonry reveal just below the crown mould of the eave.

All interior walls and floor systems are wood frame, still in good condition. The roof structure consists of large timber trusses bearing on the exterior masonry walls. The masonry shows no signs of settlement or deterioration.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Columbus City Hall is significant both in its architectural design and in its architect, Charles F. Sparrell.

In style, the City Hall combines elements of two Victorian Romanesque revivals. The expanses of smooth wall and the shallow window reveals are typical of the earlier Romanesque Revival of 1840-1880. The rock-faced coursing of the basement, corner buttresses, and particularly the treatment of the central arched entry derive from the Richardsonian Romanesque mode. The building is a conservative attempt to reconcile the desire to use then-fashionable Richardsonian devices with established methods of construction. The occurance of the Romanesque Revival in Columbus is limited to three buildings; of these, the City Hall is the most impressive example.

Charles F. Sparrell was Columbus' only practicing architect in the nineteenth century. Sparrell's commissions in the 1890's were numerous, and included large school buildings, commercial structures and residences, but the City Hall, is his best-known work. Sparrell was the only architect in Columbus to design buildings in the Romanesque Revival style.

Flans for a new city hall building have been drawn; when that building is complete, new uses will have to be found for the old City Hall.

As the City Hall the building has been a major structure in the lives of Columbus residents. It has served as the focal point for municipal political and governmental activities in Columbus for almost eighty-five years.
